RIO TINTO ALCAN – Gareth Manderson, General Manager and Lianne Olson, Stakeholder and Community Relations Liaison – RE: Update

Chair Miller welcomed Gareth Manderson, General Manager and Lianne Olson, Stakeholder and Community Relations Liaison, Rio Tinto Alcan. Ms. Olson introduced Jackie Lytle, Communications and Communities Advisor, Nechako Watershed, Rio Tinto Alcan.

Mr. Manderson noted that he has transferred from Rio Tinto's operations in Australia recently and spoke to the quality of individuals working in Rio Tinto Alcan's (RTA) operations in both Australia and B.C. Mr. Manderson mentioned that the commissioning of Rio Tinto Alcan's Kitimat Smelter Moderation Project has been very successful. RTA recently provided a tour to approximately 2000 people to look at the new operations. RTA is very focused on the modernization and success of the smelter. The hope is that the modernization will increase the life of the smelter by 60 years but that will require RTA's ability to understand the interests of stakeholders and communities in the Nechako Watershed. In order to have long term success Mr. Manderson spoke to the importance of finding ways to work with the residents to understand their issues, concerns and needs.

Chair Miller mentioned the Northwest Resource Benefits Alliance (NWRBA) and the potential to work with Rio Tinto Alcan to share and redirect resource benefits to local governments for future long term sustainability in the region. Mr. Manderson mentioned that he has experience in discussing revenue sharing and he would be comfortable discussing revenue sharing with the NWRBA in an appropriate forum. Mr. Manderson noted that he attended the Union of B.C.

DELEGATIONS (CONT'D)

RIO TINTO ALCAN - Gareth Manderson, General Manager and Lianne Olson, Stakeholder and Community Relations Liaison - RE: Update (Cont'd)

Municipalities Convention in Victoria, September 26-30, 2016 to get an understanding of the interests of the Provincial and Local Governments in the region.

Director Newell mentioned the Northwest Regional Hospital Board of Directors concerns in regard to Sulphur Dioxide (SO₂) particulates being emitted into the air from the RTA Kitimat Smelter and scrubbers needed to reduce SO₂ levels. Mr. Manderson mentioned that the Kitimat Smelter is below British Columbia and European safety benchmark regulations in regard to SO₂ emissions. It was decided during the modernization project to install an aggregated collection system wherein they collect emissions and put them through scrubbing facilities with a higher stack, a higher velocity and temperature to assist with the increase in production. With the increase in production these adjustments have mitigated the potential increase in SO₂ levels at the modernized Kitmat Smelter to compare to the smelter prior to the modernization project.

Director Thiessen mentioned that he had met with Mr. Manderson on October 19th and is looking forward to building a new relationship with Rio Tinto Alcan and working to develop a water use plan for the Nechako Reservoir. The community of Vanderhoof wants to work towards further relationship development with Rio Tinto Alcan.

Chair Miller stated the importance of Rio Tinto Alcan understanding stakeholder concerns and the integral link of the RDBN in regard to the water and air shed and developing a water management plan for the Nechako Reservoir.

Chair Miller encouraged having further conversations regarding the Northwest Resource Benefits Alliance and thanked Mr. Manderson, Ms. Olson and Ms. Lytle for attending the meeting.

Director Lindstrom spoke to discussing in the past with Ms. Fresco the possibility of having riprap in the Nautley River to assist in raising the water levels of Fraser Lake. Ms. Fresco noted that the issue has been included in the strategy as Fraser Lake's issue. Moving forward in the funding and implementation plan connections between organizations and agencies that can assist in addressing the issue will be completed and hopefully projects will be able to move forward. Ms. Fresco has also had discussion with the Northwest Invasive Plant Council and how they could assist with the issues.



DELEGATIONS (CONT'D)

FRASER BASIN COUNCIL - Theresa Fresco, Assistant Regional Manager, Upper Fraser RE: Update (Cont'd)

Director Thiessen spoke to the changes to the water bed of the Nechako River and the impacts on the future health of the river. He noted the community of Vanderhoof is asking the question "How can the community be involved and not do further damage or damage the downstream health of the river." Ms. Fresco noted that the University of Northern B.C. research water sub group called the Integrated Water Research group that are researching water quantity, quality and sedimentation on areas such as the Nechako River and watershed.

Ms. Fresco stated that UNBC is also developing a centralized location "water portal" that will store all the information from the University, Province and First Nations in one location on the Nechako River and Reservoir.

Director Greenaway commented that there has been a lot of assistance from UNBC at the Nechako Roundtable Technical Advisory Group. The administrative support for the Nechako Roundtable is located in Prince George but Ms. Fresco has spent a lot of time travelling through the region in regard to her work on the Roundtable. Director Benedict mentioned that there is a need for residents located near the Nechako Reservoir to comment and provide input.

Sustainable Funding for Watershed Governance Initiative (SFWGI) was discussed. Ms. Fresco has informally invited Rio Tinto Alcan and will provide formal invitations to Rio Tinto Alcan and other industries along with local government, provincial government, Department of Fisheries, Chambers of Commerce and other stakeholders to discuss the pilot project funding.

Discussion took place in regard to the water flow temperatures impacting salmon returns and the role of Rio Tinto Alcan regarding flow levels of the Nechako River.

Chair Miller questioned the impact from Canadian Nation Railway (CN) on the river system. He noted the Regional Board's concern in regard to dangerous goods and the potential impacts of a CN derailment along with response times. The waterways are an extremely valuable resource and it is very important for everyone to understand their value. Ms. Fresco noted that CN is not currently at the table but the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is a participant in the discussions and those concerns have been raised. Ms. Fresco spoke of meeting with CN's Environmental Manager and encouraging future discussions.

Discussion took place regarding education and lobbying efforts in regard to funding and moving initiatives forward regarding the health of the Nechako Watershed. Ms. Fresco noted that funds are limited and priorities have had to be established to receive the most impact.

Director Parker spoke to involving the agriculture sector in the health of the watershed. The Nechako River and Reservoir are surrounded by agriculture lands. Ms. Fresco mentioned that she is currently working to build relationships in the agriculture sector and any assistance would be beneficial.

Chair Miller thanked Ms. Fresco for attending the meeting.

Omineca Beetle Action Coalition -Sharon Tower, Executive Director - RE: Update (Cont'd)

Ms. Tower mentioned that she has been visiting communities in the region to provide updates in regard to the Omineca Beetle Action Coalition (OBAC).

Ms. Tower spoke to OBAC being formed in 2005 to review the impacts of the Mountain Pine Beetle epidemic on communities and plan for when the full impacts become a reality. Communities are now experiencing the impacts of the Mountain Pine Beetle on the midterm timber supply and analysis shows there will be a loss of 20,000 jobs over the next 5-10 years. The Annual Allowable cut is also being reduced by 13 million m³ per year for the next five years.

OBAC was to be funded by the province until 2017. The Coalition still has the support of the province but was not granted continued funding. Other funding options are being investigated.

OBAC strategies and action items were developed in 2006 to 2008 and 70% of the action items have been completed or are being completed currently. One of those strategies included transportation which is critical to education, diversification, industry, etc. Having a unified voice moving forward to the province enabled the Coalition to secure meetings with Deborah Bowman, Assistant Deputy Minister, Transportation and Policy Programs, Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure to move forward, although complex, a tangible plan for Highway 16 transportation.

Three strategies that have had less uptake due to various reasons, one being, time for community collaboration are:

- Tourism;
- Community and social services supports;
- Attraction and retention.

Ms. Tower noted that she has been speaking with staff at the Village of Burns Lake and encouraging the use of strategic plans that OBAC has already completed work on, social ready projects, that individual communities can utilize.

The role of the Coalition moving forward will continue to focus on the strategies developed which mostly focused on the forest sector as communities continue to transition and attempt to diversify. The Coalition provides a unified voice to focus on the current needs and issues found collectively throughout the region.

In 2014, OBAC completed a Forest Policy Paper that identified two key initiatives:

- 1. More input into the management decisions made by the Province;
 - the Province has committed to working on the 18 action items outlined:
- 2. Continued coordination of conversations with the Province:
 - Eq: Regional Wildfire Forum:
 - Highlight from the meeting:
 - Need for the continued coordination by the Coalition to assimilate information and bring forward to the Province in a unified manner.

OBAC also has a detailed diversification and implementation plan that is available on OBAC's website. Ms. Tower spoke to the need for continued conversation with the Province and working with the Members of Parliament in the region to provide a joint media release for the Federal Government to continue to support the Coalition.

Director Repen spoke to the importance of advocating and receiving the attention of the Federal Government in regard to funding for OBAC and initiatives to assist with the impacts from the Mountain Pine Beetle epidemic. He spoke to OBAC, funding for OBAC and diversification being critical for the region. Ms. Tower mentioned that on November 18, 2016 OBAC is meeting with Nathan Cullen, MP Skeena Bulkley Valley. Ms. Tower extended an invitation to attend the meeting.

Chair Miller spoke of the capacity challenges faced by small Municipalities and Regional Districts and the need to work together in a collaborative unified manner to bring forward issues to the Province and Federal Governments.

Josette Wier - RE: Genetically Modified Organism's (GMO's)

Chair Miller welcomed Josette Wier.

Ms. Wier has been addressing the issue of Genetically Modified Organism's (GMO's) in the Smithers area for the past three years and spoke to the following:

- Presented a petition with 511 signatures from residents in the Bulkley Valley against the use of GMO's in the valley:
 - o People spoken with were unaware of the use of GMO usage;
- The Ministry of Agriculture had conducted three GMO trial studies in the Bulkley Valley;
 - o requested information through a Freedom of Information and Privacy request;
- Resolution passed by the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board of Directors in April, 2013 in regard to GMO's.
- Recently presented to the Town of Smithers in regard to her issue;
- An overview of her experience in regard to a resident that purchased property neighbouring Ms. Wier's and planted GMO canola;
- Farming Industry Review Board and her request to have a four metre buffer and a one hour notice prior to the spraying of the canola crops with pesticides;
- Ms. Wier's personal condition that makes her susceptible to chemicals;
- She is a farmer as well and only wants responsible farming;
- Studies of pesticides (herbicide/insecticide/fungicide) has shown that overspray has been found up to 500 metres away from the area being sprayed;
- Growing GMO crops require the spraying of pesticides and has also created chemical resistant crops;
- She has attempted to investigate the exact chemicals being utilized but has not been provided the information;
- Two regulating bodies for pesticides but monitoring is very limited:
 - Provincial legislation investigates the proper storage of pesticides and reacts to complaints to wrongful use in ditches and riparian areas;
 - Health Canada Pesticides and Pest Management Pest Monitoring Regulator Agency;
- pesticide health risks to humans;
- How to coexist:
 - An organic farm next to a farm using GMO's must have a minimum eight metre cultivated land buffer between the properties in order for the organic property to maintain organic status;
 - Only coexist with proper rules and guidelines;
 - o The ability to communicate and discuss issues;
- The impact to beekeepers in the region due to the use of GMO's;
- Encourage the RDBN to implement rules and guidelines;
- 18 jurisdictions in the province that have resolutions against GMO's, most recently the City of Victoria.



DELEGATIONS (CONT'D)

Josette Wier - RE: Genetically Modified Organism's (GMO's) (Cont'd)

Ms. Wier made three requests of the Regional Board:

- 1. Reaffirm the April, 2013 Regional Board resolution regarding GMO's;
- 2. Allow concerned citizens to attend the RDBN hosted Agriculture Forum to discuss GMO's;
- 3. Invite the RDBN to initiate meetings with the farming community and agencies addressing GMO's.

Director Parker brought forward the eight metre cultivated land buffer between farms in order for an organic farm to maintain its organic status and the potential ability to split the eight metres between the two farms. Ms. Wier indicated that could be a possibility but both farmers needs to be receptive.

Director Fisher stated his willingness to participate in discussion regarding GMO's in the farming industry in the Bulkley Valley and co-existing but spoke to the need for patience in the process moving forward. He noted the need to have discussions with all stakeholders to address the issue.

Chair Miller mentioned that the RDBN does not have the legislative authority to ban Genetically Modified Organisms but can potentially have discussions with agencies that do have legislative oversight of GMO usage.

The Bulkley Valley Dairyman's Association has submitted a letter titled "Genetically Modified Organisms" as well to the RDBN that is on the November 3, 2016 Committee of the Whole Supplementary Agenda. Director Fisher noted that there may be an opportunity to meet in the future to discuss the issue and he felt that it may have a greater impact in the Bulkley Valley area rather than the Nechako area of the RDBN.

Chair Miller thanked Ms. Wier for attending the meeting.

WESTERN CANADA MOUNTAIN BIKE TOURISM ASSOCIATION – Martin Littlejohn, Executive Director RE: Update – Mountain Biking Trail Maps, Northern BC Brand and Logo –via Teleconference – 11:05 a.m.-11:14 a.m.

Chair Miller welcomed Martin Littlejohn, Executive Director, Western Canada Mountain Bike Tourism Association via teleconference.

Mr. Littlejohn provided an update in regard to the Western Canada Mountain Bike Tourism Association's Mountain Biking Trail Maps and Northern BC Brand and Logo application to Northern Development Initiative Trust (NDIT). He mentioned that there are currently four communities involved in the Destination BC Co-op Marketing program: Prince George, Burns Lake, Smithers and Terrace. The trail maps, Northern BC brand and logo were originally outlined in the Northern BC Mountain Bike Recreation Tourism Strategy in 2014/2015. There was a need identified to create a brand to represent the region that would also allow other communities once ready to join would be supported in the branding. The communities have made funding contributions with matching funds being provided by Destination BC. The funding request to NDIT is for additional financial resources to include additional branding components to promote mountain biking.

The goal is to have the maps completed by January, 2017 to utilize at the outdoor travel tradeshows to promote mountain biking. They will also be utilized by Travel Information Centres and the Mountain Bike Clubs to showcase opportunities in northern B.C.

WESTERN CANADA MOUNTAIN BIKE TOURISM ASSOCIATION – Martin Littlejohn, Executive Director RE: Update – Mountain Biking Trail Maps, Northern BC Brand and Logo –via Teleconference – 11:05 a.m.-

Discussion took place regarding methodologies to determine if the marketing is working and assisting to increase mountain biking awareness and tourism in Northern BC. Mr. Littlejohn mentioned that communities have recognized an increase in mountain bike tourism in that trail counters available have shown an increase and campsites are full with riders. Mr. Littlejohn mentioned that a survey has been recently conducted with partner communities in the province in regard to what methodologies and key performance indicators being utilized to provide an overall picture for the province.

Chair Miller thanked Mr. Littlejohn for attending the meeting via teleconference.

Chair Miller mentioned that this pre-budget planning session is the first step towards developing the 2017 budget. It also allows for the review of works/projects completed in 2016 and the projected works/projects needing to be completed in 2017.

Ms. de Weerdt commented that she has reviewed the budget process completed in past years and is receptive to suggestions by the Regional Board to any changes they may wish to implement.

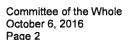

Director Repen also spoke to the resource benefit funds that some small communities in the province receive which allows those communities to upgrade their infrastructure and benefit economically.

Mr. Borth spoke to the term "Dividend" and the political decisions to make the Rural Dividend Fund an application based fund. He spoke to the Rural Dividend Advisory Committee discussing some of the issues in the future.

Discussion took place regarding communities attempting to find projects that align with the criteria. An arena is an example of an economic development tool for communities and yet the infrastructure does not align with the criteria of the program. If infrastructure is not taken care of there will be no economic development. Communities would like to have funding for their core priorities. Director Bachrach spoke to concerns in regard to taking capacity from municipal core priorities and reallocating to try and find projects that would fit the criteria.

Director Thiessen spoke to being a member of the Rural Advisory Committee and being one of four Mayors on the fourteen member Board. He spoke to the UBCM completing a similar survey to the Forestry Consultation Process that was recently undertaken to determine the actual needs and requirements of rural B.C. communities. Mr. Borth spoke of bringing the ideas forward at the Rural Advisory Committee next week at its meeting in Victoria.

Director Benedict asked if each Electoral Area could apply for the Rural Dividend Fund. Mr. Borth indicated that each Electoral Area would be eligible to apply for funds and collectively use the funds on a project. Director Benedict spoke to potentially applying for funds for an Electoral Area joint project.

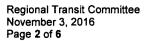

Discussion took place regarding the suggested changes brought forward at the October 20, 2016 Regional Transit Committee Meeting. Chris Fudge, Senior Regional Transit Manager, BC Transit noted that some changes have been incorporated and work is continuing to address the changes.

BC Transit has requested feedback in regard to the revised draft service, fare, infrastructure and policy proposals by November 10, 2016.

Discussion took place in regard to the buses being purchased by the province and contributing 100 percent of the capital cost and 66.69% of the operating cost for the service for the term of the agreement. The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure has committed to three years due to their commitment requirements at this time but do not intend for the project to end after the three year term. Mr. Fudge outlined what has happened in the past in regard to the purchase of vehicles when a transit system is implemented. The Province contributes its share and the local government provides its share through loan financing. In this funding model the new buses are being fully purchased with the funding provided by the Province. To have the buses operational as soon as possible buses will be utilized from BC Transit's contingency fleet until the purchase process for new buses can be completed. Standard life span for the light duty buses is five years.

Director Bachrach spoke of support from the Town of Smithers in expediently moving forward with the Highway 16 Inter-Community Transit System. Discussion took place in regard to the preliminary cost calculations influencing service levels provided for communities in moving forward.

Director Thiessen voiced concerns in regard to the cost implications to the District of Vanderhoof, connectivity to travel from Vanderhoof to Smithers, potential ridership and clear outlines regarding ridership. He also spoke to the potential impacts to other transportation operators along Highway 16. The District of Vanderhoof not being included in the organizational discussions at the start of the process was also a frustration. Director Bachrach outlined the hub model wherein there are regional hubs with transit spokes to move individuals to locations with higher levels of commercial, government, health services, etc. Discussion took place regarding the ability to trial the system and can make changes in response to immerging patterns in moving forward.

Director Parker commented that the original concept for the Highway 16 Inter-Community Transit system was for safety in assisting in removing hitchhiking from Highway 16. He questioned if that was still the priority and/or the priority was also to provide a transit system to move volumes of people. Debbie West, General Manager, Nee Tahi Buhn mentioned that for the community of Nee Tahi Buhn the value is having an affordable means of transportation that is safe.

Director Thiessen indicated the need to discuss the transit system with Saik'uz First Nation and determine their needs and wants. Chair Miller mentioned the challenges moving forward without having full consultation and discussion with all First Nations communities within the RDBN. He noted the success of the Highway 16 Transit System will be determined by having everyone participating. He spoke to the meetings that along with Director Bachrach, he had resolved to move forward from the meeting on October 20, 2016. They recently met with Lake Babine Nation and noted their desire to support Highway 16 Transit.

Director Repen noted that there are separate funds to provide secure hitch hiking locations and exploring the use of technology to provide a more secure way for people who will continue to hitchhike. Director Repen commented on his experience with hitchhiking. He also spoke to the Draft Terms of Reference allowing the ability to participate but also allows the ability to make changes if necessary.

Discussion took place regarding the consultation processes to determine the want and need for an inter-community transit system.

Director MacDougall mentioned that he participated on the Provincial Organizational Committee and there were representatives from communities and First Nations along Highway 16 including Fort St. James and discussions at that time were to have the Highway 16 Inter-Community Transit System complement services already in existence. He commented that Nak'azdli Whut'en Band, Tl'azt'en Nation, Binche First Nation and Fort St. James are developing a partnership to connect transit from Fort St. James to the Highway 16 Transit.

Director Newell spoke to transit studies that have outlined the benefits of low cost travel, economic development and safety.

Chair Miller commented that there is a desire to move forward with the draft terms of reference and discuss the costs associated with the transit system.

Chair Miller thanked Ms. West for attending the meeting.

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REPORT

Transit Committee Preliminary Cost Calculations

Discussion took place regarding municipal council consideration of the memo titled "Transit Committee Preliminary Cost Calculations." The District of Fort St. James, Villages of Fraser Lake, Burns Lake and Telkwa and Town of Smithers will be bringing the memo forward at their council meetings during the week of November 7-10, 2016 for consideration. Director Repen noted the Village of Telkwa's support for the transit system in principal and recognizes the funding challenges being experienced. Director Bachrach mentioned that there have been discussions with Moricetown in regard to the service gap between Moricetown and Smithers and the Town of Smithers is investigating options to partner with Moricetown to mitigate the service gap. The District of Houston has considered supporting the service.

Director Fisher indicated his support of the transit system utilizing grant in aid contributions at this time in the amount of \$1,000. He spoke to advocating for the use of Federal Gas Tax funds for services such as transit. He suggested the potential and staff to develop a strategy to advocate for the use Federal Gas Tax funds. Discussion took place regarding the criteria for Federal Gas Tax funds.

Discussion took place regarding the startup costs and the allocation of those costs over the current three year term. Chair Miller mentioned that the allocations may change depending on the commitment of partners. He has spoken with Chief Wilf Adam, Lake Babine Nation and indicated there was support from LBN. Ms. West spoke to capacity challenges faced by some of the First Nations communities and suggested that visiting those communities would be beneficial. Chair Miller commented that in conversations with INAC (Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada), they have agreed to provide funding for travel costs for First Nations representatives to attend the Regional Transit Committee meetings.

Director Thiessen mentioned that Saik'uz First Nation is indicated to be "On Corridor" and they are "Off Corridor." Director Thiessen suggested having a conversation with Saik'uz First Nation in regard to their willingness to participate in the transit system.

Discussion took place regarding the preliminary cost calculations; there can be reconsiderations and adjustments depending on the potential for rural contribution through grant in aid and other potential partners.

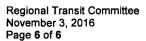
Director Parker indicated his support for the transit system and spoke to the Village of Fraser Lake investigating the opportunity to purchase a bus and he showed his support for that initiative.

Chair Miller reiterated his and Director Bachrach's commitment to meet with the First Nations in the future to discuss the Regional Transit System and cost calculations.

Director Thiessen spoke of his support of the transit system but voiced concerns regarding the cost implications to the District of Vanderhoof. He noted the need for the Highway 16 Inter-Community Transit System to be a regional system. Chair Miller spoke to communities needing to determine the threshold in which they are able to contribute and that there is support to find a solution.

Chair Miller commented that he has spoken to the College of New Caledonia and they outlined the potential benefits to their students in having a transit system. He mentioned the economic and social benefit that a transit system would have in the region.

Discussion took place regarding the constraints of legislative requirements that are a consideration moving forward with developing a funding model.

Melany de Weerdt, CAO Update:

- Disseminated to all local governments and First Nations listed;
- Determine the level of interest and feedback in terms of governance, funding models/structures and level of participation;
- Document was also provided to BC Transit and Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure for feedback.

Discussion took place in regard to the structure of the advisory group and the Regional District being the agreement holder. The RDBN Board of Directors will vote on decisions and recommendations from the Regional Transit Committee to make the final decision due to legislative restrictions and requirements.

Concerns were brought forward in regard to a fair and equitable model for rural residents due to the small percentage of rural residents that will access the service. The process moving forward will be to understand who the partners are which will affect the level of service. It is a voluntary service.

The parameters in regard to Rural Directors voluntarily providing grant in aid to the service along with Chair Miller's ability to appoint Electoral Area Directors to the Committee, was discussed.

Director Repen spoke to the challenges faced by Telkwa wherein the current fare to ride the bus from Telkwa to Smithers is \$2.75 and the proposed route fare will be \$5. The level of participation that will be needed for the service was discussed. Without participation the program most likely will not continue past the three year timeline that the Provincial Government has currently committed funding. Chair Miller mentioned that it will be necessary to have participation from the majority of potential partners and First Nations or the service will not be sustainable.

The BC Transit model was discussed in regard to the license holder needing to be a local government. Throughout the province, all transit systems have local government partnership. The Town of Smithers had initially agreed to be the agreement holder but it was felt that because the RDBN Board of Directors encompasses more of the route it may be a more balanced agreement holder. Discussion took place regarding the support of the Regional District Board of Directors for recommendations coming forward from the Regional Transit Committee. Due to the legislative requirements, BC Transit's guidelines that a local government must hold the agreement and the Provincial funding that has been provided to create the service, the Regional District is a suitable option to be the agreement holder.

The Regional District is a part of similar structures regarding other services that certain Electoral Areas participate in and are ratified by the entire Regional Board. This occurs to provide a general benefit for the whole region.

Discussion took place regarding 55% of the population of the Regional District being outside of the municipalities and if there is a small percentage of the rural population that participates in the services it will increase the success and potential of the system.

Chair Miller mentioned that the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure has committed to fund a transit coordinator position to assist in moving the service forward. He spoke to the advantages of the Coordinator working closely with First Nations participants to develop partnerships. First Nations participation will depend on the relationship with the communities and each First Nations community individually. Chair Miller spoke to the need to develop a communication protocol with First Nations in moving forward.

Director Illes spoke to concerns in regard to the potential of the lack of participation increasing the contribution amount from the participating members. There is a threshold for the majority of communities in regard to their ability to contribute funds and taxing their residents. Chair Miller also noted the more ridership the more funds will be contributed to the service.

Discussion took place in regard to supporting the first draft of the Terms of Reference and receiving further input from municipalities, First Nations and other partners. The Electoral Areas can have discussions to decide if they would like to be a participant of the committee or not. Director Bachrach noted that the Terms of Reference does not address the funding formula but the participation in the Regional Transit Committee. Director Bachrach will bring forward to his council the funding model for discussion. Ms. de Weerdt noted that the development of the Terms of Reference can run concurrent to the process moving forward.

DISCUSSION ITEM

Illegal Dumping

Alternate Director Stoltenberg provided a verbal report in regard to Director Fisher's comments regarding illegal dumping in Electoral Area "A" (Smithers Rural). He spoke of creating a partnership with the Conservation Officers Service (COS) to address illegal dumping. Director Fisher mentioned the use of local volunteer recreation groups to assist with illegal dumping cleanup. He noted that actions such as education, community clean-up events and creating an RDBN Policy to acknowledge and encourage action would assist in addressing illegal dumping.

The RCMP's ability to fine for littering was discussed along with the challenges associated with cleaning up illegal dump sites throughout the region. Discussion took place regarding the mechanisms and the need to follow through to fine individuals that dump garbage outside landfills and transfer stations.

Chair Benedict mentioned that the topic was discussed at the Electoral Area Directors Forum held at the UBCM Convention in Victoria in September, 2016. She commented that other regions in the province have agreements and contracts in place with the COS, RCMP, Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (FLNRO) Compliance and Enforcement Officers to address illegal dumping. Director Parker noted that the COS provided direct contact information to the RDBN for future contact.

Discussion took place regarding contractors removing their garbage on logging blocks once they have completed the work. Director Miller commented that if a logging block is not cleaned of garbage when a BC Timber Sales wood lot is inspected the contractor will lose their deposit and/or not be allowed to bid on future timber sales.

Janine Dougall, Director of Environmental Services noted that when persons contact the RDBN to report an illegal dump site their information is forwarded to the COS and if the site is located close to a Regional District Landfill or Transfer Station, RDBN staff will assist and go through the garbage to attempt to determine who dumped it. In the Vanderhoof area, FLNRO staff survey the lands to find and clean-up illegal dump sites. FLNRO may connect it to a community clean-up day or Earth Day to promote community assistance and the RDBN will waive fees at its Landfills and Transfer Stations to assist with the clean-up. She spoke of the benefits of the program and that the program has operated for a number of years. Trail cams in sites known for illegal dump areas was discussed.

The Chinook Comfor Shareholders Agreement and Limited Partnership Agreements are now signed and complete.

The Village of Burns Lake and the Regional District now wish to enter into a partnering agreement for the purpose of distributing funds from Chinook Comfor. This partnering agreement will require that net revenues received from Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership by the Village of Burns Lake and the Regional District be pooled together to distribute to the community.

The Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership Revenue Pooling Agreement, including the Chinook Comfor Community Foundation Society Terms of Reference, between the Regional District and the Village of Burns Lake is attached.

The Revenue Pooling Agreement requires the formation of the Chinook Comfor Community Foundation. The purpose of the foundation will be to direct how the pooled funds will be invested and income distributed. The pooled funds will be used to create a legacy fund whereby income from the fund will be distributed in the future to community organizations for economic and community development purposes.

Once established, the Chinook Comfor Foundation will be a separate legal entity. The Terms of Reference in the Revenue Pooling Agreement will be the only way to bind the Foundation to any action.

The Chinook Comfor Community Foundation will work in partnership with the Prince George Foundation and will consist of 6 directors – 2 from the Village of Burns Lake, 2 from Area E and 2 from Area B. The Foundation will be incorporated after the new Societies Act comes into effect in November 2016.

Also attached is the draft agreement with the Prince George Foundation for reference. This agreement will be executed after the Chinook Community Foundation is incorporated.

RECITALS

- A. The purposes of a municipality under Section 7 of the Community Charter, and the purposes of a regional district under Section 2 of the Local Government Act include providing for services and other matters for community benefit and fostering the economic, social and environmental well-being of their communities.
- B. Pursuant to Section 8 of the Community Charter, the Village has natural person powers and may enter into this Agreement, and may provide any service that the council considers necessary or desirable, and may do this directly or through another public authority or another person or organization.
- C. Pursuant to Section 176 of the Local Government Act, the RDBN has corporate powers and may enter into an Agreement with the Village respecting the undertaking, provision and operation of activities, works and services.
- D. The Village and the RDBN are parties to a community forest licence arrangement also involving Wet'suwet'en First Nation, Nee Tahi Buhn First Nation, Skin Tyee First Nation, Cheslatta Carrier First Nation. Lake Babine First Nation and Burns Lake Band (the "First Nations").
- The First Nations, the Village and the RDBN have agreed to manage the community forest E. licence arrangement through a limited partnership known as Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership (the "Partnership"), in which the First Nations, the Village and the RDBN will all be limited partners, governed by a limited partnership agreement (the "Limited Partnership Agreement").



- F. The Limited Partnership Agreement provides that the limited partners of the Partnership are entitled to certain allocations of the net income of the Partnership (the "Revenue").
- G. The Village and the RDBN wish to contractually agree to pool their respective shares of the Revenue in order to provide certain services and benefits to those communities comprising the residents of Areas B and E of the RDBN and of the Village.
- H. The Council for the Village of Burns Lake has authorized the execution of this Agreement on behalf of the Village of Burns Lake by a Council Resolution duly passed at a meeting of the Council held on the _____ day of _____, 2015, a copy of which is attached hereto in Schedule A.
- I. The Board of the RDBN has authorized the execution of this Agreement on behalf of the RDBN by a Board Resolution duly passed at a board meeting of the RDBN held on the day of ____, 2015, a copy of which is attached hereto in Schedule B.

For the reasons recited above, and in consideration of the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

INTERPRETATION 1.

1.1 **Definitions**

In this Agreement unless something in the subject matter or context is inconsistent therewith, the capitalized terms herein will have the meanings set out below:

- "Business Day" means a day other than a Saturday, Sunday or statutory holiday in the (b) Province of British Columbia:
- "Chinook Comfor Foundation Terms of Reference" means the terms of reference for (c) the establishment and operation of the Chinook Comfor Foundation as attached as Schedule C to this Agreement;
- "Commencement Date" means the date that the Partnership is registered in British (d) Columbia;
- "Chinook Comfor Foundation" or "CC Foundation" means the foundation jointly (e) established by the Village and the RDBN under Section 4.1 of this Agreement;
- "Limited Partnership Agreement" has the meaning given in Recital E of this (f) Agreement;
- "Partnership" has the meaning given in Recital E of this Agreement; (g)
- "RDBN Revenue" means that portion of the Revenue allocated and paid to the RDBN (h) from time to time, pursuant to the Limited Partnership Agreement, less any income, other taxes payable on such funds or start up costs or administration costs for the Chinook Comfor Foundation Society incurred by the RDBN;
- "Revenue" has the meaning given in Recital F of this Agreement; (i)
- "Term" has the meaning given in Section 2.1 of this Agreement; (j)

"Village Revenue" means that portion of the Revenue allocated and paid to the Village (k) from time to time, pursuant to the Limited Partnership Agreement, less any income, other taxes payable on such funds or start up costs or administration costs for the Chinook Comfor Foundation Society incurred by the Village; and

1.2 Headings

The division of this Agreement into sections and the insertion of the recitals and headings are for convenience of reference only and shall not affect the construction or interpretation of the Agreement.

1.3 Currency

All transactions referred to in this Agreement will be made in the lawful currency of Canada.

Wherever in this Agreement the context so requires the singular number shall include the plural number and vice versa and words importing gender shall be deemed to include all genders.

1.5 Use of the Word "Including"

The word "including" when following any general term or statement will not be construed as limiting the general term or statement to the specific matter immediately following the word "including" or to similar matters, and the general term or statement will be construed as referring to all matters that reasonably could fall within the broadest possible scope of the general term or statement.

1.6 Statutes

Each reference to a statute is deemed to be reference to that statute and to the regulations made under that statute as amended or re-enacted from time to time.

The RDBN agrees that it will deposit all RDBN Revenue to the Chinook Comfor Foundation Society, and will make no other use of the RDBN Revenue during the Term of this Agreement.

4. FOUNDATION

Establishment

The Village and the RDBN agree that within 90 Business Days of the Commencement Date of this Agreement, they will jointly establish a foundation to be known as the "Chinook Comfor Foundation" (or "CC Foundation") with the mandate, purposes and on the terms and conditions set out in the Foundation Terms of Reference attached as Schedule C to this Agreement.

5. TERMINATION

By agreement

This Agreement may be terminated at any time during the Term as may be mutually agreed upon in writing by the parties.

Limitation of Liability

The parties agree that notwithstanding anything else herein or any duty, principle, term or rule of law to the contrary, whether express or implied, neither the Village or the RDBN shall be liable to each other for any loss or damage of any nature whatsoever flowing from early termination of this Agreement, including without limitation any special, incidental, direct, indirect or consequential damages arising out of such early termination nor shall the Village or the RDBN be under any further obligation to each other.

Any such notice, request, demand or other communication given as aforesaid will be deemed to have been given, in the case of delivery by hand, when delivered, in the case of facsimile transmission or e-mail, when a legible facsimile or e-mail is received by the recipient if received before 5:00 p.m. on a day other than a Business day, or on the next Business Day if such facsimile or e-mail is received on a day which is not a Business Day or after 5:00 p.m. on a Business Day, and in the case of delivery by prepaid registered mail, as aforesaid, on the date received. In the event of discontinuance of postal service due to strike, lockout, labour disturbance or otherwise, notice, demands, requests and other communications shall be delivered by hand or facsimile transmission or e-mail.

7. **GENERAL**

Assignment

This Agreement shall not be assignable by any party in whole or in part without the mutual written consent of the other parties. Any purported assignment without such required consent is not binding or enforceable.

Engrement

This Agreement enures to the benefit of and binds the parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns.

Written Waivers

Any waivers must be in writing and signed by the party granting the indulgence, and then such waiver shall only be effective in a specific instance and for the specific purpose for which it is given.

Further Assurances

Each party will execute and deliver promptly all further documents and take all further action reasonably necessary or appropriate to give effect to the provisions of this Agreement.

Remedies Cumulative

The rights and remedies under the Agreement are cumulative and are not in addition to and not in substitution for any other rights and remedies available at law or in equity or otherwise. No single or partial exercise by a party of any right or remedy precludes or otherwise affects the exercise of any other right or remedy to which that party may be entitled.



Counterparts

This Agreement and all documents contemplated by or delivered under or in connection with this Agreement may be executed and delivered in any number of counterparts with the same effect as if all parties had all signed and delivered the same document and all counterparts will be construed together to be an original and will constitute one and the same agreement.

Delivery by Fax or Electronically

Any party may deliver an executed copy of this Agreement by fax or by electronic mail in PDF format but that party will immediately dispatch by delivery in person to the other parties an originally executed copy of this Agreement.

Amendment

This Agreement may not be amended except by a written instrument signed by all the parties.

Entire Agreement

This Agreement and all documents contemplated by or delivered under or in connection with this Agreement constitute the entire agreement between the parties and supersede all prior agreements, negotiations, discussions, undertakings, representations, warranties and understandings whether written or oral, express or implied, or otherwise.

Governing Law

This Agreement and any dispute arising out of or in connection with this Agreement shall be governed exclusively by and shall be enforced, construed and interpreted exclusively in accordance with the laws of British Columbia and the laws of Canada applicable in British Columbia which will be deemed to be the proper law of this Agreement.

Attornment

The parties agree to submit to and hereby attorn to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of the Province of British Columbia for any action arising out of or in connection with this Agreement.

Paramountcy

The provisions set forth in any other agreement between the parties will not merge with this Agreement but shall survive the execution and delivery of this Agreement except that, if such provisions are inconsistent with the provisions hereof, this Agreement shall govern.

Independent Legal Advice

Each party hereby confirms it has had an opportunity to obtain independent legal advice in entering into this Agreement.

7.14 Severability

Each provision of this Agreement is intended to be severable and if any provision is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal or invalid or unenforceable for any reason whatsoever such provision shall be severed from this Agreement and will not affect the legality, validity or enforceability of the remainder of or any other provision of this Agreement.



Time of Essence

Time shall be of the essence of this Agreement.

Dispute Resolution

If there is any dispute regarding the interpretation, performance or an alleged breach of this Agreement, any party may give written notice of dispute, including a request for meeting, to the other parties and the parties will meet within 3 Business Days after the notice of dispute is given and will attempt in good faith, and using reasonable efforts, to resolve the matter amicably to the satisfaction of all parties. If the parties cannot resolve the dispute within 7 Business Days after they first meet, or if the parties fail to meet within 7 Business Days after the notice of dispute is given, then with the consent of all parties the matter may be referred to a mutually appointed single arbitrator for final determination, and if all parties do not so consent within 14 Business Days after the notice of dispute is given, then any party may commence litigation to have the dispute settled.

7.17 Non-derogation

The parties acknowledge and agree that nothing contained or implied in this Agreement will be construed as limiting or prejudicing the rights and powers of any of the parties in the exercise of their functions pursuant to the Local Government Act, the Community Charter, or any other right or power under any public or private statutes, bylaws, orders or regulations, as the case may be, all of which may be fully exercised as if this Agreement had not been entered into.

Chinook Comfor Community Foundation Society

Terms of Reference

Mandate

The Chinook Comfor Community Foundation Society is a committee of dedicated community members whose purpose is to distribute the funds received from Chinook Comfor by the Village of Burns Lake and the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako

These funds are to be distributed according to the best interest of the community, and according to the guidelines set out in the granting criteria below.

Functions

Within their mandate, the Foundation is to:

- Meet annually and facilitate the receipt of applications for funding to deserving functions within the community;
- Make recommendation to the Prince George Community Foundation on how to distribute the funds;
- Carry out any promotional activity and communications associated with the funding process;
- Handle all administrative duties associated with the Society;
- Submit a written request for approval to the Regional District Area B and E Directors and Council for the Village of Burns Lake if changes to the Terms of Reference are required.

Scope and Jurisdiction

- The authority of this group shall not extend beyond the funding allotted for disbursal as
 determined by the Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership Revenue Sharing Agreement.
 Unless otherwise determined by the local governments, no other funding shall be
 disbursed by the foundation.
- Funding available for disbursal will be based on "income only", spending only the money earned on capital.

Membership and Tenure

The Foundation shall be composed of a Chair and an alternate Chair who will be selected by the Foundation at the first meeting of the Foundation.



The six (6) members of the Foundation, to be appointed by Council and the Regional District Directors of Area B and E, shall include the following:

- Two (2) members from the Village of Burns lake;
- Two (2) members from the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Area B
- Two (2) members from the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Area E

Foundation members shall be appointed by their local government and may not consist of elected officials or local government staff. These members shall hold their appointment until a letter of resignation is received, or until an alternate appointment is made by the local government.

The Village and the Regional District will appoint a replacement member within 30 Business Days of rescinding an appointment, and during those 30 days the Foundation is not allowed to vote on any matter. After the 30 day period, business will carry on as usual even if a replacement is not appointed.

Meetings

Meetings are to be held annually once profit distribution funds are received, and shall be called by the Chair. All subsequent meetings required for funding distribution will be at the discretion of the committee.

A quorum of three (3) committee members must be present for any meeting to proceed. This quorum must consist of at least one representative from Area B, Area E, and the Village of Burns Lake.

Granting Criteria

Community organizations are eligible to apply for grant funding. Grants are not made to individuals or businesses. Organizations must demonstrate effective management and fiscal responsibility. Only organizations that operate within Burns Lake or RDBN Electoral Area B or E are eligible for funding. To be eligible funding must be used for services available to the entire community.

RECITALS

- The purposes of a municipality under Section 7 of the Community Charter, and the purposes A. of a regional district under Section 185 of the Local Government Act include providing for services and other matters for community benefit and fostering the economic, social and environmental well-being of their communities.
- В. Pursuant to Section 8 of the Community Charter, the Village has natural person powers and may enter into this Agreement, and may provide any service that the council considers necessary or desirable, and may do this directly or through another public authority or another person or organization.
- C. Pursuant to Section 263 of the Local Government Act, the RDBN has corporate powers and may enter into an Agreement with the Village respecting the undertaking, provision and operation of activities, works and services.
- D. The Village and the RDBN are parties to a community forest licence issued by the Ministry of Forests also involving Wet'suwet'en First Nation, Nee Tahi Buhn First Nation, Skin Tvee First Nation, Cheslatta Carrier First Nation, Lake Babine First Nation and Burns Lake Band (the "First Nations").
- E. The First Nations, the Village and the RDBN have agreed to manage the community forest licence through a limited partnership known as Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership (the "Partnership"), in which the First Nations, the Village and the RDBN will all be limited partners, governed by a limited partnership agreement (the "Limited Partnership Agreement").



- F. The Limited Partnership Agreement provides that the limited partners of the Partnership are entitled to certain allocations of the net income of the Partnership (the "Revenue").
- G. The Village and the RDBN wish to contractually agree to pool their respective shares of the Revenue in order to provide certain services and benefits to those communities comprising the residents of the Village and of Electoral Areas B and E of the RDBN.
- H. The Village and the RDBN wish to incorporate a society to be known as the Chinook Community Foundation whose main purpose will be to direct how the pooled funds of the Village and the RDBN will be invested and how the income there from will be distributed in the community.

I.	The Council for the Village of Burns Lake has authorized the execution of this Agreement on
	behalf of the Village of Burns Lake by a Council Resolution duly passed at a meeting of the

For the reasons recited above, and in consideration of the parties' agreement to allocate their share of the Revenue on a 60% share to RDBN and 40% share to the Village and the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

1. INTERPRETATION

1.1 Definitions

In this Agreement unless something in the subject matter or context is inconsistent therewith, the capitalized terms herein will have the meanings set out below:

- (a) "Beneficiary" means such person or persons identified as a beneficiary by the Chinook Community Foundation;
- (b) "Business Day" means a day other than a Saturday, Sunday or statutory holiday in the Province of British Columbia;
- (c) "Chinook Community Foundation Terms of Reference" means the terms of reference for the establishment and operation of the Chinook Community Foundation as attached as Schedule C to this Agreement;
- (d) "Commencement Date" means the date that the Partnership is registered in British Columbia;
- (e) "Chinook Community Foundation" or "CCF Foundation" means the society jointly established by the Village and the RDBN under Section 4.1 of this Agreement;
- (f) "Chinook Comfor Fund" means a fund established, held and managed by the Prince George Community Foundation pursuant to an agreement dated _______ between the Chinook Community Foundation and the Prince George Community Foundation;



- (g) "Limited Partnership Agreement" has the meaning given in Recital E of this Agreement;
- (h) "Partnership" has the meaning given in Recital E of this Agreement;
- (i) "Person" includes a corporation, partnership or party, and the personal or other legal representatives of a person to whom the context can apply according to law;
- (j) "RDBN Revenue" means that portion of the Revenue allocated and paid to the RDBN from time to time, pursuant to the Limited Partnership Agreement, less:
 - (i) any income tax or other taxes payable by the RDBN on Revenue received by the RDBN; and
 - (ii) start up costs for the Chinook Community Foundation incurred by the RDBN;
- (k) "Revenue" has the meaning given in Recital F of this Agreement;
- (l) "Start Up Costs" means the costs, including legal costs, of creating and registering the Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership, Chinook Comfor Limited and Constitution and Bylaws of the Chinook Community Foundation and associated agreements and includes all non-legal costs associated with the creation of the CCF such as advertising;
- (m) "Term" has the meaning given in Section 2.1 of this Agreement; and
- (n) "Village Revenue" means that portion of the Revenue allocated and paid to the Village from time to time, pursuant to the Limited Partnership Agreement, less:
 - (i) any income tax or other taxes payable by the Village on Revenue received by the Village; and
 - (ii) start up costs for the Chinook Community Foundation incurred by the Village.

1.2 Headings

The division of this Agreement into sections and the insertion of the recitals and headings are for convenience of reference only and shall not affect the construction or interpretation of the Agreement.

1.3 Currency

All transactions referred to in this Agreement will be made in the lawful currency of Canada.

1.4 Singular, plural, gender and person

Wherever in this Agreement the context so requires the singular number shall include the plural number and vice versa and words importing gender shall be deemed to include all genders.

1.5 Use of the Word "Including"

The word "including" when following any general term or statement will not be construed as limiting the general term or statement to the specific matter immediately following the word "including" or to similar matters, and the general term or statement will be construed as referring to all matters that reasonably could fall within the broadest possible scope of the general term or statement.



1.6 Statutes

Each reference to a statute is deemed to be reference to that statute and to the regulations made under that statute as amended or re-enacted from time to time.

1.7 Schedules

The following schedules are incorporated into and form a part of this Agreement:

Schedule A - Village Council Resolution

Schedule B - RDBN Board Resolution

Schedule C - CCF Terms of Reference

1.8 Time of day

Unless otherwise specified, references to time of day or date mean the local time or date in Burns Lake, British Columbia.

2. TERM OF AGREEMENT

Term

The term of this Agreement (the "Term") will commence on the Commencement Date and continue until the 25th anniversary of the Commencement Date, subject to earlier termination in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

3. REVENUE POOLING

3.1 Village Revenue

The Village agrees that it will deposit all Village Revenue to the Chinook Community Foundation within 90 days of each time it receives monies from the Partnership, and will make no other use of the Village Revenue during the Term of this Agreement.

3.2 RDBN Revenue

The RDBN agrees that it will deposit all RDBN Revenue to the Chinook Community Foundation within 90 days of each time it receives monies from the Partnership, and will make no other use of the RDBN Revenue during the Term of this Agreement.

- 3.3 The parties agree that the Start Up Costs associated with the Chinook Community Foundation may be paid by either party, provided that whichever party pays them that party is entitled to deduct them from its Revenue.
- 3.4 The parties agree that a party who is asked by the other party must provide receipts or other documents that show the Start Up Costs that are deducted from the Revenue by that party provided that a party is not obligated to provide records that are subject to solicitor-client privilege or otherwise non-disclosable by operation of law or under contract.

4. FOUNDATION

4.1 Establishment

The Village and the RDBN agree:



- (a) to form a society under the name of "Chinook Community Foundation" in accordance with this Agreement and the Society Act;
- (b) subject to each party reviewing and being satisfied with the constating documents of the Chinook Community Foundation, which shall include but may not be limited to the constitution and bylaws of the Chinook Community Foundation, promptly execute and deliver all documents that may be necessary or desirable to give effect to the formation of the Chinook Community Foundation under any and all applicable laws and submit such documents for registration by December 15, 2016, or within 90 days of the Commencement Date, whichever is later.
- 4.2 The Chinook Community Foundation will have the mandate, functions, powers, membership, and tenure described in the terms of the Chinook Community Foundation Terms of Reference, including the purpose of paying to the Prince George Community Foundation any Village Revenue or RDBN Revenue it receives for the Prince George Community Foundation to invest as capital with the intent that the Prince George Community Foundation will disburse the income earned on the capital invested either directly to charities and other organizations that benefit the community in Electoral Areas B and E of the RDBN and the Village, or to the Chinook Community Foundation, through the RDBN or the Village, for disbursement.

5. TERMINATION

5.1 This Agreement may be terminated at any time during the Term as may be mutually agreed upon with 30 days' notice in writing by each of the parties.

6. THIRD PARTY

- 6.1 If the Prince George Community Foundation is cancelled, wound up or dissolved, or if the Chinook Community Foundation's agreement with the Prince George Community Foundation ends, the parties mutually agree to invest the Chinook Comfor Fund and the Village Revenue and RDBN Revenue for the remainder of the Term in a charitable society or foundation with similar purposes to the Prince George Community Foundation for disbursement to other charities and other organizations that benefit the community in Electoral Areas B and E of the RDBN and the Village.
- 6.2 If the Chinook Community Foundation is cancelled, wound up or dissolved, the parties mutually agree to invest the Village Revenue and RDBN Revenue for the remainder of the Term in the Prince George Community Foundation (or other organization selected pursuant to Section 6.1) for the purposes of disbursing the income earned on the monies in the fund to other charities to benefit the community in Electoral Areas B and E of the RDBN and the Village.
- 6.3 The parties agree that the capital of the Chinook Comfor Fund is to remain invested indefinitely as a legacy fund, with the intention that the capital of the fund shall be preserved while making the income generated therefrom available for distribution in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

7. DEFAULT

- 7.1 Should a party fail to perform any of its obligations under this Agreement (the "defaulting party") and such failure continues beyond 30 days from delivery of written notice by the non-defaulting party specifying the failure and requiring remedy thereof, the defaulting party must pay liquidated damages, as set out below, forthwith and without further notice to the defaulting party.
- 7.2 If the Village defaults under section 7.1, it must pay to the Chinook Community Foundation as



liquidated damages the amount resulting from multiplying \$50,000 by the number of calendar years remaining in the Term, with a pro-rata adjustment for any partial years, and this Agreement will be terminated upon the payment of the liquidated damages.

- 7.3 If the RDBN defaults under section 7.1, it must pay to the Chinook Community Foundation as liquidated damages the amount resulting from multiplying \$75,000 by the number of years remaining in the Term, with a pro-rata adjustment for any partial years, and this Agreement will be terminated upon the payment of the liquidated damages.
- 7.4 If the Chinook Community Foundation has been cancelled, wound up or dissolved, the monies payable under section 7.2 or 7.3 shall be paid to the Chinook Comfor Fund held by the Prince George Community Foundation, and if both the Chinook Community Foundation and the Prince George Community Foundation have been cancelled, wound up or dissolved, the monies payable under section 7.2 will be paid to RDBN and the monies payable under section 7.3 will be paid to the Village.

8. FORCE MAJEURE

8.1 Suspension

Subject to the other provisions of this Article 8, if either party is unable or fails by reason of Force Majeure to perform in whole or in part any of its obligations or covenants set forth in this Agreement, such inability or failure will be deemed not to be a breach of such obligation or covenant and the obligations of such party under this Agreement will be suspended to the extent necessary during the continuation of any inability or failure so caused by such Force Majeure.

8.2 Definition of Force Majeure

For purposes of this Agreement, "Force Majeure" means any event or occurrence not within the control of the party claiming Force Majeure, and which by the exercise of reasonable diligence such party is unable to prevent or overcome, including any acts of nature such as fires, explosions, lightning, earthquakes, storms, washouts, landslides, avalanches, epidemics and floods; strikes, lockouts or other industrial disturbances; acts of the Queen's or public enemies, sabotage, wars, blockades, insurrections, and riots or civil disturbances.

8.3 Exceptions

Neither party will be entitled to the benefit of Section 8.1 under any of the following circumstances:

- (a) to the extent that the inability or failure was caused by the negligence or contributory negligence of the party claiming Force Majeure;
- (b) to the extent that the inability or failure was caused by the party claiming Force Majeure having failed to diligently attempt to remedy the condition and/or to resume the performance of such covenants and obligations with reasonable dispatch; or
- (c) if the inability or failure was caused by lack of funds.

8.4 Notice of Force Majeure

As soon as possible after the happening of an occurrence in the nature of Force Majeure or as soon as possible after determining that an occurrence was in the nature of Force Majeure, a party claiming Force Majeure will make reasonable commercial efforts to give to the other party notice to the effect that the claiming party is unable by reason of Force Majeure (the nature whereof will be therein specified) to perform particular covenants or obligations.



8.5 Resumption of Obligations

As soon as possible after the Force Majeure condition is remedied or discontinued, the party claiming Force Majeure will give notice to the other party of such remedy, and that such party has resumed, or is then in a position to resume, the performance of its suspended covenants and obligations hereunder either in whole or in part.

8.6 Settlement of Labour Disputes

Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Article 8, but subject to Section 8.3, the settlement of labour disputes or industrial disturbances in which a party is involved is entirely within the discretion of that party, which party may make settlement of it at the time and on terms and conditions as it may deem to be advisable and no delay in making settlement will deprive the party of the benefit of Section 8.1.

9. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

9.1 The parties agree that notwithstanding anything else herein or any duty, principle, term or rule of law to the contrary, whether express or implied, neither the Village or the RDBN shall be liable to each other for any loss or damage of any nature whatsoever flowing from early termination of this Agreement, including without limitation any special, incidental, direct, indirect or consequential damages arising out of such early termination nor shall the Village or the RDBN be under any further obligation to each other.

10. NOTICES

- 10.1 Any notice, request, demand and other communication required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and will be sufficiently given if it is delivered by hand, facsimile transmission, e-mail or prepaid registered mail (return receipt requested) as follows:

In the event of discontinuance of postal service due to strike, lockout, labour disturbance or otherwise, notice, demands, requests and other communications shall be delivered by hand or facsimile transmission or e-mail.

11. ASSIGNMENT

11.1 Generally

Subject to section 11.2, this Agreement shall not be assignable by any party in whole or in part without the mutual written consent of the other parties. Any purported assignment without such required consent is not binding or enforceable.

11.2 Assignment under Limited Partnership Agreement

If either the Village or the RDBN (a "Transferring Party") transfers all or some of their respective Units (as defined in the Limited Partnership Agreement) in the Partnership to an Associate (as defined in the Limited Partnership Agreement) or to any other Person (either of which shall be the "Transferee"), the Transferring Party will:

- (a) if all its Units are transferred, wholly assign this Agreement to the Transferee; or
- (b) if only some of its Units are transferred to the Transferee, partially assign this Agreement to the Transferee.

and any such whole or partial assignment to a Transferee shall be deemed to have the consent of all the parties.

12. GENERAL

12.1 Time of Essence

Time shall be of the essence of this Agreement.

12.2 Relationship

No provision of this Agreement shall be construed to create a partnership, joint venture, or agency relationship between the RDBN and the Village.

12.3 Enurement

This Agreement enures to the benefit of and binds the parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns.

12.4 Written Waivers

Any waivers must be in writing and signed by the party granting the indulgence, and then such waiver shall only be effective in a specific instance and for the specific purpose for which it is given.

12.5 Further Assurances

Each party will execute and deliver promptly all further documents and take all further action reasonably necessary or appropriate to give effect to the provisions of this Agreement.



12.6 Remedies Cumulative

The rights and remedies under the Agreement are cumulative and are not in addition to and not in substitution for any other rights and remedies available at law or in equity or otherwise. No single or partial exercise by a party of any right or remedy precludes or otherwise affects the exercise of any other right or remedy to which that party may be entitled.

12.7 Counterparts

This Agreement and all documents contemplated by or delivered under or in connection with this Agreement may be executed and delivered in any number of counterparts with the same effect as if all parties had all signed and delivered the same document and all counterparts will be construed together to be an original and will constitute one and the same agreement.

12.8 Delivery by Fax or Electronically

Any party may deliver an executed copy of this Agreement by fax or by electronic mail in PDF format but that party will immediately dispatch by delivery in person to the other parties an originally executed copy of this Agreement.

12.9 Amendment

This Agreement may not be amended except by a written instrument signed by all the parties.

12.10 Entire Agreement

This Agreement and all documents contemplated by or delivered under or in connection with this Agreement constitute the entire agreement between the parties and supersede all prior agreements, negotiations, discussions, undertakings, representations, warranties and understandings whether written or oral, express or implied, or otherwise.

12.11 Governing Law

This Agreement and any dispute arising out of or in connection with this Agreement shall be governed exclusively by and shall be enforced, construed and interpreted exclusively in accordance with the laws of British Columbia and the laws of Canada applicable in British Columbia which will be deemed to be the proper law of this Agreement.

12.12 Attornment

The parties agree to submit to and hereby attorn to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of the Province of British Columbia for any action arising out of or in connection with this Agreement.

12.13 Paramountcy

The provisions set forth in any other agreement between the parties will not merge with this Agreement but shall survive the execution and delivery of this Agreement except that, if such provisions are inconsistent with the provisions hereof, this Agreement shall govern.

12.14 Independent Legal Advice

Each party hereby confirms it has had an opportunity to obtain independent legal advice in entering into this Agreement.

12.15 Severability



Each provision of this Agreement is intended to be severable and if any provision is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal or invalid or unenforceable for any reason whatsoever such provision shall be severed from this Agreement and will not affect the legality, validity or enforceability of the remainder of or any other provision of this Agreement.

12.16 Dispute Resolution

If there is any dispute regarding the interpretation, performance or an alleged breach of this Agreement, any party may give written notice of dispute, including a request for meeting, to the other parties and the parties will meet within 3 Business Days after the notice of dispute is given and will attempt in good faith, and using reasonable efforts, to resolve the matter amicably to the satisfaction of all parties. If the parties cannot resolve the dispute within 7 Business Days after they first meet, or if the parties fail to meet within 7 Business Days after the notice of dispute is given, then with the consent of all parties the matter may be referred to a mutually appointed single arbitrator for final determination, and if all parties do not so consent within 14 Business Days after the notice of dispute is given, then any party may commence litigation to have the dispute settled.

12.17 Non-derogation

The parties acknowledge and agree that nothing contained or implied in this Agreement will be construed as limiting or prejudicing the rights and powers of any of the parties in the exercise of their functions pursuant to the *Local Government Act*, the *Community Charter*, or any other right or power under any public or private statutes, bylaws, orders or regulations, as the case may be, all of which may be fully exercised as if this Agreement had not been entered into.

Chinook Comfor Community Foundation Society

Terms of Reference

Mandate

The Chinook Comfor Community Foundation Society is a committee of dedicated community members whose purpose is to distribute the funds received from Chinook Comfor by the Village of Burns Lake and the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako

These funds are to be distributed according to the best interest of the community, and according to the guidelines set out in the granting criteria below.

Functions

Within their mandate, the Foundation is to:

- Meet annually and facilitate the receipt of applications for funding to deserving functions within the community;
- Make recommendation to the Prince George Community Foundation on how to distribute the funds;
- Carry out any promotional activity and communications associated with the funding process;
- Handle all administrative duties associated with the Society;
- Submit a written request for approval to the Regional District Area B and E Directors and Council for the Village of Burns Lake if changes to the Terms of Reference are required.

Scope and Jurisdiction

- The authority of this group shall not extend beyond the funding allotted for disbursal as determined by the Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership Revenue Sharing Agreement.
 Unless otherwise determined by the local governments, no other funding shall be disbursed by the foundation.
- Funding available for disbursal will be based on "income only", spending only the money earned on capital.

Membership and Tenure

The Foundation shall be composed of a Chair and an alternate Chair who will be selected by the Foundation at the first meeting of the Foundation.

The six (6) members of the Foundation, to be appointed by Council and the Regional District Directors of Area B and E, shall include the following:



- Two (2) members from the Village of Burns lake;
- Two (2) members from the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Area B
- Two (2) members from the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Area E

Foundation members shall be appointed by their local government and may not consist of elected officials or local government staff. These members shall hold their appointment until a letter of resignation is received, or until an alternate appointment is made by the local government.

The Village and the Regional District will appoint a replacement member within 30 Business Days of rescinding an appointment, and during those 30 days the Foundation is not allowed to vote on any matter. After the 30 day period, business will carry on as usual even if a replacement is not appointed.

Meetings

Meetings are to be held annually once profit distribution funds are received, and shall be called by the Chair. All subsequent meetings required for funding distribution will be at the discretion of the committee.

A quorum of three (3) committee members must be present for any meeting to proceed. This quorum must consist of at least one representative from Area B, Area E, and the Village of Burns Lake.

Granting Criteria

Community organizations are eligible to apply for grant funding. Grants are not made to individuals or businesses. Organizations must demonstrate effective management and fiscal responsibility. Only organizations that operate within Burns Lake or RDBN Electoral Area B or E are eligible for funding. To be eligible funding must be used for services available to the entire community.

Funding Restri	ctions: Projects CANNOT be considered eligible if:
•	Funds requested are an organization's usual operational or core expenses
•	Funds are for any expenses which predate the current grant cycle
•	Funds are used to cover deficits, retire debts, or mortgage payments
•	Funds are to provide for or establish endowments
•	Funds are used for sectarian, religious, or political purposes
•	The organization shows a dependency on future funding from the foundation
•	Funding for a national charity



AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

PRINCE GEORGE COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

(herein called the "Foundation")

AND

CHINOOK COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

(herein called the "Society")

WHEREAS:

- A. The Foundation was incorporated as a not-for-profit organization under the *Society Act* [RSBC 1996], Chapter 433, and has been accorded charitable status by Canada Revenue Agency; and
- B. The Society was incorporated as a non-for-profit organization under the Societies Act, [RSBC 2015], Chapter 8, on under file number

NOW THEREFORE, the Foundation and the Society agree as follows:

- 1. The Fund shall be known as "Chinook Community Fund".
- 2. The Fund will be established on receipt, by the Foundation, of the first contribution from the Society resulting from the distribution of certain profits to the Society's members from the Chinook Community Forest Limited Partnership, being the initiating capital of the Fund. The Fund's capital may be increased from time to time by gifts, bequests and devises from the Society or any other person or organization.
- 3. The Foundation will furnish receipts valid for income tax purposes in respect of all charitable donations for the Fund received and will comply with the requirements of the *Income Tax Act* in so far as the administration of the Fund is concerned. Any gifts, bequests and devises to the Fund shall be subject to the terms of this

Agreement, shall be irrevocable and shall, unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Foundation, be made and received subject to the condition and direction that the gift, bequest or devise is to be held by the Foundation, or a transferee from the Foundation, for a period of not less than ten (10) years, subject only to a power to encroach on such sum to the extent and for the purposes permitted by the *Income Tax Act* for encroachments on the Fund's capital.

- 4. After the expiry of ten (10) years from the date of this Agreement, the Society may deliver to the Foundation a notice in writing stating its desire to withdraw all or part of the Fund. The notice shall state the percentage of the Fund to be withdrawn. Upon receipt of such notice, the Foundation shall repay twenty-five percent (25%) of the funds requested within three (3) months of the date of the notice, twenty-five percent (25%) of the funds requested within six (6) months of the date of the notice, twenty-five percent (25%) of the funds requested within nine (9) months of the date of the notice, and the balance of the funds requested within one (1) year of the date on which the notice is received. All payments of capital hereunder shall be made to the Society or such charitable organization designated by the Society, providing no payment shall be made hereunder except to a charitable organization registered as such under the Income Tax Act. A notice of withdrawal may not be made more than once each year. The Foundation shall be entitled to charge for all its reasonable costs and expenses associated with a withdrawal of the capital from the Fund, including but not limited to, money management fees, legal fees and administration fees.
- 5. The assets of the Fund will be owned by the Society.
- 6. The Foundation will maintain a separate account for the Chinook Community Fund and report to the Society on an annual basis (including financial reports showing contributions, income, disbursements, fees and balance of the Fund).
- 7. The Foundation shall have all powers necessary, or in its sole discretion desirable, to use the income from the Fund for the purpose of carrying out the charitable purposes of the Society, including, but not limited to, the power to retain, invest and reinvest capital of the Fund in any manner within the standards of law applicable to the management of trust funds, including the power to co-mingle the assets of the Fund with those of other funds for investment purposes, provided however that unless the Society has ceased to exist, the Foundation shall only disburse the Fund as per lawful directions received from time to time from the Society or its assignee, it being understood and agreed that such directions shall only be considered to be lawful if they direct the Foundation to use the Fund for a purpose which qualifies as a charitable purpose pursuant to the *Income Tax Act*. The Foundation, in carrying out its duties and responsibilities pursuant to this Agreement, agrees to exercise, or to retain a qualified professional investment manager to manage the Fund who agrees in writing to exercise, the care, skill,



diligence and judgment that a prudent professional investment manager would exercise in making investments. The Foundation does not, in any way, guarantee the performance of the Fund and shall not be responsible for any loss sustained, except where such loss arises from failure to comply with applicable standards, laws and regulations.

- 8. The Foundation shall, after advice and recommendation from the Society or its assignee, and subject to the general disbursement policy of the Foundation in place from time to time, determine annually the disbursement of income from the Fund to registered charities or other qualified donees, provided however that unless the Society has ceased to exist, the Foundation shall only disburse the Fund as per lawful directions received from time to time from the Society, it being understood and agreed that such directions shall only be considered to be lawful if they direct the Foundation to use the Fund for a purpose which qualifies as a charitable purpose pursuant to the *Income Tax Act*. Undistributed income, including realized and accrued capital gains, may be transferred to a stability reserve and the stability reserve may be drawn on at any time, in the same manner as for annual disbursements noted herein, and shall not form part of the capital of the Fund.
- 9. If the Society ceases to exist and prior to ceasing to exist has not assigned the Fund to a registered charity, the Foundation shall disburse the income of the Fund to qualified donees for similar charitable purposes as the Prince George Community Foundation, in its discretion, shall determine.
- 10. If the Foundation ceases to exist, the assets of the Fund shall be returned to the Society or as it may direct, subject to the payment of any accrued and unpaid administration fees relative to the Fund and subject to compliance with applicable legislation.
- 11. Until otherwise advised, and only on the request from the Chinook Community Foundation, the income from the Fund may be distributed through the Village of Burns Lake and/or the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako to the Chinook Community Foundation.
- 12. Unless the Foundation otherwise agrees, all gifts made to the fund by the Society will be identified as "designated gifts" so that such gifts do not increase the Foundation's disbursement quota.
- 13. The Foundation will charge an annual administration fee equal to that of other funds of similar nature and size administered by the Foundation. The fee will be charged in accordance with current Foundation policy, which may be amended from time to time, on an annual basis prior to distribution, subject to the Society's rights under this Agreement. The Foundation will advise the Society of any policy changes regarding annual administration fees.

- 14. Any costs of the Foundation in accepting, transferring or managing property donated to the Foundation for the Fund shall also be paid from the Fund's income.
- 15. The Foundation represents and warrants to the Society as of the date of the Agreement that:
 - (a) the Foundation is duly incorporated under the *Societies Act* of British Columbia, is a validly existing and in good standing with respect to the filing of any reports under the *Societies Act*;
 - (b) the Foundation will maintain its existence under the *Societies Act* of British Columbia and will ensure that it remains in good standing with respect to the filing of annual reports under the *Societies Act* through the term of this Agreement; and
 - (c) the Foundation is a registered charity under the *Income Tax Act* (Canada) and will continued to be a registered charity throughout the term of this Agreement.
- 16. The Foundation investment policy documents, as they existed at the date of this Agreement, have been provided to the Society (the "Policies"). The Foundation will consult with the Society prior to making any amendments to, or replacing any of the Policies. Any significant amendment to the Foundation investment policy will require the prior written consent of the Society, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld. If the Foundation makes a significant amendment to the investment policy without first obtaining the written consent of the Society, then the Society will have the option, exercisable within sixty (60) days after the date that the Society is notified in writing of the amendment, to terminate this Agreement. The Society will also have the right to terminate this Agreement if the Foundation increases any fee set out in the Policies by more than five percent (5%) of the fee per year without the prior written consent of the Society exercisable within sixty (60) days after the date that the Society is notified of the fee change in writing. If the Society elects to terminate this Agreement pursuant to this paragraph, the Foundation will not be entitled to change any penalty, cost or expense in connection with the withdrawal of the capital from the Fund.
- 17. This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the Province of British Columbia and the laws of Canada that have application thereto.
- 18. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and the binding upon the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns.

Highway 16 Inter-Community Transit Service



BC Transit and the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure have committed to providing enhanced funding to support the establishment of new or extended inter-community transit services along the Highway 16 corridor. The Regional District, in collaboration with local municipalities and First Nations communities, has established a Regional Transit Committee to guide services spanning from Prince George to Smithers and is in the process of moving forward with the steps necessary to establish the service and meet the needs of our local residents.

BC Transit conducted extensive public consultation and provided recommendations based on the input they received. Details can be found at https://bctransit.com/highway16.

The new inter-community transit service in Bulkley-Nechako, expected to be operational in 2017 depending on timing of local approval, will run from Burns Lake to Prince George and from Burns Lake to Smithers. Three days per week are recommended in each direction.

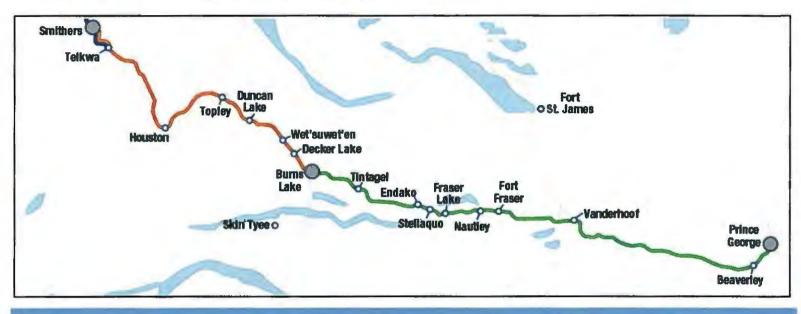

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Director Jerry Petersen Electoral Area "F" Vanderhoof Rural

Hi, my name is Jerry Petersen and I am the Director for Electoral Area "F" (Vanderhoof Rural) of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako. I am also the Chair of the Stuart-Nechako Regional Hospital District.

In the past year in Area "F" there has been \$40,700 spent in Grant in Aid monies and \$817,018 in Federal Gas Tax funds for recreation and culture for the betterment of our residents.

In the Stuart Nechako Regional Hospital District, the Lakes District Hospital and Health Centre Replacement Project was completed at a cost of \$55 million. For the St. John Hospital in Vanderhoof, \$450,100 was spent on major equipment. A total of \$432,634 was spent on minor capital projects in the hospital district.

The proposed budget for capital planning concept plans for replacement of the Fort St. James Hospital

is \$75 million (we should see some movement on the Health Clinic this coming year).



There is a proposed budget of \$1,854,000 for The Pines cafeteria expansion in Burns Lake and \$125,100 in major equipment for the C-Arm replacement at St. John Hospital.

I'm pleased to report that the Reuse Shed in now reopened at the Vanderhoof Transfer Station.

Knockholt Western Sub-Regional Landfill Projects

The RDBN initiated the development of the next phase of the landfill to allow for future garbage disposal. Test pitting activities were conducted to confirm the underlying soil conditions in the expansion area and depth to groundwater, which is critical information in establishing appropriate design criteria. A detailed site survey was also completed. A consulting firm is currently in the process of designing the landfill liner system and creating a design brief which will be submitted to the Ministry of Environment for approval. In the interim, works were completed to remove topsoil and create drainage that will allow for full liner construction and garbage placement in 2017.

Another project at the Knockholt Landfill was addressing excess sludge buildup in the lagoon which currently collects and treats septage effluent and landfill leachate. Over the last number of years, sludge levels in the lagoon had increased to a point where it was effecting the effluent quality of the liquid that is transferred to an engineered wetland for final treatment. The initial plan was to remove the sludge from the lagoon, which can unfortunately be a very expensive procedure. When investigating available options in more detail a nutrient/bacteriological additive trial project was initiated in an effort to breakdown sludge levels at significantly less cost. The results of the trial project in 2016 indicated very positive results and as a result the trial will continue in 2017.

Is your wood stove winterized?

- ⇒ Keep all flammable household items, drapes, furniture, newspapers, and books, far from the wood burning appliances.
- ⇒ Start fires only with newspaper and dry kindling. Never start a fire with gasoline, kerosene, charcoal starter, or a propane torch.
- ⇒ Keep the doors of your wood-burning appliance closed unless loading or stoking the live fire. Harmful chemicals, such as carbon monoxide, can be released into your home.
- ⇒ Regularly remove ashes from your wood-burning appliance into a metal container with a cover. Store the container of ashes outdoors on a cement or brick slab (not on a wood deck or near wood).
- ⇒ Keep a fire extinguisher on hand at all times.



Reuse Sheds

The reuse sheds at the Smithers/Telkwa, Granisle, Southside, Burns Lake, Fraser Lake and Vanderhoof Transfer Stations, as well as the Knockholt (Houston) Landfill were reopened in the last little while. It is gratify-



ing to see the amount of items that are not being sent to the landfill, but instead find a new home and a new lease on life. The sheds are open primarily on the weekends, so check your local site to see what hours they are available.

Please keep in mind that items <u>MUST</u>: 1. Be clean and in good/ reusable condition and 2. Electronic devices must be in working order. There is also a list of prohibited items and some new rules for the reuse sheds. Please check out our website for further details (http://www.rdbn.bc.ca/environmentalservices/recycling/reuse-sheds). We appreciate the community enthusiasm for these facilities and ask for your cooperation to keep them running smoothly.

Cardboard Ban

The region-wide cardboard ban has been in effect now since July 1st.

Overall, implementation went well. Not familiar with the cardboard ban??

Residents are asked to drop their corrugated cardboard off at their local recycling depot if they don't have curbside pick-up. Industrial, commer-



cial and institutional customers are responsible for finding a local collector or service provider and paying any associated costs.

Backyard Composting

The backyard composting promotion program was well-received this year. The first 100 composters were snapped up in days and a large wait-list formed. Fortunately, another 100 composters were made available and the folks on the wait-list were able to purchase the subsidized composter kit (which included the composter and a mixing tool) as well. It is exciting to see people enthusiastic about keeping organic waste out of the landfills and the wonderful side benefit is a great soil additive for their gardens and yards.



Solid Waste Management Plan

The RDBN's current Solid Waste Management Plan has been in place since

1996. A few things have changed in the last 20 years! We are looking to do a full review, part of which will include public consultation. Stay tuned for more info in 2017!



Disposal Fee Changes

The Solid Waste Management Facility Regulation and User Fee Bylaw No. 1764 came into effect on the 24th of June and this affected several user fees at all Regional District landfills and transfer stations. If you are dropping off asphalt, (continued on Page 6)

concrete, non-metal plumbing components, electrical wire, drywall, shingles and insulation (construction and/or demolition waste), these items are still free of charge if you only have a level pick-up truck load. If you have more than that, you will have to take it to a landfill and there will be a disposal fee applied. That disposal fee is now \$90 per metric tonne. This disposal fee also applies to land clearing debris.

The other fee change is for any appliance that contains an ozone depleting substance. Typically, that includes fridges, freezers, water coolers and air conditioners. The fee for disposing of these is now \$20.



The Great British Columbia Shake-Out 2016

Every year in October, Emergency Management BC (EMBC) asks its residents to participate in the "Great ShakeOut", a worldwide event that practices how to "Drop, Cover and Hold On" in preparation for earthquakes. On October 20th, 2016, over 54.8 million people worldwide participated in this exercise with over 800,000 people participating in British Columbia. The Great ShakeOut is the world's largest "Drop, Cover and Hold On" earthquake drill!

Earthquakes are the result of tectonic plate movement along plate boundaries.

As the south coast of British Columbia is within an area of plate movement it is at risk of an earthquake. On October 27th, 2012, an earthquake from the Haida Gwaii archipelago measured a

magnitude of 7.8, making it the second largest ever recorded in the area. Although this earthquake was over 450km away, the tremors were still felt throughout the

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN).

Shakeout BC is an engaging way to practice earthquake preparedness as the Province's Earthquake risk is an ever growing concern. Although the RDBN residents may not feel the immediate, devastating, physical effects of this pending catastrophic disaster, those that visit earthquake prone areas should be prepared. RDBN office staff still partake in Shake-Out every year to show support and also use this exercise as a platform to practice office safety.

This year, the RDBN office staff focused on general office safety by being tested on locations of fire pulls, fire extinguishers, eyewash stations, safety kits, etc. Staff were also offered an opportunity to learn how to use a fire extinguisher by watching and partaking in a fire extinguisher demonstration.

Home Safety Tips

- Check all smoke alarms at least once a month to ensure they are working.
- •Check the expiry date on your fire extinguisher every six months.
- Check chimney and heating systems at least once a year and get them cleaned, if needed, by trained professionals.
- . Practice your escape plan at least twice a year.
- Post all emergency telephone numbers beside each telephone in the home.

The Plan area extends from Sheraton to Broman Lake, up to Babine Lake and down to the north shore of François Lake. The Plan sets out the community vision for the Plan area, and contains statements of goals and objectives identified in consultation with the community to guide future growth and development. The review process started in January 2016 and has included consultation with First Nations, community groups, government agencies and the public. Four open houses have been held in the area to solicit input on the Plan.

Zoning Bylaw Re-Write

The Regional District Planning Department is in the process of doing a comprehensive review of Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993. It is important to keep the Zoning Bylaw relevant and updated to reflect changes in provincial legislation and to address new anticipated land uses. It is also an opportunity to improve wording clarity, improve certainty regarding intent, and amend select regulations to increase the bylaw's effectiveness and to make the bylaw more userfriendly.

Public engagement is an important part of the process. The Planning Department will be hosting information meetings this winter to provide opportunities for public information and input. Stay informed by watching the RDBN website www.rdbn.bc.ca for updates on the zoning bylaw review process and check your local newspaper for advertisements of public meetings.

Re: Quarterly Financial Report – September 30, 2016

Attached are the consolidated financial statements for the nine months ending September 30, 2016, which show a year to date surplus of \$2,750,704 compared with budget. This results from a combination of timing, where expenditures anticipated in the third quarter were spent in the fourth quarter, unspent contingencies and other deferred projects. The surplus for the full year is likely to be less.

Also attached is a colour coded summary report showing the expenses for region wide and regional rural services. In addition, each electoral area and municipal Director has been provided with a custom report that also includes the sub-regional and local services in which that jurisdiction participates.

As with previous budget reports, green indicates within budget, yellow indicates over budget by less than \$2,000 and red indicated over budget by more than \$2,000.

In the current report, Rural Government expenditures is shown as red because Federal Gas Tax projects funded year to date are more than anticipated. This is offset by revenue, transfers from the Gas Tax Reserve in the same amount.

All services are within budget at the end of the third quarter. However, there are certain expense line items within service budgets that are considerably over budget and not likely to self-correct in the fourth quarter:

•Chinook Community Forest legal fees (\$17,302). Higher than anticipated legal fees to get the service running. These fees will be deducted from revenues in future years and will therefore not affect taxation.

•EOC expenditures (\$3,509) not reimbursed by EMBC, including employee benefits, overtime, and advertising outside of the task number.

There is also a revenue line item that is likely to come in considerably under budget. Within the 911 service budget, Telus user fees revenue was budgeted at \$138,000 for 2016 and is projected to come in at approximately \$128,000. This is likely due to the use of more cell phones and less land lines and 911 fees are only collected for land lines.

The full detailed departmental financial statements are available on request.

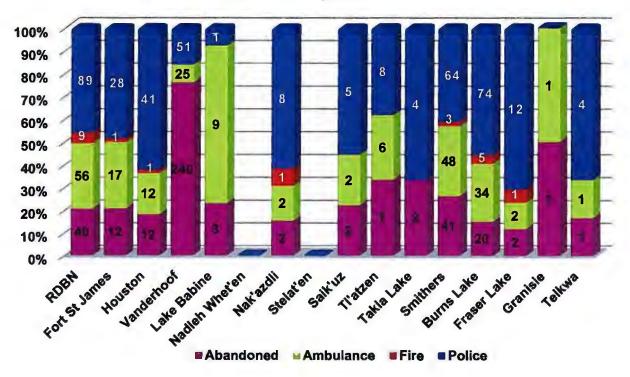

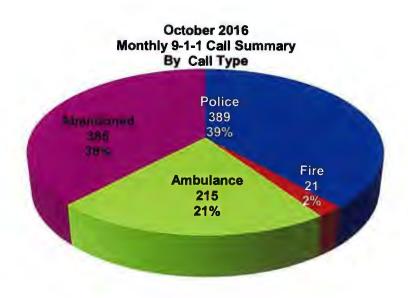

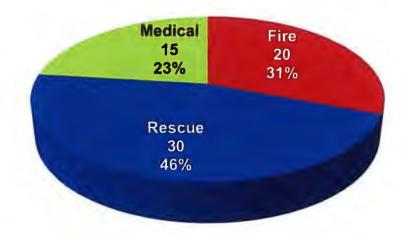

Berman Lake Regional Transfer Station Cost Sharing Agreement – Renewal

In the mid-1990s the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN) ceased operating a solid waste transfer station in the Cluculz Lake area. Closure of the facility resulted in the affected population utilizing the Regional District of Fraser-Fort George (RDFFG) operated landfill at Berman Lake. However, in 2000 the landfill facility at Berman Lake was closed and replaced with a transfer station.

In 2003, the RDBN entered into a three year cost sharing agreement with the RDFFG, which would allow residents in the Cluculz Lake area to utilize the Berman Lake Transfer Station. At the time, data indicated that two thirds of the residents in the Berman Lake Transfer Station service area were residents of the RDBN and, as such, the RDBN agreed to pay two-thirds (rounded to 66%) of the operating costs.

The cost sharing agreement was then renewed a number of times with the latest agreement expiring December 31, 2016. The annual cost for the last three years has been \$29,280.

The Regional District of Fraser-Fort George has requested a renewal of the cost sharing agreement for another three year term (January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2019) with a 5% increase in the annual contract value, which would increase the annual cost to \$30,744 (see attached letter for additional information).

RDBN staff have concluded that a 5% increase in annual contract value is a reasonable request and as such recommend moving forward with a renewal of the contract for an additional three year term.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That the RDBN Board of Directors receive the memorandum titled, "Berman Lake Regional Transfer Station Cost Sharing Agreement Renewal" and dated October 27, 2016.
- 2. Further, that the RDBN Board of Directors enter into a three year cost sharing agreement (beginning January 1, 2017 and expiring December 31, 2019) with the Regional District of Fraser-Fort George for operation of the Berman Lake Regional Transfer Station for an annual cost of \$30,744.

This is to inform you that the cost sharing agreement for Berman Lake Regional Transfer Station will be expiring on December 31, 2016. The Regional District of Fraser-Fort George (RDFFG) has valued this agreement and looks forward to a renewal of this partnership.

For this agreement, the RDFFG will be looking at a 5% increase to the value in item number six of the current agreement. This is due to the increase in operating, transport and maintenance costs along with the increase of tipping fees over the contract duration and in 2017. Service upgrades have been implemented to the facility in 2016. This includes a fully fenced and gated site operated by a caretaker. The facility also provides recycling opportunity. The RDFFG hopes you find this as a fair rate increase. Also, the RDFFG is working towards a three-year commitment of the agreement, January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2019.

Please respond in writing at your earliest convenience so that we can have the agreement in place for the 2016 budget process.

The purpose of this memorandum is to follow-up on the memorandum brought to the Committee of the Whole on November 3, 2016 and to obtain the resolution required from the Board of Directors to submit an application to the Canada-British Columbia Clean Water and Wastewater Fund for the un-incorporated community of Fort Fraser.

Project Title: Fort Fraser Infrastructure Improvement Project

Project Description:

The primary purpose of the project is associated with replacing approximately 80% of the unincorporated community of Fort Fraser's water distribution system which was originally constructed in the early 1960's using asbestos cement pipes and which is at or nearing its end of expected life.

The project will build off of studies previously completed, by moving forward with detailed design and construction of the entire water distribution replacement plan. To enable an in-depth review of the financial impact of utility services to the community, further asset management planning work will also be conducted for both the community water system and waste water collection and treatment system. In addition, the Water Conservation Plan for the community, which was originally completed in March 2009 will be updated.

Fort Fraser Local Commission Resolutions:

At the November 7, 2016 Fort Fraser Local Commission Meeting, the following recommendations were carried unanimously:

REFERRAL COMMENTS

Ministry of Agriculture

"Thank you for providing BC Ministry of Agriculture staff the opportunity to comment on the subdivision in the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) application from Dale Martens. I have reviewed the documents you have provided as well as other reference materials relating to the application. From an agricultural perspective I can provide the following comments for your consideration:

The parcel and immediate surrounds are in an area of predominantly Agricultural Capability Classes 6T (topographic limitations) and 4C (climatic limitations) with 6T being the majority of the parcel and 4C being located on the eastern edge of the parcel generally corresponding the area of the existing field; presence of the developed field also suggests capability higher than Class 6T. It should be noted that the maps I reviewed differed slightly from the map included on page 8 of the referral (CLI Agricultural Capability) as related to the presence of Class 4C lands on the eastern edge of the parcel and the lack of Class 5X on the parcel (but located on adjacent parcels).

Potential agricultural production in areas of Capability Class 6T would include forested grazing. It should also be noted that non-soil based agricultural production is allowed within the ALR and that topography can be a limitation for both soil based and non-soil based agriculture.

The parcel includes a number of soil types; soils in the Prairiedale and Berman associations are located on the eastern edge of the parcel. The combination of Prairiedale/Berman soils and Agricultural Capability Class 4C are most often associated with forage and coarse grain production. The small scale of the field and portion of the parcel in these categories is noted.

The previous comments by the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) related to the topographical limitations and limited uses for agriculture as well as preference not to divide the existing field are noted.



The proposed subdivision bisects the existing field contrary to the earlier, listed, preference to avoid this action; the preference was noted above.

While the parcel has limitations related to agriculture, maintaining the full, contiguous extent of the existing field would maximize the agricultural potential of the parcel. A proposed subdivision that did not bisect the existing field and that resulted in one parcel completely composed of Class 6T could potentially have less impact on future agricultural uses.

The ALC has information available regarding "Residential Uses in ALR-Zone2", which can be accessed at www.alc.gov.bc.ca/alc/content/legislation-regulation/alc-policies. If subdivision were to take place it is highly recommended that appropriate, lawful fences are established for all resulting parcels. This is an important step in agricultural areas and can be a key step in protecting both parcels and any owners/future owners from legal issues such as livestock being at large and reduces the potential for complaints and conflict. For more information on fencing requirements in rural areas please refer to Section 3 of the Trespass Act

If subdivision were to occur without exclusion, the resulting parcels would remain in the ALR and continue to be subject to all pertinent regulations and policies. It is important that applicants/owners/purchasers be made aware that the parcels are located in an agricultural area and that many activities associated with the business of farming and ranching that may generate noise, dust, odours, or other disturbances. The Farm Practices Protection (Right to Farm) Act protects farmers right to farm provided they use normal farm practices."

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Application History:

As noted above, the property was the subject of a previous application (ALR File No. 904). This application proposed to subdivide the Section into 5 lots. The ALC allowed a three lot subdivision. The subject property is one of the three lots that were created. The ALC noted that the property had topographical limitations and that it has very limited use as agricultural land. The ALC concluded that the subject property (Lot 2) should be 23 ha. so it could be suitable for a hobby farm and the existing field would not be subdivided.



Bylaws and Policies:

The application area is zoned Large Holdings (H2). The minimum parcel size requirement for the H2 zone is 8 ha. Proposed Lot 1 and the Proposed Remainder Lot both meet this requirement.

The current OCP designation for the property is Agricultural. This designation is intended to preserve these lands for the purposes of farming and other related activities.

Section 3.1.2(6) of the OCP states that:

Severances for small lot residential (other than home site severances approved by the Agricultural Land Commission), institutional, commercial or industrial development shall be avoided. However, Applications for exclusions, subdivisions, and non-farm uses within the Agricultural Land Reserve may be supported if:

- a) There is limited agricultural potential within the proposed area;
- b) Soil conditions are not suitable for agriculture;
- c) Neighbouring uses will not be compromised;
- d) Adequate provisions for fencing are provided, where necessary;
- e) There is a demonstrated need for the proposed development; and,
- f) The application is in the best interest of the local community.

A guiding policy under RDBN's Agricultural Plan is to maintain appropriately large parcel sizes and to keep smaller parcel residential development away from farming areas. This policy helps preserve the integrity of agricultural lands and minimizes conflict between agriculture and non-agriculture uses. The Agriculture Plan recommends that:

The RDBN should continue with its efforts to protect and preserve farm land and soil having capability for agricultural purposes through the restriction of subdivision, and limited encroachment of non-farm uses.

This application will be referred to the Regional Agrologist and the Area's Advisory Planning Commission for more input on the agricultural impacts from the proposed subdivision.

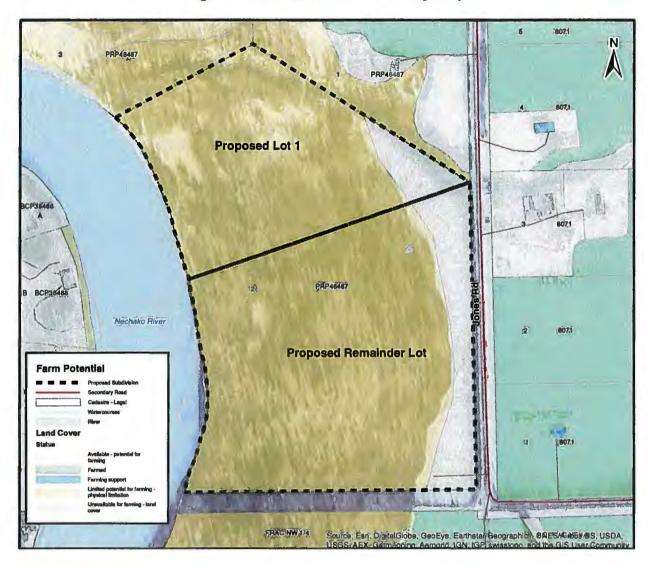
Agricultural Land Use Inventory:

In the summer of 2013, RDBN staff did an Agricultural Land Use Inventory (ALUI), which identified the farm uses, crop types and underutilized farm areas within the Vanderhoof and Smithers areas of the Region. The subject property was included in this study.

The ALUI identified that 87% of the property has limited potential for farming due to physical limitation. Along Jones Road, the ALUI shows 13% (3.7 acres) of the property has the potential to be farmed but it is currently unmaintained / inactively farmed.

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Agricultural Land Use Inventory Map



Land Use Discussion:

The property is located in one of the most favourable areas in the northern interior for cattle and hay production. Land use in the immediate area is a mix of agriculture and residential uses on parcels that range in size from 8 ha. to 50 ha.. The proposed parcel sizes are not out of character with the area. Also, the topography limits the lands agricultural potential and the existing field may not be large enough to support a viable agriculture operation. However, keeping the parcel at 23 ha, allows for greater number of agricultural opportunities and increases the potential use of the land as a hobby farm. If the property is subdivided it is very likely that the 2 parcels would never be used for farming.

The allocation of additional residential development in this farming area is not in the best interest of agriculture. These same issues were initially considered in 1999 when the ALC stated that the property would be suitable for a hobby farm and denied the



request to subdivide the property and the existing field. It is the Planning Department's opinion that the ALC's previous decision to not subdivide the parcel was appropriate.

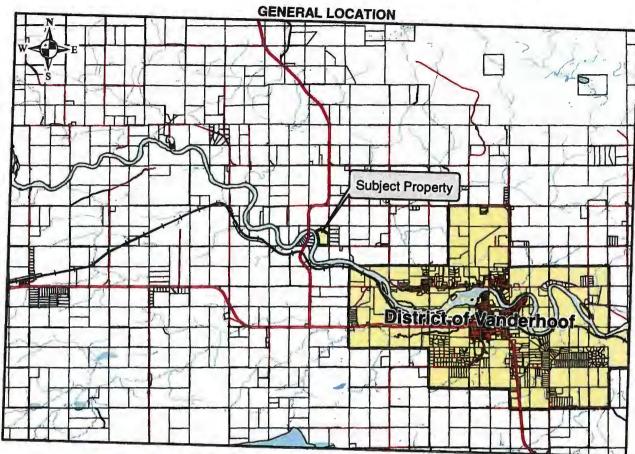

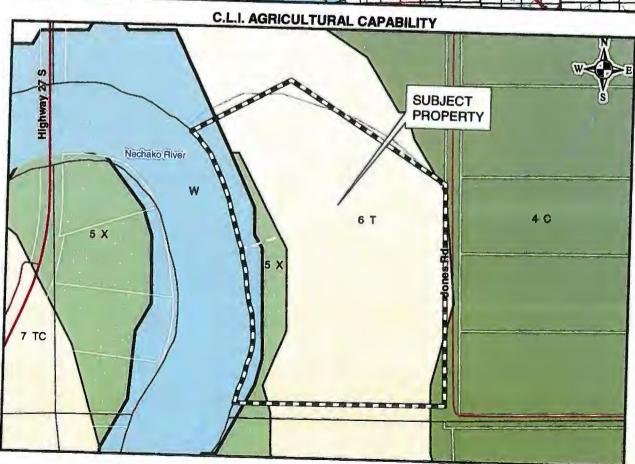
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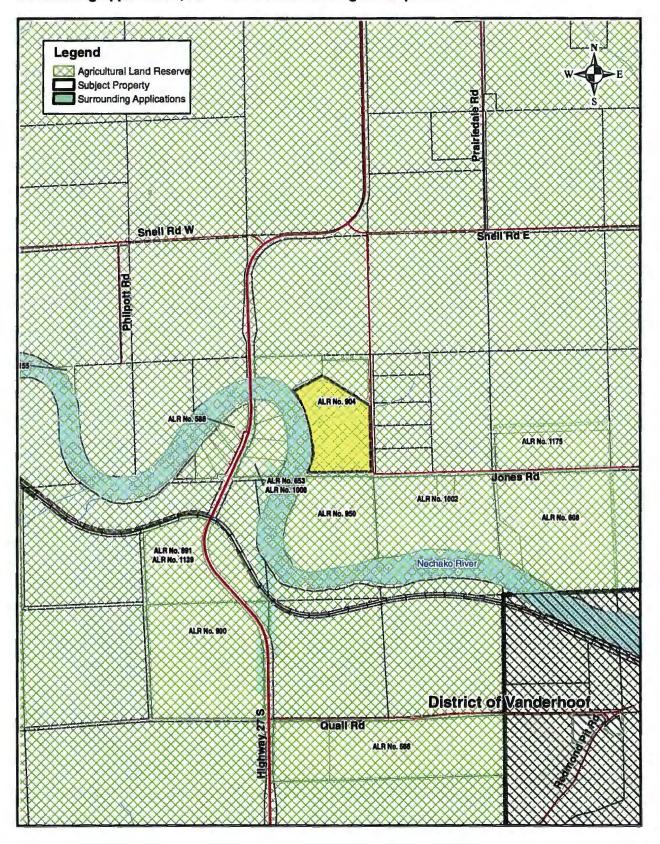

REFERRAL COMMENTS

Ministry of Agriculture:

Thank you for your referral package and opportunity to comment regarding the proposed subdivision located at 2710 Newens Road (HBH as agent of behalf of Mary Yelich).

The subject parcel is a largely intact agriculture (AG-1) parcel between smaller rural holdings directly west of the subject parcel and working farms and ranches to the north and east.

I did not conduct a thorough field assessment of the subject parcel but did travel to the subject parcel for a roadside view. I do agree with the general Canada Land Inventory (CLI) soil capability rating for agriculture as Class 3 and 4 with limitations namely heavy clay on the existing cultivated areas, as well as some areas (Class 6) with poor ground whether it be poor drainage and/or rocky areas with topography. The recently reseeded existing hayfield is representative of the general area.

In my opinion, this parcel has some very favourable attributes conducive to a small mixed-farm operation with the current parcel (one title) configuration; that being a mix of cash-crops and raising of livestock with managed grazing. The extremely close proximity to Smithers via paved road could efficiently provide getting product to market and/or customers and labour to the farm if desired. The existing cleared cultivated land is capable of supporting large mixed-horticulture activities including annual and perennial crops and gardens and I would encourage the applicants' sons to continue with feasibility planning for certain cash-crops of which I would be certainly willing to assist them with.

Rather than subdivision of the subject parcel, there is some options available regarding additional residence for family members to support farm operations found here at the ALC Policy L-18:

Farm succession planning is a very important topic and I do not take the applicants' estate planning lightly but must be balanced with preservation of agriculture land for future needs.

The subject parcel is a rarity given moderate to high soil capability, favourable aspect, availability of surface water, close proximity to Smithers, and a multitude of farm management options available due to its (intact) large size. I believe fragmentation by subdivision would be detrimental to future farm management options and potential.

I would be interested to join any field review with RDBN and ALC staff and panel members should the opportunity arise.



Area 'A' Advisory Planning Commission:

Resolution: The application not be approved. Two members to approve, two on the

fence and three to deny. Please refer to comments.

Comments: Mary Yelich presented the APC with her story and the history of the land

including an emotional plea to approve the application. There was

discussion surrounding the implications of approval setting a precedent for other land in the ALR. There was also some discussion regarding this parcel in and of itself being too small for cattle/ dairy operation; some of it not being viable land for any farming and the existing hay fields / pasture. There was also discussion that smaller parcels of land which may still be viable for alternative farming application, close to town, may not be such a bad idea. There was further discussion regarding "homesite severance on ALR lands" and whether or not the terms and conditions should be reviewed. Some of us felt that the number of years the property has been owned and worked may be considerations for subdivision and inheritance. In the end, all agreed that setting precedent was our main concern, although two members still believed the application should be approved.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Application History:

As noted above, the property was the subject of a previous application (ALR File No. 752). This application proposed to subdivide the subject property into one 9.5 ha. lot and a 47.1 ha. remainder. The ALC concluded that the subject property should not be subdivided to allow the proposed rural residential intrusion into this agricultural area.

Bylaws and Policies:

The application area is zoned Agricultural (Ag1). The minimum parcel size requirement for the Ag1 zone is 16 ha. Proposed Lot 1 and the Proposed Remainder Lot both meet this requirement.

The current OCP designation for the property is Agriculture (AG). This designation is intended to preserve these lands for the purposes of farming and other related activities.

Section 3.1.2(6) of the OCP states that:

Non-farm use of agricultural land shall be avoided. Applications for exclusions, subdivisions, and non-farm uses within the Agricultural Land Reserve may only be considered under the following circumstances.

- a) There is limited agricultural potential within the proposed area.
- b) Soil conditions are not suitable for agriculture.
- c) Neighbouring uses will not be compromised.



- d) Adequate provisions for fencing are provided, where a proposed development is adjacent to an existing agricultural use.
- e) The application is in the best interest of the local community.
- f) The proposed development considers and addresses potential impacts and potential improvements to recreational features and the environment, including wildlife habitat.
- g) And, traffic management issues will be considered and addressed appropriately.

A guiding policy under RDBN's Agricultural Plan is to maintain appropriately large parcel sizes and to keep smaller parcel residential development away from farming areas. This policy helps preserve the integrity of agricultural lands and minimizes conflict between agriculture and non-agriculture uses. The Agriculture Plan recommends that:

The RDBN should continue with its efforts to protect and preserve farm land and soil having capability for agricultural purposes through the restriction of subdivision, and limited encroachment of non-farm uses.

Changes to ALC Regulation:

In 2015 changes were made to the ALC residential use regulations to allow a second single family dwelling on a parcel for the use of a family member if the parcel is at least 50 ha. in size and if the total area occupied by all residences and other residential structures, roads, and service lines and areas between them is 4,000 m² or less per parcel. In addition, the ALCA now permits residential use under a lease of a farm or part of a farm if the applicant meets certain criterion.

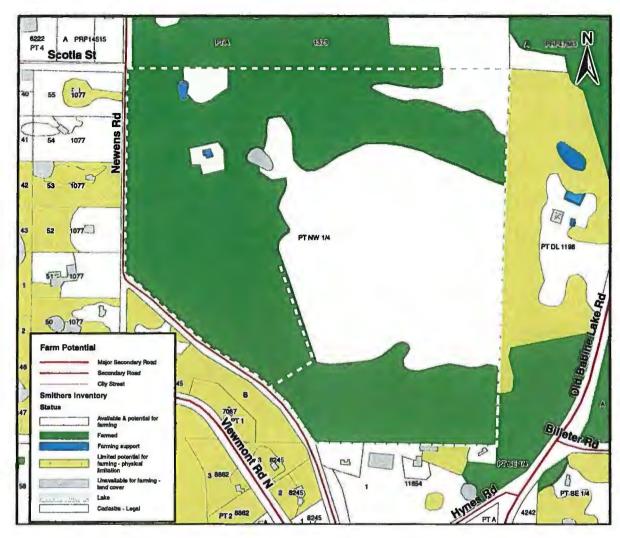
It is stated that the owner's two sons who wish to inherit the property require separate title in order to create an ownership situation to ensure continued financial and personal investment in the property and farm operation. Therefore, the new residential use regulations under the ALCA will not benefit this arrangement.

Agricultural Land Use Inventory – Farm Potential:

In the summer of 2013, RDBN staff did an Agricultural Land Use Inventory (ALUI), which identified the farm uses, crop types and underutilized farm areas within the Vanderhoof and Smithers areas of the Region. The subject property was included in this study.

The ALUI identified that 61% of the property is farmed, and that 39% of the property is available and has the potential to be farmed. The applicant stated that the undeveloped forested area is comprised of aggregates and gravel. The new residence is proposed to be located on this undeveloped portion.

Land Use Discussion:

The property is located 1.5 km north of the Town of Smithers. The application area is characterized by a mix of rural residential acreage lots to the west and south of the property and larger agricultural parcels to the north and east of the property. The actively farmed areas surrounding the application area are mixed, comprising of managed forage and pasture lands, and mixed grass and legume field crops. In addition, there is a neighbouring dairy farm on Snake Road, which leases the actively farmed areas of the subject property.

Subdivision of this land will likely erode the long term agricultural and economic potential of the parcels, increase land cost per acre (which limits farm business opportunities), and increase the potential for land use conflict between farm and non-farm uses in the future. The subject property is a large parcel with good capability for agricultural use in an agricultural area. In the Planning Department's opinion the land should not be subdivided.

Recommendation

That Agricultural Land Reserve Subdivision Application No. 1190 be recommended to the Agricultural Land Commission for denial.

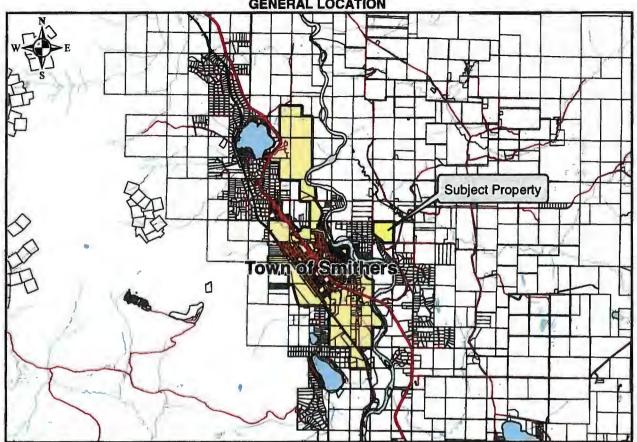

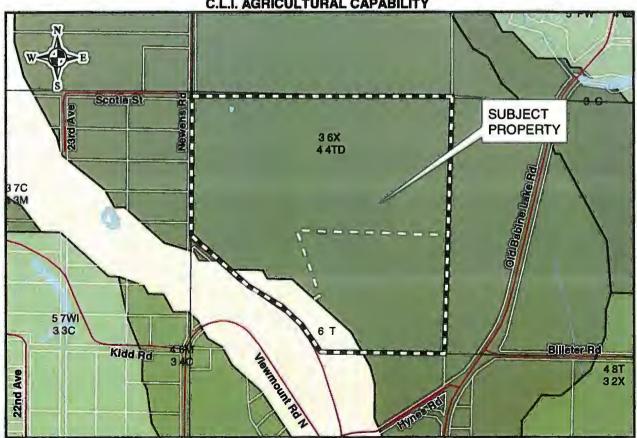

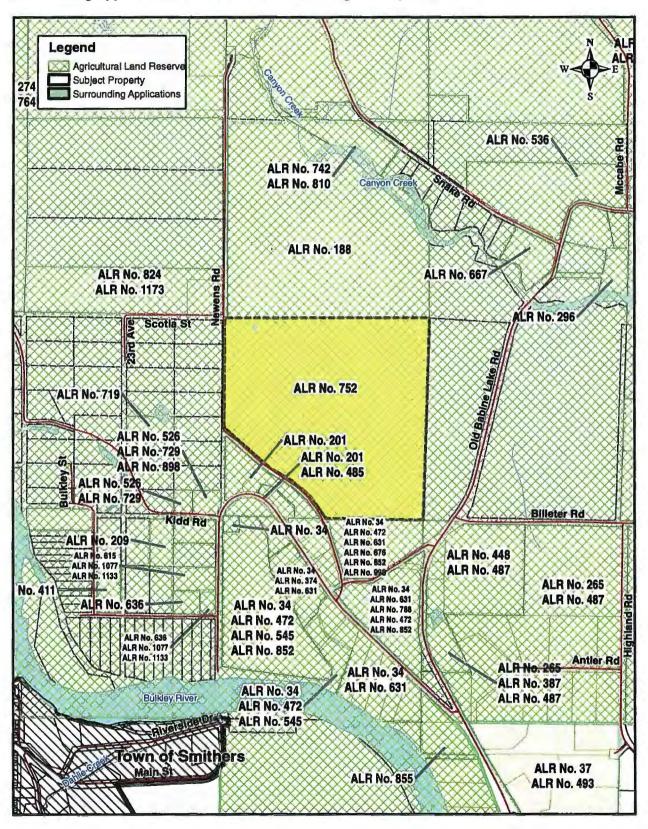
GENERAL LOCATION

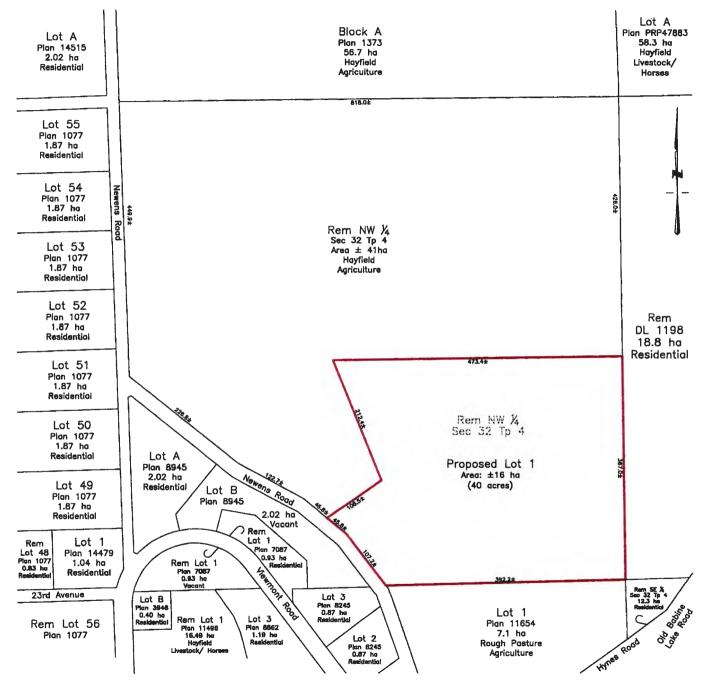

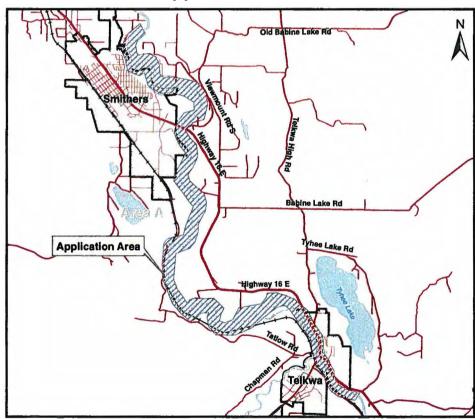

This referral from the Province is for a Licence of Occupation to allow the applicant to develop and use the application areas for adventure tourism purposes. The company would like to use two areas within Electoral Area A.

Application Area 1, shown as the hatched area on the map below is located along the Bulkley River between the municipalities of Smithers and Telkwa. This application area is 1,125 ha. in size.

Application Area 1



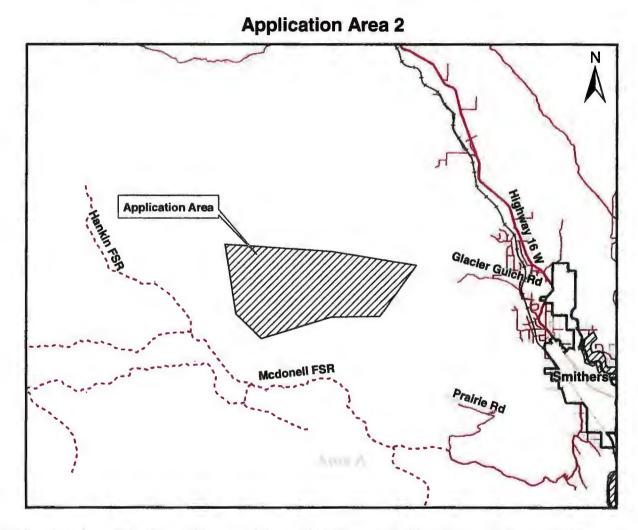
The proposed operations for Application Area 1 includes jet boat tours. The river tour will range from two to eight hours in duration on the Bulkley River, with a maximum of four clients per trip through the summer season (June-October).



Level of use is estimated at four to twelve trips per month with the busiest months from June to September.

Water Access for the jet boat will occur at public access boat launches. He primary access will be at Lunan Road near Highway 16 in Smithers. The application should be referred to the Ministry of Transportation who has responsibility for the maintenance of this right-of-way.

The application area extends over onto private lands adjacent to the Bulkley River. It is suggested that these areas be excluded from the applicant's Licence of Occupation.

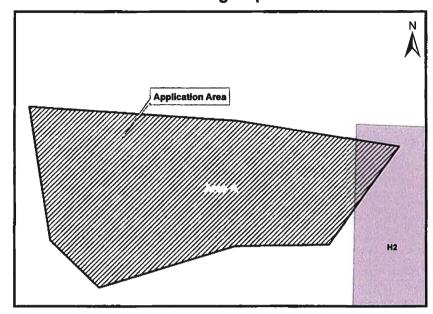


Application Area 2 is located in the vicinity of Hudson Bay Mountain, 10 km west of Smithers. This application area is 3,670.68 ha. in size.

The proposed operations for Application Area 2 includes heli-hiking excursions and an overnight stay at a rustic, temporary tenting site with fire pit and outhouse. Heli-excursions range from one to two days in duration with a maximum of four clients per trip through the summer season (April-September). Level of use is estimated at two to six trips per month with the busiest months from June to September.

Bulkley Adventures would also like to investigate the possibility of providing winter snowshoeing activities in the hiking area.

A portion of Site 2 is zoned Large Holdings (H2), and outdoor recreation facilities are permitted within this zone. However, there are no development plans mentioned in the applicant's management plan for this area.

Significant ecosystems and wildlife values identified by the Ministry of Environment and mentioned in Schedule C of the "Smithers Telkwa Official Community Plan, 1704, 2014" (OCP) are found within the application area. These include unique ecosystems of noteworthy plant populations and communities such as the Arctic Poppy and Mountain Goat habitat. The Regional District encourages the Province to evaluate the request for protection and enhancement of the associated values in the design of development within the Plan area (Policy 4.2.2(2)).

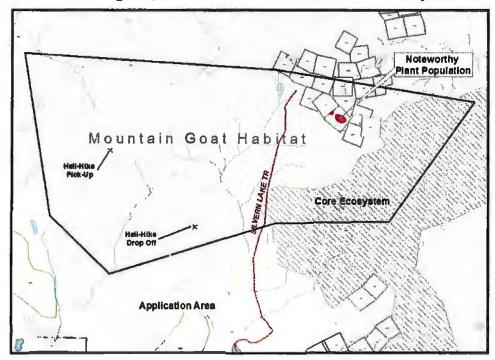
In addition, the eastern portion of the application area is designated as a Core Ecosystem in the LRMP and the OCP. The purpose of the Core Ecosystem designation is to protect values by providing representation of a cross-section of ecosystems, by retaining representations of old growth forests, and by providing forest interior conditions. Low impact recreation and tourism are permitted.

The Silvern Lakes Trail is also found within the Application Area. This trail has been adopted by the Bulkley Valley Backpackers for maintenance and improvements with equipment and supply assistance from the Forest Service. Therefore, this user group should be consulted as part of the application review process.

The Silvern Lake trail is within a Special Management Zone (SM1) in the LRMP. The objective for this zone is to encourage and promote the valuable backcountry recreation potential in this area. Because the area has high backcountry recreation and visual quality values, all management must be directed by a comprehensive management plan. The applicants do not address the impacts to Mountain Goat populations from the Helicopter use at the pick-up and drop-off locations.

It is recommended that the Province consider whether the management plan is adequate.

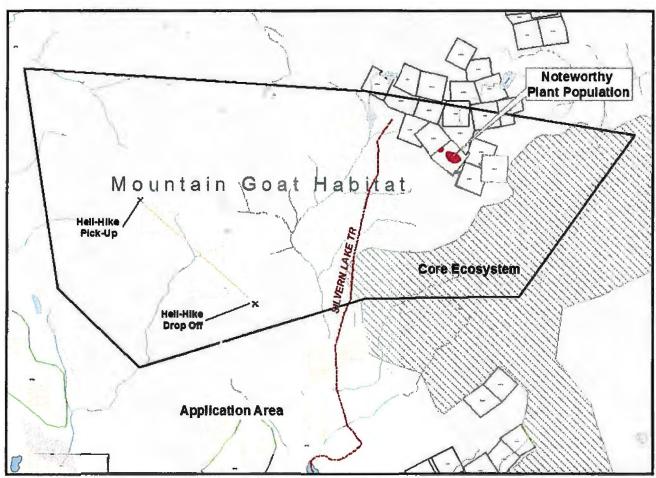

ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PLAN

Introduction

Bulkley Adventures offers outdoor adventure tours that have little environmental impact and create minimal disturbance to the surrounding environment. To maintain a minimal environmental footprint, Bulkley Adventures has an environmental management plan that outlines our rules, commitments and goals for the guides and participants while on a tour. As such, Bulkley Adventures commits to minimal disturbance of the natural environment; to comply with to maintain motorized equipment (jet boats) in environmentally sound condition; and to comply with accepted environmental procedures.

Commitments to Environmental Management

1.0 Minimal Disturbance

<u>Policy:</u> Bulkley Adventures is committed to respecting and preserving the integrity of wildlife habitat and ecosystems, including all flora and fauna, on any tour site. This includes minimal disturbance and disruption to feeding zones, game trails, migration routes, timber stands, rivers, river banks, streams, small vegetation and even the organic layer of a soil profile. Bulkley Adventures guides are to respect the surrounding habitat at all times, and ensure that tour participants do the same. The following rules will aid in ensuring minimal disturbance to surrounding area of tour locations:

- ABSOLUTELY NO HUNTING OR FISHING ON BULKLEY ADVENTURES TOURS.
- · Hikers must follow established game trails where possible to reduce disturbance to alpine flora.
- No food or garbage shall be left behind on tours. "If you brought it, you take it home with you"
- If wildlife is spotted, tour participants will maintain an appropriate distance for the safety of themselves and the animal.
- Above all, do not unnecessarily disturb any flora or fauna during tours.

1.1 Waste Management

<u>Policy:</u> Bulkley Adventures is committed to the proper disposal of any waste generated from tours (food wrappers, water bottles, human waste etc.). Bulkley Adventures will ensure that all food garbage is removed from the tour sites and ensure that participants do not litter. Human waste will be deposited into a portable outdoor camping/hiking toilet with double lined plastic bags which are sealed and disposed of daily.

1.2 Eco-Friendly Products

Bulkley Adventures is committed to protecting the environment through use of eco-friendly products. This includes EPA stamped eco-friendly cleaning products, and when applicable, use of paper products (paper towel and toilet paper) made from post-consumer recycled materials.



Maintenance & Fuelling

2.1 Fuelling/Motor Oil

<u>Policy:</u> Fuelling of jet boats will only occur at gas stations. Bulkley Adventures jet boats will never be fuelled on the river, nor will jerry cans of fuel be transported in the boat during jet boat tours. Motor oil will only be filled at gas stations. Motor oil will never be filled on the river, nor at boat launches.

2.2 Boat & Vehicle Inspections and Maintenance

<u>Policy:</u> Bulkley Adventures is committed to maintain motorized equipment in environmentally sound condition through regular equipment inspections and planned maintenance checks. To prevent boat and vehicle break downs, leaks or spills, the driver will complete a *Daily Vehicle Inspection* form (Appendix 1, Form 1) each day prior to the use of a vehicle for Bulkley Adventures tours and a *Small Vessel Pre-Trip Inspection* (Appendix 1, Form 2) prior to the use of a jet boat for Bulkley Adventures tours.

Spill Response

3.1 Spill Response

<u>Policy:</u> As Bulkley Adventures only fuels boats at gas stations, the only contact with spills will be associated with boat or vehicle leaks. BA is committed to preventing spills, and effectively managing and cleaning spills if they occur. All Bulkley Adventures vehicles and boats are equipped with a spill response kit and tour guides are trained on the proper use of spill response equipment. Bulkley Adventures guides will abide by the spill response plan provided below.

Spill Response Procedure

In the event of a spill or leak the following steps must be initiated:

- 1. Immediately alert bystanders in the vicinity to stay clear of the area.
- 2. If a flammable volatile material is spilled warn everybody, and control sources of ignition.
- 3. Control the source of pollution.
- Envelope the source with permeable absorbent diapers (diesel diapers) and/or berm containment.
- 5. Containerize the polluted material and remove to waste storage facility.
- 6. If any person is contaminated, flush with water for fifteen minutes or more.
- 7. Remove any clothing that may be contaminated.

Conclusion

Bulkley Adventures is an outdoor adventure tour company that succeeds by offering others tours showcasing the beauty of the surrounding environment. As such, Bulkley Adventures is inherently invested in maintaining the tour location areas in pristine condition. Bulkley Adventures' management plan is a commitment of minimal disturbance, responsible waste disposal, use of eco-friendly products, and the use of environmentally sound fuelling practices. Bulkley Adventures commits to comply with these environmentally accepted procedures and other regional, provincial and federal environmental regulations.

TENURE MANAGEMENT PLAN

Introduction

Bulkley Adventures (BA) is an adventure tourism company based out of Smithers, BC looking to acquire an Extensive Use Area Tenure Permit to carry out its two adventure tourism activities in the Bulkley Valley: heli-hiking and jet boat tours. As a condition of the Tenure Management Plan (TMP) BA commits to adhere to all results, desired behaviours, indicators and limits within the "Wildlife Guidelines for Backcountry Tourism/Commercial Recreation in British Columbia" guide.

Heli-Hiking

BA's heli-hiking excursion departs from Highland Helicopters base located at the Smithers airport and drops clients off on an alpine ridge located just west of Hudson Bay Mountain. Heli excursions range from one to two days in duration with a maximum of four clients per trip through the summer season (April-September). Level of use is estimated at two to six trips per month with the busiest months from June-September. To reach the hiking drop-off area, the Bell 206 Jet Ranger helicopter flies 0.1 hours (less than 6 minutes) from the airport to the drop-off site and only briefly lands on the alpine ridge to unload the passengers and gear then departs back to base. Although the use of helicopters as a method of transportation is minimal, BA commits to adhere to the "Wildlife Guidelines for Backcountry Tourism/Commercial Recreation in British Columbia" Aerial-related Recreation > All Habitats > Winter and Snow-free > Section 3, page 9, Direct Disturbance of Wildlife' to minimize and mitigate the impact of aircraft activity on the physiological and behavioural activities of wildlife. Once at the drop off site, clients will have an approximate 4 hour hike along the ridge to the site of a minimal impact tenting/picnicking area. As part of the Tenure Management Plan, BA commits to adhere to the "Wildlife Guidelines for Backcountry Tourism/Commercial Recreation in British Columbia" Non-motorized > Alpine/Tundra, Forests and Grasslands > Snow-free while guiding clients on the heli-hiking excursions to reduce and mitigate any impact the excursions may have on the surrounding flora and fauna. BA plans to complete minimal impact improvements to an area less than ¼ hectare within the heli-hiking extensive use area. These improvements would adhere to the Minimal Impact Site criteria as they would meet **ALL** of the following:

- Ancillary to an authorized AT activity tenured under this policy
- Involve seasonal and intermittent use
- Contain only low order, 'rustic' temporary improvements including: a steel fire pit with enclosed spark catcher cage, a temporary tent with tent frame that can be easily removed for the off season (winter months), an outhouse with a portable toilet containing a sealed, detachable bottom that is flown back to Smithers daily for disposal and cleaning, and a food cache for



emergency rations in case clients become unexpectedly stuck on the mountain due to inclement weather

- Involves the use of a small area of crown land (less than ¼ hectare)
- Does not limit public access and is at least 200 meters away from popular public recreation areas and trails

Bulkley Adventures is focused on this area for summer heli-hiking tours while investigating for areas of interest for potential expansion. Specifically, Bulkley Adventures would like to investigate the possibility of providing winter snowshoeing activities in the hiking area.

Jet Boat Tours

Jet Boat tours range from two to eight hours in duration on the Bulkley River, primarily between Smithers and Telkwa, with a maximum of four clients per trip through the summer seasons (June-October). Level of use is estimated at four to twelve trips per month with the busiest months from June-September. Water access for the jet boat "put-ins' and 'take-outs', occur at public access boat launches (primarily Lunan Rd boat launch near Hwy 16 in Smithers). As a condition of the TMP, BA commits to adhere to the tenting/picnicking area. As part of the Tenure Management Plan, BA commits to adhere to the "Wildlife Guidelines for Backcountry Tourism/Commercial Recreation in British Columbia" Boating > Freshwater and Foreshore > All seasons section to mitigate and reduce any impact the boat tours may have on the river.

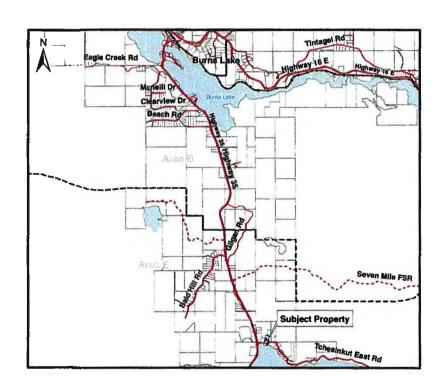

Northern Health Authority

The proposed bylaw amendment has been reviewed by this office, before comments can be provided on the proposed rezoning, Northern Health would need to assess the suitability of the proposed subdivided lots for servicing on-site sewage disposal systems. This office has received a proposed subdivision application referral from an Approving Officer from the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure. The applicant has been provided information regarding further requirements, which would need to be fulfilled prior to Northern health undertaking the assessment.

Please note that Northern Health evaluates subdivision application referrals with respect to the BC Sewerage System Regulation, the BC Sewerage System Standard Practice Manual, and Northern Guidelines for Subdivision.

Area 'E' Advisory Planning Commission

Resolution: Support the application to change the zoning on said property from Light Industrial to Rural Residential.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Official Community Plan

The property has two designations. The portion of the property south of Tchutsinkut East Road adjacent to the lake, is designated Lakeshore (L) and the portion north of the road is designated Rural Residential (RR) in the Burns Lake Rural and Francois Lake (North Shore) Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1514, 2009 (the OCP).

The proposed rezoning is supported by the OCP as the Lakeshore and Rural Residential designations support the creation of parcels as small as those proposed if the property is truncated by a road and onsite sewage disposal can be accommodated.

Zoning

The uses permitted on the property currently are light industrial in nature and do not fit the character of the area. The uses permitted in the Light Industrial (M1) zone include:

- (a) light manufacturing including the construction, assembly and repair of wood and fibreglass products, signs, boats and ceramic products;
- (b) warehousing including cold storage plants, frozen food lockers and feed and seed storage and distribution;
- (c) food products manufacturing, processing and packaging excluding processing and packaging of fish and including only pre-dressed and government inspected meats and eviscerated poultry;
- (d) building supplies and lumber yard;



- (e) automotive repair garage including autobody work and painting, muffler shops, transmission shops, tire sales and service, carwashes and excluding the wrecking, salvage and storage of automobiles;
- (f) commercial workshop including machine shop, welding shop, private or government garage and workshop;
- (g) storage compounds;
- (h) retail sales of petroleum products.

If a principal use of land has been established in the Light Industrial Zone, the following secondary uses of land, buildings or structures are permitted:

- (a) one dwelling unit per parcel;
- (b) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal and secondary uses;
- (c) retail sales and rentals.

The uses permitted in the proposed R3 zone, located on Proposed Lot 1 include:

- (a) single family dwelling;
- (b) home occupation;
- (c) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

The uses permitted in the proposed R6 zone, located on the Remainder Lot include:

- (a) single family dwelling;
- (b) two family dwelling;
- (c) field crops and horticulture;
- (d) noncommercial farm livestock;
- (e) home occupation;
- (f) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

The permitted uses fit the character of the area, and the zones would allow the subdivision as proposed.

Historical Industrial Use and Contaminated Sites

The property is currently zoned Light Industrial which reflects the previous uses of a float plane hangar on the property. The hangar is currently being used as an accessory building to the residential use of the property.

The Environmental Management Act requires the Local Government to submit a Site Profile to the Director of Waste Management when industrial and/ or commercial activities have occurred on a property that is subject to a zoning application. A Site Profile has been sent by staff on November 4, 2016. We have not heard a response from the Director of Waste Management.

If the Director notifies the Local Government that a site investigation is required at the subject property, the application will be put on hold until a release is obtained from the Director of Waste Management.



Sewage and Water

A Registered Onsite Wastewater Practitioner (ROWP) has done test pits and surveyed the subject property for suitable areas for on-site sewage disposal systems and water supply. The ROWP states in his report that both of the proposed lots can accommodate on-site water supply and sewage disposal systems substantially in accordance with the Northern Health Subdivision Guidelines and the BC Sewerage Regulation.

Land Use Discussion

In the Planning Department's opinion the proposed rezoning will permit uses that are a better fit with the surrounding character of the area. In addition, the proposal will reduce the potential for negative impacts to Tchesinkut Lake associated with future industrial use of the land.

This application will permit a new waterfront parcel and residential development north of the road. The parcel located near the water is already developed and proposed zoning will not allow further subdivision beyond the proposed 2 parcels.

There are approximately 7 other properties that are truncated by Tchesinkut East Road that may potentially be rezoned and subdivided. The public's and the Board's response to this application may potentially have a bearing on future applications.

Given that the proposal allows for a more appropriate use of the land, and the rezoning is in accordance with OCP Policy, it is recommended that the Board approve 1st and 2nd Reading and subsequently be taken to Public Hearing.

Recommendations:

- 1. That "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1788, 2016" be given First and Second Reading and subsequently be taken to Public Hearing.
- 2. That the Public Hearing for "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1788, 2016" be delegated to the Director or Alternate Director for Electoral Area E.

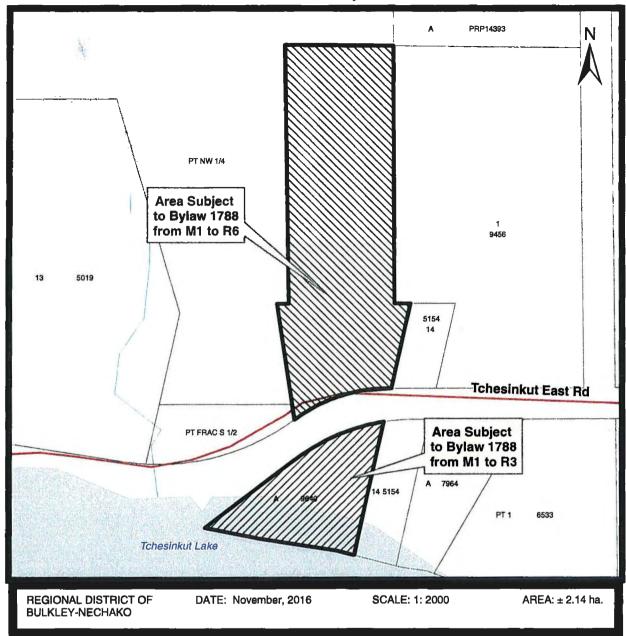

Bulkley Valley Engineering Services Ltd. (BVES) was engaged by Janet Wilder (Owner) to undertake an assessment of residential water and sewer in support of a proposed rezoning and subdivision application.

Background

The subject property is 0.621 hectares (5.35 acres) and truncated by Tchesinkut Lake Road. The Owner wishes to apply for rezoning and subdivision which would see the property divided at the road right of way. This would create a smaller lakeshore lot [Proposed Lot A] of approximately 1.166 acre (0.472 hectares) and a larger 4.184 Acre (1.693Ha) lot [Proposed Remainder]. The current zoning is M1, and BVES understands the property is not within the Agricultural Land Reserve. Lot A, located on the south side of Tchesinkut Lake Road, would be rezoned as Waterfront Residential (R3) and the Remainder lot as Rural Residential (R6).

Currently there is a single residential dwelling and a sea-plane hangar located on Lot A. Both proposed lots can be accessed via existing driveways with existing culverts directly from Tchesinkut Lake Road. The existing residential dwelling is approximately 260 square meters (2,800 square feet), was constructed in 1966, has a conventional absorption field septic system, and a concrete septic tank located on the lake side of the dwelling. The existing residence gets potable water from the adjacent Tchesinkut Lake.

Methodology

The relevant guiding documents are the following:

- RDBN Zoning Bylaw and mapping
- RDBN OCP and mapping
- RDBN Rezoning Brochure
- Northern Health Subdivision Guidelines
- BC Sewerage System Standard Practice Manual (SPM) V3

Our Mr. Eerik Lilles, P.Eng. and Liam Overstall visited the site on August 3rd, 2016 to review existing and meet with the Owner. During this site visit RTK and optical survey was undertaken. Mr. Lilles and Overstall returned to the site on August 11th, and with the aid of a tracked excavator, excavated test pits, undertook field soil hydraulic conductivity testing, and performed additional survey.



Test pits and soil tests were undertaken to demonstrate primary and reserve sewage discharge areas for the proposed Remainder lot, and a reserve discharge area for the proposed Lot A. The existing septic system was checked for field failures and the tank was inspected visually.

Results and Recommendations

Results of site evaluation for each of the two proposed lots are described:

1) Proposed new Waterfront Residential (R3) Lot A:

The existing septic system, while likely non-conforming to the current SPM, shows no signs of historical or pending failure, and the owner indicated there have not been any failures with the system since they have owned the property.

The site slopes towards the lakeshore at approximately 5%. Testing was undertaken on the uphill side of the property at least 30 meters away from the lakeshore. Soils in this area were found to be a sandy clay loam and dry. No groundwater or indications of seasonal high groundwater were observed within the 1.5 meters (5 feet) deep test pits. Field soil hydraulic conductivity testing indicate soils with percolation rates at 35 and 50 minutes per 2.5 cm. This site is not affected by flooding.

While soils are generally fine grained, it is BVES' opinion that undisturbed soils near the surface have adequate permeability to demonstrate a Type 1 residential absorption field in reserve (in addition to the existing) and there is adequate space to support a system with eighty square meters of infiltrative area. This area includes factors of safety of 10% for construction allowance and 5% to accommodate the site slope.

Due to the limited area and horizontal setback requirements, a Type 1 pressure absorption system will be required and a Type 2 system may be better suited to minimize site disruption. The lot is serviced by power to support a pump. BVES understands adjacent lakefront lots also have absorption fields.

The adjacent Tchesinkut Lake is a large fresh water body and a suitable source of drinking water with reasonable precautions undertaken, by all who use it, including intermittent testing and point of use treatment and/or disinfection should it be required.

2) Proposed new Rural Residential (R6) Remainder Lot:

No existing dwelling or septic system exists on this proposed Lot. An obvious building site immediately behind the existing driveway access was observed. The lot slopes at less than 5% north and west from the obvious building site.

Test pits indicate soils to be a sandy clay loam and unsaturated soils up to 3 meters (10 feet). The proposed lot is more than 1.6 hectares (4.0 acres) in area. Field soil hydraulic conductivity tests indicate percolation rates are slower than 60 minutes per 2.5 cm. This site is not affected by flooding.

Two suitable sites for zero discharge sewerage lagoons have been identified based on the investigation undertaken by BVES. Adjacent lots on this side of the Tchesinkut Lake Road also have zero discharge sewerage lagoon systems.

While on site, BVES interviewed neighbors and found that adjacent properties on this side of Tchesinkut Lake Road have producing residential wells at moderate depth.



It is the opinion of BVES that both proposed new lots can accommodate on-site water supply and sewage disposal systems substantially in accordance with the Northern Health Subdivision Guidelines, and the British Columbia Sewerage Regulation.

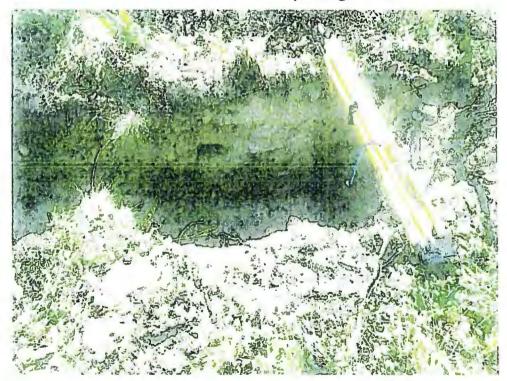


Photo 2: Typical test pit

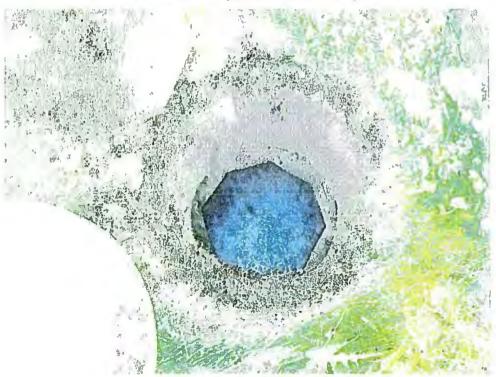


Photo 4: Existing septic tank

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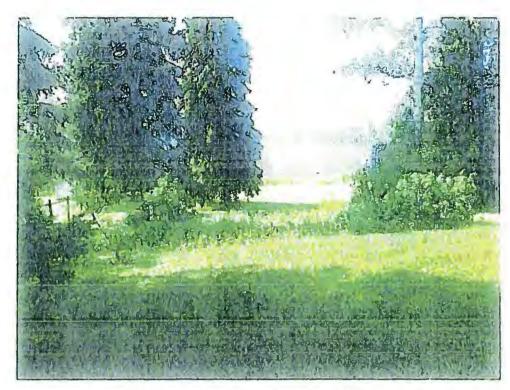
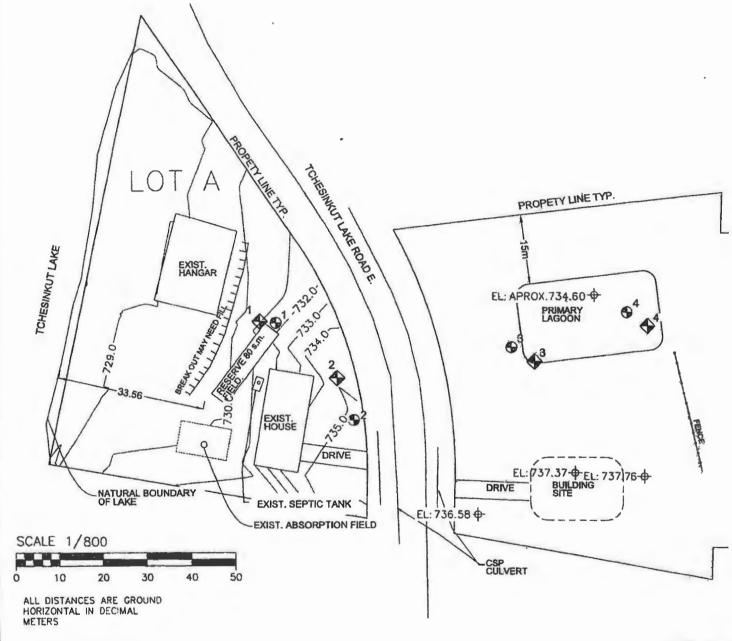


Photo 5: Existing absorption site.

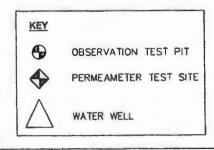


Photo 6: View of house from lake

- Phase 3 is proposed to create 6 lots on the portion proposed to be rezoned to H1 and 1 lot on the portion proposed to be rezoned H2.

Existing Subdivision Potential

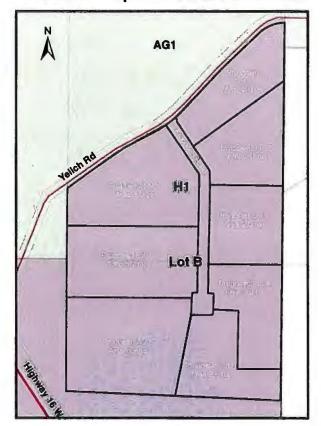
The current zoning on Lot B would potentially allow the land to be subdivided into 6 lots in total. However, the area that is currently zoned H1, and has subdivision potential, is quite swampy. The area that is currently zoned H2 is more suited for subdivision, and is more easily accessed by Yelich Road.

The previously proposed subdivision Plan, which was denied, is shown below on the right. The subdivision plan proposed with the current rezoning application is shown below on the left.

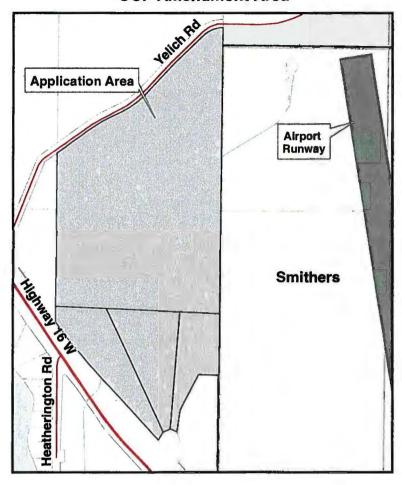

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Official Community Plan

The properties to the south of the subject property were subdivided into a four lot subdivision by the applicant in 2009. These lands were zoned H1; therefore, a rezoning or OCP amendment were not necessary (it is noted one of these parcels was rezoned for industrial use). An OCP change from AG to RR is proposed for the previously subdivided residential parcels (lots 2, 3, and 4) in addition to Lot B to reflect their use and zoning.

OCP Amendment Area



Zoning

Lot B is currently split zoned Small Holdings (H1) and Large Holdings (H2). The rezoning application does not intend to change the use, rather than to change the locations of the zones to allow the proposed subdivision layout noted above.

The following uses are permitted in the Small Holdings (H1) Zone.

- (a) single family dwelling;
- (b) two family dwelling;
- (c) agriculture;
- (d) horticulture, nursery, greenhouse;
- (e) silviculture;
- (f) kennel and veterinary clinic;
- (g) home occupation;
- (h) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

The following uses are permitted in the Large Holdings (H2) Zone.

- (a) agriculture;
- (b) intensive agriculture;
- (c) horticulture, nursery, greenhouse;
- (d) single family dwelling;



- (e) two family dwelling;
- (f) logging and silviculture;
- (g) portable sawmill and lumber kiln (provided that the floor of the lumber kiln does not exceed 45 m2):
- (h) mineral, placer, coal and aggregate exploration, extraction and processing;
- (i) waste disposal site;
- (i) outdoor recreation facilities;
- (k) kennel and veterinary clinic;
- (I) primitive campsite;
- (m) guest ranch;
- (n) rural retreat;
- (o) peat extraction;
- (p) home occupation;
- (q) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

The Rural Residential (RR) designation in the Smithers Telkwa Rural OCP is intended to provide opportunities for people to live in a rural setting while protecting and preserving the rural character of the area.

The proposed 2 ha. sized lots are an appropriate size for the area and facilitate privately drilled wells and sewage lagoons that may not need municipal servicing.

Conflict with Airport Lands

There is concern that conflicts may occur between the proposed residential development and noise associated with airport operations, and future light industrial land use contemplated on the airport lands. To address this concern the applicant has proposed the registration of a noise covenant on title of the proposed subdivided properties. The covenant would be in favor of the Town of Smithers who would be required to sign the covenant document as the Grantee. Such an easement could give the airport the right to create noise, odors and other impacts associated with airport and industrial operations in the area that would potentially create a nuisance on the lots.

This easement would protect the airport and its tenants from potential nuisance complains from the residential property owners, and would also serve to notify any purchasers of the new residential lots that they are in the middle of an industrial area and they can expect to be impacted by activity on the airport lands.

Staff recognize that this is not a typical easement and the applicant's lawyer or notary may have trouble developing wording that is acceptable. In such situations it is not uncommon for the local government's lawyer to draft the covenant for the Regional District and have the applicant reimburse the legal costs. The local government then provides the draft covenant to the applicant for review and consideration. If the Board is supportive of the recommendations contained in this report staff will offer this option to the applicant unless directed otherwise by the Board.

Discussion

Growth Management: The proposed rezoning is not expected to result in an increased potential for residential development surrounding the airport. The existing zoning allows the same number of parcels to be created as the proposed rezoning. If developed, the proposed rezoning will allow for the subdivision to be placed on lands better suited for development and will not impact the existing swamp.

Airport Operations: It is noted that the Town of Smithers previously stated opposition to the development surrounding the Smithers Airport Lands. However, they have expressed a willingness to discuss aspects of the Noise Covenant on the subject properties to ensure that there remains a setback buffer between the airport and residential uses.

Given that the proposal does not change the density to the lands adjacent to the airport; the Planning Department recommends approval, and will work with the Town of Smithers Airport Manager and Staff to develop a suitable covenant to ensure the protection and proper development of the residential lands to avoid any anticipated conflict.

Recommendations:

- 1. That the Board consider and approve the consultation identified in the consultation checklist attached as "Appendix A".
- That "Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 1786, 2016" and "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1787, 2016" be given First and Second Reading and subsequently be taken to Public Hearing.
- 3. That the Public Hearing for "Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 1786, 2016" and "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1787, 2016" be delegated to the Director or Alternate Director for Electoral Area A.
- 4. That the Public Hearing for Bylaw No. 1786, 2016 and Bylaw No. 1787, 2016 not be held until a draft Noise Covenant is completed to the satisfaction of the Director of Planning and the Town of Smithers.

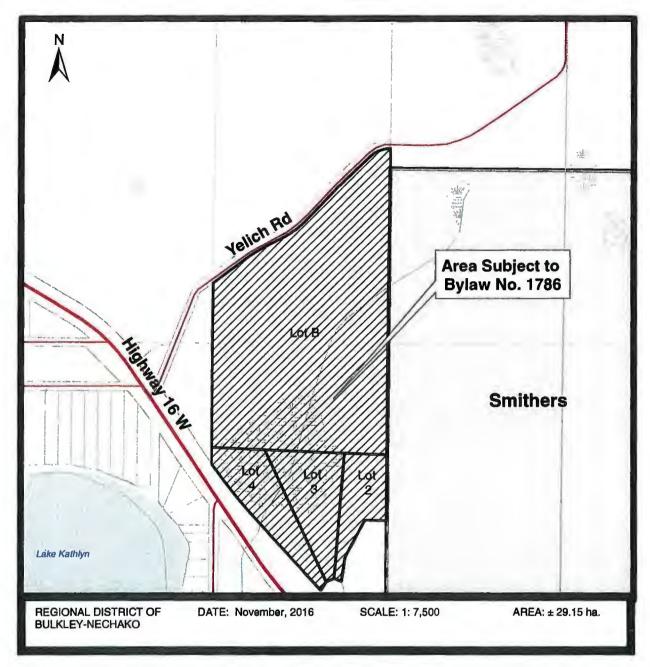

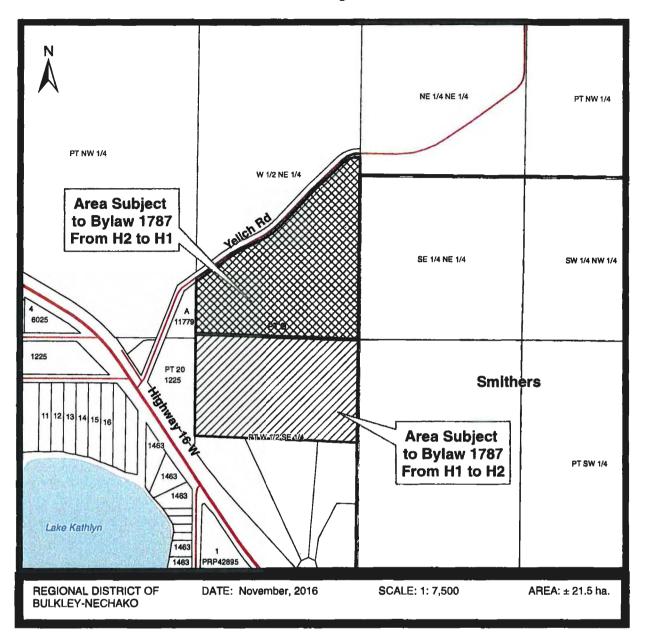

The proponent wishes to flip the split zoning of Lot B Sec 14 Tp1A R5C Plan EPP25548 from H2 to H1 and H1 to H2 facilitate a future proposed subdivision. This property has recently been removed from the ALR as the "North Panel believes the property has no meaningful agricultural capability, is not appropriately designated as ALR and that the property in not suitable for agricultural use". A copy of the resolution is included with this submission. Should the rezoning be approved the proponent intends to subdivide the lot directly south of Yelich Road and create 5 residential lots. A sketch of this proposal is attached. This is part of an overall development plan that the applicant has been working on since 2009.

In reviewing the previous comments from the Town of Smithers, the applicant would like to address the potential land use conflicts by offering to register a noise covenant on title. This will indicate to potential buyers not familiar with the noise and traffic associated with the Smithers Airport, in essence offering full disclosure for out of town buyers and alleviating complaints in the future. The lots will be a minimum of 5 acres in size and will be serviced privately by drilled wells and sewage lagoons. The road maintenance falls under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and will not create an additional burden on the Town of Smithers' operating and maintenance costs.

At present, the property to the north and northwest is not farmed. This property owner has cleared a 20 acre section of land over the past 10 years and has no intention of planting crops due to the rocky conditions of the soils. To the east is the Town of Smithers airport and west and south are small residential lots (0.5 acre to 5 acre). There are agricultural developments to the east of the Smithers airport boundaries, but for the most part, the large parcels are single family homes.

With respect to the economic and social considerations of this proposed subdivision, it has been my experience over the past 8 years in land surveying in Smithers that there is a demand for the 5 acre "hobby farm" lifestyle. In order to keep with the green initiatives of the province and people in general, it is necessary to create this type of subdivision in locations where a person can exercise green transportation options. There are few subdivisions of this type in the Smithers area where a person can have the hobby farm lifestyle and be close enough to town to walk or bike to school or work. This subdivision will offer this alternative as the recent upgrades of Highway 16 in this area provide a widened shoulder for this purpose.

Increase to traffic along Yelich Road will be minimal with the introduction of 1 additional residential lot. The road location, approved by the Ministry of Transportation, has safe site lines along Yelich Road.

With respect to the OCP Amendment and the request of the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako, we request that the OCP designation for Lot B Plan EPP25548 and Lots 2,3 and 4 Plan EPP42101 be designated as Rural Residential as the land is no longer in the ALR and should not be considered Agricultural.

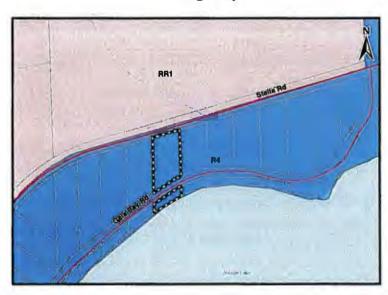

Previous Rezoning Application

This property has a long enforcement history dating back to 2012 when the owners first applied to rezone the property to facilitate an expansion of the business.

The rezoning application requested the following.

- 2. And, to be allowed up to 110 m² of gross floor area of accessory buildings devoted to the home occupation.

The applicant offered to limit the bottling to less than 6500 litres of water per week with a requirement that the water bottled will only come from the same parcel, and is bottled using only electrically powered equipment.

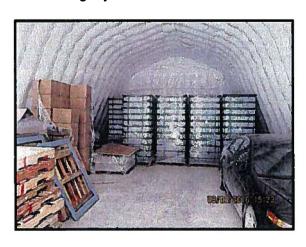
This rezoning was denied by the Board in 2013

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Gala Bay Springs currently operates contrary to the Zoning Bylaw.

- Water bottles are regularly stored outdoors which is contrary to the Home Occupation regulations.
- An adjacent accessory building was used contrary to the Zoning Bylaw, and contrary to representations made to the RDBN to obtain a building permit.
- The area used for the purposes of the water bottling is 837.5 square feet, or 77.81 square metres, in contravention of the Home Occupation regulations.
- The business appears to have more employees working on the property than is permitted by the Home Occupation regulations.
- The use is not a home occupation, and is not a permitted use on the property.

It is noted that the RDBN has initiated legal action to address the above noted Zoning Bylaw infractions.







The subject property is located on the lakeshore in a recreational and residential subdivision consisting of smaller sized parcels (1 to 3 acres in size). The RDBN has received a number of complaints from neighboring residents regarding the noise from, and level of activity on, the Gala Bay Springs property over the last few years

Given the non-compliance with the Zoning Bylaw and the history of complaints from area residents the Planning Department recommend that Rezoning Application No. D-01-16 be denied.

Recommendations:

That OCP Amendment and Rezoning Application No. D-01-16 be denied.

Proposal

In late 2013, Gala Bay Springs Water Company requested a relaxation to the Land Use Regulations on the subject property. We were denied with overwhelming response from our community. After review of all the material from the previous application and changes to our business model, we are requesting a similar relaxation to the Land Use Regulations with key changes that has taken into consideration all the feedback received from the local community.

We are requesting the following relaxations in order to accommodate our current and perceived future business activities:

• To be allowed up to 110 square metres of gross floor area of accessory buildings devoted to the home occupation.

These relaxations will allow us to continue to operate all of our existing equipment including machinery and storage tanks, necessary materials used in our dally operations, a small workshop for servicing equipment and ensure proper and safe access for vehicles on the property. The relaxations are required primarily due to the cumbersome nature of our products and needs to be handled appropriately.

The existing by-law regulations will be upheld regarding employees as we should not require more than one assistant on the property at any given time.

Background & Review of the Property

Gala Bay Springs Water Company has been operating under its current ownership for approximately four years. Previous to that, the company was run by former owners for many years prior. Ownership of the company is split three ways between FRC Holdings — a family investment owned by Flora & Ryan Chiu — Tak Poon and Jace McCord. Originally, Ryan and Flora desired a water company as an income-providing investment for them and their future family. Due to the growth of their family and for health reasons, Ryan and Flora have remained in Vancouver to be close to other family members and to receive the continued medical attention they require. In lieu of this, and for the last 3 years, Jace McCord has been the sole resident living full time at the property and is responsible for operations of the business. In addition to the water business, he has made many friends in the surrounding area and has made a positive impact to others through teaching computers and providing qualified financial consultation during his off-time.

The property, itself, includes one single family dwelling in which Jace McCord resides and one accessory building totaling approximately 70 square metres. Our water sources are two naturally flowing aquifers which do not require any artificial pumping methods. We are currently in the process of upgrades to these wells as per the recommendations following from an inspection by the Ministry of the Environment earlier this year. These upgrades are to be performed by an approved, qualified contractor and we expect them to be completed in advance of any public hearing. We will continue to work closely with the Ministry of the Environment to ensure that our wells meet or exceed their standards according



the new Water Sustainability Act and Groundwater Usage Regulations. This legislation was put in place by the Provincial government to ensure that all water systems, wells, streams, lakes, rivers and other bodies of water are protected and are used fairly by everyone.

Operations & Expansions

The company's operations on the property are and will continue to be limited to three and five gallon bottles. The bottles are stored on property until they are delivered by a one-ton van to locations including Vanderhoof, Fort St. James, Fraser Lake and Burns Lake. Our primary clients are the residents, businesses and industrial outfits in these areas that either do not have access to municipal sources or for other reasons do not have potable water sources around them. These clients rely on the delivery service from our company to serve them and many are avid believers in the quality of the spring water that we offer.

Our bottling process is simple in nature but should be explained as it identifies how wastewater is created, managed and disposed of appropriately. From our water sources, we collect and store water from the aquifers into a storage tank, using no artificial means, to act as a buffer for servicing the residence and our bottling facility. We work closely with Northern Health to ensure that water is stored and transported from this storage container in a safe, clean and closed system to ensure quality and safety. Bottles are manually washed, then sanitized and filled by a small, automated machine. Any chemical sanitizers used in this process are biodegradable, environmentally friendly and disposed of in a manner that has been reviewed and inspected by the Ministry of Environment earlier this year. An advisory was issued to recommend changes if we intend on expansions that will increase our wastewater output. We will continue to work with the Ministry as per their recommendations going forwards.

We have explored and still have interest in expanding our services to 500mL bottles – primarily for private labelled services including weddings, company promotions and other types of organized events. After much consideration over our land usage restrictions, input received from the community and Regional District, we have realized the infeasibility to expand these services at our current location. Instead, we are actively searching for a partnering bottling company offsite to manage these operations. What this means to the community is that there will be an increased amount of traffic in the future. We expect between 1-3 additional vehicles per week that will be transporting water to this location. Please note that this number has taken into consideration the natural flow rate of our wells and cannot be increased without artificial methods (pumping) which would cause irreparable damage to our wells.

Summary

Gala Bay Springs Water Company acknowledges and respects the community that it is in. We appreciate all the outdoor activities and the quiet, nature-driven environment around us. We take every step possible to ensure that our footprint is minimal in nature and does not impede on anyone's right to enjoy the surrounding area. We, also, appreciate all the feedback that we have received and take into



consideration the concerns of its community members. We encourage any and all feedback to be sent to us and greatly look forward to any opportunity to address future ideas with those members having interest in our operations together. We strive to be a positive community business by sponsoring and assisting local initiatives wherever possible. Many of our customers and community members have become friends that call on us when needed — whether it be helping them with building, moving or assisting them in their own projects. We gladly extend that offer to anyone we meet who treats us fairly and with respect.

In the future, we will continue to work closely with the Regional District, appropriate Ministry departments of the Provincial government, Northern Health and community members to ensure that our operations continue to meet their expectations. Any expansions will be continually monitored by the aforementioned parties to ensure that we meet any existing or new regulations and meet safety needs without damaging the environment around us.

With all of this in mind, we feel that our request to relax the land use regulations will allow us to expand our business with minimal impact to the community and an ongoing system of checks and balances will ensure that everyone is heard and respected.

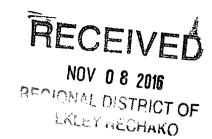

RE: Request for core funding commitment April 2017 - March 2018

In 2005, even before others grasped the significance of the mountain pine beetle epidemic, local governments recognized the impending consequences to the communities of our region, providing funding and in-kind contributions to start the Omineca Beetle Action Coalition. The Province recognized the benefits of regional planning and leadership, and provided ongoing funding for strategy development, action planning and implementation until March 2017.

By 2006, the BC government had already forecast that "25% or more of the present income level in several communities will be lost". As of 2010, the Central 1 Economic Analysis of BC projected the beetle kill would "...lead to a net loss of 11,250 direct forestry jobs and up to 9,500 indirect/induced jobs in the BC interior through to 2028." Over the next decade, the provincial allowable cut will decline by more than 13 million cubic meters per year, about equal to the demand of a dozen good-sized sawmills. Now, and for the next 5-10 years, mills will close and forest sector jobs will be lost.

Every community in the central interior of the province has been affected by the mountain pine beetle epidemic, although not all to the same degree. The impacts vary both spatially and temporally, depending on when and how much timber is killed, how much good timber is left to sustain an industry, and how much of the local economy depends on forestry. Having experienced the first mill closure in our region and the resulting regional complexities, we believe the continuation of the Coalition is even more essential to the region. Being forced to examine our long-term goals and reduce our dependence on the existing industrial model opens us up to finding new ways to sustain our communities. The challenges faced by our communities motivate us to work together to transform our regional economy by:

- Defining our unique qualities and interests;
- Creating a voice and collaborative leadership within the region;
- Working with senior governments and First Nations to ensure government policies and programs are appropriate to our needs;
- Creating a climate for investment that is compatible with our communities' needs and aspirations.

We have received strong support letters for OBAC's continuation from our twelve member municipalities and two regional districts. These letters provide the Board of Directors clear indication that their volunteer time is of significance and the continued implementation of the long term sector strategies of value.

- OBAC..."has been an invaluable asset to communities in the North for many years. Their focus on articulating regional communities' interests and priorities to government and business has helped our area weather the tide of uncertainty that has been brought about by the northern pine beetle infestation. Their continued support to our region is crucial..." Village of Burns Lake
- "...The Regional District of Fraser- Fort George recognizes the vital role that the Omineca Beetle Action Coalition (OBAC) plays in supporting the development of our region....To be successful in our work, we need OBAC to continue to fulfill its role as a single cohesive and informed voice that articulates regional communities' interests, priorities and good ideas to government and business, and to continue be a catalyst for projects that contribute to the region's capacity to adapt, innovate and achieve its long-term objectives..."

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- "...In moving forward, it is imperative we recognize the vital importance of working together and collaboratively to ensure the strength of each and every community is identified. To achieve this effort, both the inclusion of First Nations and continued engagement with senior government is crucial. OBAC has been the driving force for several years acknowledging and addressing community challenges at the grass roots level. The OBAC leadership has displayed a unique and successful formula and must continue to strive for a continued "one voice", cohesive approach in the diversification of our region..." "Since its inception in 2005, the Omineca Beetle Action Coalition (OBAC) has provided immeasurable support, guidance and leadership to the District of Houston and our membership communities with the tools required to adapt to changes to the timber supply and other factors. With the continued uncertainties in the forest sector, it is critical that the Omineca Beetle Action Coalition continue to advocate on our behalf to both the private and public sectors..." OBAC's Diversification and Implementation Plan 2016 – 2020, which included a request for continued funding, was presented to the Province in April 2015. On March 31, 2016, the Board received the Province's response that they were not considering providing additional funding to OBAC at this time.

On October 21, 2016, the OBAC Board committed to requesting its two regional districts to consider contributing to core funding of \$140,000, up to \$70,000 per each Regional District, to continue operations from April 2017 – March 2018. Discussions are ongoing with the Province regarding providing core funding to a new "entity" i.e. a community coalition vs a beetle action coalition.

The Board respectfully asks this funding request of up to \$70,000 to support core operations be included with your 2017 budget considerations. A formal response would be appreciated as soon as possible.

Subject: Core funding for the Omineca Coalition (formerly OBAC)

Issue: Material to support a funding resolution by member governments, Regional District of

Bulkley Nechako and Regional District of Fraser Fort George

BACKGROUND

In March 2016 the Coalition was formally notified that the province would not provide it further funding. Directors decided at that time to continue operation until at least March 2017 using existing funds, and to explore options for continued financial support, including the possibility of core funding by member communities. Directors also approved a name change, reflecting the organization's renewed mandate.

By transitioning to a new identity and generating core funding from members, the Coalition expects to be much better positioned to then access incremental financial support through the rural dividend, Northern Trust, or others key initiatives. If funding is not confirmed, then the Coalition will have to discontinue operations early in 2017. If funding is confirmed, the Coalition will be formally reconstituted under the new name and move forward on the strategic priorities communities have identified.

\$140,000 is considered the minimum funding necessary to carry out the core functions: facilitating the regional dialogue that supports effective engagement with senior governments; and providing capacity to communities to engage in key issues that affect them. The two Regional Districts are asked to contribute up to \$70,000 for the 2017/18 fiscal year to enable continuation of the Coalition. The following resolution has been prepared to support that process.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Directors take the following motion to their respective regional district board at the earliest possible opportunity:

WHEREAS the negative impacts of the pine beetle epidemic on regional timber supplies, and therefore on the social and economic wellbeing of communities in the Omineca Region are now being felt; and

WHEREAS the Coalition has developed and supported implementation of a regional plan and sectorbased strategies to enhance community resilience; and

WHEREAS the Coalition has proven its effectiveness at providing a cohesive and credible regional voice on matters of importance to its member communities; and

WHEREAS the Coalition provides capacity and support needed to ensure all communities, regardless of size, are able to engage in a constructive dialogue with senior governments; and

WHEREAS there is an ongoing need for these functions;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT

The (name of Regional District) approve a cash grant of up to \$70,000 to be contributed to the Coalition for its core operations in the 2017/18 fiscal year.



POTENTIAL QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT THE OMINECA COALITION

1. What is the Coalition?

Primary response:

It is a voluntary Coalition of 14 local government leaders working together to identify and promote the common interests of their communities.

Supporting points:

- Modelled after the Omineca Beetle Action Coalition (2005- 2016) to deal with the community impacts of the pine beetle epidemic.
- Made up of elected leaders from all municipalities and regional districts.
- Membership extends from Smithers to Valemount and from Hixon to Mackenzie.
- Provides a forum and capacity for working together for more resilient communities.

2. What does it do?

Primary response:

It fills a gap by providing a forum and resources for elected leaders to plan and act together. Supporting points:

- Enables leaders to meet regularly to discuss and act on their communities' common interests.
- Develops and communicates regional plans and priorities to support economic and social sustainability and resilience.
- Communicates the region's interests and advice directly to the premier, cabinet ministers and other senior officials.
- Engages directly with local and regional provincial government staff on matters of importance to communities.
- Provides direct support to enable key local initiatives to succeed.

3. What impact has the Coalition had on the region?

Primary response:

It has brought us together to respond to the biggest social and economic challenge we have faced.

Supporting points:

- Given the region a strong and united "voice".
- Enabled communities to focus on common interests and promote meaningful opportunities for the future.
- Developed an overall plan (Blueprint for Action) and supporting economic and social strategies for the region.
- Efficiently communicated the needs and priorities of the region directly to senior governments.
- Increased capacity for communities to help themselves and benefit through networks with others, which is especially important for small communities that often aren't able to act on their own.



4. Why couldn't this be done by existing organizations?

Primary response:

No other organization has a mandate to provide regional leadership toward community resilience.

Supporting points:

- Fills a gap by helping local governments collaborate on work beyond their core mandates.
- Has the capacity to bring together existing organizations to identify and work on common objectives – benefit the region by facilitating synergies.
- Has a unique mandate from regional citizens through its members.
- Has a regional perspective and is able to respond quickly.
- Has MOU's with NCLGA and NDIT to ensure clear lines of responsibility and avoid overlap.

5. What are some tangible examples of things that wouldn't have happened without the Coalition? Primary response:

In addition to providing a blueprint for action and a forum for regional leadership, the Coalition's participation has supported and enabled numerous initiatives in the region. Supporting points:

- (current) The regional wildfire forum, bringing together provincial, local and First
 Nations interests to cooperate on better protecting communities and natural resource
 values.
- (current) Regional engagement on key initiatives with the Ministry of Natural Resource
 Operations, for example: informed and coordinated input to the Prince George and
 Lakes Timber Supply Reviews, input to the Forest Stewardship Plan renewal process.
- (recent) Facilitated coordinated community input to passenger transportation solutions for the region.
- (recent) Development of a comprehensive submission on changes to forest policy necessary for community sustainability.
- Local government involvement in the growth and diversity of the bioenergy sector.
- Well informed regional input to provincial government deliberations such as the midterm timber supply review, BC timber sales review, rural BC project, the passenger transportation initiative, agricultural developments; and the rail review.
- Greater community capacity through implementation of the community transition toolkit.
- A stronger regional social services network.

6. How is the Coalition accountable?

Primary response:

It is accountable to communities through the direct participation of locally elected leaders. Supporting points:

- The Coalition directors, who are mayors, councilors, regional district directors and regional district chairs, are appointed by their respective local governments and accountable to citizens through them.
- Coalition plans, reports and other activities are regularly reported in newsletters or posted on our web site.
- Coalition books are audited annually.



7. Where to from here?

Primary response:

The past 10 years have shown how important it is for local governments to work together as a region – we need to continue this collaborative approach.

Supporting points:

- We provide an efficient and effective mechanism for the province to engage the region's communities, and therefore hope to see its continued support.
- We will need to evolve to ensure we continue to be relevant and add value to the region.
- We may need to find new, innovative approaches to maintain our capacity.
- Our focus goes well beyond the immediate impacts of forest industry transition to the broader, longer term economic and social interests of the region.

8. What specifically will the Regional Districts' cash grant be spent on?

Primary response:

The core capacity to convene, facilitate and inform regional dialogue and then follow through with the senior governments and others.

Supporting points:

- Salary and office expenses for one staff member.
- Directors' meetings and teleconferences.
- Meetings with senior elected officials, government staff and others.
- Consulting support for technical and strategic advice.
- Continuation of high priority initiatives such as the regional wildfire forum and the engagement initiative with FLNRO.
- Leverage and time to obtain funding from other sources for key initiatives (e.g., the province, NDIT, Rural Dividend, Forest Enhancement Society, WED).

- 1. A press release outlining
 - process for companies who want to burn
 - Approval criteria/process for permits
 - Contact numbers for Area A (MOE, companies, MOH, FLNROE, MLA) so people to call to get more information as well
 as express concerns. (I also want a list I can use).
 - A link to the Bulkley Smoke management plan. <u>www.cleanairplan.ca</u> and any other relevant resources for people to better understand the issue

There have been several pieces in the Interior News from Wetzinkwa (Sept 28, pg A11, Oct 12 and 19 both on page A9) community forest outlining their process/perspective but it would be good to have something a more comprehensive release about the overall issue.

Taylor Bacharach gave me your contact information – I didn't know you were our Area Representative on the Regional District – I had thought it was Taylor.

We live on Viewmount Road, North, just out of Smithers and have a great view (now that the leaves are off the trees) of our lovely valley looking towards the Town of Smithers. We also have a view (not so great) of the smoke that hangs, flows, or settles over the Town of Smithers and one of the business' that produces this smoke is New Pro or RePap or whatever it is called now..........I do know they are allowed a certain amount of pollutants to be released each day but I can't tell what this amount looks like and the volume does seem to change. PIR/West Fraser is also guilty of smoke and I was of the understanding that they were NOT allowed to burn without notifying Ministry of Environment well in advance of doing the burn. There has also been, for quite a few days, another funnel of smoke coming from the Tatlow Road (?) area.

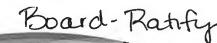
I would like to have a telephone number/email address when the air quality is bad, like it was today......no alerts on the Bulkley Valley Air Alerts from Ministry of Environment during all of this time AND the smoke was hanging over Smithers until around noon or later when the cloud cover over the Town lifted.

I feel strongly that the air quality is NOT being monitored or reported to the public as frequently as is needed. CFNR and CNFW from Terrace are the only stations that issue alerts as far as I know – the local radio station, I feel, is very poor at alerting BV and regional residents and perhaps that is because the air quality levels are too high for people with lung/breathing problems to be able to take care when there is air pollution.

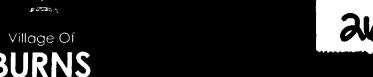

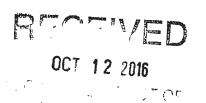

Report from Fall Fair Beef Committee

October 17, 2016

Thank you to the NVE and the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako for the opportunity of continued improvements to the beef barn. Your generous donation has allowed us to replace, upgrade and improve our facilities to a more usable venue. It was very much appreciated by all the participants of the Beef Show as well as the general public who toured our beef barn. In addition, this facility will be considerably more user friendly for the winter storage component of the program due to the new floor surface.

The following is a list of our progress to date, as well as the financial breakdown:

Floor:

We upgraded the existing floor of the barn. Approximately 300 c/m of material was placed and packed to bring the floor level to an elevation higher than the outside ground level. \$8159.82

Wash rack:

The 20 year-old wash racks were removed and totally rebuilt with the exception of the concrete pads and some existing plumbing. As well we managed to replace the existing water pump that supplies the beef barn with the pressure for washing and watering of livestock. \$ 966.49

Show ring:

Due to safety concerns, we decided that it would be prudent to complete the show ring by adding two gates. Due to previous fiscal restraints, we weren't able to totally enclose the area when the show ring was updated three years ago. \$ 244.16

Summary:

Over the years we have managed to improve the beef barn and keep up with many of the ongoing maintenance programs. It certainly has become a more usable facility with the upgrades we completed this year. However we have identified other improvements and required maintenance that will have to be addressed in the near future and as funding becomes available.

Again, thank you for your contributions and continued support. Our community and our agriculture producers really appreciate your efforts.

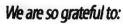

Introduction

In total, fifteen personal, confidential interviews were held amongst a cross section of community leaders, stakeholders, and potential user groups to test the proposed \$871,142 campaign. A detailed report was prepared with findings and recommendations presented to the Board of the Bulkley Valley Child Development Centre in September 2016. The respondents had detailed comments and offered a variety of helpful insights. The following provides only a high-level summary of the themes and opinions that emerged from these interviews.

Highlights

General

- First thoughts are uniformly favorable about dealings with the Bulkley Valley Child
 Development Centre and the Executive Director
- There is limited knowledge about the services and programs offered through the CDC; an increased social media plan needs to be developed
- The majority of interviewees felt that the BV CDC provided a critical health service to the community of Smithers and the Bulkley Valley

The Campaign

- Three distinct cases to be made-community, infant/youth development and education
- Early financial participation by the Child Development Centre's Board, Society Members, Staff and friends critical in securing additional support
- 100% of respondents felt that testimonials from families who are using or have used the center would be the strongest reason for people to donate



- 75% of respondents said that the sale of the Poplar Road Building was crucial in securing all of the funds for this campaign
- Many respondents talked about increasing public knowledge about the center its services, programs and success stories, through an increased social media strategy
- Significant numbers of major gifts are needed- the same names were identified and generally, in context as industries rather than individuals
- Now is the time to move forward

Conclusions

- It is crucial to secure financial commitments from the BV CDC's Board, Society members, staff and friends. This is an immediate campaign priority critical to gaining private & public sector support.
- 2. The Case is valid and this project should go forward. A detailed Case for Support needs to be finalized to help solicit major donations. The fundraising Case must carefully articulate three perspectives- community, infant/youth development and education.
- 3. The BV CDC needs to redefine there social media and outreach plan to increase knowledge of the center by the community, region and Province.

Notification regarding Coastal GasLink Pipeline Ltd. (TransCanada) Multi-use and Re: Stockpile Sites referral document CGW 4703-HMA-LA-LTR-0191, 0913, 0915, and 0917

The lands containing the proposed Multi-use and Stockpile Sites are not zoned and are not in the ALR according to our records. The locations are also outside of building inspection and fire protection areas. Our mapping indicates that there are no residences or private properties in the vicinity of the referral sites.

As TransCanada is aware the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has the following concerns regarding worker camps, and other facilities associated with the construction process.

Solid Waste Disposal

There is additional consultation required regarding the pipeline's solid waste disposal needs to allow the RDBN to identify any potential impacts on our infrastructure, determine our ability to accommodate the waste, and allow for the necessary planning and budgeting. The following is an example of some of the information required:

- How much solid waste (in tonnes) is proposed to be disposed of at each RDBN landfill?
- How much of that waste is industrial waste and hazardous waste?
- Over what time period is the waste proposed to be disposed?
- What waste reduction activities will be conducted to minimize waste generated (recycling, composting, etc.)

There is no certainty that the RDBN may be able to accommodate certain solid waste from pipeline construction at our landfills. There needs to be discussions relating to the capacity of our facilities, our operational limitations, and our long term costs well in advance of any request to utilize RDBN facilities.

Liquid Waste Disposal

The RDBN's ability to accept liquid waste at our facilities is very limited. The most practical solution may be the disposal of liquid waste at municipal facilities; however, the capacity of municipal facilities to accommodate the waste from all of the potential pipeline projects is likely not known. It may be in the best interest of Coastal GasLink Pipeline Ltd. to begin working with municipalities to identify their capacity to accept liquid waste, identify any facility upgrades that may be necessary, and discuss the fees that may be associated with utilizing municipal facilities. It may also be an option to develop a regional facility. This may be an opportunity for the region to obtain upgrades to infrastructure for the benefit of the region's residents. This same opportunity may be available for municipal water systems. The RDBN's Environmental Services Department is open to facilitating the necessary discussions between the municipalities and the pipelines.

Invasive Plant Control

The proposed Coastal Gaslink Pipeline right of way can be expected to facilitate the spread of invasive plants. The RDBN is asking that Coastal GasLink Pipeline Ltd. develop an invasive plant management plan (for the RDBN's review), and commit to provide annual funding to the Northwest Invasive Plant Council (NWIPC) to support their weed control efforts in the RDBN.

Fire Protection and Emergency Response

Coastal GasLink Pipeline Ltd. should consult with the RDBN regarding fire protection, emergency response, and their emergency management plan. The Regional District is concerned that there will be inadequate and inconsistent plans and protocols between camps, and pipeline contractors. Of particular concerns are the communications protocols and emergency evacuation components of the plan.

The Bulkley Valley Dairymen's Association would like to let our local Regional District know that we do not support a ban on Genetically Modified Organisms.

We believe that the agriculture employed citizens of our community should be free to choose or not choose GMO seeds, whether or not to farm organically, and whether they do or do not use conventional modern farming techniques.

Our local farmers work hard to try and make a living for ourselves and our employees, provide healthy food for our communities while at the same time taking good care of the land in a sustainable manner for future generations. We deserve the freedom to farm with out undo interference from special interest groups. Our practices are legislated by the Federal Government, by our own rigorous industry practices program ProAction, as well as Provincially by the Ministry of Agriculture and related government agencies.

For your own information the Federal Ministry of Health as well as the Canadian Food Inspection Agency have given approval to a wide variety of GMO seeds. These are Federally regulated products. Any ban that Municipalities, or Regional Districts put in place on these products would be symbolic in nature only and would not be legally enforceable. This issue simply is not in our local jurisdiction, and it would be good to advise any individuals who wish to ban GMO products to take their protests to the appropriate Federal Governmental Ministry.

The Province of British Columbia also has a law called the "Farm Practices Protection Act". Provisions in this act state that Towns, Municipalities, and Regional Districts do not have the right to instruct farmers what they can or cannot grow on their farms.

We hope you find this information helpful in all your deliberations on this subject. Keep up the good work on our behalf.

Dear Honorable Directors:

The Smithers Farmers' Institute (SFI) has been an advocate for the rural community since 1922. Two of our main objectives are: to improve conditions of rural life, so that settlement may be permanent and prosperous; and to promote the theory and practice of agriculture by lectures, essays, the circulation of information and other educational methods.

The SFI is an umbrella agricultural organization – our members practice a wide range of production protocols, including organic or chemical –free and more conventional production methods. We are dismayed by the decisions being made by the RDBN and some local municipalities regarding potential bans on GMO crops as we are representatives and promoters of agriculture in all its diversity as it occurs within our region. We feel that these decisions should be done in partnership with both consumers and producers. To date there has been no direct consultation with any local agricultural groups. It is our feeling that making decisions without proper dialogue between all of the stakeholders is detrimental to the regional agriculture industry.

Before decisions are made we feel it is imperative that the public and local governing bodies both be fully informed of how GMO crops differ from conventional crops, and also how GMO foods have been incorporated in our food system. Further context regarding how GMO crops are grown, both in the Bulkley Valley and nationwide, would ensure that decisions made by the RDBN do not detrimentally affect our local food system. We worry that without proper education decisions can be made that negatively impact farmers in our region who work very hard to produce quality and healthy food for our citizens. We are also concerned with potential conflicts between the RDBN resolution made in 2013 (and any decisions made subsequent to this) with property rights and legal authority between government bodies. Growing genetically modified crops is a standard farm practice in Canada, and as such producers of these crops are protected under the provincial Right to Farm legislation.

Farming is difficult. We are constantly challenged by weather, changing markets, increased regulation, environmental concerns, public scrutiny and more. The SFI has a mandate to support the local agriculture industry in our area; we feel that is best accomplished by encouraging cooperation between rural and urban communities to their mutual benefits.

We hope we can work together with the RDBN to resolve issues that concern our farming community and facilitate communication between the RDBN and local farmers.

The purpose of this letter is to notify you of the outcome of my review regarding Canadian Forest Products Ltd. (Canfor) purchase of Forest Licence (FL) A93557 from Conifex Timber Inc. (Conifex).

On February 12, 2016, the ministry was notified by Conifex Timber Inc. that Canfor took ownership control of 1040804 B.C., an affiliate of Conifex Timber Inc. that holds FL A93557.

I have reviewed the details of the change in control and I am satisfied that the requirements set out in Section 54.5 of the *Forest Act* have been met thus no further actions are required.

As part of the review process, a competition assessment was undertaken and information from community leaders and First Nations was considered including buyer power. The findings indicate that this transaction is unlikely to unduly restrict competition in the markets for standing timber, logs or chips. This is based on the lack of change in milling capacity, and comparatively small size of the licence allowable annual cut relative to the timber supply area, which results in little change to the market.

I do wish to assure you that my government shares your concerns with the sustainability and economic health of the community of Fort St. James especially as the forest sector adjusts to a falling timber supply created by the mountain pine beetle epidemic. The ministry is well aware of the critical importance of maintaining competitive log and timber market conditions to support a vibrant forest sector in British Columbia as we transition through this period of declining timber supplies.

Thank you again for taking the time to write and I encourage you to continue to engage with Greg Rawling, Regional Executive Director, Omineca Region along with your contacts at Conifex and Canfor.

Rail Safety Improvement Program Public Education and Awareness

What is the Rail Safety Improvement Program?

The <u>Rail Safety Improvement Program (RSIP)</u> is a program to improve rail safety and increase public confidence in Canada's rail transportation system. The program aligns to the Department's strategic outcome to provide for a safe transportation system. Through investment in infrastructure and technologies along with education and awareness initiatives, the program will contribute to the reduction of injuries and fatalities as well as increase public confidence of railways in communities.

The RSIP provides grant and contribution funding to improve rail safety and reduce injuries and fatalities related to rail transportation. The program will provide funding towards two components:

- 1. Infrastructure, Technology and Research (ITR)
- 2. Public Education and Awareness (E&A)

RSIP's Public Education and Awareness component will provide funding to projects that:

- enhance awareness of grade crossing and trespassing hazards;
- promote safe practices at road/railway grade crossings and on railway property;
- conduct research studies for rail safety improvement; and
- help reduce deaths, injuries and accidents around road/railway crossings in Canada.

What is the Public Education and Awareness component?

The E&A component will provide funding towards two key elements, a National Public Information and Education Program, and a Regional and Municipal Education and Awareness Program for high risk areas.

National Public Information and Education Program

Building on the existing and current initiative, this element will fund Operation Lifesaver Canada which will continue implementing a national program that will continue to raise awareness and education across Canada.

Regional and Municipal Education and Awareness Program for high risk areas

This element will leverage contributions from regional and local communities where there is a higher need for awareness and education and to work with organizations to address the specific issues in those areas of concern.

Who is eligible for funding?

The following groups are eligible for funding:

- Provinces, territories, municipalities, local and regional governments
- Road and transit authorities
- Crown corporation (including VIA Rail)
- For-profit organizations (e.g. railway operators, railway owners)
- Not-for-profit non-government organizations (NGOs)
- Indigenous groups
- Individuals





What can be reimbursed?

The program will reimburse recipients up to 50% of eligible expenditures incurred for a project.

Applicants may be reimbursed for the following expenditures:

 Staff wages & benefits, professional fees, public outreach and communication materials, travel costs, room rentals, facility costs, conference fees and administrative costs.

Note: The RSIP does NOT provide advance funding, and applicants must show they have enough up-front funding to carry out the proposed project.

What activities are eligible for funding under the RSIP's Education and Awareness component?

Eligible activities include:

- outreach initiatives, promotional awareness and public campaigns related to rail safety;
- public service announcements, social media, websites and other communications activity related to rail safety;
- production and distribution of rail safety education and awareness materials to promote rails safety; and
- research, studies and analysis to a better understanding of behavior, attitudes and the impact of rail safety issues.

When to apply?

Applicants wanting to apply for funding must send in their application no later than January 31, 2017.

How to apply for funding?

The RSIP <u>Applicant's Guide</u> provides a detailed description of how to apply for funding. In general, the following information will be required to support eligibility assessment and for the selection process:

- project proposal using the template that is provided;
- budget estimates for the project using the budget template provide;
- project proposal meets the Eligibility Assessment Criteria; and
- project proposal clearly indicates it meets the Merit Selection Criteria.

This is a follow-up letter to our letter of September 14, 2016 regarding the issue of Human trafficking/sexual exploitation, youth and child exploitation, youth porn use/addiction in BC.

We have included 5 strategies for Police to accompany the 10 strategies for City Councils that we sent previously.

We have also included a poster from the Vancouver "Buying Sex is a Crime" billboard and poster campaign. The Archdiocese of BC has sponsored this campaign, and they have also set up an excellent new website on trafficking locally: thetraffickedhuman.org.

We would like to see the 2 E's: Enforcement and Education. 1. Enforcement of the law (Protection of Communities and Exploited Persons Act): Local police need basic training to the issue of Human trafficking/sexual exploitation, youth and child exploitation, youth porn use and addiction. 2. **Education**: Our youth need education about the seriousness of this issue. For example, "sexting" has become "cool", but it is child pornography and illegal under the criminal Code even between consenting minors. In the same way we have stringent rules for children learning to drive cars (age restrictions, training requirements, L and N levels of competency) we need to start comprehensive "cyberspace safety training" to encourage "good humane digital citizens" so that youth understand the serious irretrievable consequences of online presence (it is permanent and enduring becoming their "life brand").

We would like to hear what proactive steps your community is taking to address this issue of Human trafficking/sexual exploitation.

If you need more materials or would like a presentation to any stakeholder/community/advisory group, please let me know.

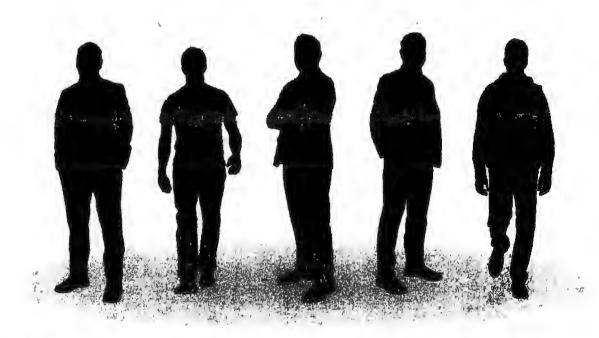

- 4. INVENTORY SCAN: Assess your community. Look for sex ads (Backpage, Craigslist, the newspaper, Georgia Strait); these will lead you to the buyers and sellers. List the businesses that are endemic to HT: escort services, modelling agencies, casinos, adult entertainment centers, tattoo parlours, holistic health centers, nail spas, day spas, massage parlours, strip clubs, cheap hotels. Be aware of their services/clientele. List all your community resources to support victims.
- 5. COLLABORATION AND BEST PRACTICES: Share information with other agencies, RCMP, FBI, Interpol. Where are the best practices in the country? In the world? Halifax police addresses the North Preston and Preston "Finest" gang, RCMP operated "Northern Spotlight Operations", London Ontario has veteran frontline worker and police educator Megan Walker (1-519-432-2204) from the London Women's Abuse Center, Montreal vice unit, Peel Region Police in Hamilton in collaboration with survivor Tamea Nagy, Edmonton vice unit, Winnipeg police and the Tracia Trust in Manitoba, York police in Toronto with survivor Casandra Diamond of Bridge North, Ottawa police (made recent massage parlour sweep). Washington State with former Congresswoman Linda Smith and NGO "Shared Hope"; Seattle using Nordic Model. RESOLUTION CONCERNING ROADSIDE VEGETATION MANAGEMENT IN BRITISH COLUMBIA AND CONTRAVENTION OF THE CANADIAN MIGRATORY BIRDS CONVENTION ACT OF 1994 AND THE BRITISH COLUMBIA WILDIFE ACT OF 1996

WHEREAS THE PURPOSE OF THE CANADIAN MIGRATORY BIRD CONVENTION ACT (MBCA) OF 1994 IS TO:

Implement the International Convention between Canada and the United States of America by "protecting and conserving migratory birds – as populations and individual birds – and their nests." (Statutes of Canada c.22)

And the Act states:

"no person shall: Disturb, destroy, or take a nest, egg, nest shelter, eider duck box or duck box of a migratory bird" (MBCA Regulations, General Prohibitions, Section 6, Section 5 (9))

WHEREAS THIS ACT (MCBA) APPLIES TO ALL Provinces and parts of Provinces of Canada

WHEREAS THE BRITISH COLUMBIA WILDLIFE ACT STATES:

"A person commits an offence if the person, except as provided by regulation, possesses, takes, injures, molests or destroys

- (a) A bird or its eggs
- (b) The nest of an eagle peregrine falcon, gyrfalcon, osprey, heron or burrowing owl. or
- (c) The nest of a bird not referred to in paragraph (b) when the nest is occupied by a bird or its egg" (Section 34, BC Wildlife Act)

WHEREAS THE SPECIES AT RISK ACT (SARA) STATES:

"No person shall damage or destroy the residence of one or more individuals of a wildlife species that is listed as an endangered species or a threatened species, or that is listed as an extirpated species if a recovery strategy has recommended the reintroduction of the species into the wild in Canada" (Section 33)

and

WHEREAS IT HAS BEEN WELL DOCUMENTED THAT MIGRATORY BIRDS ARE DECLINING IN NUMBERS (see background document)

and

WHEREAS THE BRITISH COLUMBIA'S MINISTRY OF TRANSPORTATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE'S ENVIRONMENTAL BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES FOR HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE STATES:



"Potential Environmental Impacts" from "Brushing" and "Mowing" "....may disturb birds and their nests" They then present a table showing the required "Performance Standards and Legal Requirements" to prevent disturbance to birds and their nests.

and

WHEREAS THE BRITISH COLUMBIA GOVERNMENT IS CURRENTLY IN CONTRAVENTION OF THE ABOVE MENTIONED ACTS DESPITE REPEATED REQUESTS AND OPPORTUNITIES TO SIMPLY ADJUST ROADSIDE BRUSHING TIMELINES

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

We (the undersigned) respectfully request that British Columbia's Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure:

- 1. Follow the mandatory law that no highway brushing be carried out during the peak breeding bird season in British Columbia in order to comply with the Migratory Birds Convention Act of 1994 and the British Columbia Wildlife Act of 1996.
- 2. Assess the peak breeding bird season in geographically explicit regions across British Columbia following Environment and Climate Change Canada's Regional Nesting Period Tables (see https://www.ec.gc.ca/paom-itmb/default.asp?lang=En&n=4F39A78F-1) with accompanying maps for each region.
- 3. Only allow mowing of weeds only when it does not impact woody shrubs, trees and aquatic vegetation in ditches during breeding bird season.
- 4. If for any reason the brushing must be carried out, we strongly urge the Ministry to hire a professional ornithologist to assess the area prior to brushing to determine the presence or absence of birds and their nests. In the event that the ornithologist determines there is no risk to breeding birds, the brushing must be carried out within 7 days of the ornithologist's recommended approval for brushing. If brushing is not carried out within this time period, an ornithologist must be hired again to do an additional assessment (see Environment and Climate Change Canada Nature Reducing Risk to Migratory Birds, https://www.ec.gc.ca)

BRIEFING DOCUMENT

RESOLUTION CONCERNING ROADSIDE VEGETATION MANAGEMENT IN BRITISH COLUMBIA AND CONTRAVENTION OF THE CANADIAN MIGRATORY BIRDS CONVENTION ACT OF 1994 AND THE BRITISH COLUMBIA WILDIFE ACT OF 1996

In early 2016, residents and birders in northwest BC observed roadside clearing and brushing happening during peak breeding bird season. Concerned birders immediately contacted the local Ministry of Transportation (MoT - the Ministry responsible for roadside vegetation management) and asked them to postpone their activities during breeding bird season. The birding community has made this request to MoT continuously for several years and have explained that it is an offence under the Migratory Bird Conservation Act (MBCA). Only on one occasion did Ministry staff from Fish and Wildlife postpone the brushing along the Morice River Road until the breeding bird season was over. It is clear that communities cannot rely on the Provincial Ministry staff to monitor this as they are simply understaffed and underfunded to carry out this work.

It is also concerning that *Breeding Bird Surveys* and other data collection methods used by both the Provincial and Federal governments to determine the status of our birds are conducted at the same time as the Ministry of Transportation is cutting down the brush that some of the birds are nesting in.

Despite repeated complaints and concerns, the Ministry of Transportation continues to issue contracts to do the brushing during the peak breeding season for birds which is mid-May to mid-July. This past spring (2016) they brushed roads throughout the Bulkley Valley area during June.

On the latest occasion (June 2016), BC Conservation Officers (C.O.'s) were contacted about the brushing along Viewmount Road, Smithers. Only after a warning from the C.O.'s did the brushing cease. It is the Ministry of Transportation that makes the decisions (not the Contractors) around timing windows. There are not enough C.O's to monitor and enforce this issue. It would be far more effective for the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure to adopt the mandatory practice of inhibit all roadside brushing during peak breeding bird season.

We have been told that the Ministry likes to do the brushing when the leaves have all flushed to maximize the impact of their brushing. We would argue that the maximum negative impact on the regeneration of much of the "brush" would be achieved by brushing later in the season when all the food reserves of the plants have gone into leaf production as well as flower and seed production. Plants accumulate reserves in their roots in the fall and use up the reserves the following year in order to successfully reproduce. Hence for most species their food reserves are lowest at the time of flowering and seed production. Clearly this will vary from species to species. We would like to suggest that brushing later in the season may actually be more effective for reducing the regeneration of many roadside vegetation species

It is important to be clear that roadside vegetation management is important for a number of reasons and for the purposes of this resolution, we are asking that roadside brushing continue with the least impact to our declining bird populations. This would drastically reduce the harm to birds and their nests and eggs. This would also eliminate the continuous contravention of the Canadian and Provincial Acts described in the resolution.



We suggest that brushing, if it has to be done, be done in either April or after July 31. A good guideline as to whether or not the season has started or is over, is to listen to see if the birds are singing. If there is a lot of bird song, it means the birds are on territory and have nests. Searching for nests is not recommended for several reasons:

- a) Nests are extremely difficult to find (birds do not want their predators to find their nests so most are extremely well camouflaged)
- b) Looking for nests is likely to do more harm than good (see the recommendation from Environment Canada [Environment and Climate Change Canada Nature Reducing the Risk to Migratory Birds https://www.ec.gc.ca])
- c) Removal of nests after breeding season has little or no effect on the bird's ability to nest again. Most birds build a new nest every year with the exception of a few species e.g. Great Blue Heron which uses the same nest year after year.

Background information on the two Acts

Migratory Birds Convention Act 1994 - Game Officers (i.e. Conservation Officers) can issue a compliance order if he/she believes that a person is contravening the Act and its Regulations (see Section 11.21 subsection 1). Persons subject to order (of compliance) are

Section 11.21 (MBCA)

- (2) Subsection (1) applies to any person who
 - a) Owns or has the charge, management or control of the substance to which the alleged contravention relates or the property on which the substance is located.
 - b) Causes or contributes to the alleged contravention this suggests that the Ministry of Transportation, their workers and their contractors may be liable for contravention of the Act
 - c) Is likely to cause or contribute to the alleged contravention

The order can instruct the person to cease the activity for a specified period and refrain from doing anything in contravention of the Act.

The maximum penalty for every person that commits an offence is a fine up to \$1 million or imprisonment for a term of not more than 3 years or both upon conviction on indictment and up to \$300,000 or imprisonment of not more than 6 months, or both, upon summary conviction.

The parties to the offence are described in Section 1.2 of Penalties in MBCA

Section 1.2 If a corporation commits an offence under this Act, any director, officer, agent or mandatory of the corporation who directed, authorized, assented to, acquiesced in or participated in the commission of the offence is a party to the offence, and is liable on conviction to the penalty provided by this Act, whether or not the corporation is prosecuted for the offence.

<u>The Convention</u> is described in the Schedule attached to the MBCA Act and outlines Canada's International Commitment to Migratory Birds.



BC Wildlife Act

Exemptions to Section 34 of the BC Wildlife Act are as follows:

"11.3 (1) A person is exempt from Section 34 of the Wildlife Act with respect to possessing, taking, injuring, molesting, or destroying a bird or its egg or a nest occupied by a bird or its egg if the bird is not designated as wildlife, a threatened species or an endangered species (where wildlife is listed under Schedule A)"

Schedule A of the BC Wildlife Act lists birds of the following species:

"all species of birds described in the American Ornithologist's Union Checklist of North American Birds, 7th Edition (American Ornithologist's Union 1999) or its supplements, which are native to Canada or the United States of America and were not introduced by man"

and

"(2) Despite subsection (1), a person is exempt from section 34 of the Wildlife Act with respect to taking, injuring, molesting or destroying a bird or its egg or a nest occupied by a bird or its egg if the bird is listed in Schedule C."

Schedule C includes species that are not native to B.C. or have been specifically designated as problems e.g. brown-headed cowbird (BC Wildlife Act current to July 6, 2016)

BC Wildlife Act (Fines and Penalties)

Section 84 (1) states "for purpose of determining the fines and penalties to which a person is subject on conviction for an offence under this Act,"

- (b) "subsections (3) and (4) apply in relation to an offence under Section 34"
- (3) states "Subject to subsection (4), a person who commits an offence referred to in subsection (1) (b) is liable
 - (a) on a first conviction, to a fine of not more than \$100 000 or to a term of imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both, and
 - (b) on each subsequent conviction for the same offence or another offence referred to in subsection (1) (b), to a fine of not more than \$200 000 and not less than \$2 000 or to a term of imprisonment not exceeding 2 years, or both."
- (4) states "Despite subsection (3) (a), if the person referred to in that subsection has previously been convicted of an offence referred to in subsection (1) (a), the person is liable to the punishment set out in subsection (3) (b)."

Declining Migratory Birds

- 1. One third of all North American Bird Species need Urgent Conservation Action
- Of these, 73 species are birds of the Boreal Forest, 144 species are birds of Temperate Forests, 45 species are Grassland species – all habitats described as the Major Habitats in British Columbia
- Other species occupying Arid Lands (e.g. Okanagan), and Wetlands and Alpine Tundra (i.e., habitats found throughout BC) are also listed as being of concern. (North American Bird Conservation Initiative, 2016. The State of American Birds. 2016. Environment and Climate Change Canada, Ottawa, Ontario. 8 pages www.stateofthebirds.org)

<u>British Columbia's Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure Best Management</u> Practices

Section 5-10 Roadside Vegetation Management, Potential Environmental Issues clearly states that "Brushing" and "Mowing" "may disturb birds and their nests"

It then lists "Performance Standards and Legal Requirements" which include offences under both the Migratory Birds Convention Act and the BC Wildlife Act.

NOTE: It should be mandatory that a qualified ornithologist does a "walk through" of the area as it is unlikely that Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure staff and/ or their contractors are qualified to do a proper assessment.

Lack of education

We think that there should be a concerted effort made to educate the public on this issue as they can act as surrogate monitors of contravention and can report brushing during critical time periods. Most people are not aware that the MBCA exists or even that the BC Wildlife Act protects birds

Good afternoon CAB Members,

Hope you're having a good fall and are excited to see our Oilers and Canucks off to a good start to their seasons. This email is to provide a quick update on Northern Gateway and the happenings over the past couple of months.

As you may remember, there was the consultation process on the proposed Tanker Moratorium. This process ran for 6 weeks and closed on September 30, 2016. Thank you to those who submitted their comments to Minister Garneau. We understand the comments were well received and that the feedback is being reviewed by their office.

In June of this year, the Federal Court of Appeal quashed our project certificates. The court gave the Federal Government three options including redoing Phase IV consultation with First Nation and Metis communities, send it back to National Energy Board for further comment or reject it outright. The Federal Government has indicated they will be making this decision on (or before) Friday, November 25, 2016.

Northern Gateway is encouraging the Federal government to redo Phase IV consultation. We believe it is in the government's interest to keep all pipeline projects viable. If the Federal Government choses to redo Phase IV, we are not sure of exactly how or when the consultation would take place. However, we would hope to take part of the consultation alongside the Federal government, where appropriate, as we have the technical background and project details that will ensure a complete consultation process.

At this stage, we have no indication of what decision the Federal Government will make but we are committed to keeping you informed. We will send an update to you all as soon as we find out and then will be hosting a CAB Telephone Town Hall on November 29 at 12.30pm MST / 11.30pm PST



to review what the decision is and what it means for our project. An email closer to the date will be sent out with details but please mark that off in your calendars.

On a sad note, we regret to inform you that long time CAB member and great friend of the project, Dwight Davidson passed away on October 25, 2016. He was well liked and respected around the CAB table and showed great commitment to see this project succeed. Please keep him in your thoughts.

COMMUNITIES ON THE MOVE DECLARATION: CREATING SMART, FAIR AND HEALTHY TRANSPORTATION OPTIONS FOR ALL BC COMMUNITIES

VISION

We envision that in 10 years, across BC - in communities small and large, it will be easy, safe and enjoyable to get around, whether by walking, biking, public transit, driving, ride-sharing or in a wheelchair. We want to see the provincial government making progressive investments that support active, connected and healthy communities with a wide range of mobility needs.

This vision is guided by the following VALUES:

- <u>Safety for All Road Users</u>: The design and rules of the road should work towards a goal of zero fatalities so all British Columbians can arrive at their destination safely.
- <u>Healthy Communities</u>: It is easier for British Columbians to be active and healthy when there are safe biking and walking routes, good street design and regular transit.
- Mobility for All: Communities of all sizes need transportation options to enable everyone including vulnerable groups such as children, older adults and those with disabilities or low incomes as well as non-drivers to access education, employment, healthcare, recreation and cultural events and to foster important social connections.
- <u>Clean Air and Environment</u>: Public transit, telecommuting and active modes of transportation reduce local air pollution and carbon emissions that contribute to climate change.
- <u>Consideration of Community Needs:</u> All BC communities should have a range of convenient, affordable transportation options that are tailored to their context — whether urban or remote, dense or dispersed, small or suburban.
- <u>Cost Savings and Economic Opportunities:</u> Investments in active and public transportation can help to control rising healthcare costs while stimulating local business and tourism.



What will it take:

Increased support and long-term funding for transit

- Provide full funding (\$400M/year) and policy support for implementation of the BC Transit Strategic Plan 2030 and local government 'Transit Future Plans' to grow transit service and meet local needs.¹
- o Provide a fair share of capital funding and secure, predictable regional revenue tools for the full implementation of the TransLink Mayors' Council 10-Year Vision.
- o Provide funding for public transportation systems that serve small, rural, remote and isolated communities such as the use of school buses and bus services that feed into regional centres.

A Provincial Active Transportation Strategy

- Allocate \$100M per year over the next ten years to support the development of local cycling and walking infrastructure within a larger provincial network.² Priority should go to completing connected cycling and walking transportation networks.
- Fund Active School Travel Planning and standardized cycling education for healthy, active children.
- o Increase capacity within the Ministry of Transportation by developing an Active Transportation unit that has the professional expertise to work on policy and planning.

Commitment to equity

- o Improve handyDART service to meet demand and to expand accessibility to evenings, Sundays and holidays.
- Revert back to the \$45 annual fee for Annual Bus Passes for Persons-with-Disability.
- o Ensure all public transit systems have affordable options for people with low incomes.
- Ensure funding is allocated geographically and equitably across the province. Recognize
 infrastructure deficits for pedestrian, cycling and transit modes as well as limitations faced by
 rural, remote, geographically isolated and small communities as part of funding criteria.

¹. Analysis by <u>David Suzuki Foundation</u> shows that although \$4.75 billion in provincial funds was promised in the 2008 Provincial Transit Plan – eight years into the 12-year plan, only 23 per cent per cent (\$1.1 billion) of the provincial contributions have been realized. DSF calculates that an average annual investment of \$400 M would be required to bridge the funding gap and add the capacity and level of service necessary to reduce traffic congestion, increase ridership and meet the 2020 Climate Change goals as outlined in the 2008 plan.

² \$100 million is an estimate for BC based on our population and what leading jurisdictions spend per person, per year on active transportation infrastructure (Netherlands \$40/person/year; Winnipeg \$32/person/year; Brisbane \$51/person/year; London \$27/person/year). This may seem like a large request but not in terms of transportation infrastructure costs, for example this amount is very close to what the Ministry of Transportation is spending to renovate a single interchange on Highway 1.



Regional considerations

- Work with local governments to establish a Rural Transportation Strategy. Develop and fund innovative community transportation systems, ride-sharing, tele-services and telecommuting options that can serve rural and remote British Columbians including those who can't drive or don't have access to a vehicle.
- Provide support for the development and implementation of Winter City Guidelines that give residents the opportunity to be active all year long. This should include operational measures such as snow-clearing for active transportation networks and improved winter road maintenance to reduce accidents.
- Update Traffic Engineering Standards for managing industrial traffic in resource based communities so that they guide improvements in air quality, pedestrian and cycling movement as well as safety.
- Support the Metro Vancouver Mayor's Council to pursue alternative funding mechanisms –
 such as vehicle levies, road pricing (including tolling), local fuel and parking taxes and expansion of community/group passes.
- Continue and expand the UPASS program to the students and employees of postsecondary institutions.

Commitment to Safety

- Support the BC Road Safety Strategy and work with all levels of government and other partners to achieve a goal of safe streets and zero fatalities. Speed limits should be reduced and strictly enforced, including through the use of speed cameras and other proven measures.
- o Prioritize safety measures for vulnerable road users such as pedestrians, cyclists and those in wheelchairs and mobility devices.

The Great Bear Rainforest covers 6.4 million hectares on British Columbia's north and central coast, and is home to 26 separate First Nations. One-third of the 6.4 million-hectare area is fully protected, while low-impact resource development activities, such as forestry, tourism and hydro-electric generation are allowed in the remainder to support the people living in the area.

To celebrate this achievement, and to commemorate the Royal visit, the Province is also establishing a new \$1-million Great Bear Rainforest Education and Awareness Trust. Trust funds will support:

- Developing teacher and student resources;
- Raising awareness of the Great Bear and the people who have lived here for more than 12,000 years;
- Resource management practices and ongoing research; and
- Resource management-based education, awareness and understanding in the Great Bear Rainforest area.

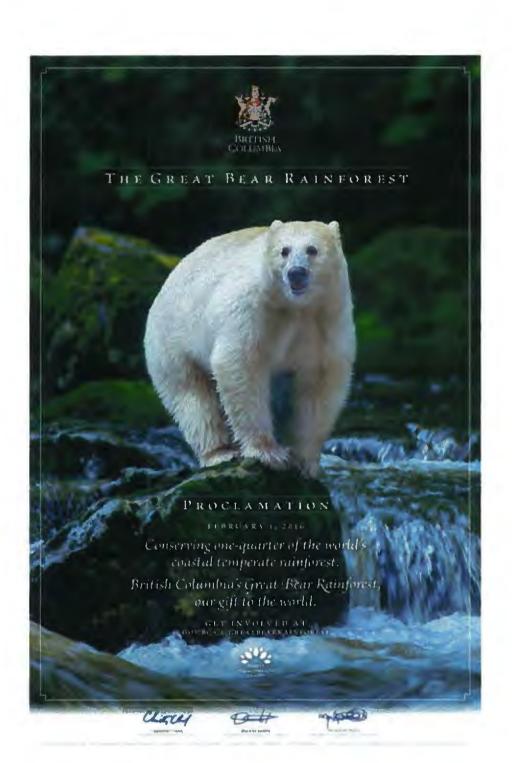

New Federal Railway Safety Funding Available for Municipalities

In the 2016 Federal Budget, the government announced that they would continue investments in rail safety by providing \$143 million over three years to sustain existing rail safety measures and support new investments in oversight, enforcement, better risk management, and additional support for first responders.

Just last week the government provided more details on how some of that money will be spent, and there was good news for Municipalities.

The announcement outlined \$55 million in potential funding for the "Rail Safety Improvement Program". It is intended for projects including the installation of flashing lights and bells at railway crossings and the construction of full pedestrian overpasses. Funding will also support safety improvements on rail property, along rail lines and at road-rail grade crossings such as outreach, promotional awareness, educational activities and public service announcements, research and studies; as well as the closures of grade crossings that present safety concerns.

Funding is available as follows:

- \$12 million in 2016-2017
- \$20 million in 2017-2018
- \$20 million in 2018-2019

Depending on the nature of your project, grants and contributions are available on an annual or multi-year basis.

- They are now accepting applications for projects that will begin in 2017-2018.
- The deadline for applications is **December 23, 2016**.

There is also a smaller public awareness component with a deadline of **January 31, 2017.**

Executive Director's Report

Hello NCLGA Members,

This is a very brief "NCLGA 101" for each of you to consider. Local government associations like FCM, UBCM and the NCLGA frequently get the "what, exactly, do you do?" question. It's a great question and a responsible question considering the important decisions you make to ensure your local government is getting the best possible bang for its buck.



Geographically, the NCLGA includes all local governments from 100 Mile House and the Cariboo Regional District north to the Yukon boarder, and from the Pacific Coast across to the Alberta border. It is an area that accounts for roughly 70% of British Columbia's landmass.

The NCLGA has a four year strategic plan and three of its most significant components are advocacy and regional collaboration and reconciliation.

ADVOCACY

On the advocacy front, we have worked hard over the past three years to focus on "partnership" rather than "protest" when it comes to working with senior levels of government and other stakeholders. This has really opened doors for the NCLGA and allowed us to successfully push through several key issues and resolutions.

From preventing the use of agricultural land for carbon offsets to upgrading HWY 97 from class B to class A status, and more broadly, garnering national attention around member driven resolutions on rape culture and human trafficking, the NCLGA is really focusing heavily on advocacy and its starting to show real results.



Premier meets with North Central Local Government Association

Just this past week at UBCM, the NCLGA had 25 separate meetings on issues specific to northern BC. These meetings included industry executives, cabinet ministers,

opposition MLAs and the Premier.

A major theme of our efforts- which is unique to the NCLGA- is the lack of understanding (from other jurisdictions) around our local resource based economies and how some decisions can impact northern communities (i.e. northern decision makers need to be at the table in a more substantive way).

It isn't an easy road to hoe, but it is certainly worth the effort. Two of many examples that show an increase in northern input are the northern post-secondary school marketing initiative and efforts to establish a beef processing facility in the region. Moving forward, we will be focusing on issues like waste management and emergency preparedness in northern BC.

Unlike other local government organizations who do a fantastic job on policy matters and can broadly apply their efforts to include Canada's largest municipal governments (from an array of jurisdictions), the NCLGA focuses on advocacy. It is the only advocacy organization mandated solely to promote the economic, social and environmental well-being of northern BC communities, (both rural and municipal).

REGIONAL COLLABORATION

Our region accounts for 80% of BC's overall exports, 80% of its agricultural lands, most of Canada's current, large scale resource development projects, and the largest tract of unsettled First Nation treaty lands in North America. It is also home to some of the world's most pristine, culturally rich, and environmentally significant locations.

It isn't an overstatement to say that Northern BC is one of the most strategically important places on the globe; the problem is that the residents of the region only account for 6.8% of BC's population. Our small and dispersed population, combined with the uniqueness of our region makes regional collaboration essential.

NCLGA is the only organization positioned to bring all communities in the region together and we're taking that responsibility very seriously.

Not only has the invitation list and amount of delegates to our annual convention increased exponentially over the past three years, we have signed seven MOUs with other region-centric organizations (from Northern Development to the Fraser Basin Council) which has allowed us to better align northern priorities and perspectives, and

has significantly increased our ability to advocate for our members.

Furthermore, just this year we organized and helped host the first ever Northern Mayors and RD Chairs Roundtable and are in the throes of organizing a Northern Rural Directors Roundtable.

Lastly on the regional collaboration front, the NCLGA created the Northern Voices Endowment Fund. It is currently at \$300,000, but the interest from this fund will go specifically toward regional collaboration and will be used to cover the venue, materials and catering costs of events like the Rural Directors Roundtable.

It is worth pointing out that we established this endowment fund without increasing NCLGA membership dues in nearly a decade, and our conference fees have remained steady at an all-inclusive \$375...the lowest of any related conferences attended by northern community leaders.

ABORIGINAL ENGAGEMENT AND RECONCILIATION



UNBC strengthened ties with the Lheidli T'enneh and unveiled a new sign written in the Dakehl (Carrier) language.

Approximately 16% of us who call northern BC home are aboriginal, a number that is more than three times higher than any other jurisdiction in BC. In fact, sixty percent of BC's aboriginal population lives within the NCLGA area (which includes a full third of First Nation governments in the Province).

More than eleven residential schools operated in northern BC over a period spanning 120 years. The broader public is only now starting to understand the ramifications of the Residential School System and learning about reconciliation and its endemic impact on northern communities.

The NCLGA is working hard with aboriginal organizations, key stakeholders and all levels of government to ensure that all of us who call northern BC home are respected as neighbors, partners and responsible stewards.

Lastly, the NCLGA is incredibly agile and responsive to its members. We aren't a large association, but we are very effective in our capacity to promote our members priorities and perspectives. We have collaborated with other organizations who work extremely well on the policy and research aspect of northern issues, which has left us in a position to act more effectively as advocate and convener for our members.

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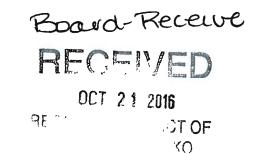

Access to health services across the regions highlighted at Northern Health board meeting

New and improved services and resources undertaken by Northern Health and its partners to improve the delivery of health services were highlighted for the Board during their regular meeting in Prince George on October 19th, 2016. The board also heard about significant awards garnered by Northern health staff and physicians.

The expansion of access to magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) in northern B.C. will grow significantly over the next year as the Request for Proposals (RFP) process has been completed and the tender has been awarded for three new MRIs as part of the Northern Health 10-year medical imaging strategy. The MRIs will be located in Terrace, Fort St. John and Prince George (replacement for UHNBC).

"We know in our expansive region that sometimes travel is required. Establishing MRIs to serve people in the northwest and northeast can reduce some of the travel burden," states Dr. Charles Jago, Northern Health Board Chair. "This is a significant first step in enhanced medical imaging opportunities in our communities."

The Board also heard details regarding the visit by their Royal Highnesses The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge to Haida Gwaii on Friday, September 30th. The Duke and Duchess toured the new hospital and health centre and met with Northern Health physicians, health care workers, patients and their families.

Haida Gwaii Hospital and Health Centre $-\underline{X}$ aayda Gwaay Ngaaysdll Naay will officuially open for service to the public in November and is the first facility in Northern Health that carries both an English name and a First Nations name.

An update on community consultations on 'Growing up Healthy in Northern BC' was also presented during the board meeting. Completed by the end of July, consultation results are being analyzed for a comprehensive report upcoming. There were two main approaches to listening to residents. The first approach included community meetings that were held across the north, including open public sessions, stakeholder focus groups and youth groups. The second approach was an electronic process where residents were also asked to





contribute ideas and select priorities through an innovative online process, using Thoughtexchange as the platform for that engagement.

A total (allowing for overlap) of 874 participants engaged in these consultations, providing their thoughts, feedback and ideas for supporting child health in the north. Some of the suggestions brought forth from the public included:

- Focus on traditional First Nations and Aboriginal culture
- Increase supports for mental health and substance use issues for children and youth
- Increase access to existing recreation and culture activities
- Reducing use of technology (or use too young)
- Address poverty and related issues (food security well noted)

"Prioritizing child health is one way we are working to improve the current and future care of northern B.C. residents," said Cathy Ulrich, Northern Health President & CEO. "We are grateful for the input of those people who live, work, learn and play in northern communities as we work together to support living well and preventing disease and injury."

Northern Health, the Cariboo Chilcotin Regional Hospital District, the Cariboo Regional District and Barkerville Gold Mines partnered in the establishment of the Wells Primary Care Clinic. The clinic will host a visiting Nurse Practitioner and is a great example of how community partnerships improve access to health care. The official opening occurred on September 20, 2016.

Award-winning Northern Health staff and physicians were hailed at the meeting:

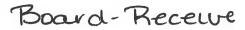
- Barb Crook, Health Services Administrator, Mackenzie & District Hospital & Health Centre is this year's recipient of the Health Care Hero Gold Apple award.

- Dr. Becky Temple, Clinical Instructor, Department of Family Practice has been awarded the 2016 Clinical Faculty Award for Excellence in Community Practice Teaching by the Faculty of Medicine.

The Questions Save Lives campaign encourages both patients and providers to share what questions they would ask to promote safe care. Patient safety is a shared responsibility, communication between providers and patients are critical for effective and safe health care delivery. Northern Health is encouraging patients to raise their concerns or to ask questions about their health or health care. It is important that people are not afraid to ask and participate in their care; health care providers want patients to ask questions.

Northern Health is also encouraging providers to always ask questions of patients and their family members. Research shows patient anxiety can slow down comprehension, so providers need to ensure essential communication is understood. Listening to patients ensures care provided will be optimally tailored to each patient's needs. Questioning, and being asked similar questions from different providers, is important to providing safe, effective care.

Lives can be saved with the simple question "Are there any other questions you have or things you would like me to explain better?"

Anti-Gang Unit Seeks Local Government Engagement

Oct. 12, 2016

The Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit of British Columbia (CFSEU-BC), as part of its commitment to public engagement, collaboration and education, is providing local governments an opportunity to learn more about gang violence in their communities.

CFSEU-BC Chief Superintendent Kevin Hackett, a panel member in UBCM's convention study session *Gang Violence in Our Communities*, is available to present to interested local governments. Some of the topics include: the purpose of the CFSEU-BC and how it fits into the BC policing system; the Provincial Tactical Enforcement Priority (PTEP) program; and the CFSEU-BC-led *End Gang Life* gang prevention, education, and public engagement initiative. Composed of members from police departments throughout the Province, CFSEU is British Columbia's "integrated anti-gang police agency". This 400-member unit works to educate the public, prevent youth and adults from joining gangs, and investigate and prosecute gangs and other criminal organizations.

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Registration Open for CEOs Forum

Mark your calendars - the Local Government Leadership Academy's *Chief Elected Officials Forum* will be held December 6-7, 2016 in Richmond, British Columbia. Registration is now open for this unique forum provided for Mayors, Chiefs and Board Chairs.

The session will be guided by Gordon McIntosh, who has 36 years of executive, consultant and educator experience and has conducted 1,200 sessions involving 130,00 elected and appointed civic leaders throughout Canada and overseas. 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Consultation on Species at Risk Policies

Oct. 12, 2016

Environment and Climate Change Canada is seeking input on seven draft policies on the implementation of the *Species at Risk Act*. Feedback will be accepted until November 18, 2016.

The seven draft policies are designed to support predictable, clear and consistent implementation of the act, and address critical habitat protection on non-federal lands, *Species at Risk Act* permitting, and listing policy for terrestrial species at risk, among other topics. The seven proposed policies, together with additional related policies and guidelines, are available on the Species at Risk Public Registry. Interested parties may submit feedback to the Registry or to the Conservation Planning Unit by November 18.

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Input Sought on Biosolids & Composting Policies

Oct. 12, 2016

The BC Ministry of the Environment is seeking input on new biosolids and composting policies as outlined in an intentions paper for the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation. Comments will be accepted until December 2, 2016.

Proposed policies address:

- · Increased transparency,
- · Notification requirements,
- · Facilitating improved organics recycling,
- · Harmonization with national guidelines, and
- · New standards for protection of health and the environment.

Additional background on the proposed changes is available on the Organic Matter Recycling Regulations & Guidelines webpage. Comments may be submitted to the Ministry of the Environment.

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RCMP Seeking Input on Auxiliary Constable Program

Oct. 13, 2016

Based on input received during previous consultations, RCMP National Crime Prevention Services has developed several options regarding the future of the Auxiliary Constable Program (ACP). UBCM asks BC local governments to indicate their preferred option via survey prior to Tuesday, November 1, 2016. UBCM will then convey responses to the RCMP.

The RCMP is considering three options with regard to the ACP. These options are as follows:

Option 1 (Status Quo): Maintain the ACP in its current form (consistent with January 2016 changes), with no Auxiliary Constable (AC) participation in general duty patrols or ride-alongs, and no firearms familiarization training. ACs would remain appointed peace officers, wear a police-type uniform, and be issued intervention tools and soft body armour. A training standard and activity matrix would be subsequently developed to ensure minimum standards for ACs. At this time, the level of supervision (direct or indirect), nature of the activity matrix, and training requirements are unknown.

Option 2 (Community Corps Program): ACs would participate solely in community policing (e.g. safety education, crime prevention initiatives). They would wear a civilian-type uniform, and would not be appointed as peace officers. The RCMP has developed a draft training standard, should this option be implemented, that consists of 13 courses totalling 81.5 hours (52 classroom hours, 39.5 hours online).

Option 3 (Tiered Program): A three-tier system. Each tier would have specific requirements for training and experience.

Tier 1 would be comprised of the duties and training standards described in Option 2, with participation set at 48 hours per year.

Tier 2 would include all Tier 1 activities, as well as traffic and crowd control, parades and public ceremonies, and foot or bike community presence under indirect supervision. Tier 2 ACs under would be appointed Peace Officers, wear a police-type uniform, and be issued intervention tools and soft body armour. Training would include Tier 1 courses, as well as six additional courses. Participation would be set at 96 hours per year with a curfew imposed after 9:00 pm.

Tier 3 would include Tier 1 and Tier 2 duties, as well as general duty patrol (in an RCMP vehicle, all terrain vehicle, snowmobile, marine vessel, bike, on foot, etc.), check stops, and other activities deemed appropriate. Training would build on the Tier 1 and Tier 2 standards, as well as firearms familiarization and additional courses as determined by the division training unit. Participation would be set at 144 hours per year with a curfew imposed after midnight.

UBCM was initially given an insufficient amount of time to consult with local governments prior to submitting feedback to the RCMP. Based on input from stakeholders, including a letter from RCMP Local Government Contract Management Committee co-Chair, Councillor Sav Dhaliwal, the RCMP extended the deadline to November 1, 2016.

ACs are unarmed, uniformed volunteers whose primary purpose is to participate in community policing and crime prevention activities. In British Columbia, the ACP has been in existence for over 50 years and is governed by a Provincial Policy. There



are currently about 700 active ACs located in 67 RCMP detachments throughout the Province, volunteering about 120,000 hours of service a year to their local communities.

ACs are appointed under the BC *Police Act* to assist the Provincial Police Force in the performance of its duties. The Province provides the funding to support local ACPs approved and established at Provincial RCMP detachments. Municipalities with populations greater than 5,000 are responsible for providing policing within their municipality, and are responsible for funding their local ACP, with the Ministry providing maintenance support. The Province also provides ACs with personal liability protection, WorkSafe BC coverage, death and dismemberment insurance coverage, a training curriculum, badges and ID.

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RCMP Contract Management Committee Seeks Input

Oct. 19, 2016

The RCMP Local Government Contract Management Committee (LGCMC) will meet November 3, 2016 to discuss a number of items related to policing in British Columbia. Local governments may suggest discussion items related to the RCMP contract by contacting Bhar Sihota, UBCM Policy Analyst prior to October 28.

The LGCMC is a forum for consultation, analysis and communication between local government and the Province regarding the management of the agreement under which the RCMP provides local police services in BC. Biannual in-person meetings present an opportunity for members to analyze and respond to changes that may be proposed by the federal government and/or RCMP, and recommend changes to the federal government and/or RCMP that may be considered necessary or appropriate.

The LGCMC is comprised of nine local government representatives from throughout the Province, appointed for two or three year terms by UBCM's Executive, as well as a representative of UBCM's Executive and the provincial Assistant Deputy Minister, Policing and Security Programs Branch. Representatives of the RCMP are invited to attend Committee meetings as required.

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UBCM Appears Before Tax Competitiveness Commission

Oct. 19, 2016

UBCM delivered a presentation to the Province of BC's *Commission on Tax Competitiveness* last week. Announced in Budget 2016, the commission was appointed by the Minister of Finance in July. The Commission will provide recommendations on how to modernize British Columbia's PST and other business taxes to enhance competitiveness and stimulate economic growth.

As part of its work, the Commission undertook targeted public and stakeholder consultations. Other groups appearing before the Commission identified municipal business taxes as an issue.

In its presentation to the Commission, UBCM referenced work undertaken for the provincially appointed *Expert Tax Panel* back in 2012. The presentation provided the following context-setting statistics:

- When taxpayers look at their property tax bill, few realize that municipalities receive only a portion of the property tax collected. Using 2016 data, the total property tax levy totaled \$7.3 billion. Of this total, however, just \$4.1 billion or 56% was for "municipal" taxation. Regional District, transit and some other taxing jurisdictions represent 10%. The remaining 34% of the 2016 property tax supported provincial services.
- Of the \$4.1 billion in municipal property taxes referenced above, 61% of this share is levied to residential taxpayers, 37% to businesses and 2% to other properties. While the overall tax burden has increased, the percentage share of taxes levied on businesses has *decreased* by 5% since 2000.
- Municipal tax competitiveness must be considered in the context of all other provincial and federal taxes paid by businesses. Based on 2016 data, UBCM estimated the municipal tax burden represents approximately 14% of the total business tax burden in B.C. This estimate does not include taxes levied by the Federal Government.

Back in 2012 UBCM told the *Expert Panel* that local governments supported the province's aim of creating and sustaining a competitive tax environment. UBCM reiterated to the *Competitiveness Panel* that this is still the case today.

UBCM also noted that the majority of recommendations of the 2012 Expert Tax Panel have not been acted upon. The 2012 final report included recommendations that the Province work with UBCM and local governments on collaborative processes related to business tax benchmarking, best practices, and cost containment. In addition, a final recommendation spoke of the need to improve the integration of economic development strategies, and that arrangements should be made for local governments to share in the revenue gains associated with sustained, improvement in economic performance.

On balance, UBCM thought the findings of the 2012 *Expert Panel* were fair and deserving of further work and attention and we remain of that view.

UBCM reiterated three concepts for the Commission to consider. They were as follows:

Perspective: Remember that municipal property tax represents a small proportion of the overall tax load on business.



Build on the existing framework: The framework is sound, and municipalities are able to use existing tools to affect change. Promoting these tools – things like highlighting best practices with respect to local tax policy decision-making, and use of tax agreements and revitalization exemptions - is likely to improve the pace of change.

Encourage inter-governmental dialogue and creative solutions: The local government system is diverse and complex. We need to work at this together and have local governments sitting down with the province and the federal government to make a concerted effort to look at the balance of responsibilities and authorities, and the range of tax and revenue. And we need to talk about inter-governmental transfers and take a good look at the cost effectiveness of the full regulatory system.

UBCM also cautioned against overly simplistic solutions that have been proposed by some organizations, such as a mandated ratio between residential and business taxes. A ratio of this nature in the current environment of rapidly escalating residential assessment and relatively flat business assessment will end up with unintended consequences that ultimately would not serve the business community well.

In conclusion UBCM would note that the Commission is comprised of individuals with knowledge and experience in the area of tax policy and we were appreciative of the invitation to appear as a delegation. We will keep our membership appraised of their final recommendations when the report is released later this fall.

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Species at Risk Engagement

Oct. 26, 2016

The BC Ministry of the Environment has created an engagement website to gather input on species at risk. Comments will be accepted until November 30, 2016.

The website is structured around four topics:

- 1. Principles for the protection of species at risk.
- 2. Provincial protection of species at risk.
- 3. Protection of species at risk on private land.
- 4. Funding for species and ecosystems at risk.

The website also contains case studies of recent success stories in BC and additional background on species at risk.

Input may be submitted directly through forms on the website.

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Urban Deer Management Funding Applications Now Available

Oct. 26, 2016

The Province has been working with UBCM to develop a new urban deer cost management cost-sharing funding program. *The Provincial Urban Deer Cost Share Program* will help local governments or First Nations with funds to help address urban deer management challenges through operational or research projects. The program application is now available.

The Province will make up to \$100,000 (in total) available to local governments or First Nations through shared cost agreements in 2016/17. The Province will receive all project proposals and will be responsible for the final funding prioritizations and allocations.

In 2016/17 the Program is intended to support 'shovel ready' projects that are consistent with community-based planning processes.

The Provincial Urban Deer Cost-Share Program will fund priority projects that:

- address human-deer conflict in areas where the use of traditional deer management techniques (e.g. hunting) are not appropriate;
- are consistent with objectives that have been developed through a community-based planning process;
- have a resolution of support from the local government's council or board or Indian Band's/First Nation's chief and council;
- are compliant with all applicable laws and by-laws and adequately manage all human safety, environmental and animal welfare risks;
- are in accordance with a permit issued under the Wildlife Act (or any other statute);
- · are technically sound and feasible;
- are scientifically rigorous (if a research project);
- · commit to reporting; and,
- provide matching funds (from the local government or First Nation or any partners).

Applications should be received on or before November 22nd, 2016.

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New Federal Infrastructure Funding Announced

Nov 2, 2016

Finance Minister Bill Morneau announced that Phase 2 of the federal Infrastructure Plan will be expanded from \$48 million over 8 years to \$81 billion over 11 years during his fiscal update yesterday. Minister Morneau also announced that \$15 billion from the expanded Phase 2 plan would be delivered through a new Canada Infrastructure Bank.

The announcement deepens the commitment made by the Government of Canada in Budget 2016 to fund community infrastructure. Phase 2 funding will be allocated as follows:

- Public Transit: \$23.5 billion

- Green Infrastructure (Clean Air, Clean Water): \$21.9 billion

- Social Infrastructure: \$21.9 billion

- Getting Canadian Products to Global Markets: \$10.1 billion

- Rural & Northern Communities: \$2 billion

Further details on the full design of the Phase 2 plan are expected in Budget 2017. In a news release yesterday, Federation of Canadian Municipalities President Clark Sommerville applauded the Government of Canada's commitment to expanding infrastructure funding saying, "These unprecedented infrastructure investments will mean more growth, more jobs and stronger communities".

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BC Building Act Update: Variation Requests

Nov 2, 2016

The application for requesting a local authority variation under Section 7 of the *Building Act* is now available on the *Building Act* website. An application guide is also available.

A local authority/local government variation is:

- A technical building requirement or set of requirements that differs from a requirement in provincial building regulations;
- Requested by a local authority or group of local authorities who wish to enforce the requirement within their jurisdiction(s);
- · Subject to Minister approval; and, if approved,
- Enacted though a provincial building regulation that applies in the jurisdictions of the local authority(s) making the request.

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Funding & Resources Update

Nov 2, 2016

Each month we provide an update on UBCM funding programs and information on other programs or resources that may be of interest to local governments and First Nations.

Local Government Program Services

2017 Age-friendly Communities: This Friday, November 4, 2016, is the application deadline for this program, which assists BC local governments to support their aging populations by developing and implementing policies and plans, or enacting projects that enable seniors to age in place and facilitate the creation of age-friendly communities. Grants of up to 20,000 are available.

2017 Asset Management Planning: Matching grants of up to \$10,000 are available to assist local governments in delivering sustainable services by extending and deepening their asset management practices. The application deadline is November 18, 2016.

The 2016 Asset Management Planning Training Subsidy will provide up to 50% of the registration fee for up to three staff per local government for eligible Asset Management BC training events.

Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative: Applications are accepted on an on-going basis under these program streams: Fuel Management Prescriptions, Demonstration and Operational Treatment projects. Applications are not presently being accepted to the Community Wildfire Protection Plan or SWPI FireSmart Grant program streams. Details on the 2017 Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative are expected later this month.

Other Funding

Northern Development Initiative Trust: Applications are being accepted for the Trust's winter funding application until November 18, 2016.

2016/17 Provincial Urban Deer Cost-Share Program: The province has established a \$100,000 fund to help local governments and First Nations address urban deer management challenges through operational or research projects. The application deadline is November 22nd, 2016.

Clean Water and Wastewater Fund: This program supports the rehabilitation of local government drinking water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and the planning and design of future facilities and upgrades to existing systems. Canada and British Columbia are investing up to \$373.6 million across the province.

Vancouver Foundation: Test and Grow applications (Stage One: Project Overviews) will be accepted in the Arts & Culture and Education & Training fields of interest from November 14 to December 9, 2016. The Foundation supports projects that address the root causes of complex social issues in ways that lead to systemic change. Applicants should ensure that their project meets this primary lens of social innovation and the outcomes listed under their guidelines.

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Oceans Protection Plan Announced

Nov 9, 2016

On November 7, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced the creation of an Oceans Protection Plan, supported by \$1.5 billion in funding over five years, starting in 2017-2018. As part of this announcement, the Prime Minister also indicated that legislation addressing derelict vessels would be introduced in 2017.

UBCM membership has consistently endorsed resolutions calling for enhanced spill planning and response, including calls for many of the elements that may be partly addressed through the Oceans Protection Plan: a collaborative approach to spill response, restoration of the Canadian Guard complement, and the development of approaches to remove derelict vessels. UBCM has actively advocated on behalf of local governments on these issues, including through a recent submission on marine safety to Transport Canada, as part of the consultations leading up to the announcement of the Oceans Protection Plan.

Elements of the plan include:

- Improvements to the marine safety system: enhanced Coast Guard response capabilities, and better coordination of emergency response;
- Ecosystem preservation and restoration: protections for marine mammals, improvements to marine pollution incident response, and investments in preservation and restoration of vulnerable ecosystems;
- Partnerships with Indigenous and coastal communities, including: more active roles in emergency response and additional opportunities for sharing of local knowledge; and
- Amendments to the Canadian Ship-Source Oil Pollution Fund to ensure that industry—funded compensation is available for those impacted by oil spills.

In addition the announcement included several BC specific elements:

- Indigenous Community Response Teams offering training for search and rescue, environmental response and incident command;
- A new regional oil spill response plan for the northern coast;
- Four new lifeboat stations, six new radars, and a new logistics depot in Port Hardy, to house staff and equipment for spill response; and
- A five year project with local and regional partners to collect and update baseline data to support stewardship and enhance spill response for the Northern BC Coast.

A detailed costing out of plan elements has not been made available.

Derelict vessels were addressed in the Prime Minister's announcement with a statement that legislation to be introduced in 2017 will incorporate:

Support for the clean-up and removal of smaller high priority vessels and plans to address large commercial vessels;
 and



• Additional measures to prevent future derelict vessels.

The announcement of the new Oceans Protection Plan did not reference an anticipated tanker moratorium for the north coast, but federal Transportation Minister Marc Garneau has indicated that this will be announced before year's end.

Shortly following the Prime Minister's announcement, Premier Christy Clark issued a statement indicating that the federal announcement addresses the gaps in spill response identified by the BC Government.

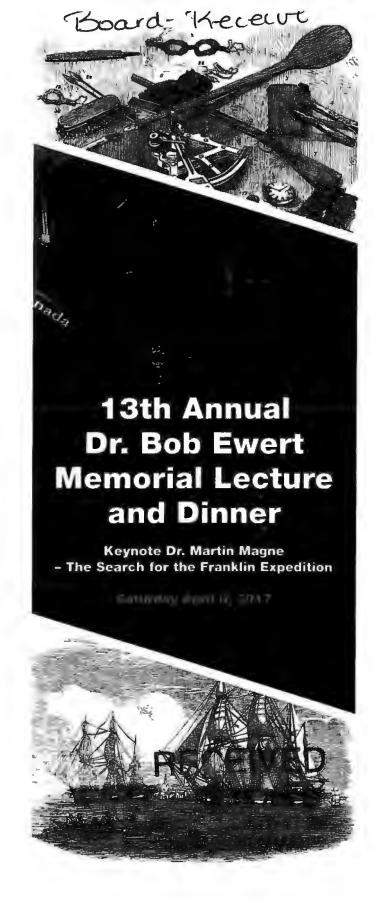

This year's keynote address will be by Dr. Martin Magne (third from right), on The Search for the Franklin Expedition.

Celebrate our northern history during Canada's 150th anniversary as Dr. Magne speaks about investigations by Parks Canada into one of the greatest puzzles in the history of Canadian exploration.

In 1845, Sir John Franklin set sail from England with two ships, HMS Erebus and HMS Terror, in search of a Northwest Passage across what is now Canada's Arctic. The ships and crew vanished, which prompted a massive search which continued until just recently.

After more than 160 years of searching, in 2014, the Parks Canada underwater team finally discovered one of the ships, the HMS Erebus. In September 2016, researchers found the HMS Terror.

The locations of the ships tell a different story than accepted theories and may change a chapter in Canadian history.

Dr. Marty Magne is recently retired from the position of Director of the Archaeology and History Branch for Parks Canada, where he oversaw 50 staff of terrestrial and underwater archaeologists as well as historians in offices across the country, including the team exploring the mystery of the ill-fated Franklin Expedition.

BYLAW NO. 1789

A bylaw to amend the tax limit for the Fort Fraser Water Service

WHEREAS the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has established by Bylaw No. 1243 the Fort Fraser Water Service within a portion of Electoral Area "D";

AND WHEREAS the Regional District wishes to increase the maximum annual tax requisition for this service from \$62,500 to \$78,125;

AND WHEREAS under Section 347 of the *Local Government Act*, the sole participant has consented to the adoption of this Bylaw;

AND WHEREAS under Regulation 113/2007, the approval of the Inspector is not required because the increase in the tax limit is not greater than 25% of the baseline amount five years previous;

NOW THEREFORE the Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

- 1. Section 4 of Bylaw No. 1243, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefore:
 - "4. The maximum amount that may be requisitioned annually for this service, under Section 388(1)(a) of the *Local Government Act*, shall be SEVENTY-EIGHT THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE (\$78,125) DOLLARS."
- 2. This bylaw may be cited as the "Fort Fraser Water Service Establishment Amendment Bylaw No. 1789, 2016".
