DELEGATION

BRAD LAYTON – Liberal Candidate, Skeena Bulkley Valley

Chair Miller welcomed Brad Layton, Liberal Candidate, Skeena Bulkley Valley.

Mr. Layton provided a handout that included a bio and issues he feels are important along with the Liberal policy titled "A Historic Investment Plan to Strengthen the Middle Class, Create Jobs and Grow Our Economy." Mr. Layton explained that the document provides an outline on how the Liberal party plans to double the federal infrastructure investment from \$65 billion to \$125 billion over the next 10 years. If elected they plan to make an immediate down payment of \$5 billion for the first two years after the election for infrastructure. The plan has three distinct eligibility areas: public transit, social and green infrastructure.

Mr. Layton mentioned that a Liberal Government plans to add green infrastructure to the New Building Canada Fund and provide clearer project criteria, faster approval processes and quicker dispersal. It will be a similar model utilized for the Gas Tax Fund. Any uncommitted federal infrastructure funds near the end of any fiscal year will be transferred to municipalities through a temporary top-up of the Gas Tax Fund.

A Liberal government plans to establish the Canada Infrastructure Bank (CIB) to provide low-cost financing to build new infrastructure projects.

Mr. Layton spoke to the importance of skills and trades training and noted that a Liberal government will increase funding to skills and trades training by \$750 million. \$500 million will be invested in the labour market development agreements, \$200 million will be for workers not currently eligible, \$50 million to expand aboriginal skills training and \$25 million for training facilities, existing and new infrastructure.

DELEGATION (CONT'D)

BRAD LAYTON - Liberal Candidate, Skeena Bulkley Valley

The Liberal party is planning to work with employers to develop an appropriate apprenticeship worker ratio for all federal infrastructure projects. Changes are also planned for the Employment Insurance program through immediate engagement with the provinces. They intend to adjust the waiting period from two weeks to one week and reduce the waiting period to receive first payment to within two to three weeks.

Current relationships between the federal government and First Nations is also a top priority and the Liberal party plans to engage and communicate with First Nations to work together to address the issues faced by First Nations communities under past governments.

Chair Miller commented that immediately putting money into skills training is not the full answer to developing and growing skills training programs but the need to ensure that the federal, provincial, local governments, post-secondary institutions and industry form partnerships to work together to build a plan that will work for everyone. Mr. Layton noted that the funding will be available but the projects, models and planning still require development and implementation.

Director Thiessen spoke to the changes to the foreign workers program and what does the Liberal government plan to do to address the lack of workers. Mr. Layton mentioned that the Liberal government wants to create a program that provides work to displaced Canadian workers first, through such ideas of relocation of workers throughout Canada and then still provide opportunities for foreign/temporary workers along with their families to fill jobs.

Director MacDougall noted the challenges and issues regarding CN Rail in regard to getting products to market, safety of transporting products through communities and horn signals at crossings. Mr. Layton mentioned that the CN issue has not been recently brought forward but if he is elected he would like to see the regulations that CN follows in the United States be the same or similar in Canada.

Director Repen commented that a lot of the Liberal campaign has focused on a balanced budget, primary resource activities and how to foster growth in the long-term, what does the Liberal government plan to do to strengthen growth? Mr. Layton spoke to their plan to dedicate funding to green infrastructure such as better internet and cell service, once that is in place rural areas will have a better ability to attract business. Stable communications and internet are the backbone.

Chair Miller encouraged Mr. Layton and the Liberal party, if elected, to work together with all political parties and provinces to find solutions. It is important for politicians to work towards solutions for all of Canada.

SHELDON CLARE - Independent Candidate - Cariboo-Prince George (via teleconference)

Chair Miller welcomed Sheldon Clare, Independent – Cariboo-Prince George.

Mr. Clare provided an outline of his background. He has lived the majority of his life in Prince George and currently teaches at the College of New Caledonia (CNC), sits on the CNC Board of Governors and is the Elected Facility Rep. He is currently the President of the Canadian National Finance Association and is past President of the Royal Canadian Legion, his local Rod and Gun Club and past Chair of the Alpine Club of Canada's Prince George Section. He also assisted with the profiles of the Caledonia Nordic Ski Club as a volunteer Biathlon Sports Information Officer for the 2015 Canada Winter Games in Prince George.

Mr. Clare mentioned that the reason he is running as an independent candidate is because he believes the party system is broken and in order to correct the system an elected official needs to be responsive and responsible to the voters rather than a political party. Mr. Clare intends to fight for local issues, diversify the economy and not just focus on resource extraction, but look for markets for renewable resources. He also noted that an emphasis needs to be put on the importance of the agriculture sector. There is a need to reduce student debt when students leave post-secondary education and he feels that an avenue to address this is through eliminating interest on student loans. He also believes in better support for seniors and more services for veterans along with more support for veterans and those dealing with post-traumatic stress disorder.

Mr. Clare commented that economic diversity is key for success and that we have been impacted by the boom or bust cycle numerous times and require diversification to cushion the effects of a boom or bust economy.

Mr. Clare spoke of his strong opposition to Bill C-51, Anti-Terrorism Act 2015. He strongly believes that intelligence agencies should not be law enforcement agencies as well. He noted concerns regarding the privacy and freedom aspects associated with the legislation of Bill C-51.

In terms of the environment, polluters need to pay for their damages and cleanup. Mr. Clare does not support mandatory minimum sentencing, he feels that limits the ability for the judge and courts to provide adequate sentencing. Mr. Clare has considered the idea of tying corporate tax rates with corporate performance in terms of providing jobs and employment opportunities and being good corporate citizens within communities. If companies have a high level corporate performance their tax rate would be reduced.

It is important to pay attention to the people that live in the region, why they live here, along with providing good quality work opportunities.

Mr. Clare commented that there needs to be a better voice for aboriginal people and also better support and education opportunities for aboriginal people.

Director Repen asked if Mr. Clare was elected would he consult with constituents regarding his various platforms to determine whether or not they were supportive and what the general consensus would be. Mr. Clare explained he felt that by being an independent he would have the opportunity to listen to his constituents and have the ability to be a critical thinker. He believes in a flexible coalition to better Cariboo-Prince George and Canada. Mr. Clare mentioned that it is important to get more people to vote and there needs to be a process to encourage people to vote for something not against something.

Chair Miller thanked Mr. Clare for attending the meeting via teleconference and the importance for all political parties to work together to find solutions for the betterment of all constituents.

Director Strimbold spoke to the potential changes moving forward from the Northwest Regional Advisory Committee (NW RAC) to the Northern Development Initiative Trust (NDIT) Regional Board in regard to second time applicants to the different funding grant allocations.

Chair Miller noted that NDIT now has a pine beetle account that can be accessed for grant funding.

The intake deadline for grant submissions for this fall is November, 2015.

Discussion took place regarding the difficulty of assessing the potential requests for funding in 2016. Developing a rating system and/or check list to apply to all applications to assist in determining priority projects was discussed. A smaller group to review the projects such as the Rural Directors Committee was suggested.

NDIT staff have requested that the RDBN Board of Directors prioritize the list of potential grant applications for the NW RAC for the 2016 year. Some applications have not yet been submitted but are in the beginning planning stages.

The Regional Board expressed its wish to have the projects brought forward to the Rural Directors Committee for prioritization.

West Fraser Concrete Ltd. (SMXA), Donaldson Road, Smithers, Electoral Area "A"

Jason Llewellyn, Director of Planning provided an update in regard to the West Fraser Concrete Ltd., Smithers Motocross Association's track located at Donaldson Road, Smithers, Electoral Area "A". Staff have been actioning the Regional Board's directions and finalizing the affidavit to get an injunction to cease operations. Staff has also attempted to meet with the property owner to determine what the property owner intends to do to remediate the site of the old landfill in which the SMXA Track is located and to discuss the RDBN obtaining a right of way to the old landfill site.

Staff noted that there appeared to be a motocross race that took place recently on the site but the use of the site during the summer appears to be relatively small.

Mr. Llewellyn mentioned that the RDBN Director of Environmental Services spoke with the property owner and he is not willing to do work to remediate the site back to its prior condition prior to the SMXA track being built on top of the landfill cap. The property owner's response was contrary to telephone conversations during the summer where he indicated at that time that he would complete the work, but avoided meeting with RDBN staff.

Unless staff receive different direction from the Regional Board the next steps will be to follow through with the court process to stop usage on the site. Staff will provide a report to the Regional Board in regard to remedial steps for the site and issues to access a right of way.

The Regional Board expressed frustration at the lack of support from provincial ministries in assisting in finding a suitable location for the SMXA track and mitigating the issue and finding a solution. Frustrations were voiced that the SMXA did not assist in moving forward to find a solution to relocating the motocross to a more suitable location.

Staff noted that the property owner has also indicated that he will not sign an agreement to allow the RDBN to have a right of way to the old landfill site.

NATHAN CULLEN, MP Skeena Bulkley Valley, New Democratic Party

Chair Miller welcomed Nathan Cullen, MP Skeena Bulkley Valley, New Democratic Party.

Mr. Cullen thanked the Regional Board of Directors for a chance to come and present to the Board.

He mentioned that he is currently assisting a colleague in regard to the Syrian refugee crisis that has recently taken place.

Mr. Cullen mentioned that with the writ being dropped on August 1, 2015 and ending October 19, 2015 that this is the longest Federal Election. With the election being a longer period of time it also increases the cost by an additional \$200-\$300 million.

He spoke to the early commitments made by the New Democratic Party (NDP) during the Federation of Canadian Municipalities Convention in Edmonton, June 4-8, 2015 to add an extra cent on the gas tax revenues to Regional Districts and Municipalities.

Mr. Cullen noted the recession that Canada has experienced in the early part of 2015 and the negative growth that has occurred. The economy is fragile and is experiencing the lowest job creation rate in two years in comparison to the past 45 years. He noted that infrastructure is a hallmark to moving forward in tough economic times. The NDP is planning to have infrastructure projects aligned to allow for a shovel ready approach if the NDP is elected. The NDP is also committed to a balanced budget the first year. If elected they will assume the last quarter current budget and are committed to balancing the budget for the 2016-2017 budget year.

He noted that consumer affairs are key: for example the current low price per barrel of oil is not reflected at the pumps. Mr. Cullen spoke of a study completed on the disconnect in regard to oil prices and prices at the fuel pumps and the analogy "rocket up and feather down" was discussed. If oil prices are up the price at the pump is up, if oil prices drop the price at the pump feathers down. There has been the suggestion of implementing a Gas Ombudsperson. Another key factor is the lack of refining capacity in Canada. Chair Miller mentioned that fuel prices at the pump have a direct effect on economic growth.

Chair Miller suggested the need for Federal Parliament and the Provincial Legislature to work together and find solutions and consensus.

Mr. Cullen spoke of the Unisto'ot'en Camp south of Houston. Concerns have been brought forward in regard for the potential for an escalation of violence and the inconsistency as to who is allowed into the area. Mr. Cullen mentioned that representatives from the Unisto'ot'en and the RCMP are working on communication. He noted that rumours from the media and social media have had an impact and he has attempted to correct them in order to keep the atmosphere neutral. Director Strimbold asked at what point and whose role is it to find a resolution to the issue. Mr. Cullen commented that pipelines are an issue and will continue to be, he mentioned that the land issues need to be resolved. It creates uncertainty for investors and is overwhelming for citizens, First Nations, and non-First Nations. He mentioned the importance of having the province engaged also.

Director Thiessen noted the refugee crisis and spoke to the churches sponsoring refugees in the past but those opportunities do not seem to be available today. What can communities do to assist in the refugee crisis? Mr. Cullen explained that during the Vietnam crisis and the faith sponsorships during that time Canada received 60,000 refugees but currently faith based applications are being rejected outright. In the last three years Canada has received approximately 1,000 refugees. He also stated that Turkey has offered assistance to Canada but Canada has not moved forward.

Director Thiesseri spoke to concerns that there has been no new rental housing projects and the elimination of capital gains to assist in reinvesting in light rental housing projects would be very beneficial. People have to often leave their communities or find poorer housing because of the lack of affordable rental housing. Mr. Cullen mentioned that the NDP has committed to 10,000 housing units across Canada in the first year. They are working with CMHC and developing plans that can be customized for each community to address its needs. He noted that the pace of making changes to the capital gains depends on the budget. He also mentioned that Canada is the only country that doesn't have a national housing strategy.

Alternate Director Hughes commented on the issues of internet/cell coverage in the region. He mentioned the importance and necessity of having internet and hopes there can be more focus on coverage in the region. Alternate Director Hughes stated concerns regarding the frequencies auctioned by Industry Canada and the lack of acknowledgement and compensation to people using those frequencies. Mr. Cullen reported that Telus has shown interest in completing coverage along Highway 16. Mr. Cullen mentioned that Netflix takes up approximately 2/3 of broadband width. He spoke to connectivity needing to be a joint effort between industry and government. Director McGuire thanked Mr. Cullen for taking a letter forward from the Village of Granisle in regard to receiving funding through the Connecting Canadians Grant Funding for cell coverage.

Director McGuire inquired as to the grant funding that was put on hold recently until the federal election is complete. Mr. Cullen noted that 4-5 communities that have received letters of support but have been requested to delay announcement of funds received. The NDP has stated that if an organization has in hand a letter of approval from the federal government that money is in the budget for the 2015 budget year and will be provided. He stated that organizations should announce that they have received funding but understands that due to the direction provided they are withholding announcing funding received.

Chair Miller brought forward the resolution forwarded to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities in regard to the \$800 million that was to be allocated to Mountain Pine Beetle impacted areas and communities. Mr. Cullen reported that approximately \$200 million of those funds have been allocated but when inquiring about the remaining funds it no longer appears to be a part of the budget. He mentioned that he cannot commit to providing the funds as there requires further research into the actual location of the funds.

Director Repen asked if the NDP had a plan to reinvest in rural areas and draw human resources to support an evolution in economy and provide stability to the country. Mr. Cullen mentioned the need to have manufacturing abilities in the country and that Canada needs to refine its raw resources in country. He noted that BC currently exports 97% of its raw logs and that in research and development Canada ranks 30 out of 30 developed countries. He spoke to the need to get smarter in order to get better at managing resources. Mr. Cullen also stated that Canada has the lowest rate of patents and that innovation is also a key component to success. Mr. Cullen reported that schools like BCIT (British Columbia Institute of Technology) are also moving forward with innovative ideas.

Mr. Cullen noted that the NDP has committed to reducing the small business tax rate by 25% along with a \$40 million innovation fund and an accelerated capital cost allowance to allow to write down equipment quicker.

He mentioned that funds had been allocated to Elections Canada to conduct pilot projects for online voting but unfortunately that funding was cut and the project was not able to move forward.

Discussion took place regarding the senate and the issues it faces. Reviewing the senate requires opening the constitution and requires conversations with the provinces.

Mr. Cullen commented that if communities are not on the campaign debate list to please write to his campaign and request an opportunity to have Mr. Cullen come to their community.

Director MacDougall spoke of the challenges and issues with CN and companies not able to get products to market due to lack of rail service. He also asked Mr. Cullen about the Bills being brought forward. Mr. Cullen mentioned that he had introduced a bill that was defeated regarding the banning of raw bulk exports off the coast of Prince Rupert regarding Enbridge. One of the Private Members Bills being brought forward is in regard to notification for dangerous goods moving through communities via rail. He has had conversations with the National Fire Chiefs Association and wanted a policy in place for pre-notification to communities. He expressed his frustration regarding the liability and lack of training for volunteer fire departments in regard to what is being transported through communities. The National Fire Chiefs Association has indicated they are having good dialogue with the Transportation Safety Board and will keep moving forward. He commented that there should be penalties in place for CN when rail cars are not being supplied to get product to market.

Chair Miller thanked Mr. Cullen for attending the meeting.

Director McGuire expressed her concerns that not all communities should have the same guidelines for the reuse sheds as each community is different. Janine Dougall, Director of Environmental Services noted that Granisle and Southside may not have the same level of issues that the other facilities in the region have encountered but they have had issues also. Discussion took place regarding the need to have consistent service levels in the region and closing the reuse sheds initially until a solution could be found.

The re-use sheds will be closed as soon as reasonably possible if the Regional Board moves forward with the recommendations.

Discussion took place regarding the need to find a solution to the issues associated with the reuse sheds. The need to move forward as soon as possible was discussed.

1. Guiding Principles - Airshed, Water Management and Solid Waste

Director Repen noted the need for a combination of public education and the utilization of best practices by industry, businesses and residents in regard to airshed, water use and solid waste management in the region. This is a key component to a healthy economically viable region.

Discussion took place in regard to the possible impacts to the region and the cost that may be borne by the region in regard to future development. The importance of welcoming new businesses and industry and encouraging growth in the region was also discussed.

Discussion took place regarding the strategic plan of the Regional Board and the priorities of the Board along with staffing implications.

Director MacDougall spoke to individual community initiatives that could be shared across the region.

Outdoor wood burning stoves and the issues and air quality impacts associated with the emissions from the units was discussed. Director Thiessen stated that everyone has a right to free air and access to water.

Director Newell brought forward concerns regarding TransCanada's current timber salvaging strategy and that is does not appear to align with the Regional Board's direction regarding the utilization of fibre.

The Forestry Committee will review the document and provide comments to staff to bring forward at a future Regional Board Meeting.

Discussion took place regarding the larger amount of wood waste wood produced by short logging. Changes have been made in Fraser Lake to move to short log hauling.

The Provincial Government is now wanting to charge for the waste being utilized.

The Regional District facilitates grant funding and can assist with grant training for non-profit organizations but the responsibility is the organization's, not the Regional District.

The Lake Babine Nation (LBN) has submitted an application to Northern Development Initiative Trust's (Northern Development) Economic Diversification Infrastructure, Northwest Regional Advisory Committee Account (NW RAC). A resolution of support from the RDBN is required by the NW RAC.

LBN is requesting a \$250,000 grant towards Phase Two of a biomass heating project.

Phase One

Budget: \$723,000

• Expected Completion: October, 2015

Activities include:

- o Crew training and work experience for Firewood Program
- o Engineering Feasibility with RETScreen supply chain study
- o Engineering Design and Tender Documents

Phase Two

- Budget \$385,000
- Expected Completion: March 2016
- Activity includes:
 - o Underground Distribution System Construction in Fort Babine

Phase Three

- Budget \$800,000
- Expected Completion: March 2017
- Activities include:
 - o Construction of Energy Centre in Woyenne
 - Business set-up and operation training
 - District System Operator Training

Phase Two will take place in the community of Fort Babine, in Electoral Area 'G'. According to the LBN website, Fort Babine has a population of "near 200 members (60 full time residents) in 36 homes".



This project is expected to:

- provide improved heating to Fort Babine community buildings which include the school, health center, water treatment facility, band hall, and fire hall(upon Phase Two completion);
- create five full time and eight part time permanent jobs (upon Phase Three completion);
 and,
- create a revenue stream by selling heat to government organizations in Fort Babine and private homes in Woyenne, as well as selling electricity produced by the DES system in Woyenne to the grid (upon Phase Three completion).

Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Financial Plan Guidelines

1. Purpose

To provide structured guidance for the preparation of the Five Year Financial Plan.

2. Legal Framework

a. Financial Plan Bylaw Details

For each service, the financial plan bylaw must set out:

- i. Proposed Expenditures
- ii. Proposed Funding Sources
- iii. Proposed Transfers to and from funds, separately for reserve funds and accumulated surplus for each service

b. Revenue Categories

For each service, the financial plan bylaw must set out:

- i. Revenue from property value taxes
- ii. Revenue from parcel taxes
- iii. Revenue from fees and charges
- iv. Revenue from other sources
- v. Proceeds from borrowing

c. Expenditure Categories

For each service, the financial plan bylaw must set out:

- i. Interest and Principal on debt
- ii. Capital Expenditures
- iii. Deficit from prior year, if any
- iv. Amount required for other purposes.

d. Limit on Taxation

Budgeted taxation for each service cannot exceed the maximum tax requisition in each service establishment bylaw.

e. Limit on Tax Requisition

The tax requisition for each service cannot exceed budgeted taxation for that service.

f. Deadline for Financial Plan Bylaw Adoption

March 31



g. Balanced Budget Requirement

Each service must have a balanced budget

- i. If an actual deficit results, it must be included as an expenditure in the following year's financial plan
- ii. If an actual surplus results, it is included as revenue in the following year's financial plan

h. Public Consultation

Regional Districts are required to consult with the public on their financial plans. The nature and extent of public consultation is not prescribed.

i. Financial Plan Amendments

The Financial Plan may be amended by the Regional District Board at any time

j. Borrowing in the financial plan must undergo a separate approval process.

3. RDBN Services

Each service must be accounted for and managed separately.

The RDBN has 68 separate services including region-wide services, regional rural services, subregional services and local services. A table of RDBN active services by category is shown on the following page.

4. Property Assessments

a. Assessment Base for the Budget

The five year financial plan is based on property assessments in the Completed Tax Roll, which is available in January.

b. Assessment Base for the Tax Requisition

The Tax Requisition for the year is based on the Revised Tax Roll, which is available at the end of March. The deadline for the tax requisition is April 10.

5. Property Class Tax Rate Multipliers

Unlike, Municipalities, which establish tax rates for each class of property, for regional district taxation, the relationship between tax rates for residential properties and other classes of properties is established by provincial statute.

6. Tax Exemptions

a. Mandatory Exemptions

There are certain mandatory exemptions determined by the Local Government Act. Some examples are properties owned by the Federal Government, the Province, the Regional District, a Municipality within the Regional District or buildings used for public worship.

b. Contractual Exemption

A 1950 agreement between the Province and Alcan (now Rio Tinto Alcan) has exempted Alcan's properties that are used for the generation of power for the smelter in Kitimat. Since 2009, we have been receiving a grant in lieu of taxes from the Province under a 15 year commitment ending in 2024. The 2014 grant was \$811,172 and it increases annually according to the formula used by BC Hydro for its generating facilities.

c. Permissive Tax Exemptions

Under the *Local Government Act*, regional districts are authorized to enact bylaws to exempt properties owned by not-profit organizations in a limited number of categories. A one year exemption can be granted with a two thirds majority of the Regional District Board. A permissive tax exemption longer than one year and up to 10 years requires the consent of the electors. Some examples are properties used primarily for public athletic, recreation or education purposes. The RDBN currently has no active permissive tax exemptions.



7. Reserve Funds

- a. Statutory Capital Reserves can be established by bylaw for any service to accumulate funds for capital expenditures expected in the future, typically for asset replacement, refurbishment, additions or major repairs. Contributions and accumulated interest can only be spent for the purpose established in the Capital Reserve Establishment bylaw.
- **b.** Operating Reserves can be established by bylaw to provide funds for operating costs that fluctuate from year to year, such as rural elections.

8. Surpluses or Deficits from the Prior Year

Surpluses and deficits must be accounted for separately for each service

a. Deficits

If the actual financial results for a service from the prior year resulted in a deficit for that service, it must be carried forward to the current year's budget as an expenditure.

b. Surpluses

If the actual financial results for a service from the prior year resulted in a surplus for that service, it is carried forward to the current year's budget as revenue in that service. Such revenue may be used to:

- i. Reduce taxation for the current year;
- ii. Fund additional expenditures for one-time projects in the current year;
- iii. Contribute to a capital reserve;
- iv. Contribute to an operating reserve; or
- v. Budget for a contingent expenditure for projects that may be identified during the current year or a future year

9. Debt

a. For RDBN services

i. Revenue Anticipation Borrowing

Short term borrowing to cover a temporary shortfall in funds in anticipation of the collection of annual tax requisition is collected can be approved by the Regional District Board.

ii. Short Term Capital Borrowing

For Administration Purposes only, short term capital borrowing (less than 5 years) can be approved by the Regional District Board up to a maximum of \$50,000 plus \$2 per capita. For example, in 2005, the RDBN borrowed \$131,700 under this provision to pay for part of the purchase price of the McLeod Building in Burns Lake (later to become the new RDBN Administration Building). The loan was repaid over 5 years.



iii. Short Term Equipment Financing

Equipment financing (less than 5 years) can be approved by the Regional District Board. For example, in 2015, the RDBN borrowed \$1,547,000 to finance part of the costs of landfill equipment at Knockholt and Clearview.

iv. Long Term Capital Borrowing

Borrowing of greater than 5 years requires:

- 1. A Loan authorization Bylaw that has received the consent of the electors, and
- 2. A Debenture Security Issuing Bylaw that can be approved by the Regional District Board

v. Temporary Borrowing

Temporary Borrowing in anticipation of receiving debenture proceeds can be approved by the Regional District Board once the loan authorization bylaw has been approved.

b. Financing Municipal Undertakings

Municipalities that wish to borrow using the Municipal Finance Authority debenture facility must do so through Regional Districts.

- i. The Municipality requires a loan authorization bylaw that has undergone the usual municipal approval process as well as a Council resolution requesting that the Regional District participate in a debenture issue on its behalf, and
- ii. The Regional District Board issues a Security Issuing Bylaw for debenture borrowing on behalf of municipalities.
- c. Joint and Several Liability The Regional District and its member municipalities are jointly and severally liable for each other's MFA debenture debt.

10. Financial Plan Preparation and Management Process

The following outlines the financial planning process along with the associated timelines:

- d. Five Year Bar Graphs comparing taxation for region-wide services and regional rural services in Year 1 of the financial plan with each of the previous 4 years.



- e. Pie charts for Year 1 of the financial plan showing the percentage of taxation that each service makes up of region-wide services and regional rural services.
- f. Detailed budgets for each service are available on request.

12. Financial Planning Principles

a. Service Sustainability

The five year financial plan should reflect long term cost projections and revenue expectations for each service. This would include reasonable tax rates, including contributions to capital reserves and/or the use of debt financing, where necessary, to sustain each service in the long term.

b. Minimum Taxation

For each service, taxation should be kept to the lowest level possible, consistent with delivering quality, sustainable services.

c. Matching Costs with Benefits

A balanced approach is needed when planning for the ultimate replacement of long lived assets. The options are:

1. Pay as you go

Tax properties at the time the asset is replaced. This can lead to large, one-time taxes.

2. Debt Financing

Borrow the funds at the time the asset is replaced and repay the debt over the life of the new asset (cannot be longer than 30 years).

3. Capital Reserves

Contribute to capital reserves during the time the asset is used up so that enough funds are available to finance the new asset at the time of replacement.

Inter-generational equity is affected when making a choice between contributing to capital reserves and using future debt financing to fund the future replacement of capital assets. In making this choice, consideration is given to how the existing assets were financed in the first place.

i. Capital Reserves

When the current generation of taxpayers did not fund the existing asset, it is appropriate to contribute to capital reserves for ultimate replacement. This reflects the fact that current taxpayers are using up an asset they did not pay for.

ii. Debt Financing

When the current generation of taxpayers have paid for the existing assets through taxes, contributing to capital reserves would result in them paying for



the existing asset twice (once for initial acquisition and once for replacement). In this case, it would be appropriate to consider debt financing for future asset replacement so that the future generation of taxpayers bears the cost of the new asset.

d. Stable Tax Rates

Large fluctuations in tax rates should be avoided, to the extent possible. Tools to manage tax rate fluctuations include:

i. Capital Reserves

Capital reserves can smooth out the cost of long term or infrequent capital purchases.

ii. Operating Reserves

Operating reserves can smooth out the cost of regular operating costs that occur every few years.

iii. Operating Contingencies

Where a service has a historically large surplus, the excess could be used to reduce taxes in year 1 of the financial plan or used to budget for an operating contingency, which could be used in the future to offset future tax increases.

iv. Service Level Adjustments

Under certain circumstances, it may be appropriate to minimize tax increases by reducing that scope of the service provided.

e. Consistency with Other Plans

The financial plan should be consistent with any other existing RDBN plans, including:

- i. RDBN Strategic Plan
- ii. Departmental Work Plans
- iii. Official Community Plans

f. Public Consultation

i. Open Budget Deliberations

Each draft of the financial plan is deliberated in a public, open meeting of the Committee of the Whole. The final financial plan is deliberated by the RDBN Board in a public, open meeting. These deliberations should be advertised in advance of the meetings.

ii. Public Meetings with Municipal Councils

On request, the RDBN will attend a Municipal Council meeting to present the RDBN budget for the current year.

The current agreement expires on December 31, 2015. The new agreement was amended to include the second arena in Smithers, and to add the Smithers Gallery Association. The new agreement will be in effect from January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2021.

SMITHERS RURAL FIRE PROTECTION AND RECREATION AND CULTURE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT IS DATED FOR REFERENCE THIS _DAY OF 2015.

BETWEEN:

THE REGIONAL DISTRICT OF BULKLEY-NECHAKO,

P.O. Box 820, Burns Lake, British Columbia, VOJ 1EO (hereinafter referred to as "Regional District")

OF THE FIRST PART

AND:

THE TOWN OF SMITHERS,

P.O. Box 879, Smithers, British Columbia, VOJ 2NO (hereinafter referred to as "Town")

OF THE SECOND PART

WHEREAS: a Regional District may, by bylaw establish and operate local services under Part 24 of the *Local Government Act*,

AND WHEREAS: The Regional District has established by Bylaw No. 884, 1995 as amended, a service of fire protection; and by Bylaw No 886, 1995 as amended, a service to contribute to Smithers recreation and culture; both in the same portion of Electoral Area "A";

AND WHEREAS: The parties have entered into a contractual agreement dated September 14, 2011 for the Town's provision of fire protection services (the Services) in a portion of Electoral Area "A", which agreement expires on December 31, 2015;

AND WHEREAS: the Town has agreed to continue to provide the Services on the same basis as the expiring agreement until such time as the expiring agreement is renewed;

AND WHEREAS: The parties wish to enter into a new agreement for the Town's provision of fire protection services in a portion of Electoral Area "A";

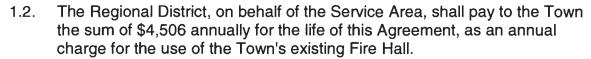
NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSE that in consideration of the premises and of mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto covenant and agree each with the other as follows:

1. Fire Protection

1.1. The Town shall provide fire protection services for and to the residents of the Smithers Rural Fire Protection Service Area, (the Service Area) as shown on the map attached to and forming part of this Agreement as Appendix "A" in the same manner and to the same extent as is provided to the residents of the Town of Smithers, excepting that in the Service Area there will be no fire hydrants and the source of water shall be from a tanker truck or pumper/tanker truck. In the event that more than one fire occurs at the same time, the Town of Smithers Fire Chief or designate will determine how to best respond to each fire.

Term: January 1, 2016 - December 31, 2021

- 1.3. The Regional District, on behalf of the Service Area, shall pay to the Town an annual sum in compensation for the net operating costs of the said service during the life of this Agreement as determined in Section 3 of this Agreement. Annual net operating costs do not include debt servicing costs of the Town.
- 1.4. The payments referred to in Sections 1.2 and 1.3 of this agreement are subject to the taxation limit in the Smithers Rural Fire Protection Local Service Establishment Bylaw No. 884, 1995, as amended from time to time.
- 1.5. The Town shall keep a record of fires within the Town of Smithers and the Service Area for the benefit and information of both the Town and the Regional District.
- 1.6. The Town of Smithers Fire Chief, or other officer, appointed by the Office of the Fire Commissioner as a Local Assistant to the Fire Commissioner (LAFC) shall also be appointed as the LAFC for the Service Area.
- 1.7. The Town and the Regional District will use reasonable efforts to negotiate a fire protection agreement with the Ministry of Forests with respect to grass and forest fires.

2. Recreation and Culture

- 2.1. The Regional District shall endeavor to take the steps necessary to make the boundaries of the Smithers Recreation and Culture Service Area the same as the boundaries of the Smithers Rural Fire Protection Service Area and both will be referred to hereinafter as the Service Area.
- 2.2. The Regional District, on behalf of the Service Area, shall pay to the Town an annual taxation grant towards the net operating costs of the Town's parks, arenas, and recreation administration and programs during the life of this Agreement as determined in Section 3 of this Agreement.
- 2.3. The Regional District, on behalf of the Service Area, shall pay to the Smithers Public Library, Bulkley Valley Historical and Museum Society, Smithers Gallery Association, and the Bulkley Valley Community Arts Council an annual taxation grant during the life of this Agreement as determined in Section 3 of this Agreement.
- 2.4. The payments referred to in Section 2.2 and 2.3 of this agreement are subject to the taxation limit in the Smithers Rural Recreation and Culture Local Service Establishment Bylaw No. 886, 1995, as amended from time to time.
- 2.5. The Town shall take the steps necessary to ensure that the residents in the Service Area are provided access to the aforesaid recreation and culture facilities and/or programs subject to the same user fees and restrictions as Town residents.

3. Cost Apportionment

3.1. The formula for calculating the amounts due in Sections 1.3, 2.2 and 2.3 of this Agreement shall be as follows:

- a) Determine the converted hospital assessments on land and improvements within the Town, the Service Area and both together;
- b) Calculate the percentage that the converted hospital assessment within each of the Town and the Service Area are of the combined total:
- Apply these percentages to the annual net operating costs of the fire protection service and the annual budget allocation of the Town to the specific recreation and culture items identified in this Agreement;
- d) Determine the proportionate contribution of both the Town and the Regional District.
- 3.2. The latest and/or adjusted assessment information provided by the British Columbia Assessment Authority shall be used in determining the converted hospital assessment of land and improvements in each area.
- 3.3. The parties agree that the budget surplus or deficit in one year will reduce or increase, respectively, the Regional District's calculated contributions in the following year.

4. Payments

4.1. Fire Protection

The payments referred to in Section 1.2 and 1.3 of this Agreement are due and payable by the Regional District to the Town on the first day of August of each year during the life of this Agreement.

4.2. Recreation and Culture

- a) The payments referred to in Section 2.2 of this Agreement are due and payable by the Regional District to the Town on the first day of August of each year during the life of this Agreement.
- b) The payments referred to in Section 2.3 of this Agreement are due and payable as follows:
 - One-twelfth of the annual payment to the Smithers Public Library is due and payable on the last day of each calendar month during the life of this Agreement.
 - The annual payments to each of the Bulkley Valley Historical and Museum Society and the Bulkley Valley Community Arts Council are due and payable on the first day of August of each year during the life of this Agreement.

5. Budget Process

5.1. The Electoral Area "A" Director of the Regional District shall be involved in the preparation of the Town's Annual Budget for the items identified in this Agreement.

5.2. The Town shall assure that the Regional District is furnished with its draft budget in time to be included in the Regional District's Annual Budget for the year, no later than February 15th of each year

6. Indemnification

- 6.1. The Town shall indemnify and save harmless the Regional District from any and all liability arising out of the provision of any of the services contemplated by this Agreement arising from or contributed to by the negligence of the Town, the Smithers Library, the Smithers Arts Council, the Bulkley Valley Museum, or any of their respective officers, employees, agents or contractors.
- 6.2. The Regional District shall indemnify and save harmless the Town from any and all liability arising out of the provision of any of the services contemplated by this Agreement arising from or contributed to by the negligence of the Regional District, its officers, employees, agents or contractors.

7. <u>Term</u>

- 7.1. This Agreement will be in effect from January 1, 2011 to December 31, 2015, unless otherwise terminated in accordance with this the early termination provisions contained herein.
- 7.2. The Town may terminate this Agreement, to take effect at the end of any calendar year, by giving not less than six months written notice to the Regional District where the approved rate of taxation by the Regional District on the Service Area will not be sufficient to pay its share of the costs as determined by this Agreement.
- 7.3. This Agreement may be terminated by either party for reason of undue hardship, to take effect at the end of any calendar year by giving at least 12 months written notice to the other party. If the parties cannot agree that an undue hardship has occurred, the dispute will be resolved in accordance with the Commercial Arbitration Act.

Re: Proposed Service – Fort St. James Senior Transit

Background

The District of Fort St. James currently operates a transit service to transport seniors to medical appointments in town, Vanderhoof and Prince George. Passengers are picked up at home and returned to their homes after the appointment. In addition, the service now accepts passengers from Vanderhoof for trips already scheduled to go to Prince George. Vanderhoof passengers are picked up and dropped off at the Vanderhoof A&W. The District of Vanderhoof pays a small fee to the District of Fort St. James for this service. The service is contracted out by the District of Fort St. James by the Fort St. James Seniors Society.

RDBN Service Request

Costs are increasing and funds are needed for vehicle replacement. Since rural residents also benefit from this service, the District of Fort St. James has requested that the Regional District establish a service to help pay for the operating and capital costs.

Proposed New Service

After discussion with Director Greenaway, it is proposed to establish an RDBN Senior Transit Service. Both the District of Fort St. James and a portion of Electoral Area "C" would participate in this service. See attached map. The service would continue to be managed by the District of Fort St. James. The RDBN would tax properties in the District of Fort St. James and a portion of Area "C" and make annual financial contributions to the District of Fort St. James to pay for operating costs and capital reserve contributions. The District of Fort St. James would manage the costs and the capital reserve, and would continue to own the vehicles. The District of Fort St. James would continue to make in kind contributions such as vehicle maintenance and administration.

Projected Costs

Net costs, after fees, grants and donations are projected to be \$30,000, including annual contributions to a capital reserve for vehicle replacement of \$15,000. See attached budget. If this service is approved, the 2016 RDBN budget will include the costs outlined above.

Proposed Tax Limit

To accommodate future potential cost increases, the proposed tax limit is \$35,000. This equated to a residential tax rate of \$0.094 per thousand (\$9.40 for a \$100,000 property).



Approval Process

Since the residential tax rate is relatively small, to keep approval costs to a minimum, Director Greenaway has proposed to obtain the consent of the electors in Area "C" by the Alternative Approval Process. The District of Fort St. James will have its own separate approval process.

The Board is requested to consider giving three readings to Bylaw No. 1750 further in the agenda.

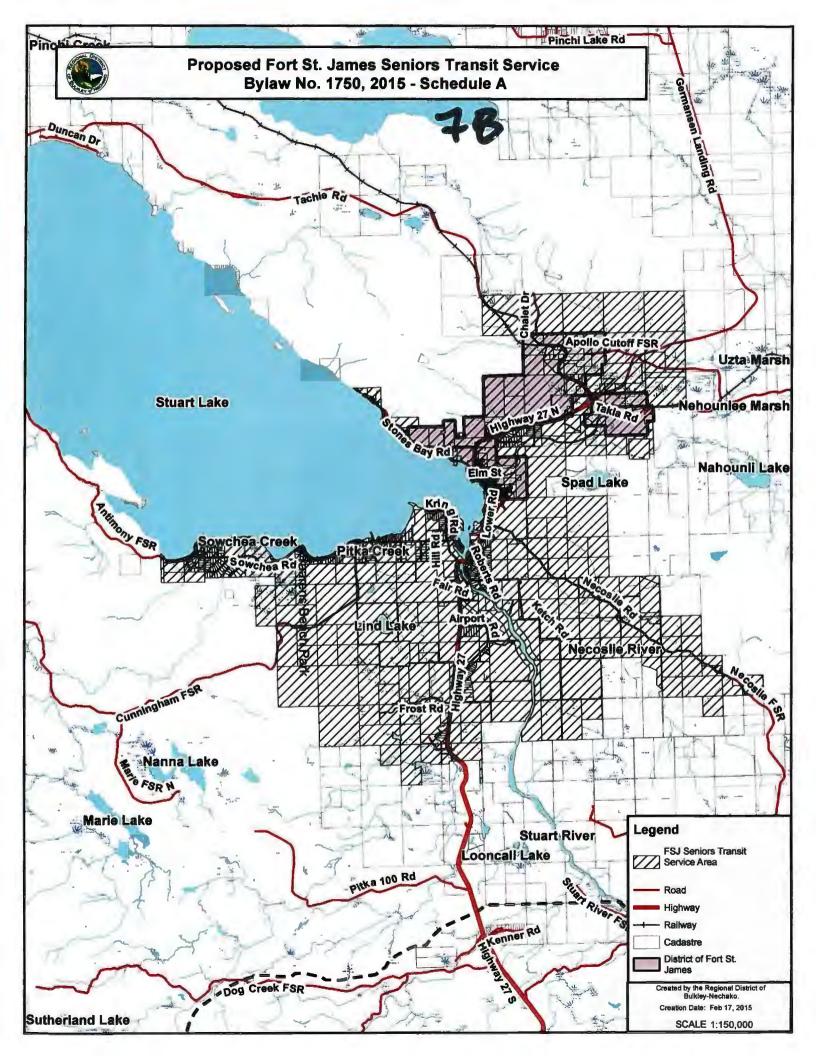

Re: Board of Variance Nominations

PURPOSE

Where a local government has adopted a zoning bylaw it must also establish a Board of Variance (BOV) by bylaw. That bylaw must set out the procedures to be followed by the local government and BOV in receiving and considering applications, and providing notice.

In 2012 the Regional District Board adopted a Board of Variance Bylaw, and a Board of Variance Policy. The policy outlines the process to appoint the three Board of Variance members. The process involves each RDBN Board member having an opportunity to nominate a person to be considered for appointment to the BOV by the RDBN Board.

In 2012 the Planning Department made a number of requests to the RDBN Board for persons to be nominated for appointment to the BOV. Unfortunately, not enough nominations were received to fill the three vacant positions.

Staff are asking that each Director please nominate a candidate for the BOV by December 31, 2015 so that the Board may consider BOV appointments in January 2016.

Once a person is nominated, staff will provide that person with the attached form, which will be submitted to the Regional District Board when BOV appointments are considered.

BOARD OF VARIANCE ROLE AND RESPONSIBILITY

The BOV consists of three members appointed by the Regional District Board. Members are appointed for a 3-year term; however, a local government may rescind an appointment to the BOV at any time. The BOV members appoint a Chairperson among themselves.

The BOV is authorized to consider three types of applications:

1. Applications requesting a "minor variance" from persons who allege they are caused "undue hardship" by:



- enforcement of the zoning bylaw regulation concerning the siting, size or dimension of a building or the siting of a manufactured home;
- enforcement of subdivision servicing requirements related to water, sewage and drainage services in areas zoned for agricultural or industrial use; or
- the prohibition on structural alterations or additions to a building or structure while a "non-conforming use" is continued in all or part of it.
- 2. Applications from persons who allege that the Building Inspector made an error in determining the amount of damage to a building, which is, in whole or part, a "non-conforming use". If a building or structure, which is non-conforming to a bylaw, is damaged or destroyed to the extent of 75% or more of its value above its foundations, as determined by the Building Inspector (Subsection 911(7) of the Local Government Act) the repair or reconstruction of that building or structure may not occur. The BOV may set aside the decision of the Building Inspector on the extent of damage, and make its own determination.
- 3. Applications from landowners requesting an extension to a date set by a bylaw that terminates land use contracts early within 6 months after adoption of that bylaw if the owner alleges that the early termination of the land use contract would cause hardship. The BOV may for reasons of undue hardship order that the provisions of the land use contract continue to apply beyond the early termination bylaw date but not beyond the 10-year sunset date

Undue Hardship

In order to grant a "minor variance" or extend the termination date of a land use contract the BOV must find that the enforcement of a bylaw requirement, or the termination date would cause the applicant "undue hardship". What constitutes an "undue hardship" is not defined, and is entirely up to the BOV to determine given the individual merits of each case. It is important to note that the BOV is not required to identify, explain, or justify in their rulings the hardship that they found.

Minor Variance

The Local Government Act states that the BOV may "order that a minor variance be permitted from the requirements of the Bylaw". Therefore, the BOV must find that a variance is minor prior to granting that variance. What constitutes a "minor variance" is not defined, and is entirely up to the BOV to determine given the individual merits of each case.

Limitations on Authority

The BOV cannot approve a variance or exemption to a bylaw that:

- a. is in conflict with a Section 219 Covenant registered on title;
- b. is in conflict with Section 27 of the *Local Government Act* (heritage conservation)
- c. deals with a matter covered in a land use contract;



- d. deals with a matter covered in a:
 - Development Permit;
 - Development Variance Permit;
 - Temporary Use Permit; or
- e. deals with a designated flood plain.

The BOV cannot approve a variance or exemption to a bylaw that, in the opinion of the BOV:

- a. results in inappropriate development of the site;
- b. adversely affects the natural environment;
- c. substantially affects the use and enjoyment of adjacent land;
- d. varies permitted uses and densities under the applicable bylaw; or
- e. defeats the intent of the bylaw.

In each case it is up to the BOV to consider the above issues and make their own determination regarding the impact of the proposed variance. The BOV cannot place conditions on its approval, other than a condition that construction of a building be started and completed within a certain time period.

In support of the application process the BOV requires the appropriate information to properly consider the above criterion. Otherwise it may approve applications for which it has no jurisdiction, or has implications that are more appropriately dealt with by the Regional District Board.

To help ensure that the BOV does not approve variances outside of its jurisdiction, and has adequate information to evaluate background information to make an informed decision the Planning Department would provide a report to the BOV to be considered along with each application.

BOV JURISDICTION AND INDEPENDENCE

The Regional District Board and the BOV have somewhat overlapping jurisdiction, with both bodies having independent authority to vary certain bylaw requirements identified under section 1 above. Applicants are free to choose whether they make application to the Regional District Board for a development variance permit, or the BOV for a "minor variance" where there is "undue hardship." Staff may advise potential applicants of the criterion they are required to meet in order to have their application successfully considered by the BOV; however, staff cannot determine if there is undue hardship or whether a variance is minor, and cannot refuse to accept a BOV application.

Only the BOV can consider applications identified under sections 2 and 3 above.

The decision-making authority of the BOV is independent and separate from the Regional District Board. No appointed or elected Regional District Board member, Advisory Planning committee members, or RDBN official can sit as a member of the BOV. RDBN staff, committees, or the Board may provide information, opinions, or recommendations to the BOV on particular applications. However, they cannot direct



the BOV on jurisdictional issues or whether an application should be granted or denied.

APPEAL OF BOV DECISIONS

The decision of the BOV on "undue hardship" cases is final. Procedural or jurisdictional matters may be challenged in a court of law, under the *Judicial Review Procedure Act*, but a challenge on the basis that a decision was not reasonable or not justified will not be considered by the Courts.

The correctness of BOV decisions on appeals regarding the Building Inspectors decision on extent of damage can be appealed to the Supreme Court of British Columbia and that decision may be further appealed to a higher court by either the applicant or the Regional District.

Recommendations

That the Regional District Board receive staff's request that each Director please nominate a candidate for the Board of Variance by December 31, 2015 so that the Board may consider Board of Variance appointments in January 2016.

BYLAW NO. 1623, 2012

A bylaw to establish a Board of Variance and its procedures

WHEREAS Section 899 (1) of the *Local Government Act* requires a local government that has adopted a zoning bylaw to establish a Board of Variance;

AND WHEREAS Section 900 (3) of the *Local Government Act* requires that the bylaw establishing a Board of Variance must set out procedures to be followed by the Board of Variance;

AND WHEREAS Section 931 of the *Local Government Act* provides that a local government may adopt a bylaw which imposes fees payable upon application to a Board of Variance;

NOW THEREFORE the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. CITATION

This bylaw may be cited as "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board of Variance Bylaw No. 1623, 2012".

2. ESTABLISHMENT

Pursuant to the *Local Government Act*, the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako hereby establishes a single Board of Variance for Areas A, B, C, D, E, F and G of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako.

3. **DEFINITIONS**

- 3.1 In this bylaw:
 - 3.1.1. "Board of Variance" means the Board of Variance established under this bylaw;
 - 3.1.2. "Chair" means the chair of the Board of Variance appointed under Section 4.4:
 - 3.1.3. "Regional District Board" means the board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako;
 - 3.1.4. "Secretary" means the secretary to the Board of Variance appointed under Section 5.1.



4. APPOINTMENT AND MEMBERSHIP

- 4.1 The Regional District Board, by resolution, shall appoint 3 members to the Board of Variance for a three year term.
- 4.2 The Regional District Board may, at its sole discretion, rescind the appointment of any member.
- 4.3 Upon the resignation, death, or removal of a member during his or her term the Regional District Board shall, by resolution, appoint a successor who shall hold office for the remainder of the term of the former member.
- 4.4 At the first Board of Variance meeting of a new year the Board of Variance shall appoint one of their members as Chair for that year by majority vote of members present.
- 4.5 If the Chair of the Board of Variance is not at a meeting the members present shall appoint one of the members present as the Chair for that meeting.

5. SECRETARY

- 5.1 The Director of Planning of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako or his or her designate shall act as the Secretary to the Board of Variance. The Secretary shall be responsible for the following:
 - 5.1.1. receiving applications to the Board of Variance;
 - 5.1.2. scheduling Board of Variance meetings in consultation with Board of Variance members;
 - 5.1.3. ensuring that notice of an application is provided as required under Section 901 of the *Local Government Act* and this bylaw;
 - 5.1.4. assisting the Board of Variance in its communication with applicants;
 - 5.1.5. providing the Board of Variance with the Planning Department's comments regarding each application to the Board of Variance;
 - 5.1.6. maintaining a record of Board of Variance decisions and ensuring that the records are available for public inspection during normal business hours.



6. APPLICATION AND APPLICATION FEE

- 6.1 All applications to the Board of Variance shall be made on the application form provided by the Secretary.
- 6.2 The application must be accompanied by plans and technical information sufficient to explain the basis for the application. This information may include, but may not be limited to, the following:
 - 6.2.1. a letter stating the grounds for the application;
 - 6.2.2. a certificate of location certified by a BC Land surveyor;
 - 6.2.3. a site plan drawn to scale;
 - 6.2.4. building elevation plans drawn to scale.
- 6.3 The Secretary may request that an applicant provide additional plans and other information where necessary to explain the basis for the application.
- 6.4 All applications shall be accompanied by an application fee in the amount identified in Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Development Procedures Bylaw No. 1422, 2007.
- 6.5 Processing and review of an application shall only proceed upon full payment of the application fee to the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako.
- 6.6 Half of the application fee may be refunded if the application is withdrawn prior to the provision of notice under Section 7 of this bylaw, or Board of Variance consideration of an application. Following the provision of notice, or Board of Variance consideration of an application, no part of the application fee shall be refunded.

7. NOTICE OF APPLICATION

- 7.1 Where notice of an application is required pursuant to Section 901 of the *Local Government Act*, the notice shall be mailed or otherwise delivered not less than 10 calendar days prior to the date of the meeting at which the Board of Variance shall consider the application to:
 - 7.1.1. the owners, as shown in the last revised assessment roll, and tenants in occupation of the land that is the subject of the application and all parcels any part of which are within 50 metres of the parcel that is the subject of the application;
 - 7.1.2. the Board of Variance members; and





7.1.3. the Director for the Electoral Area in which the land that is the subject of the application is located.

8. BOARD OF VARIANCE MEETINGS AND HEARINGS

- 8.1 Two (2) members of the Board of Variance shall be a quorum for the purpose of considering an application.
- 8.2 Upon receipt of an application the Secretary shall schedule a Board of Variance meeting for the consideration of that application.
- 8.3 The Board of Variance shall consider an application at the time and place stated in the notice under Section 7 of this bylaw.
- 8.4 The Board of Variance may adjourn the meeting from time-to-time, and may reconvene without further published notice if the time, date and place of the reconvening are announced at the tie of the adjournment.
- 8.5 Provided that notice has been given in accordance with Section 7.1 of this bylaw, the Board of Variance may decide upon the application in the absence of the applicant or any other person.
- 8.6 At a Board of Variance meeting when an application is heard the Chair shall do the following:
 - 8.6.1. provide an overview of the application and state the location of the application;
 - 8.6.2. provide the applicant, or a representative of the applicant, with the first opportunity to present information or comments relating to the application to the Board of Variance;
 - 8.6.3. provide any other person notified of the application with an opportunity to present information or comments relating to the application.

9. DECISION

- 9.1 All decisions of the Board of Variance shall be by majority vote of those members present and must be made within 7 days of a hearing for that application.
- 9.2 In the case of a tie vote the application shall be considered to be denied.





10. REPEAL

The "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board of Variance Bylaw No. 1275, 2003" and any amending bylaws thereto are hereby repealed.

REGIONAL DISTRICT OF BULKLEY-NECHAKO BOARD OF VARIANCE POLICY

February 2012

1. Policy Objective

This document is designed to provide direction to staff regarding the administration of "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board of Variance Bylaw No. 1623, 2012".

2. Appointment of Board of Variance Members

The process used to identify nominees for appointment to the Board of Variance by the Regional District Board shall be as follows.

- a. When a new Board of Variance member is required to be appointed, for up to a three year term, staff shall ask each Regional District Board member to nominate a person eligible to be appointed to the Board of Variance. Staff shall contact that person and obtain a completed nomination form (attached) from that person.
- b. The nomination form(s) for appointment to the Board of Variance shall be presented to the Regional District Board at a regular Board meeting with a staff recommendation that the Board undertake a secret ballot where each Regional District Board member identifies their top three choices for the Board of Variance.
- c. The three applicants for the Board of Variance with the most votes are considered the winners. If there is a tie for the third place a vote is held between the tied third place applicants to determine the winner of third place.
- d. The Regional District Board may then consider a motion to appoint the three winners of the secret ballot to the Board of Variance.

3. Planning Department Review and Comment on Applications

All Board of Variance applications shall be reviewed by Regional District Planning Department staff. Planning Department staff shall prepare a staff report which discusses the application and provides the following information to the Board of Variance for their consideration.

a. If approval of an application would be in conflict with a Section 219 covenant registered on title the Board of Variance shall be advised to deny the application as it does not have jurisdiction to approve the application.



- b. If the application deals with a matter that is covered in a development variance permit that has been issued for the subject property the Board of Variance shall be advised to deny the application as it does not have jurisdiction to approve the application.
- c. If the application deals with a variance that was the subject of a development variance permit refused by the Regional District Board staff shall provide the staff report(s) for the development variance permit to the Board of Variance for consideration.
- d. If the application deals with a flood plain specification under Section 910 (2) of the Local Government Act the Board of Variance shall be advised to deny the application as it does not have jurisdiction to approve the application
- e. If the application applies to a property for which an authorization for alterations is required under Part 27 of the *Local Government Act* the Board of Variance shall be advised to deny the application as it does not have jurisdiction to approve the application.
- b. If the application applies to a bylaw infraction that is the subject of enforcement action by the Regional District the Board of Variance shall be advised of the nature and history of the enforcement action for consideration.
- c. The Board of Variance shall be advised if the variance or exemption may result in the inappropriate development of the site, an adverse affect on the natural environment, a substantial affect on the use and enjoyment of adjacent land, a variance of the permitted uses and densities under the applicable bylaw, or the defeat of the intent of the applicable bylaw.

DISCUSSION:

This application was originally received in November 2014. The stated purpose of the application was to legalize the non-farm use of the property. At that time Belvedere Contracting Ltd. rented the property and was using it as a staging area for their construction business.

In January staff were informed by HBH Land Surveying that Belvedere Contracting was rethinking their application and had dismissed HBH Land Surveying as the agent for the application. The equipment was subsequently removed from the property.

Since January staff has repeatedly tried to contact the property owner for instructions on how to proceed with the application. As no response has been received it is not known if the property owner wishes to proceed with the ALR application. It is also not known whether the property owner will be making the necessary OCP amendment and rezoning application to allow the proposed use.



Staff are obliged to process the application to the RDBN Board; however, given the lack of direction and information from the property owner it is difficult for staff to evaluate the application. In staff's opinion it would not be appropriate to forward the application on to the ALC for consideration.

Section 25 (3) of the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* states that a non-farm use application may not proceed unless authorized by a local government resolution if, on the date the application is made the application requires, in order to proceed, an amendment to an official community plan or a zoning bylaw.

The land under application is zoned Highway Commercial (C2) and the proposed industrial use of the land is not permitted. Therefore, the Board may refuse to provide a local government resolution authorizing the application to the ALC.

Given the lack of information associated with the application, and the inability to contact the property owner, it is recommended that the RDBN Board not provide a local government resolution authorizing the application to the ALC. This would end the application process.

Recommendation

That the Regional District Board not authorize the submission of Agricultural Land Reserve Non-farm Use Application No. 1174 to the Agricultural Land Commission.

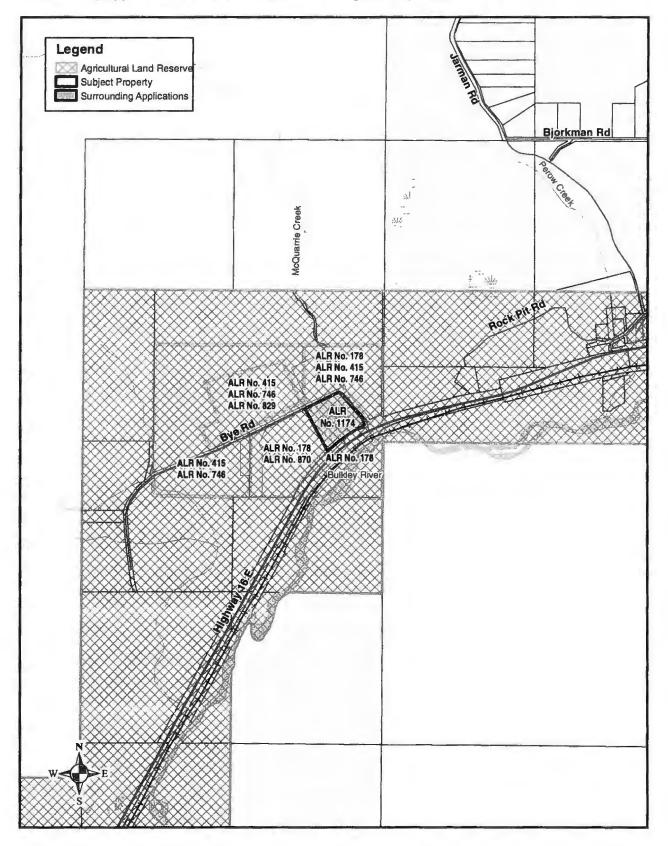








Surrounding Applications, ALR Status & Surrounding Development

Good afternoon,

I am writing to notify you that Coastal GasLink Pipeline Ltd. (Coastal GasLink) is taking steps to apply for an alternate route in the Morice River area by amending our Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC) that we received from the BC Environmental Assessment Office (EAO), and our BC Oil and Gas Commission (OGC) permit.

The proposed alternate pipeline route is located in the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako. It begins at a point approximately 35 kilometres south of Houston and runs westward, approximately parallel to our EAC route. Most of the alternate route is on the north side of the Morice River rather than the south side. It rejoins the EAC route approximately 56 kilometres from its starting point. See attached map for further reference.

The decision to submit this application follows extensive consultation with Aboriginal groups in the area who expressed a concern about pipeline construction activities south of the Morice River, and the potential effect to the underground springs that feed the River. We are now considering the feasibility of an alternate route referred to as the "Morice River North Alternate" (MRNA) route which is approximately five kilometers north of our current pipeline route. Environmental, archaeological and engineering information has been collected on the MRNA route that would support amendment applications to both the EAO and OGC. Aboriginal groups whose traditional territory may be potentially impacted by the proposed MRNA route were invited to participate in the field data collection programs and provide Traditional Ecological Knowledge.

We anticipate filing an application to amend the EAC with the EAO as early as November 2015, and applying to the OGC for approval of the MRNA route shortly after. The final route will be determined as an outcome of these regulatory processes, and once we have had the opportunity to advance construction planning and detailed engineering design taking into account cultural, environmental, commercial, and constructability considerations.

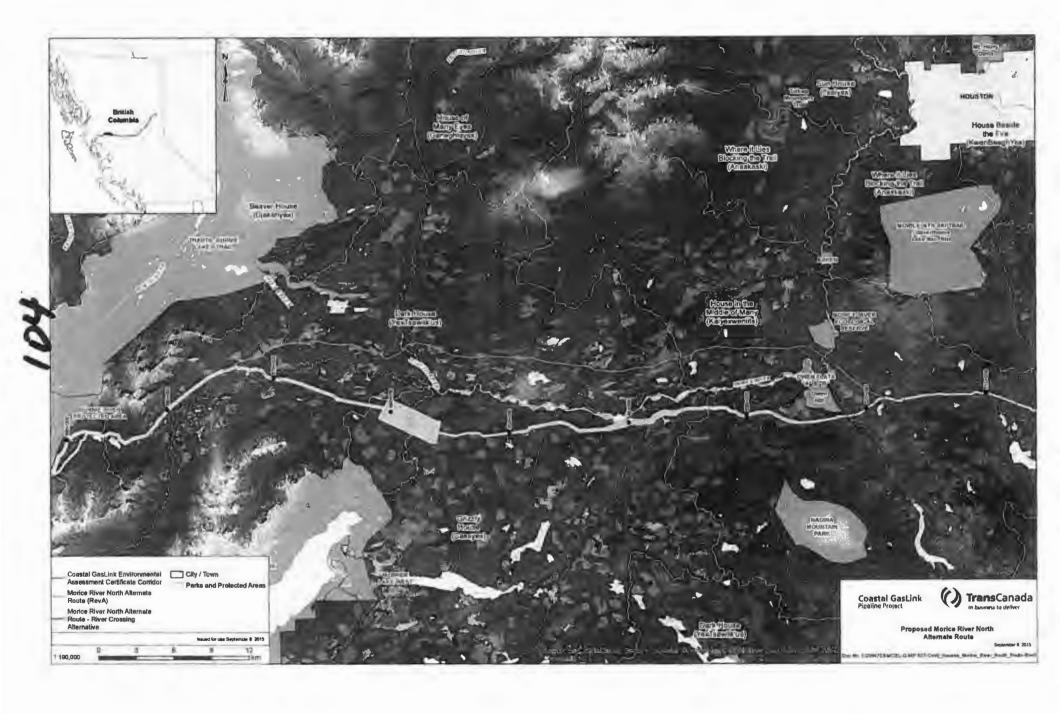

This message is to notify you that as part of the regulatory review of the Solid Fuel Burning Domestic Appliance Regulation (SFBDAR), the Ministry of Environment has released a Policy Update describing proposed changes to the SFBDAR.

Adopted in 1994, the SFBDAR is targeted at reducing air pollution from domestic wood heating. The objective of the current review and proposed revisions is to minimize impacts on human health and ecosystems by further reducing air pollution from domestic wood heating in British Columbia.

In 2009, the Ministry of Environment (the Ministry) initiated a comprehensive review of the SFBDAR to update the emission standards for wood burning appliances sold in B.C. and to deal with the issue of pollution from outdoor wood boilers. An intentions paper was released for public comment in May 2010. Following that time regulatory development was put on hold awaiting the release of new emission standards by the US Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA). The Policy Update describes the ministry's proposed approach to revising the SFBDAR taking into account the new USEPA emission standards and the feedback received on the intentions paper.

SOLID FUEL BURNING DOMESTIC APPLIANCE REGULATION

Information Update-Policy Intentions

The ministry is revising the Solid Fuel Burning Domestic Appliance Regulation (SFBDAR)

September 2015

The regulation in context

Residential wood heat is a significant source of fine particulate matter ($PM_{2.5}$) air pollution in B.C., accounting for approximately 15% of provincial $PM_{2.5}$ emissions. The wood smoke contribution to pollutant levels measured in communities is often even greater, as wood smoke emissions occur at rooftop level.

In 1994, the Solid Fuel Burning Domestic Appliance Regulation (SFBDAR) was enacted under the *Environmental Management Act* for the purpose of reducing air pollution from domestic wood heating. The regulation sets PM emission standards applicable to certain solid fuel (wood and wood pellets) burning appliances sold in B.C. The Act and regulation are administered by the Ministry of Environment (the ministry).

While the SFBDAR has been successful in ensuring that the majority of wood and pellet stoves sold in B.C. are cleaner-burning certified models, several issues have become apparent with current provisions, including:

- The regulation exempts several categories of solid fuel burning appliances, such as outdoor wood boilers (OWBs, also known as hydronic heaters), forced air furnaces and wood-fired cook stoves from meeting emission standards; and
- The emission levels referenced in the regulation no longer represent best available technology for reducing PM emissions from domestic wood heating.

Consultations on revising the SFBDAR

In 2010 the ministry released an intentions paper outlining a comprehensive approach to revising the regulation and inviting comment on the proposal. The intentions paper and a summary of public comments received can be found at the ministry's wood-burning appliance regulatory review website.

The regulatory review process was then deferred in favour of waiting to harmonize with revised wood heater standards expected to be released by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) in 2012. The revised standards were finally released in 2015.

Key Points

The revisions are intended to:

- Improve air quality in populated areas by reducing emissions of wood smoke from home heating
- Regulate the sale of wood burning appliances to ensure that only cleaner models are sold in B.C.
- Harmónize with new wood heater emission standards released by the US Environmental Protection Agency
- Establish a sunset date for the use of highemitting outdoor wood boilers

Details of the proposed revisions

1. Wood and pellet boilers

Beginning in 2016, it is proposed that only wood and pellet boilers certified to meet either the new US EPA emissions standards for boilers (Title 40, Part 60, Subpart QQQQ) or the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) B415.1 emission standards will be legal to sell in B.C. There will be a three month period during which vendors will be allowed to sell existing stock that does not meet the new standards.

In addition, the ministry proposes to limit the installation of OWBs to sites that are more than 30 metres from any property line. New OWBs will be limited to larger lots in rural areas, where impacts on neighbours are less likely. This property line setback is consistent with the approach taken in many US states. It recognizes that even cleaner burning OWBs can cause problems on smaller lots due to their short chimneys, higher emissions relative to most wood stoves, and cycling operation. Pellet or chip-fired OWBs will be allowed to be installed with only a 10 metre setback. Vendors of OWBs will be required to inform purchasers of the new installation requirements.



The ministry is also proposing to phase out the use of OWBs that do not meet either the US EPA standard, the CSA standard or qualify for the US EPA White Tag Program. Prior to the phase-out, a ten-year grace period will be in place to recognize the investment of those who may have recently installed an OWB. Thus, the use of these non-conforming OWBs will be phased out by 2026. Non-conforming OWBs that are located more than 75 metres from any property line and more than 150 metres from any school or hospital will be exempt from the phase-out.

2. Wood and pellet furnaces

Beginning in 2017, it is proposed that only wood and pellet fired forced air furnaces certified to meet either the new US EPA emissions standards for furnaces (Title 40, Part 60, Subpart QQQQ) or the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) B415.1 emission standards will be legal to sell in B.C.

3. Wood stoves, pellet stoves and other solid fuel appliances

The ministry proposes to broaden the SFBDAR definition of "appliance" to capture a broader range of devices. Beginning in 2016, wood or pellet fired appliances other than boilers or furnaces will only be legal to sell in B.C. if they are certified to meet either the new US EPA standards (Title 40, Part 60, Subpart AAA) or the CSA B415.1 standards for particulate matter emissions. There will be a three month period during which vendors of appliances will be allowed sell existing stock that does not meet the new standards.

Under the ministry's proposal, a few niche categories of solid fuel appliances will continue to be exempted from emission standards. Exempted appliances will include site-built masonry fireplaces, masonry stoves, wood cook stoves and portable camp stoves. In each case, the exempt appliances will be narrowly defined to minimize the opportunity for regulated appliances to be characterized as exempt. None of the proposed types of exempted appliances are sold or built in sufficient numbers in B.C. to be major contributors to air pollution.

4. Solid fuel

The ministry proposes to include in the regulation a definition of acceptable fuel for wood heating appliances. Acceptable fuel would include untreated seasoned wood products, pelletized fuel and fire logs. The effect of this revised definition will be to prohibit burning of undesirable fuels, such as garbage, plastics and treated wood. The use of paper and cardboard to start fires will continue to be allowed.

5. Compliance

Under the ministry's proposal, manufacturers, distributors and retailers of solid fuel appliances will not be required to conduct additional emissions testing specifically to sell in the B.C. market. Rather, they will be required to have records and appliance labelling to demonstrate that emissions testing has been undertaken and certification achieved. The labelling and record keeping requirements are similar to the current SFBDAR. In addition, vendors of OWBs will be responsible for maintaining records showing that they have informed purchasers of OWB installation and phase-out requirements.

The path forward

The ministry proposes to revise the regulation as outlined in this information update. The target date for completion of the revisions is spring 2016.

Potential Increased Costs for Building Official Qualifications

Oct. 14, 2015

The Province is alerting local governments to potential increased costs, starting in the 2016 fiscal year, resulting from the new mandatory qualifications for building officials in the *Building Act*.

There are presently no provincially mandated qualifications for building officials, despite the fact that some building officials may have obtained voluntary certification through the Building Officials' Association of BC (BOABC). Under the *Building Act*, building officials will have to be qualified, meaning they will have to:

- become members of a prescribed professional association (the Province expects this to be the BOABC);
- pass exams that correspond to the level at which they work;
- undertake continuing professional development annually; and
- be listed on the registry of qualified building officials.

The Province expects to delegate administration of building official qualifications to the BOABC.

There will be an overall transition period of four years for building officials to meet the new qualifications. Once the applicable sections of the Building Act come into force, building officials will have six months from the date the requirements take effect to join the BOABC and start the qualification process. They will then have an additional three-and-a-half years to meet the exam requirements.

If the building officials local governments employ are not already certified by the BOABC, these new requirements may result in increased costs for them. The Province anticipates the four-year transition period for the qualification requirements will start in 2016, so there may be a budget impact as early as

next year.

Costs will be both one time and annual. The effects on local governments will vary, depending on whether:

- they pay the fees for BOABC membership for the building officials they employ;
- the building officials they employ have already successfully passed any BOABC exams (building officials will not have to rewrite any exams they have already successfully passed through BOABC's voluntary certification program; however, if they are at Level 1, depending on their responsibilities, they may need to pass additional exams);
- they pay the training and exam costs for the building officials they employ who have not yet successfully passed the required exams; and
- they pay the costs of building officials' continuing professional development.

BOABC has provided an estimate of the one-time and annual costs, based on the assumption that the Province will delegate administration of the qualifications to the BOABC.

The Province has noted that members of the Municipal Insurance Association of British Columbia may be able to access funds available through its Risk Management Grant Program to assist in implementing mandatory qualifications for building officials (i.e., in meeting one-time costs). Applications for this funding must satisfy the criteria of the Risk Management Grant Program and will be assessed on a case-by-case basis. Please contact the Municipal Insurance Association for more information.

The Building and Safety Standards Branch will be providing more information about the qualification requirements closer to the time the applicable sections of the *Act* come into force—anticipated to be early in 2016.

INTRODUCTION:

This report is regarding an unsightly premises in Electoral Area C at 6535 Woods Road (Lot B, District Lot 1659, Range 5, Coast District, Plan PRP13148).



THE SITUATION:

The subject property, shown on the map above, contained a large accumulation of materials that includes derelict vehicles, equipment, snowmobiles, vehicle parts, tires, containers and tanks which hold unknown liquids, etc. The property owners have done a substantial amount of clean-up on their property to date, and continued efforts are expected. The majority of the derelict vehicles, snowmobiles, and equipment have been removed. The Regulation Compliance Officer recently spoke with the property owner, and she indicated that her son has been conducting clean-up efforts whenever his time permits, as he works 6 days a week in camp. They will be continuing with clean-up efforts as long as conditions allow. She noted that their property becomes very wet during the

spring and fall which makes work with heavy equipment difficult. Regional District staff are happy with the efforts that have been shown thus far, and are working with the property owners to ensure future clean-up is continued.

Thank you for your correspondence of July 28* regarding UBCM's member visits. I appreciate your interest in UBCM's outreach activities to its membership.

I am aware that UBCM's Executive Director, Gary MacIsaac, spoke with you about our approach upon receipt of your letter. However, I would like to take this opportunity to further outline UBCM's approach to member visits.

UBCM seeks to visit approximately twenty-five (25) percent of its membership each year, so that each member receives a visit every four (4) years. While not every member is visited exactly every four years due in part to member staff vacations or geographical challenges, UBCM makes every possible effort to adhere to this rotational cycle.

UBCM deploys two-person staff teams to meet primarily with chief administrative officers and accompanying senior staff. The visits provide an invaluable opportunity to hear about key community issues and challenges, share information on UBCM's priorities, work and programs, and solicit feedback on our organizational effectiveness. We have received largely positive feedback on this approach from our members, as the information collected helps ensure that we have another means of keeping abreast of community issues. In turn, UBCM has found member feedback to be beneficial in shaping our policy work, improving our programs, and informing our advocacy efforts.

Staff have informed me that the Bulkley Nechako region was visited in 2013. Our records indicate that member visits took place with the following local governments at that time: Vanderhoof, Fort St. James, Fraser Lake, Burns Lake, Granisle, Houston, Telkwa, Smithers and the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako. As such, the region can expect another visit in 2017.

Good afternoon,

I am writing to notify you that Coastal GasLink Pipeline Ltd. (Coastal GasLink) is taking steps to apply for an alternate route in the Morice River area by amending our Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC) that we received from the BC Environmental Assessment Office (EAO), and our BC Oil and Gas Commission (OGC) permit.

The proposed alternate pipeline route is located in the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako. It begins at a point approximately 35 kilometres south of Houston and runs westward, approximately parallel to our EAC route. Most of the alternate route is on the north side of the Morice River rather than the south side. It rejoins the EAC route approximately 56 kilometres from its starting point. See attached map for further reference.

The decision to submit this application follows extensive consultation with Aboriginal groups in the area who expressed a concern about pipeline construction activities south of the Morice River, and the potential effect to the underground springs that feed the River. We are now considering the feasibility of an alternate route referred to as the "Morice River North Alternate" (MRNA) route which is approximately five kilometers north of our current pipeline route. Environmental, archaeological and engineering information has been collected on the MRNA route that would support amendment applications to both the EAO and OGC. Aboriginal groups whose traditional territory may be potentially impacted by the proposed MRNA route were invited to participate in the field data collection programs and provide Traditional Ecological Knowledge.

We anticipate filing an application to amend the EAC with the EAO as early as November 2015, and applying to the OGC for approval of the MRNA route shortly after. The final route will be determined as an outcome of these regulatory processes, and once we have had the opportunity to advance construction planning and detailed engineering design taking into account cultural, environmental, commercial, and constructability considerations.

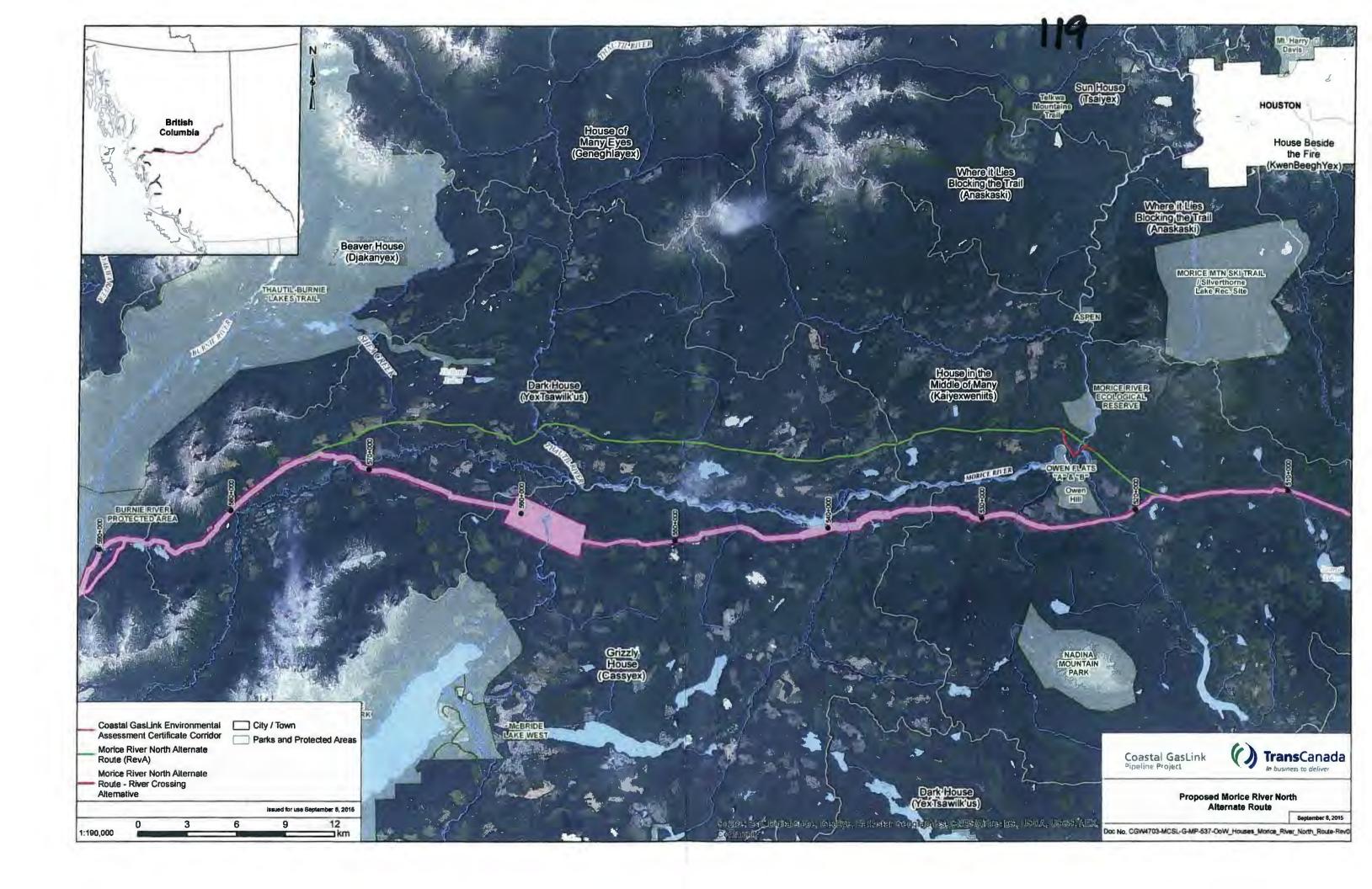

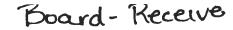

Re: Provincial Climate Leadership Plan Process

At its July 31, 2015 regular meeting, the Greater Vancouver Regional District Board of Directors adopted the following resolution:

That the GVRD Board:

- a) Send a letter to the Minister of Environment conveying the four foundational policies identified by Metro Vancouver staff in consultation with member municipalities, as input during the 30 day comment period on the discussion papers associated with the Provincial Climate Leadership Plan;
- b) Direct staff to report back in September 2015 with a detailed list of policy recommendations for the Climate Leodership Plan process; and
- c) Share with all regional districts in British Columbia a copy of the letter sent to the Minister of Environment under part a), along with the report titled "Provincial Climate Leadership Plan Process", dated June 30, 2015, and its attachment titled "The Climate Action Plan in Metro Vancouver: Quantifying the Effect of British Columbian Climate Policy on Metro Vancouver's Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Other Air Emissions", dated September 17, 2010.

Metro Vancouver and its member municipalities have been leaders and key partners in implementation of the BC Climate Action Plan that was adopted by the Provincial government in 2008. Correspondingly, we anticipate that the region's 2.45 million residents, nearly 150,000 businesses, and 23 member jurisdictions will play a key role in achieving the goals of the new BC Climate Leadership Plan. If paired with the proper resources, the BC Climate Leadership Plan (CLP) can build on the successes to date and scale-up climate action to significantly reduce greenhouse gases and better enable Metro Vancouver and the Province to prepare for the locked-in impacts of climate change.

Based on policy analysis conducted by Jaccard and Associates in 2010, as well as more recent consultations with Metro Vancouver member municipalities, Metro Vancouver has identified four policy areas that are foundational to reaching provincial and regional GHG reduction targets:

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- 1. Widespread adoption of low/zero carbon vehicles.
- 2. Transition to net-zero-carbon new buildings and near net zero carbon existing buildings.
- 3. Support for local government actions to reduce and shorten vehicular trips and increase trips by walking, cycling, and transit.
- 4. **Carbon pricing** to create a market signal to stimulate adoption of low carbon technologies and practices.

Actions in these areas are complementary and should be implemented simultaneously in order to maximize greenhouse gas (GHG) reductions. Further details are provided in the attached staff report to the GVRD Board (Attachment 1) and the report by Jaccard and Associates (Attachment 2).

In addition to the GHG reduction policies and actions, Metro Vancouver supports the inclusion of objectives and approaches in the CLP that help prepare the region for the impacts of climate change including sea level rise, extreme precipitation events (e.g. flooding and droughts), heat related impacts (e.g. air quality, heat related health impacts) and others.

Effective implementation of the foundational actions described above will require enhanced funding and authority for local governments including:

- Expanded funding mechanisms for transportation infrastructure and other climate actions,
- Delegation of greater authority to local governments to regulate building performance including enabling building energy benchmarking, and
- Changes to legislation designed to allow local governments to extend support to businesses in achieving GHG reduction goals.

In support of the four foundational GHG reduction policies as well as climate adaptation actions, Metro Vancouver staff will send a subsequent letter with a more detailed list of technical policy recommendations that align with existing Metro Vancouver plans and policies.

Metro Vancouver looks forward to future opportunities to provide feedback in the CLP process and to working closely with the Province on the successful implementation of the CLP in the years to come. Dear Community Advisory Members:

I am writing you today to thank you for your ongoing participation in the Northern Gateway Community Advisory Board process. I can assure you that our project proponents remain committed to Northern Gateway and building this critical Canadian infrastructure. However, a construction timeline is not the critical driver of our current focus. Rather, our priority right now is building trust, engaging in respectful dialogue and building meaningful partnerships with First Nations, Métis and local communities.

Although much of that work happens outside the public eye and without media attention, I also want to take this opportunity to inform you that the judicial review of the National Energy Board's Joint Review Panel will begin October 1, 2015 in the Federal Court of Appeal in Vancouver. Unlike most of our work over the last year, we expect these proceedings to generate significant media attention.

Out of respect for the court process we will not be commenting on the specifics of this proceeding, but I can let you know that we expect a judicial decision by early 2016. We remain committed to sharing information with you as CAB members and will provide a further update during the October CAB meetings.



Despite this litigation, we remain committed to working collaboratively with the applicant First Nations and would be very pleased to develop mutually beneficial solutions with them. I believe it's important to note here that Northern Gateway accepts and recognizes the traditional land use rights and practices of First Nations and Métis peoples. As I mentioned earlier, our ongoing priority is to continue to build trust and meaningful partnerships with First Nations, Métis and local communities. We know we have more work to do in this regard.

As you are aware, we are also continuing to work towards meeting the conditions set by the Joint Review Panel and the BC government.

On behalf of John Carruthers, President of Northern Gateway, and our entire team, I want to thank you again for your continued support.

At the same time, we know it's important to keep the cost of electricity as competitive as possible. Our rates are among the lowest in all of North America, and the 10-year Rates Plan introduced in 2013 will help us keep them low. We also want to support your efforts to save energy and we will continue to offer customers tools, incentives and information to manage energy costs.

We can't do this alone. Your advice and support of our operations help us ensure that the electrical system is there to serve you and your community every day.

From 100 Mile House to Fort Nelson, Haida Gwaii to Pouce Coupe and Atlin to McBride and out to Bella Coola, we are partners working to serve B.C. communities.

SITE C MOVES FORWARD

BC Hydro is building a new dam in Northeastern B.C. which will provide our customers with the most affordable and reliable clean power for over 100 years.

The Site C Clean Energy Project will be the third dam and hydroelectric generating station on the Peace River, located about seven kilometres southwest of Fort St. John. It will provide 1,100 megawatts of capacity and produce about 5,100 gigawatt hours of electricity each year — enough energy to power more than 450,000 homes per year.

B.C.'s population and economy are growing and the demand for power is expected to increase by 40 per cent over the next 20 years. Construction on the dam and generating station, which has undergone a thorough and independent multi-year environmental assessment process, began in July and will create approximately 10,000 direct person-years of employment throughout the construction period. Construction of the project is expected to be completed in 2024.

Like BC Hydro's other large hydroelectric facilities, the cost advantages of Site C will grow over time, resulting in significant benefits to customers, compared to alternatives. That's because after an upfront capital cost, Site C will have low operating costs for more than 100 years which will result in lower costs to our customers over time.

KEEPING OUR SYSTEM SEISMICALLY SECURE

BC Hydro's dams have been operating safely for decades but the need to assess new information never ends. That's why the findings of a six-year seismic hazard assessment of the entire province released in late 2014 are so important to BC Hydro's Dam Safety program.

Working with international experts, the BC Hydro study confirms that in the Peace and Columbia regions of the province, where we have most of our generating assets, the risk of potential damage to our facilities due to an earthquake has generally remained the same or decreased.

In some circumstances, the expected level of shaking in a high-magnitude earthquake hasn't changed, but the duration of shaking could be longer, which increases the hazard. For example, ground shaking on Vancouver Island and areas of Bridge River could be more severe during a major earthquake.

Looking ahead, the study will help us calculate seismic hazards at existing facilities and for new capital projects. It will also help us prioritize upgrades to our facilities.

BC Hydro has a long-term plan to help reduce the potential downstream risks to people, property and infrastructure in the event of a major earthquake and will invest approximately \$1.9 billion in dam safety and seismic upgrades over the next 10 years. In addition, major seismic upgrades are also part of the redevelopment of the John Hart Generating Station.

BC Hydro is prioritizing its capital investments to help address increased hazards identified on Vancouver Island and at Bridge River, as well as undertaking new public education and awareness campaigns in Campbell River, Jordan River and other parts of the province. This includes working very closely with local governments, First Nations and emergency responders in these communities.

BC Hydro is also completing a multi-year seismic assessment to better understand risks and vulnerabilities within its transmission and distribution system in the event of a major earthquake, particularly on Vancouver Island and the South Coast.

A number of investments have already been made to address these concerns. This includes the Vancouver City Central Transmission project for a new substation in Mt. Pleasant and underground transmission lines, and initiatives on Vancouver Island for a major cable project between George Tripp and Horsey substations, and new substations at South Wellington and Buckley Bay.

REGIONAL STORIES AND CAPITAL PROJECTS

Snowstorm in Kitimat/Terrace

Record amounts of snow fell over a 36-hour period in the Kitimat and Terrace areas in early February. BC Hydro and contractor line and vegetation crews from Hazelton, Smithers, Prince George and Williams Lake joined local crews to restore power in an area that stretched from Kitimat to Stewart. Kitamaat Village, a First Nations community about 12 kilometres by road from Kitimat, was hit particularly hard and lost its power on the night of February 5.

BC Hydro crews battled over 150 cm of snow and dangerous road conditions to repair broken poles and downed wires. Restoration was complicated by the fact that the area is remote and forested, and trees continued to fall on the power lines. Trees were also falling on the road into Kitamaat Village, making the clearing of deep snow more difficult. Additional snow plowing support came from the District of Kitimat and the local road contractor and by February 8, power was restored to the last of the customers in Kitamaat.

In May, the Haisla Nation presented BC Hydro employees with a mask to recognize the work crews did to restore power to Kitamaat Village. The mask was presented by Haisla Nation Regional Stories Chief Councillor Ellis Ross and created by Haisla member Garry Wilson. The mask is displayed in BC Hydro's Terrace office.

Capital Projects Update at WAC Bennett Dam

Several capital projects continue to move forward to completion at the GM Shrum Generating Station and the WAC Bennett Dam near Hudson's Hope. The spillway chute upgrades started in 2014 and will wrap up in 2015. Damaged sections of the concrete surface have been removed and replaced. Pre-implementation work continues for the Rip-rap Upgrade Project – large rock protecting the upstream face of the dam from wind and wave erosion will be replaced in the coming years. The next step in the project is to obtain approval from the BC Utilities Commission.

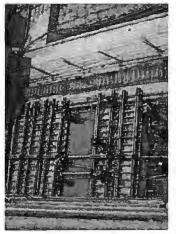
In the powerhouse, the Unit 1 to 5 Turbine Replacement project is nearing completion. All five new turbines are in place and the last unit will be returned to service this summer. The Units 1 to 4 Rotor Pole Rehabilitation project is also nearing completion.

Unit 5 was added to the project and the sequence and timing of the work on the units was done in step with the turbine replacement project to minimize the amount of time that the units are out of service.

Boat Ramps

More redeveloped boat ramps were opened and ready for use in the past year. The Alexander Mackenzie's Landing boat launch improvements include new upper and lower concrete ramps allowing use down to elevation 658 metres. Farther north on the Williston Reservoir at Dunlevy, the new ramp in Butler Ridge Provincial Park is much improved. The ramp extends further than previously, down to elevation 660.75 metres with larger parking and turn-around areas. Both projects were built by Duz Cho Construction. Adding to the Taylor and Dinosaur sites, BC Hydro has completed four ramps in recent years that are free for recreational use.

WAC Bennett Dam and Peace Canyon Visitor Centres

Modernized, using best-in-class design and exhibits, the new WAC Bennett Dam Visitor Centre is already attracting visitors from all over the world. The bright space tells the story of power generation, energy conservation and remembers the aboriginal and non-aboriginal people who lived on the land prior to dam construction and the filling of the Williston Reservoir. A downstairs theatre with elevator access and a cafeteria add to the experience as well as all-new outdoor exhibits made from re-purposed materials collected from recent GM Shrum Generating Station upgrade projects. Next year, the Aboriginal Gallery will be unveiled to complete the Visitor Centre project.

Peace Canyon Dam has moved its Visitor Centre outdoors! A new viewing platform, overlooking the dam and generating station has been built. Interpretive signage will be installed on the platform for the 2016 visitor season. The site is accessed by a well-signed side road off of the main driveway to the dam.

2015 BC Hydro Safety Rodeo in Prince George

The sun was shining and everyone was in a great mood at the 2015 BC Hydro Safety Rodeo on June 6. Over 900 people attended, enjoying the competitions, demonstrations, exhibits, and family-friendly activities throughout the day. This year, the event was held for the first time in Prince George at the new District Office.

Each year, the safety-themed event is open to BC Hydro employees, their families and BC Hydro affiliates. Over 70 employees from across the province competed in the power line technician (PLT), forklift, driving and first aid competitions. The top performing PLT teams and individuals will represent BC Hydro at the Annual International Lineman's Rodeo on October 17, in Bonner Springs, Kansas.

RELIABILITY PERFORMANCE

BC Hydro recognizes how important the reliable supply of electricity is to our customers. We will continue to improve, reinforce and maintain the electrical system.

In Fiscal 2015, the BC Hydro average interruption duration per customer was 2.97 hours compared to 2.30 hours in Fiscal 2014. The average number of interruptions per customer in Fiscal 2015 was 1.72 compared to 1.56 in Fiscal 2014.

These statistics also include interruptions due to planned outages.

SUPPORTING COMMUNITIES

VEGETATION MANAGEMENT

BC Hydro's distribution system is complex and highly efficient, with nearly 77,000 kilometres of overhead distribution and transmission power lines throughout the province. BC Hydro's Vegetation Management program manages a \$50 million annual budget that helps to provide safe, reliable power to our customers. Every two to five years, BC Hydro audits the overhead lines to identify vegetation issues, such as trees situated close to power lines, and dead, dying or diseased trees that could fall on power lines. Vegetation Management contractors then prune or remove trees and vegetation in areas where the distribution power lines may be impacted. When an area of distribution experiences reliability issues, Vegetation Management assesses the local power lines for potential tree-related causes. Even with a proactive management program, trees account for about 20 per cent of all power interruptions.

COMMUNITY REGREENING PROGRAM

BC Hydro and Tree Canada Foundation partner on the Community ReGreening Program and work directly with communities around the province to support tree planting in urban areas. The annual program helps restore and retain green space and encourages low-growing vegetation near power lines which helps BC Hydro maintain a safe and reliable distribution system. Community projects that meet the Community ReGreening Program criteria can receive up to \$10,000. Applications for funding in the next fiscal year need to be received by BC Hydro or Tree Canada before January 31, 2016. www.bchydro.com/regreening

BC Hydro is allowing decorative wraps to be installed on padmounted equipment. Eligible requesting parties include: municipal governments, strata councils, property managers, and established community groups (i.e. Business Improvement Associations, Kinsmen, Lions or Rotary Clubs, Neighbourhood Association) or businesses (established for five years or longer). FISH & WILDLIFE COMPENSATION PROGRAM

The Fish & Wildlife Compensation Program (FWCP) is a partnership between BC Hydro, the Province of B.C., Fisheries and Oceans Canada, First Nations, and public stakeholders, operating in the Coastal, Columbia, and Peace regions of the province. The program was initiated in 1988 to support projects that conserve and enhance fish and wildlife and their supporting habitats in areas impacted by existing BC Hydro dams. The FWCP Peace Region has four sub regions: Finlay, Peace, Parsnip and Dinosaur.

Project selection and guidance is the responsibility of the FWCP-Peace Board which is made up of representatives from the Program partners to ensure regional decision-making. Through the FWCP, BC Hydro invests nearly \$1.5 million each year in the FWCP-Peace Region in support of conservation and restoration

of fish, wildlife and their habitats. More than \$25 million has been invested by BC Hydro through the FWCP in the Peace Region since 1995.

Projects that will be supported this year include: improving the scientific information available on mercury levels in fish in Williston and Dinosaur reservoirs; identifying potential fish barriers that could be removed to improve access to fish habitat; and enhancing survival of caribou calves within the Klinse-Za, Scott, Kennedy, and Burnt Pine caribou herd areas.

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Wildfire Prevention Funding & Resources

Oct. 14, 2015

Following another damaging wildfire season in B.C., a number of new and renewed resources—funding and workshops—are available to local governments and First Nations seeking to better protect their communities.

- A \$10 million "top-up" to the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative (SWPI) was announced by the Premier at the
 recent UBCM Convention. Grants will continue to be available for First Nations and local governments to prepare
 Community Wildfire Protection Plans and fuel management prescriptions, and to undertake operational fuel treatment
 projects. 2016 program materials will be available in December.
- The 2016 SWPI FireSmart Grant program, announced last month, is a new funding stream within SWPI. This program supports groups of residents to take the lead in planning for for wildfire safety on their own properties. Local governments and First Nations may apply for up to \$10,000 each to take steps towards achieving FireSmart Community Recognition status. The application deadline is November 30, 2015.
- The Premier also advised UBCM delegates that the Ministry of Forests, Lands & Natural Resource Operations is
 developing a Forest Enhancement Program "to undertake salvage harvesting of dead timber, wildfire risk reduction
 and fuel management operations, and to enhance reforestation efforts and wildlife habitat restoration in stands
 severely impacted by wildfires and mountain pine beetle". The program will be operational is 2016-17.
- The last of six regional Local FireSmart Representative Workshops will take place in Burnaby on November 17 & 18.
 Aimed at emergency preparedness and wildfire prevention staff from First Nations and local governments in the Coastal Fire Centre, this workshop will provide participants with the knowledge, skills and tools to help protect their communities from wildland-urban interface fires and will prepare participants to assist their communities in the FireSmart Canada Community Recognition Program.
- The First Nations' Emergency Services Society (FNESS) has secured federal funds for an On-Reserve Fuel Reduction Treatment program. Applications from First Nations are being accepted until October 23, 2015.
- FNESS will also be delivering a series of six Regional Wildfire Prevention Workshops beginning in November 2015 and continuing until February 2016. Sessions are planned for Kamloops, Cranbrook, Williams Lake, Smithers, Vancouver and Fort St. John.

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2016 Asset Management Planning Grants

Sept. 30, 2015

A 2016 round of grant funding for the Asset Management Planning program has been confirmed. The intent of the program is to assist local governments in delivering sustainable services by extending and deepening asset management practices within their organizations.

Matching grants of up to \$10,000.00 are available to support activities that advance a local government's asset management planning or practices, and facilitate better integration of asset management planning with long term financial planning.

A maximum of 50 grants will be awarded, with priority given to applications that demonstrate cost-effective progress in asset management policy and/or practice and to applicants that have not previously received funding through the Asset Management Planning program.

Applications must be received by November 13, 2015. Full program information is available on the UBCM website.

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AGLG Legislative Amendments Introduced

Sept. 30, 2015

Bill 36 – Auditor General for Local Government Amendment Act was introduced in the Legislature on September 28th, 2015.

The provincial government signalled that legislative amendments would be introduced during the fall session when the report from the Independent Review was released in the spring.

In announcing the introduction of this Bill the Province stated it is intended to do the following:

- · Clarify the terms and conditions of employment for the AGLG;
- Strengthen the audit council's authority to review and monitor the performance of the AGLG;
- Enhance the minister's authority to review the AGLG Act and the functioning of the office; and,
- Require that the AGLG consult with the Union of British Columbia Municipalities prior to developing the performance audit program.

In brief, the proposed amendments include:

- Removing the requirement that the AGLG be authorized to be an auditor of a company under Section 205 of the Business Corporations Act but making this a requirement for the Deputy AGLG.
- A requirement that a AGLG appointment must now be made under the Public Service Act.
- Provision that upon recommendation of the Minister of Community Sport and Cultural Development, the Lieutenant Governnor in Council may, with or without cause, order that the AGLG be suspended, with or without remuneration, or removed.
- A statement that in making the above recommendation the Minister will consider a recommendation, if any, by the Audit Council. The words "if any" were not included in the original AGLG Act.
- Provision that the AGLG may provide information to a law enforcement agency if they believe an offence has been committed.
- Additional option for the Audit Council to secure support resources. Currently the AGLG Act provides that ministry staff resources may be provided to assist the Audit Council. The amendments add the option for the Audit Council to retain persons for this purpose (subject to approval of the Deputy Minister).
- · Opportunities for the Audit Council to review and provide comment on the AGLG office's budget and programs.
- Provision that before preparing an Annual Service Plan, the AGLG must consult with UBCM respecting themes on which some or all audits must be based.
- Requirement that the Minister must begin a review of the Act five years after the Act has been in force.

UBCM will monitor this legislation as it proceeds through the Legislature. We will be particularly interested in the sections of the legislation that impact the Audit Council as we see the independence of this Council as very important.

In August UBCM released a report titled *Auditor General for Local Government: Perspectives on Operations,* that summarized the findings of the UBCM survey of audited communities. Prior to Convention UBCM followed up and presented our findings to the Minister and to the Audit Council.



At the 2015 UBCM Convention the following resolution was adopted:

"That UBCM call on the Province to eliminate the Auditor General for Local Government due to the fact that the requirements of such an office are already met under existing local government legislation and regulations."

Also at Convention, Minister Fassbender announced the appointment of Mr. Gordon Ruth, the new AGLG and his intention to add two additional positions (with local government experience) to the Audit Council.

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New FireSmart Grant Program Launched

Sept. 30, 2015

A new funding stream within the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative will assist communities to develop or advance local planning efforts to mitigate risk from wildfire on private lands in the wildland urban interface. Fifty grants of up to \$10,000 each will be made available to local governments and First Nations under the 2016 SWPI FireSmart Grant program.

The funding will support residents to undertake FireSmart planning activities, as identified through the FireSmart Communities Program provided by Partners in Protection. FireSmart Communities is designed to encourage self- organized groups of residents to take the lead in implementing solutions for wildfire safety on their own properties.

First Nations and individual neighbourhoods or subdivisions within local governments that are in areas prone to wildfire can earn FireSmart Community Recognition status by meeting the criteria set by Partners in Protection.

The intent of the 2016 SWPI FireSmart grant program is to enable First Nations or resident or community groups within a local government to take the required actions in order to achieve and/or maintain FireSmart Community Recognition status from Partners in Protection.

The Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative (SWPI) is a suite of funding programs managed through the Provincial Fuel Management Working Group — including the First Nations' Emergency Services Society, Ministry of Forests, Lands & Natural Resource Operations and the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM).

Since 2004, SWPI has provided funding for Community Wildfire Protection Plans and updates, fuel management prescriptions, pilot/demonstration projects and operational fuel treatments. The 2016 SWPI FireSmart Grant program has been developed as a new funding stream within SWPI.

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FCM's CIPP Program: A New Way Forward

Sept. 30, 2015

Through partnerships, First Nations and local governments have the potential to share scarce resources, reduce costs, and generate positive social and economic outcomes. FCM's Community Infrastructure Partnership (CIPP) Program provides opportunities for First Nations and local governments to work together, for the benefit of all.

The award-winning CIPP program encourages participants to imagine a new way forward. It supports capacity building and provides tools to strengthen partnerships and develop lasting service agreements. Since its 2010 launch, CIPP has:

- Hosted training workshops for over 100 First Nations and neighbouring municipalities.
- Facilitated historic meetings that resulted in friendship or communication agreements.
- Supported service agreement creation particularly on water, but also waste, fire, and transit.

Interested communities have the opportunity to take advantage of the following services, at no cost:

- Regional workshops on relationship building and service agreements.
- National webinars on pricing, governance and CIPP resources.
- · Volunteer and peer mentors including engineers and facilitators.
- Online Toolkit, templates, case studies, and sample agreements.

The next Regional Workshop will take place in Nanaimo, BC on October 5th 2015. Contact Karen Miller at FCM if you would like to receive a copy of the workshop report.

CIPP is funded by Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada and implemented by the Federation of Canadian Municipalities.

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UBCM Appointment Sought to Real Estate Foundation of BC

Sept. 30, 2015

UBCM is currently looking to appoint a local elected official to the Board of Governors of the Real Estate Foundation of BC (REFBC) as a result of an Order in Council passed on June 8, 2015.

The Real Estate Foundation of BC was established in 1985 as a provincially legislated nonprofit corporation that provides grants and other forms for funding to non-profit organizations whose projects aim to improve land use and/or real estate practices in the province of BC. The Foundation's mission is to transform land use attitudes and practices to make BC communities better and stronger. As the Foundation marks over 25 years of grant making, it must continue to adapt to global economic uncertainty and stay attuned to the changing needs of BC communities – both urban and rural.

The board meets quarterly, over 2 days, with the next meeting scheduled for December 17 and December 18, with a premeeting Governors' dinner scheduled for the evening of December 16th. Subsequent meeting dates and locations are:

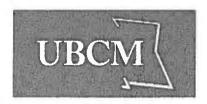

NDP Government Would Focus on Partnership

Sept. 24, 2015

NDP leader John Horgan told UBCM delegates today that a New Democrat government would focus on partnership with communities and among provincial parties.

Mr. Horgan said that a government under his leadership would ensure that mental health services are consistent across the province. Horgan also committed the NDP to scrapping the Auditor General for Local Government and re-allocating its budgetary commitments to other priorities, such as mental health or funding resource communities. Horgan also acknowledged the need for new solutions to improve housing affordability in B.C., and pledged to make more Crown land available to communities for social housing.

Referencing the high turnover among Ministers for local government that has occurred over the past decade, Horgan also said that an NDP government would provide greater stability for B.C. communities.

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Delegates Endorse Resolution to Eliminate AGLG

Sept. 24, 2015

UBCM members endorsed a resolution calling for the government to eliminate the Office of the Auditor General for Local Government (AGLG) on Thursday morning.

Resolution B85: Office of Auditor General for Local Government was endorsed by 54.5 percent through an electronic vote. The resolution, brought forward by the District of North Saanich, was subject to considerable debate by the membership.

Councillor Catherine Lord from the City of Vernon told delegates that she supported the motion based on her community's experience as an audit community that had worked with the AGLG. Ms. Lord noted that audit process "took a considerable amount of time" but provided "a minimal end result."

Township of Esquimalt Councillor Beth Burton-Krahn spoke against the resolution light of the qualifications of the new Auditor General for Local Government, Mr. Gordon Ruth, announced by the Province yesterday. "There is a new Minister and new [AGLG] leadership and should be given another chance."

Mayor Bruce Milne of Sechelt, whose local government has been audited by the AGLG, also spoke against the motion. "No one can read the reports released thus far and not see the value in outlining best practices and recommendations based on actual findings," said Milne. "Claiming we do not need audits of our spending puts us in the same category as the Canadian Senate or the UK House of Lords. Our communities deserve better. They want us to be open and transparent."

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Let's Prosper Together Says Green Leader

Sept. 24, 2015

Adam Olsen used much of his final speech to UBCM as Interim Green Party Leader to encourage delegates to embrace relations with their neighbouring First Nations communities.

Connecting senior staff and elected officials from our respective communities will result in enduring and resilient relationships, said the Tsartlip band member and former District of Central Saanich councillor. "Only by working together will both prosper."

Olsen indicated that the Green's support for natural resource development differs from the current government's approach. "Frankly, our province is falling behind," he warned. "Stop hollowing out our province and start investing in it," he said.

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Liability and Risk Management for Elected Officials

Sept. 24, 2015

Presenters from the Municipal Insurance Association of B.C. described the risks and consequences of local government liability exposure and offered valuable advice on how elected officials can to avoid placing themselves, their boards and councils in these circumstances.

Settlement costs from liability and property claims are just the tip of the iceberg, as legal costs, lost time, and high stress are also inevitable when misstatements or misbehaviour are alleged. Claims may be denied or settled, but in both cases the process of discovery and trial can take years and damage personal health and reputations.

The presentation provided legal definitions of negligent misrepresentation, defamation and misfeasance and many examples of how these situations arise. "Every time elected officials speak to members of the public, there is some financial interest or outcome at stake," said Lindsay Nilsson, MIABC director of Claims and Legal Services. Conversations can become the basis of claims if something is said or written that is proved in law to have caused the party to suffer a loss.

Prevention is definitely better than cure. Avoiding claims is possible with a few best practices: Learn to identify the risk; do not give answers without being 100% certain; use "invariable practice" of qualifying answers; refer decision making to your council/board; record the exchange.

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Municipal Issues Driving Federal Election

Sept. 23, 2015

Federation Canadian Municipalities president Raymond Louie, no stranger to the UBCM, was warmly received by Convention delegates on Wednesday afternoon. The Vancouver councillor and former Lower Mainland Local Government Association executive member delivered the FCM address emphasizing the federal election.

He congratulated UBCM's strong leadership and boasted that B.C. has the most innovative municipalities in the country.

This election, he said, presents a vital opportunity to move the municipal agenda forward in Canada. Louie is leading the FCM's federal election efforts, Roadmap for Election 2015, which includes websites, a Party Platform Tracker and an Election Toolkit. With BC as a key election battleground this time around, he said, "we need to be active, we need to be united, and we need to be ready."

Local government issues are resonating on the campaign trail, he reported. All four major federal party leaders have named municipalities as vital partners they are keen to work with. Louie asked for delegates to help promote the #cdnmuni commitment to candidates, letting them know that voters are looking for federal support for local communities, to create jobs, build the economy and protect the environment.

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Proposed Changes to Fire Services Act Would Download New Costs to RDs

Sept. 23, 2015

A resolution endorsed during Wednesday's session draws attention to the potential cost and capacity impacts to regional districts that will result if proposed changes to the *Fire Services Act* move forward. The changes under consideration would require regional districts to enforce the *Fire Services Act* in unincorporated areas, adding significantly to local government costs to deliver this service.

Resolution A3: *Provincial Responsibility for Fire Services Act and Regulations* requests that the province provide the necessary resources to inspect and enforce provincial safety regulations including the *Fire Services Act* rather than pursuing options to download the responsibility for inspections and enforcement of provincial regulations on local governments.

Chair Al Richmond, UBCM First Vice-President said, "While our members are supportive of the need to amend the *Fire Services Act* to close the gap to ensure that the same level of protection is provided in all areas of the province, our concerns are with the process which the province is proposing which will download the inspection and enforcement requirements to local governments."

The resolution, submitted by Squamish-Lillooet Regional District and endorsed by the Southern Interior Local Government Association, was also supported by six similar resolutions from Bulkley-Nechako Regional District, East Kootenay Regional District, Thompson-Nicola Regional District, Cowichan Valley Regional District, Comox Valley Regional District and Cariboo Regional District.

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Decisions Arising from the September 23, 2015 Resolutions Session

Sept. 23, 2015

The following is a summary of the resolutions and positions adopted during the Wednesday policy session at the 2015 Convention. The full and exact wording of any amendments will appear in the Convention Minutes.

Section A

A1 Allocation of New Building Canada Fund Endorsed as Amended

Therefore be it resolved that UBCM call on the Province to allocate **a minimum of** 60% of the Building Canada Fund directly to local government.

A2 Mental Health and Addiction Services and Resources Endorsed with Amendment as Proposed

Therefore be it resolved that the provincial government be called upon to develop a long-term, multi-faceted strategy to help people suffering from mental health and addiction issues including integrated health and psychiatric care, criminal justice reform, and access to affordable housing, as a matter of priority within the BC health care system;

And be it further resolved that UBCM call on the provincial government to ensure that the level of resourcing and facilities for providing mental health and addiction services are increased throughout the province to allow for improved access and treatment for those suffering from mental health issues, including addictions.

- A3 Provincial Responsibility for *Fire Services Act* and Regulations *Endorsed*
- A4 Resourcing Local Governments for Oil and Hazardous and Noxious Substances Emergency Planning Response Endorsed with Amendment as Proposed

Therefore be it resolved that UBCM call on the provincial and federal governments to expand the scope of oil and hazardous and noxious substances (HNS) risk assessment and response planning to include all impacts and consequences on local communities and governments, and introduce additional funding for the resources and locally-specific capacity building required to ensure that local governments are in the best possible position to plan for and protect communities and the environment in the event of fires, explosions, spills and related incidents as a result of increasing transportation of oil and HNS;

And be it further resolved that UBCM and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities call upon the federal government to develop a comprehensive emergency response plan and procedure for hazardous and noxious substance spill related emergencies that includes due recognition of and compensation for the role of local government emergency response services.

A5 Environmental Bill of Rights Endorsed



Section B1

The recommendations of the Resolutions Committee for the Section B – Part 1 resolutions were introduced as a block. This includes resolutions B1 to B51.

A motion, duly moved and seconded, to remove the following resolutions from the Section B – Part 1 block and admit them for individual debate, was endorsed.

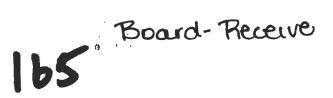

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Update from Emergency Management BC

Sept. 23, 2015

This morning, Pat Quealey, Assistant Deputy Minister, Emergency Management BC, told delegates that while "all emergencies are local" the province is continuing to build their emergency response capabilities.

With a focus on unity of effort and purpose, Mr. Quealey walked delegates through the activities of Emergency Management BC and their focus on integrated response. This included recent staffing additions and the status of their 3-year planning efforts to develop a decision-making framework for immediate response, sustained response and recovery planning.

To provide context, Mr. Quealey reviewed scenario modeling for Metro Vancouver and the Capital Regional District estimating numbers of fatalities and injured or displaced citizens. The message was clear: in the case of a catastrophic earthquake, communications will be disrupted, critical infrastructure will be severely impacted, and the supply of food, water and aid may be limited for months.

Emergency Management BC continues "to prepare for the worst" and will be testing their planning efforts to date through a coastal response exercise in Port Alberni in June 2016. The exercise is being coordinated with local governments, First Nations and other agencies to test and inform the decision-based plans that are in place.

Mr. Quealey finished his presentation with a focus on notification, alerting and public education and spoke to EMBC plans to increase their ability to connect directly to citizens in the case of a tsunami alert and other emergency situations. Mr. Quealey identified that the Province intends to develop a Local Government Engagement Strategy, as well as enhanced support for First Nation communities.

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Are our Water Systems at Risk?

Sept. 23, 2015

The findings of the B.C. Water and Wastewater Association/Urban Systems report were presented to a full house by John Weninger, BCWWA Chair of Infrastructure Management at a clinic Wednesday. The session's attendance clearly signified the importance of the issue of financial sustainability of water and wastewater systems for local governments in BC.

Released last February, the report *Are Our Water Systems At Risk?* looked at 162 local governments' audited financial statements and a selection of community asset management plans. It assessed how financially well-positioned BC municipalities are to sustain their water and wastewater infrastructure at a time when many systems are in need of renewal and replacement.

The report identified several key findings, including that water and wastewater fees are not covering the full cost of service delivery in many communities and that many local governments are vulnerable, as they have not set aside sufficient reserve savings to buffer unexpected changes.

The report estimates that at least \$13 billion of additional investment will be required to renew and replace water and wastewater infrastructure in B.C.

Mr. Weninger pointed to communities' reliance on provincial and federal grant funding, a lack of asset management planning, deferrals of maintenance investments, urban sprawl, and a perception of a lack of public support for paying the full cost of the system as obstacles to local governments being well positioned to address water and wastewater system needs.

Mr. Weninger suggested that local governments address financial impact of aging water and wastewater infrastructure by adjusting water and wastewater rates to cover the full cost of the services; develop an integrated asset management process; rank water and wastewater renewal as a top priority; adopt 'smart growth principles' and foster collaboration among all levels of government to support communities to become fiscally self-reliant.

Mr. Weninger concluded the clinic by saying, "renewal should be a top priority for this generation but also for generations to follow."

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New Auditor General for Local Government Announced

Sept. 23, 2015

On Wednesday, Minister Peter Fassbender announced that Gordon Ruth has been appointed as the next Auditor General for Local Government.

Gordon Ruth, FCPA, FCGA is currently the executive vice president of certification and operations for the Chartered Professional Accountants of BC. Ruth was also the chief executive officer for the Certified General Accountants of BC and has held several positions in the public sector. He spent 15 years with the Greater Vancouver Regional District (now Metro Vancouver), ultimately as the chief financial officer. His appointment is effective October 1, 2015.

The Minister also indicated that additional appointments to the Audit Council at the AGLG are forthcoming. The new appointees will both bring local government experience to their role with the Council.

In the balance of his address, Minister Fassbender committed to additional dialogue with UBCM and local government regarding the Building Canada Fund; encouraged delegates to engage in the new Promote Your Community to the World program; and reiterated his commitment to work with mayors on the future of TransLink.

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President's Address Focuses on Provincial Relationship

Sept. 23, 2015

In an address Wednesday, UBCM President Sav Dhaliwal commended the Province for areas where collaborative work with local government was producing results while also encouraging the government to do better in matters of consultation.

Councillor Dhaliwal acknowledged Provincial engagement on a wide range of issues, including proposed new guidelines for election expenses; consultation on a land spill response framework; funding support for the Community program and small water systems; and the renewal of an MOU between UBCM and the Ministry of Aboriginal Relations and Reconciliation that was signed Monday.

Dhaliwal indicated a need for greater transparency by the Province with regard to the local government share of the New Building Canada Fund. The President also invited closer consultation with UBCM on proposed legislative changes to the office of the Auditor General for Local Government. In the resolutions session following the speech, delegates endorsed Resolution A1 calling on the province to allocate 60% of New Building Canada Funding to infrastructure owned by local government.

Councillor Dhaliwal also reiterated UBCM's commitment to the *Strong Fiscal Futures Report*, which provides a framework to renew local government finance in B.C. Delegates unanimously endorsed this report at the 2013 UBCM Convention. Dhaliwal also praised the Federation of Canadian Municipalities for their election readiness strategy.

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Update on the Auditor General for Local Government

Sep 22, 2015

On Tuesday, delegates were informed of changes that are underway related to the governance and operations of the office of the Auditor General for Local Government (AGLG).

Jacquie Dawes, Deputy Minister for the Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development told delegates that the Province of B.C. remains committed to the work of the AGLG office: "We feel [the office] is now operating as it should and serving the interests of taxpayers." Ms. Dawes affirmed that UBCM's report from earlier this year would help to inform where the office will go in the future.

The Acting Auditor General for Local Government, Arn van Iersel, outlined changes that have already been implemented in the office in response to the recommendations from an independent review and the report by UBCM. Mr. van Iersel indicated that further training of staff has been undertaken and that UBCM has been approached to provide further suggestions for upgraded training.

Mr. van Iersel also said the office would scale back the number of audit and perspective reports published annually. The AGLG office will also dedicate their own staff to undertake all fieldwork and gradually reduce the use of external contractors. Audit topics that are currently under consideration by the office include water systems and human resources.

Audit Council member Tim Wood told delegates that he believed "performance auditing is a fundamental means of protecting democracy" since it helps to build public confidence and trust in government. Mr. Wood also indicated that the Audit Council wants to build on the positive momentum that van Iersel has generated in the AGLG over the past six months.

Mayor Wayne Baldwin voiced appreciation for work that has been undertaken to date. Mayor Baldwin, who is also a member of the UBCM Executive, expressed concern that as yet consultation on proposed legislative changes to the office had not taken place with UBCM. The province announced that legislation would likely be introduced in the fall legislative session this year. Mr. Baldwin also noted that Minister Fassbender has been engaged with this file since his recent appointment, and expressed hope that better collaboration will result at the direction of the Minister.

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Coordinating Policing and Mental Health Care Interventions

Sep 22, 2015

Delegates at today's Large Urban Communities Forum heard success stories from the front lines of mental health and policing. A collaborative approach between police and health care and social workers is diverting psychiatric emergency calls to special team units, reducing hospital intakes and helping match clients to the services they most need.

Corporal Taylor Quee, with the Police Mental Health Intervention Unit, described the kinds of mental health crises that police respond to every day. Often severely addicted or mentally ill clients will call 9-1-1, receive emergency services and/or extended hospital care, be discharged, and then repeat the process a day, a week or a month later.

Breaking this "cycle of crisis" is the goal of the collaboration between Fraser Health and the Surrey RCMP. A similar program is under way between Northern Health and the Prince George RCMP.

Brian Jackson, a psychiatric nurse and manager of Fraser Health's Assertive Community Treatment Team, explained how a cooperative approach between agencies can better help frequent users of hospital and police services receive appropriate care. "The key to success is engagement, outreach and a multi-disciplinary team approach," he said.

Using a Housing-First model, caregivers patiently cultivate trust and extend this to emergency response workers, sharing client files and identifying diagnoses and patterns of behaviour. By coordinating with psychiatric nurses and social outreach workers, repeat clients are identified and can be responded to appropriately.

This effort has resulted in a 58% reduction in emergency department visits, and an 80% reduction in hospital admissions, for psychiatric reasons in Surrey.

The model has many benefits, including saving money, reducing ER congestion, freeing up police resources, decreasing homelessness and improving quality of life for clients. It can also avoid ineffective responses, which can result in higher risk situations for police, care practitioners, the public and the individuals in crisis.

A better informed, "softer touch" response from police provides clients with the least intrusive resolution to emergency situations while providing a high standard of care. The model can be adapted to any size of community, according to Quee.

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Sparking Action for FireSmart Communities

Sep 22, 2015

This morning's 'Sparking Action for FireSmart Communities' clinic identified 2015 as part of the current trend of increasingly active and damaging fire seasons and provided delegates with important information on how to build wildfire-resilient communities.

This year's wildfire season started early in BC and has seen more than 1,800 fires, including 24 interface fires of notes. Nearly 300,000 hectares have burned to date this year. Although comparable to the 2014 season, more fires occurred in the south of the province and more structures were destroyed this year.

Clinic panellists included BC Wildlife Service's Lyle Gawalko and FireSmart Canada's Kelly Johnston who provided a vividly clear message: FireSmart communities can reduce wildfire risks and decrease community and personal losses from wildfires.

"We'll always have wildfires," said Gawalko, "because we have lightening, and we have forests and grasslands." Climate change and the Mountain pine beetle are contributing causes, but so is increasing development in the wildland-urban interface, where the forest meets the community.

Specific examples of successful FireSmart actions were provided by the Anarchist Mountain community's FireSmart Coordinator Denis Thomson and District of Logan Lake Mayor Robin Smith. They demonstrated how activities at the local government level and by community members can reduce wildfire risk on their own properties and neighbourhoods.

The District of Logan Lake, a small community completely surrounded by forests, developed the first Community Wildfire Protection Plan in the province. For the next ten years they worked their plan to the fullest, said Mayor Smith.

The clinic highlighted the resources available to support local governments, First Nations and community and resident groups to become FireSmart. This includes funding under the existing Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative and the newly announced 2016 SWPI FireSmart Grant Program. All program and application materials are available on UBCM's website.

The new program seeks to dramatically increase the number of FireSmart-recognized communities in B.C. There are 15 certified communities in Canada, while 1,500 U.S. communities have been certified under the similar FireWise program.

"Everyone is responsible for wildfire prevention," said Johnston. "We need to encourage private home owners and land owners to take responsibility for reducing their risk."

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Provincial Review of Biosolids Storage, Use Underway

Sep 22, 2015

A Tuesday morning clinic heard an update from the Ministry of Environment (MoE) concerning a scientific review that may lead to regulatory changes concerning the use of biosolids. Recommendations arising from the review are slated for release in December of this year.

Chris Ord, from the MoE Environmental Standards Branch, outlined the benefits of using biosolids (sludge from wastewater operations that has been treated to reduce odour and contaminants), including tailings reclamation and enhancing soil. At present in B.C., 60% of our biosolids are used to rehabilitate mining sites, 20% are used in forestry and 20% for agricultural purposes. Utilizing biosolids rather than disposing of them in landfills also reduces the amount of greenhouse gas produced by B.C. landfills.

While biosolids contain trace amounts of harmful substances, MoE staff informed delegates that the risk of using biosolids for agricultural purposes is negligible provided they are used in accordance with existing standards and regulations. Potential contaminants include triclosan (commonly found in detergent), pharmaceuticals and metals. Although some efforts are underway, MoE staff acknowledged that further steps to reduce source contaminants are needed.

Delegates from several communities questioned MoE staff on the issue of odour, and the need for tougher standards on odour control. Metro Vancouver staff also described the use of biosolids within their area and the practice of shipping biosolids to other parts of the province, such as mining operations or ranching operations, where there is a need for the resource.

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Funding Announced for Safe Drinking Water

Sep 22, 2015

Following a commitment made at last year's Convention, Health Minister Terry Lake today announced \$500,000 in funding for the BC Water & Waste Association to help communities address small water systems challenges.

The Ministry plans to work the association to support communities that rely on small water systems and ultimately reduce health risks and boil water advisories. In addition, workshops, webinars and supports to improve local governance and stability are expected to follow in 2016.

UBCM has provided recommendations to the province regarding small water systems and today's announcement responds to some of these recommendations.

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UBCM Renews MOU with MARR

Sep 21, 2015

The 2015 UBCM pre-conference workshop "Moving Forward with First Nations" focused on agreements and partnerships. To open the session, John Rustad, Minister of Aboriginal Relations & Reconciliation; UBCM President Sav Dhaliwal, and First Nations Relations Committee Chair Murry Krause formally renewed the MOU on Local Government Participation in the New Relationship with First Nations.

The MOU is a three-year agreement that recognizes local governments as a unique interest in negotiations with First Nations, and acknowledges local governments as respected advisors to the Province. It also represents a joint commitment by both parties to ongoing consultation and information sharing.

"This agreement ensures fulsome engagement and dialogue as we continue to walk this path together", commented President Dhaliwal, as he addressed the over 200 delegates in attendance at the session.

MOU implementation will be a topic of discussion at an upcoming MARR/UBCM Joint Staff Working Group meeting.

The text of the MOU is the following:

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) replaces three previously signed MOUs and two supporting Protocol Agreements which dealt with local government participation in treaty negotiations and other activities under the Province's New Relationship with First Nations, and reflects the spirit and intent of those commitments.

THE PARTIES:

The parties to this MOU are:

- The Province of British Columbia (the Province) as represented by the Ministry of Aboriginal Relations and Reconciliation (MARR); and
- The Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) representing all municipalities and regional districts of British Columbia, as well as several post-treaty First Nations.

WHEREAS:

The Parties agree that court decisions have resulted in changes to the way the Crown consults with First Nations with respect to decisions made by the Crown that have the potential to impact Aboriginal rights and title.

The Parties acknowledge that the Province and B.C. First Nations organizations are working together to develop new government-to-government relationships to improve the process of decision-making as it relates to land, resources, social, and economic development.

The Parties recognize that local government jurisdictions may be affected by the negotiation of land, resource and economic development agreements with First Nations. The Parties accept that local government constitutes a unique and special



interest in the negotiation of a range of agreements with First Nations including modern treaties and non-treaty land, resource and economic development arrangements.

The Parties acknowledge that local governments endeavour to develop positive working relationships with First Nations neighbours, fostering relationships built on the principles of honesty and respect. This MOU encourages local governments and First Nations to communicate and inform each other about matters of mutual interest.

THEREFORE:

This MOU reflects the development of the relationship between the Parties in response to the evolution of the treaty process and progress made since the New Relationship vision document was developed in 2005, as well as subsequent legal developments. It defines a renewed commitment by the Parties to:

- continue a process for local government participation in the negotiation and implementation of treaties;
- consult and exchange information with local governments on other agreements outside the B.C. treaty process; and
- · consult on matters of mutual interest including those matters that will impact local government jurisdiction.

TOPICS

The Province will share information, consider local government interests and seek advice on matters affecting local government jurisdiction including but not limited to the following:

- · Land management and land use planning
- Land selection
- · Dispute resolution
- Property taxation
- · Environmental assessment and protection
- · Local government access to resources for public purposes and access to adjacent lands
- · Servicing arrangements
- Regulatory arrangements
- Governmental relations
- Economic development
- Reconciliation efforts and initiatives

CONSULTATION AND INFORMATION SHARING PRINCIPLES

The Parties agree to the following principles governing consultation and information sharing:

- flexibility for local government to identify and represent their interests in a way that they consider appropriate to their local circumstances;
- early notice to local government of a matter that may affect local government jurisdiction;
- sufficient information early on and reasonable time for local government to document their interests and views and to provide advice to provincial negotiators and/or provincial representatives;
- · due consideration of local government interests, views and advice;
- · a response from provincial negotiators/representatives on how local government advice was used; and
- ongoing information exchange between the Province and local government.

DEFINITIONS

The following definitions cover the types of agreements referred to in this MOU:



Treaty: a comprehensive agreement negotiated among B.C., Canada and a First Nation under the B.C. Treaty Commission process that is a full and formal expression of reconciliation between First Nations and the Crown.

Treaty Related Measure (TRM): a temporary arrangement negotiated by B.C., Canada and a First Nation at a negotiation table that is tied directly to treaty topics under negotiation. They are cost-shared between Canada and the Province.

Incremental Treaty Agreement (ITA): a legally-binding, longer term arrangement negotiated at a treaty negotiation table.

An ITA permits the parties to conclude agreements on topics typically addressed under treaty negotiations and to implement the agreement in advance of a final treaty.

Other Agreements: refers to social, land, resource or economic development agreements negotiated between a First Nation and the Province outside the B.C. treaty process that have the potential to impact local government.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES RESPECTING TREATY NEGOTIATIONS, TREATY-RELATED MEASURES, INCREMENTAL TREATY AGREEMENTS, AND TREATY INTERIM MEASURES

The Province

Structure: The Chief Negotiator leads the provincial negotiating team in all aspects of the negotiations and provides direction to all team members.

Information: Provincial negotiators will, in a timely manner, provide their local government representative with table-specific agendas, work plans, documents for discussion and other relevant information.

Consultation: Provincial negotiators will consult and exchange information in a timely manner with potentially impacted local governments on issues considered important by either the Province or the local government, according to the consultation principles stated in this MOU.

Side Tables: Where the local government and First Nation agree, the provincial negotiators will undertake to establish a side table or working group for local government and the First Nation to negotiate and come to agreement on issues related to the future local government-First Nation relationship. The provincial negotiators will give full and fair consideration to results produced and agreements reached by these tables.

Low Activity Tables: Where the level of activity at a treaty table is low, the provincial negotiators will keep local government representatives informed of any developments at the table through regular information updates and exchanges.

Local Government

Role: Local government representatives are members and respected advisors on provincial treaty negotiation teams until a negotiation is concluded and the treaty takes effect.

Treaty Implementation: Prior to the effective date, local government and the Province will discuss local government involvement in treaty implementation and make every effort to come to an agreement that identifies the significant issues of interest to local government and how local government will be involved/informed during the implementation of these issues.

On the effective date, the First Nation and neighbouring local governments will deal directly with each other.

Local governments and the First Nation will work together to develop and build their relationship.

Attendance: Local government representatives will have the opportunity to attend treaty-related discussions and negotiations including main tables, side tables, working groups and bilateral meetings.



Interests: Local government representatives are responsible for defining and representing their interests in matters related to negotiations and for sharing these interests and other relevant information with the provincial negotiating team.

Providing advice: Local government representatives will engage in discussions and contribute advice on all matters concerning the future local government-First Nation relationship, including engagement on overall treaty process changes.

Structure: Within the area defined by a First Nation's Statement of Intent, local governments will collectively determine how they will be organized to participate in a negotiation – e.g. as an alternate local government structure – and will advise the appropriate provincial negotiator of their chosen structure as well as the primary contact(s).

Involvement: Based on their interests and the level of activity at the specific treaty table, local governments may determine the level to which they wish to be involved ranging from receiving information to participation at meetings and providing advice.

Confidentiality: Participating local government representatives are subject to any and all confidentiality rules and practices that apply to a negotiation. They may, after consultation with the lead provincial negotiator, share confidential information with their respective councils and regional district boards, other local governments, and with UBCM on an in-camera basis.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES RESPECTING OTHER AGREEMENTS

The Province

The Province will initiate contact with a local government when:

- an agreement with a First Nation on a matter relating to land, resources or economic development will be negotiated;
- the outcome of negotiations will affect the local government's jurisdiction, operations or provision of services.

The Province will consult and exchange information in a timely manner with the local government according to the consultation and information sharing principles stated in this MOU.

The Province and the local government will jointly determine the level of the local government's involvement ranging from receiving information to participation at meetings and providing advice.

Local Government

Local governments will serve as respected advisors to the Province in negotiations that affect their interests.

Based on their interests and the level of activity of a negotiation, local governments and the Province will jointly determine the level of involvement ranging from receiving information to participation at meetings and providing advice.

Local governments are responsible for defining and sharing their interests and other relevant information with the Province, and will advise the Province how their interests may be addressed.

Local government representatives are subject to any and all confidentiality rules and practices that apply to a negotiation. They may, after consultation with the Province, share confidential information with their respective councils and regional district boards, other local governments, or local government structures, and with UBCM on an in-camera basis.

COMMUNICATION BETWEEN THE PROVINCE AND THE UBCM

The Province will share information with UBCM and/or a body designated by the UBCM on the Province's approaches to the development of non-treaty initiatives under the New Relationship. The Parties will work together on identifying the



appropriate avenues for this information sharing to ensure clear, and full understanding of the processes and activities underway.

The Province will provide UBCM with:

- a list of all concluded agreements with First Nations updated semi-annually; and
- a current list of provincial government contacts updated semi-annually.

UBCM will monitor the progress of provincial notification and consultation with local governments on relevant agreements with First Nations.

REVIEW

This MOU will be reviewed three years from the date of signing unless the Parties jointly agree to an earlier review.

Filling the Leadership Void in Marijuana Regulation

Sep 21, 2015

With the increasing divergence between marijuana laws and public behaviour, some local governments have begun to take matters into their own hands. Whether recent efforts to develop legal frameworks to regulate retail pot shops will prove successful, there is little doubt that the activity remains illegal.

Reviewing the issue's legal context, Tony Wilson of Boughton Law Corporation reminded delegates that the possession and sale of marijuana remains prohibited in Canada and only the federal government can amend the Criminal Code to change this. Only lawful medical marijuana may be obtained, only with a doctor's prescription from a licensed provider, and only if delivered by mail through Canada Post.

He compared the proliferation of retail marijuana dispensaries in Vancouver and elsewhere to Mahatma Ghandi's Salt Tax protests in the 1930s, calling them a brilliant campaign of civil disobedience and spin doctoring.

Faced with an explosion in the number of dispensaries, and the absence of Health Canada in the mitigating the resulting problems, local governments have had little choice but to engage the issue with its myriad health, safety and bylaw issues.

Provincial Health Officer Dr. Perry Kendall described the range of impacts of psychoactive substances, from beneficial to chronically damaging. Relative to other controlled substances, including alcohol, marijuana's impacts are demonstrably benign, he observed. Is marijuana illegal because it is bad, or is it bad simply because it is illegal, he wondered aloud.

Kendall presented the research on the "paradox of prohibition" that indicates health and social problems increase under regimes of both prohibition and free-market availability. A carefully regulated market can provide the maximum benefits with minimum of negative consequences, he said, meeting the public health objective.

Vancouver Cllr Kerry Jang described the rigorous research, analysis, and modelling that resulted in that city's decision to regulate cannabis dispensaries. "When there is a problem on the streets, we have to do something about it," said Clr. Jang.

The process to obtain a business license permitting the retail sale of marijuana will be arduous but fair, address numerous civic policy objectives, and likely result in a dramatic decrease in the number of commercial locations engaged in the business.

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Age-friendly Grant Program Continues

Sep 21, 2015

The Ministry of Health has confirmed a contribution of \$0.5 million to UBCM's Seniors' Housing & Support Initiative for additional grants under the Age-friendly Community Planning & Projects program.

The 2016 Age-friendly Community Planning & Project program is intended to assist local governments in BC to best support aging populations, develop and implement policies and plans and/or develop projects that enable seniors to age in place and facilitate the creation of age-friendly communities.

A maximum of 25 grants of up to \$20,000.00 are available to local governments in BC for community planning initiatives or community projects.

The application deadline is October 30, 2015 and applicants will be notified of the status of their application by December 11, 2015. Program and application materials are available on the UBCM website.

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Natural Resource Permitting Project

Sep 21, 2015

Over the years, UBCM members have called for a more coordinated and timely approach for referrals and approvals of permits and licences. The good news is that message has been heard. Visit the BC government's booth at UBCM, and learn more about the Natural Resource Permitting Project (NRPP).

Now in year 2 of its 7-year mandate, the NRPP is being delivered by the Natural Resource Transformation Secretariat to provide better access to information online and improve the way decisions are made in the natural resource sector.

The project will integrate data, legislation, people and processes across the six natural resource ministries and various agencies, boards and commissions. This will enable timely access to consistent information people need to complete an online application for a variety of authorizations in the natural resource sector – from a hunting permit to a licence to cut trees. It ensures that the permitting process will be streamlined, while maintaining the rigorous standards and stewardship that citizens of this Province expect.

The first release of the pre-application online service is set to launch Fall 2015 through its Natural Resource Sector Online Services (NRSOS) website. For more information, read the NRPP overview and watch the NRSOS demo video.

UBCM's Community Economic Development Committee is looking forward to learning more about the NRPP in early 2016, when ministry staff is expected to meet with UBCM to provide an overview of the Project.

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New FireSmart Grant Program Launched

Sep 16, 2015

A new funding stream within the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative will assist communities to develop or advance local planning efforts to mitigate risk from wildfire on private lands in the wildland urban interface. Fifty grants of up to \$10,000 each will be made available to local governments and First Nations under the 2016 SWPI FireSmart Grant program.

The funding will support residents to undertake FireSmart planning activities, as identified through the FireSmart Communities Program provided by Partners in Protection. FireSmart Communities is designed to encourage self- organized groups of residents to take the lead in implementing solutions for wildfire safety on their own properties.

First Nations and individual neighbourhoods or subdivisions within local governments that are in areas prone to wildfire can earn FireSmart Community Recognition status by meeting the criteria set by Partners in Protection.

The intent of the 2016 SWPI FireSmart grant program is to enable First Nations or resident or community groups within a local government to take the required actions in order to achieve and/or maintain FireSmart Community Recognition status from Partners in Protection.

The Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative (SWPI) is a suite of funding programs managed through the Provincial Fuel Management Working Group — including the First Nations' Emergency Services Society, Ministry of Forests, Lands & Natural Resource Operations and the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM).

Since 2004, SWPI has provided funding for Community Wildfire Protection Plans and updates, fuel management prescriptions, pilot/demonstration projects and operational fuel treatments. The 2016 SWPI FireSmart Grant program has been developed as a new funding stream within SWPI.

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2016 Asset Management Planning Grants

Sep 16, 2015

A 2016 round of grant funding for the Asset Management Planning program has been confirmed.

The intent of the program is to assist local governments in delivering sustainable services by extending and deepening asset management practices within their organizations.

Matching grants of up to \$10,000.00 are available to support activities that advance a local government's asset management planning or practices, and facilitate better integration of asset management planning with long term financial planning.

A maximum of 50 grants will be awarded, with priority given to applications that demonstrate cost-effective progress in asset management policy and/or practice and to applicants that have not previously received funding through the Asset Management Planning program.

Applications must be received by November 13, 2015. Full program information is available on the UBCM website.

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

1) That the Regional District hereby amends the boundaries of the Vanderhoof Rural Fire Protection Service Area by including the following properties:

SW 1/4 OF SEC 33 TP 2 R4C EXC THE MOST SLY & THE MOST WLY 25 M IN PARL WIDTH

- and that the resulting boundaries of the Vanderhoof Rural Fire Protection Service Area are as shown on Schedule "A";

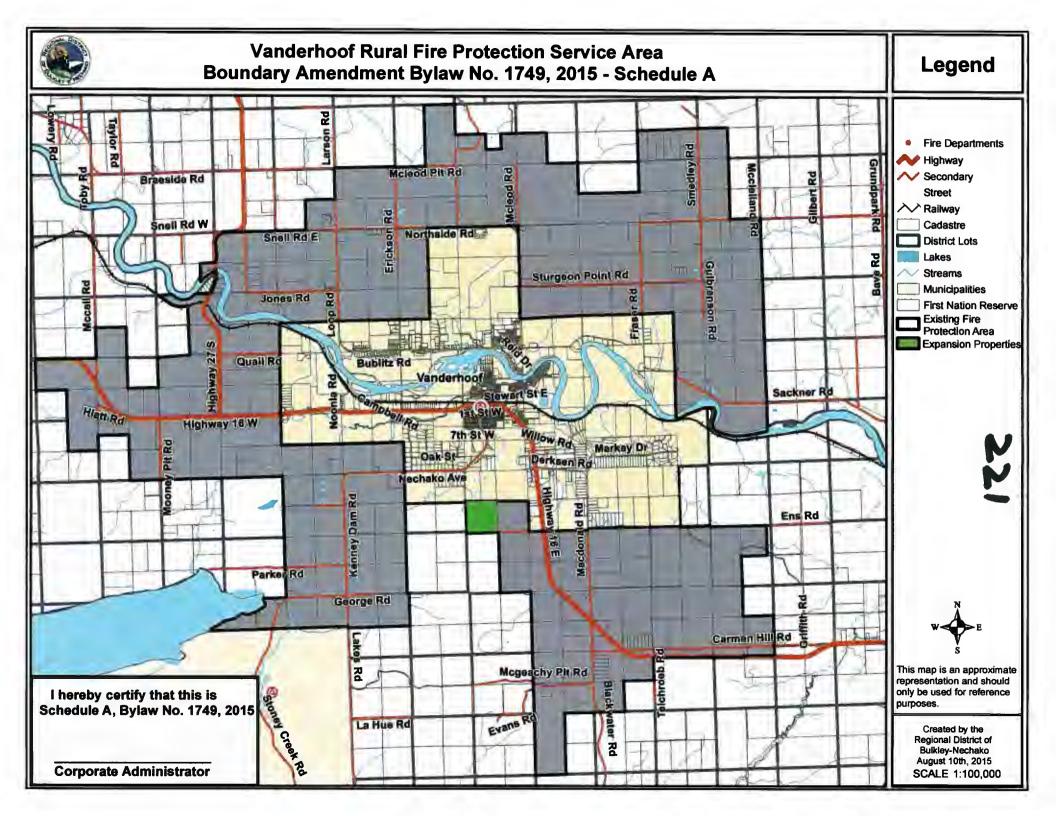

BYLAW NO. 1750

Being a bylaw to establish a service within the boundaries of the District of Fort St. James and a portion of Electoral Area "C" (Fort St. James Rural) to provide transportation services for senior citizens in the Fort St. James Area.

WHEREAS:

A. Under Section 796 of the *Local Government Act* a Regional District may operate any service the Board considers necessary or desirable for all or part of the Regional District;

- B. The Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako wishes to establish a service for the purpose of providing transportation services for senior citizens in the Fort St. James Area;
- C. The approval of the Inspector of Municipalities has been obtained under Section 801 of the *Local Government Act*;
- D. The approval of the electors of a portion of Electoral Area "C" (Fort St. James Rural) has been obtained under Section 801.3 of the *Local Government Act* and Section 86 (2) of the *Community Charter* and consent on behalf of the electors in the District of Fort St. James has been obtained under Section 801.4 of the *Local Government Act*.

NOW THEREFORE the Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

1) Service

The Regional District hereby establishes, within the boundaries of the District of Fort St. James and a portion of Electoral Area "C" (Fort St. James Rural) as shown on Schedule "A" attached, a service for the purpose of providing transportation services for senior citizens in the Fort St. James Area.

2) Boundaries

The boundaries of the service area are the boundaries of the District of Fort St. James and a portion of Electoral Area "C" (Fort St. James Rural) in the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (the "Service Area") as shown on Schedule "A" attached.

Bylaw No. 1750

3) Participating Area

The "Participating Areas" are the District of Fort St. James and Electoral Area "C" (Fort St. James Rural).

4) <u>Cost Recovery</u>

As provided in Section 803 of the *Local Government Act*, the annual cost of providing the Service shall be recovered by one or more of the following:

- a) Property value taxes imposed in accordance with Division 4.3 of Part 24 of the *Local Government Act*:
- b) Fees and charges imposed under Section 363 of the *Local Government Act*;
- c) Revenues received by way of agreement, enterprise, gift, grant or otherwise;
- d) Revenues raised by other means authorized by the *Local Government Act*.

5) <u>Maximum Requisition</u>

The maximum amount that may be requisitioned annually for the costs of this service shall be \$35,000 (THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS).

6) Apportionment of Costs

The costs of the service shall be apportioned among the Participating Areas on the basis of the converted value of land and improvements in the Service Area.

6) Citation

This Bylaw may be cited for all purposes as the "Fort St. James Seniors Transit Service Establishment Bylaw No. 1750, 2015."
