The Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has identified legacy/resource development revenue as one of its priorities and included monies in its 2014 for this initiative (\$20,000).

In consultation with the region's municipal CAOs and subsequent meeting while at NCLGA in Fort St. John with Mr. Fred Banham, Mr. Banham has put forward a work plan proposal, together with costs for this initiative for review by the Regional Board. It is expected that the project costs over the course of the remainder of 2014 and first half of 2015 will be \$40,000. As the RDBN presently has a budget of \$20,000, consideration in the 2015 budget for the second half of the project can be addressed at that time.

It is expected that the RDBN will be working closely with municipal staff and Councils to move this important initiative forward.

Attached is the legacy work plan proposal together with a timeline and costs for your consideration and approval.

#### **RE: Industrial Legacy Work Plan Proposal**

Dear Ms. Chapman:

As follow-up to our meeting and discussion in Fort St. John about Bulkley Nechako access to new sources of local government revenue to assist with economic diversification and community infrastructure upgrades, I have prepared an 'Industrial Legacy Work Plan Proposal' for your review and consideration. I submit this plan as a draft subject to review by the CAOs and the Regional District.

This project is difficult to specifically price out because of the variety of meetings and expenses incurred by not just the consultant but local government in conducting research, hosting meetings, elected official expenses, travel expenses and presentation materials. Another factor is how quickly, does the Regional District want to move ahead with the entire initiative. As a budget estimate, we are likely looking at a project investment of \$40,000 over the next 12 months by the time we get to a point on making presentation 'Asks' to industry.

The 'Industrial Legacy Work Plan Proposal' is laid out in a manner that identifies the target goal, with a list of objectives required to achieve the primary goal. Each objective has a primary lead that will provide the bulk of the information for that objective and assistants who will help or coordinate achieving the objective. I have estimated a relatively tight time frame required to meet the each objective and estimated the amount of consultant time required for each.

I would be available to assist the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako with this initiative as a consultant. My working time is billed at a rate \$100 per hour, travel time when required is \$50 per hour and expenses are additional based upon receipts.

I look forward to your response to the work plan. Thank you for the opportunity to be part of this timely and important initiative.



# **DIGITIZING PROJECT**

## FILM

- 1. Best quality film: The Legislative Library would be the source of the microfilm as it would be the best quality. The microfilm is held by BC Archives who will sell a duplicate master of the film for digitization.
- 2. Cost to purchase duplicate master reels: approximately \$110.00 per reel.
- 3. How many reels are there? Right now the Legislative Library has microfilm of the Interior News from 1910 1993. A guess would have it at 56 to 58 reels.

# **DIGITIZATION OF REELS**

- 1. UBC would be able to participate. It has the capability to digitize reels of microfilm. It is possible they could digitize the film in-house for a fee. This would save the huge expense of buying equipment and paying a wage for someone to do the entire process.
- 2. Cost is \$250.00 per reel, approximately based on previous projects. The cost of doing it in-house (UBC) is unknown at this time.

# HOSTING

- A program UBC called CONTENTdm is the database that powers the BC Historical Newspapers website. It will take the digitized information/newspapers and upload it all to a server with all that this involves. Cost \$105.00 per roll plus \$20.00 for collection set up.
- 2. If the project is hosted at UBC a link can be provided to connect to the landing page of the Interior News.
- **3.** If hosted by UBC they will do any required maintenance or error correction as part of the commitment to host the material.
- 4. Additional years would continue to be added at the same per-reel rate of the first batch.

# PROJECT

1. Total cost per reel: \$485.00 (rough estimate). 59 reels x \$485 = \$28,130.00

#### TIME

1. If we did 10 reels at a time it is suggested that we allow up to a year to complete a 10 reel project.

# Project to Digitize 100 Years of Smithers Interior News

**History** – During a North Coast Library Federation meeting in November 2011 a guest speaker from the Irving K. Barber Learning Centre spoke on a project that was ongoing, digitizing all the newspapers in British Columbia. Grants can be applied for through the Learning Centre by any organization wishing to undertake digitization of their newspaper. The grant application is quite specific: any group applying for a grant would have to raise 50% of their proposed costs before applying with the Irving K. Barber Learning Centre grant providing matching funds up to \$15,000.00.

In 2012 many local citizens in Smithers were preparing projects to celebrate the Town's Centennial and were looking for historical information. The Bulkley Valley Genealogical Society, who were producing the Chronicles of Smithers for the Centennial Celebration were looking at a mountain of work to collect our community's history. When asked if it would have been helpful to their research if the Newspaper was digitized and linked to the Smithers Library web site, there was a very quick, positive response. It would be a powerful tool for researchers and bibliophiles that utilize the library. It was pointed out that digitization of local newspapers and delivery of the information via a website is already being done by the Prince George, Terrace and Kitimat Libraries.

**Feasibility of the proposal -** The Prince George Library had their own equipment, staff and server to digitize their newspaper. They have been receiving yearly grants for 6 years from the Irving K. Barber Learning Centre to help with the process. Terrace and Kitimat Libraries received grants and use their own programs. We have also explored the digitization process employed to digitize the Merritt Herald by the Nicola Thompson Museum. **Beneficiaries of digitized information** - We know that many will benefit from easy access to the historical issues of the past 100 years of the Interior News: teachers and students, lawyers, historians, museum curators and administrators, researchers, authors, mining engineers, prospectors, insurance companies. Access will be available to anyone, anywhere in the world, from their home, at no cost.

**Organizing the project** - Other organizations might be willing to support this proposal and with that thought in mind, we proposed to form the Interior News Digitization Group with the Smithers Library Board and the Friends of the Smithers Library undertaking the lead.

- Black Press through the local publisher Grant Harris was asked for their permission, endorsement and assistance with this project. They have given us permission to digitize their newspaper and have agreed to supply us with vital information to assist in the accumulation of old copies of the Interior News and a letter of permission to use their copy righted publication.
- The Bulkley Valley Genealogical Society indicated in writing that they would join the group and appointed Laurie McArthur to represent their Society at future meetings. They have donated \$1,000.00.
- The Bulkley Valley Historical and Museum Association have joined the group with a promise of a \$1,000 donation.
- Smithers Public Library Board has endorsed the project and appointed Vicki Alton to represent them in the Digitization Project Group.

**Source of microfilm records** – Currently microfilms of the Interior News are held by B.C. Archives in the Legislative Library in Victoria. As well, the Terrace Branch of Northwest Community College and the Bulkley Valley Museum each have a collection of microfilms. The best, most pristine microfilm would be with the BC Archives and they have agreed to let us purchase copies for our use in the digitizing process. Their index specifically lists The Interior News in negative form from 1910 to 1990 and commercially filmed issues from Jan. 1994 to Dec. 1998, a total of 56 reels. There are gaps in accessible sources for digitization between 1990 and 1994 and moving forward from 1998 to 2005. This will take a bit of work with having to use all available sources to complete this project.

**Reproduction Needs** –To purchase the microfilm reels from BC Archives the cost will be approximately \$110.00 per reel, 56 reels to date. Digitization includes the scanning of the film, cropping the images, colour correction, folderization and applying filenames. CONTENTdm is a database used for the BC Historical newspapers website. By the time a microfilm reel is digitized, ingested into this website, making the full text of the newspaper searchable we are looking at approximately \$600.00 per reel.

**Financing the project** –Black Press has been very co-operative in providing us with copy right permission and access to their files. In addition, they have agreed to advertise this project with a plea for donations from the general public. The Friends of the Smithers Library is a registered charity with Revenue Canada and may issue tax-exempt receipts for donors. In addition the Digitization Group intends to apply to local foundations, various government departments, businesses and service clubs.

In closing, we hope to submit a grant application to the Irving K. Barber Foundation this year when they open for applications in November, 2014. The plan is to start small, digitizing the first 10 reels to work out any bugs. Letters of support are imperative to assist in our being successful with any grant application we make. This presentation is to update all of you on this project. All we ask is, if you can see the worth of a project like this, to provide us with a letter of support to accompany our grant application. Your letter would be a vital addition to our information. Thank you for listening to us and we look forward to being able to share with our communities the time when we can say that with a click of a mouse history is at your fingertips! # UBC digitization program brings B.C. history to the world

An innovative UBC program has provided more than \$1 million in funding to help B.C. communities promote their unique histories to audiences around the world, thanks to digitization.

The support will allow users to view photos related to the Japanese-Canadian internment on the West Coast in the 1940s, peruse the pages of historical B.C. newspapers and much more.

Launched by the Irving K. Barber Learning Centre in 2006, the B.C. History Digitization Program (BCHDP) provides matching grants to support projects that make B.C. heritage freely accessible to the public via the Internet.

This year, nearly \$188,000 in matching funds was allocated for 23 projects throughout the province. In total, the BCHDP has awarded more than \$1.02 million for 120 grants over the past six years. "The BCHDP not only provides funding to make B.C.'s history available to the world – it also represents an investment in our communities," says Simon Neame, director of the Learning Centre. "Since its inception, the BCHDP has been dedicated to helping libraries, archives, museums and post-secondary institutions share their unique resources with a broader audience."

"We are again pleased with the breadth and scope of historical material that will be digitized by B.C. institutions as part of this unique financial partnership," adds Chris Hives, BCHDP coordinator and university archivist.

Sixty-six of the 120 grants given out over the years have supported projects based outside of the Lower Mainland; nearly one-third of the projects have focused on the digitization of photographs. One of this year's recipients is the West Vancouver Memorial Library, which will use the funds to add 1,500 digitized images to its online repository.

"The B.C. History Digitization Program, together with the support of the Friends of the West Vancouver Library, has made it possible for us to draw attention to a hidden treasure in our keeping," says Deb Hutchison Koep, deputy director at West Vancouver Memorial Library. "Local collections reflect the community and promote an important sense of ownership over cultural institutions like our Library."

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Many B.C. newspapers have also been digitized since the BCHDP began – including local papers in Prince George. That project's next stage is focusing on digitizing titles from 1977 to 1985.

"We are extremely proud of what we have been able to accomplish with funding from the B.C. History Digitization Program," says Marc Saunders, public service manager at the Prince George Public Library. "The high-quality images we are acquiring now will be used in some form for many years to come, perhaps even for generations."

Other items to be digitized in this latest program round include: 1,500 photos and artifacts from Burnaby's Nikkei National Museum related to the Japanese-Canadian internment on the West Coast between 1941 and 1947; a portion of the extensive Karl Spreitz film archive at the University of Victoria; and photos from The Reach <u>Gallery</u> and Museum Abbotsford for the Abbotsford Living History Project.
