He noted that there is excellent information in the report in regard to future seniors housing needs in the community.
Climate Action Conference -Vancouver	Director Beach attended a Climate Action Conference in Vancouver and noted that it was a good event and had provided good information to the attendees.
Village of Burns Lake Change of Meetings	Director Beach informed the Regional Board that the Village of Burns Lake for the past few year has held its Council meetings on Wednesdays but the meetings have now been changed back to Tuesdays for the 2018 year.
<u>Negative Press in regard</u> to Hockey in Burns Lake	Director Beach commented that there has been negative press recently in regard to hockey and Minor Hockey in Burns Lake. He spoke of the increased enrolment in Burns Lake Minor Hockey for the 2017/2018 season along with good enrollment in other hockey groups and that it is an important economic driver and community builder. Director Beach spoke of his appreciation for the support that the RDBN provides in regard to the Burns Lake arena. He also noted the health and mental health benefits for youth in playing hockey and all sports.
<u>Southside Seniors</u> <u>Housing Project</u>	Director Benedict mentioned that the Southside Seniors Housing Project is moving ahead quickly after ten years of work on the project. Ten acres of land was donated to the Southside Seniors Housing Society for a facility. They are applying for grant funding and working with BC Housing to build a low income six unit housing unit for seniors. They are currently reviewing the ability to increase the facility to ten units. They have hired 43 employees currently and are planning to hire a total of 50 employees. There has also been a couple of restaurants that have completed renovations and reopened along with a new clothing store. Tahtsa Group is also operating its sawmill. There has been the creation of approximately 100 full time positions in the community.
Town of Smithers Update	Director Bachrach mentioned that the Town of Smithers is moving forward with its Airport Project and the winter road upgrade to Rosenthal Road.
<u>October 25, 2017 Flash</u> <u>Flooding Event in Telkwa</u>	Director Repen spoke of the flash flooding event that took place in Telkwa on October 25, 2017. He noted that the river had risen to its highest level in 24 years and pushed the dyke to its maximum capacity. There was significant damage to the dyke. 

First Nations and Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Relationship Protocol

SECTION I: Introduction

WHEREAS there is a shared vision to develop a relationship based on respect, recognition, and collaboration for the achievement of strong governments, social justice, and mutual benefit of (list all communities here alphabetically).

WHEREAS the parties embrace this opportunity to work together in the spirit and intent of this Relationship Protocol.

THEREFORE, this agreement strives to strengthen local First Nations and Regional District relations, to achieve fair and equitable human rights, and demonstrate recognition for all people in the region.

SECTION II: Purpose & Goals

The purpose of this Protocol is to promote shared understanding and ongoing education opportunities that lead to the parties mutually benefitting as a result of our relationship. We will do this by actively working towards the following goals:

- 1. Strengthening local First Nations and local government relationships through ongoing education and engagement activities;
- 2. Incorporating First Nations perspectives for effective RDBN services and supporting one another in our respective initiatives; and,
- 3. Establishing sustainable economic activities and arrangements and identifying new opportunities that will bring us together.

SECTION III: Principles

In this protocol, we seek to forge a relationship that will give us a better understanding of each other and show the next generation how we can all work together for the betterment of all.

Through principles of respect, friendship, communication, openness/transparency, inclusion, trust, fairness, support, compassion, collaboration, reconciliation, and equality, we will be able to achieve true, meaningful, and enduring dialogue between First Nations and the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako.

For the RDBN and local First Nations, these principles will be demonstrated when:

1. We are thriving and mutually benefitting as neighbours.





2. We are living and prospering together as partners on the land.

SECTION IV: Implementation

The parties agree to mutually support one another in the implementation of this Protocol. It is intended that just as our relationship will continue to grow and evolve as we move forward in this undertaking, so too will this Protocol. This Protocol does not signify a static moment of commemoration, but rather it is a living and breathing agreement that recognizes our mutual respect for each other, our different governance structures, our separate and shared histories, and our shared space on the territory.

In order to implement this commitment made herein, the parties agree to hold one another mutually accountable for our actions which may at times either work towards the achievement of our shared goals (as expressed in Section II) or they may fail to move us ahead. It is based on this respect that we have for each other that we agree to hold one another accountable through ongoing and regular dialogue to ensure the ongoing pursuit of the vision as expressed here. Only through true, meaningful, and long-lasting implementation, will this Protocol work to build a stronger overall community that we all seek.

SECTION V: Terms & Conditions

The Protocol will be a living relationship that can grow and evolve. This Protocol does not modify any relationships, agreements or negotiations the RDBN and the communities have individually or jointly with any other levels of government or organizations.

INTRODUCTION:

On April 20th, 2017 the Board passed the following motion:

That staff work with community stakeholders and the Director for Electoral Area A to evaluate the full range of options for the establishment and operation of trails and recreation sites in Electoral Area A, including the proposed Highway 16 trail.

MEMORANDUM

And, that staff report back to the Board for further direction following the above noted evaluation.

This report discusses the results of staff's evaluation of options for trails and recreation sites in Electoral Area A. It also includes discussion of related issues in other Electoral Areas, and makes recommendations for the Board's consideration.

TRAILS AND RECREATION IN THE RDBN: AN OVERVIEW

The RDBN makes notable financial contributions to recreation facilities located within municipalities. This report does not focus on these recreation facilities, and deals with outdoor recreation and trails in the rural area. For the Board's information the RDBN's annual contributions to recreation activities in municipalities is outlined below.

Trails and recreation facilities in the rural area typically fall into one of five categories. These categories are:

Recreation Sites and Trails BC (RSTBC) sites. RSTBC is part of the Ministry
of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, and most of the sites under
RSTBC jurisdiction are sites previously operated by the Ministry of Forests. Over
the years an increasing number of the former Ministry of Forests operated sites
have been categorized as "unmanaged", or "retired". A number of the
"unmanaged" sites remain operational and are user maintained. The remaining
"managed" recreation sites are typically maintained by contractors or community
groups working under funding agreements or contracts with the RSTBC.
Many of these sites are used for camping, and may contain rudimentary boat
launches and other basic facilities.

RSTBC trails are typically associated with a specific community group which operates the facilities under agreement with RSTBC. A significant portion of the operational and capital costs for these facilities is in the form of volunteer labour and various other funding sources. Community Forests are playing an increasingly important role in funding these recreation sites and trails.

The trend since 2002 has been for the Province to reduce the funding it expends on the operation of recreation sites and trails. This began when the Province began withdrawing from the operation of recreation sites in 2002. Since that time the Province has continued to reduce the level of funding available for maintenance and operation.

- Provincial Parks are established by the province under the Park Act.
- RDBN License of Occupations. These include crown lands where the RDBN has been issued a license for a recreation related purpose. In both cases where this has occurred the RDBN allows another group to take responsibility for the operation of the site, including the operations costs. (Glenannan Park / Stuart River rest stop).
- MoTI Right of Way Use Agreements. This is where the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) enters into an agreement with a formalized group to allow a recreation facility to be operated within a road right of way. These are relatively uncommon as the MoTI would prefer to enter into these agreements with a local government. Should the RDBN wish to facilitate the development of boat launches it is likely that they will be on road right of way.
- Informal Recreation Sites and Facilities. This category includes recreation sites that are frequently used, but are not formally recognized or maintained as a facility. Informal boat launches located within road right of way are a common example.

ELECTORAL AREA A RECREATION AND TRAILS ISSUES

Highway 16 Commuter Trail

Overview

The Cycle 16 Trail Society is a community group working on establishing a commuter trail between Smithers and Telkwa. The trail is proposed to be adjacent to the Highway within the Highway right of way. A Concept Design Report prepared for the Society is attached for the Board's information.

The proposed commuter trail involves the following.

- The majority of the trail is proposed to be within the Highway right of way.
- The trail is proposed to be approximately 3 metres wide and be either paved or have a gravel surface.
- The preferred route would involve an elevated bridge crossing of the highway or an underpass.
- A minimum of 10 crossings over private property (the registration of right of ways, or the subdivision and purchase of those lands would be required).
- Preliminary construction costs (not including land acquisition costs) are between \$4,094,752 and \$5,331,443.

As noted, the proposed trail is within the Highway right of way, which is under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI). The MoTI has clearly indicated that they will only allow the development of the trail within their right of way if the RDBN enters into an agreement with the MoTI to their satisfaction. This agreement would involve the following.

- The RDBN being responsible for the trail including all maintenance, liability, and management.
- The RDBN being responsible for capital replacement costs.
- The RDBN being responsible for the removal of trail infrastructure should the RDBN wish to no longer operate the trail.

The following is a very preliminary estimate of the minimum annual costs associated with the RDBN's operation of the trail. These costs are extremely preliminary and are based on the following assumptions.

- The RDBN would enter into an agreement with a 3rd party who would provide maintenance for the RDBN under contract.
- No furniture such as garbage cans, benches, bike racks, etc. will be provided.
- The trail is for summer use only and is closed during winter.

- The below costs do not consider the highway crossing required in options 1 or 2.
- · Option 3 would require higher maintenance costs.

Future RDBN Involvement

Currently the Cycle 16 Trail Society is expending much effort and resources based on the hope that the RDBN will agree to take responsibility for the trail to the satisfaction of the MoTI. It appears that the project will not be able to occur unless it becomes an RDBN project. If the Board is willing to consider taking responsibility for the Cycle 16 Trail project the RDBN should also take a greater role in overseeing and directing the project in the future. The future work includes:

- Developing a detailed implementation plan for Board approval. The implementation plan needs to deal with the following tasks
 - Budgeting for RDBN costs associated with the project in the 2018 budget. This includes consideration of staffing implications.
 - Negotiation of the RDBN's agreement with MoTI.

- Developing the necessary service establishment bylaw.
- Looking for funding opportunities and making applications.
- Preparing detailed design and construction drawings.
- Negotiating lands acquisitions with private property owners.

The above information is provided to allow the Board to consider whether the RDBN is prepared to take on responsibility for the project, and undertake the above noted work in cooperation with the Cycle 16 Trail Society. If the Board is not prepared to consider being fully responsible for the trail, as required by MoTI, the Cycle 16 Trail Society should be made aware so that it can evaluate it's future actions.

Electoral Area A Parks and Recreation Function

There have been preliminary discussions with the RSTBC regarding a potential partnership with the RDBN to allow the RDBN to contribute financially to the provision of recreation sites and trails in the rural area, and the idea is that the RDBN'S financial support will go towards assisting community groups maintaining recreation sites and trails.

The basis of the cooperation involves the RSTBC continuing to take responsibility for the management and administration of existing and future recreation sites and trails, and the RDBN would commit to providing a consistent source of funding for capital improvements and operations. In exchange for the RDBN's financial contributions the RDBN would have a formalized role in the RSTBC decision making process regarding the management of existing, and the development of new sites and trails. However, final decision making authority would rest with RSTBC.

The Area Director is considering the possibility of appointing a group, such as Electoral Area A recreation commission, to advise on recreation and trails issues and to advise the RSTBC. There has also been discussion regarding the involvement of the Wetzink'wa Community Forest in the partnership. Further details have yet to be developed and agreed upon.

The RDBN's participation in this partnership with the RSTBC would require the RDBN to adopt a Service Establishment Bylaw creating the necessary taxation-area-and taxation limits. Elector assent is not necessary for this type of service if it includes the entire Electoral Area.

ISSUES IN OTHER ELECTORAL AREAS

Lakes Outdoor Recreation Society

In 2002, the Province began the process to reduce their involvement in operating Ministry of Forest recreation Sites. To avoid the closure of Provincial operated sites in Electoral Areas A and E the community rallied, with the financial support of the Burns

Lake Community Forest Ltd. (BLCF), to form the non-profit Lakes Outdoor Recreation Society (LORS). LORS employs local contractors to maintain 28 recreation sites and 2 provincial parks within the Lakes District on behalf of RSTBC and with the continued financial support of the Burns Lake Community Forest.

Should Electoral Areas B and E wish to facilitate increase recreation and trails development in their areas there is a unique opportunity to explore a partnership involving one or more of the RDBN, RSTBC, LORS and BLCF.

As noted, the RDBN's participation in such a partnership would require the RDBN to adopt a Service Establishment Bylaw creating the necessary taxation area and taxation limits.

Electoral Area C Rest Area

As noted the RDBN currently holds a License of Occupation for land that is a rest area outside of Fort St James. The rest area is located next to the bridge over the Stuart River on Stuart Lake Highway. The Rotary Club of Fort St James has previously maintained the site. However, the Rotary Club is no longer active and the RDBN must either take over maintenance of the site or decommission the site.

The Director for Electoral Area C and staff are evaluating options for this site, which may potentially include the adoption of a Service Establishment Bylaw to cover the costs associated with the continued operation of the rest area.

OPTIONS

There is an apparent demand, which varies somewhat between Electoral Areas, for increased rural recreation amenity. This demand is a result of local residents requesting services, and is seen as an opportunity to improve tourism opportunities. Also, there is increasing recognition of the importance of improving regional quality of life as an economic development strategy. The current approach relies on RSTBC, local community volunteerism, and various funding sources such as community forests, to determine the nature of recreation and trail development.

It is not expected that the Province will notably increase RSTBC funding in the future. Based on past trends it can be expected that Provincial funding will continue to decrease. Therefore, maintenance of the status quo will likely not result in new or improved rural recreation and trail development.

There are great examples of recreation facilities developed by community groups. The Burns Lake Mountain Bike Association and their success with the Burns Lake Bike Park and Boer Mountain Recreation Site are a great example. However, community volunteer capacity is limited in most communities. Facilities such as boat launches and docks, small parks and picnic areas, and the development of the informal use areas, will likely not occur, to any notable extent, without some form of RDBN involvement.

Option 1: Partnership with RSTBC

The benefit of partnership with RSTBC is that they already perform the administrative functions associated with recreation sites and trails management in the rural areas. The RDBN could easily contribute to these operations without incurring the cost of developing in-house administrative capacity. However, the RDBN would have no direct control over the decision making process, and it is not clear how successful this model would be in facilitating the development of new recreation sites. Also, there is some concern that the RDBN's involvement in financially supporting RSTBC operations may facilitate the long term withdrawal of RSTBC funding and greater reliance on RDBN funding for existing recreation sites.

A variation on option 1 is for the RDBN to provide funding directly to community groups operating rural recreational facilities, and not funnel the funds through RSTBC.

The staffing implications associated with Option 1 would depend largely on the number of Electoral Areas that adopted this approach, the nature of the agreements entered into with RSTBC, and other factors such as the manner in which funding and recreation related decisions are made in each electoral area. It is estimated that the work could easily grow to consume from 20% to 50% of a full time employee.

Option 1 would require additional staffing resources that could either be allocated to the Electoral Areas receiving the service, as part of their Service Establishment Bylaw, or the staffing costs could be allocated to general government where the costs would be subsidized equally by all Electoral Areas and municipalities.

If the Board's preference is for option 1 staff can begin the process of creating the necessary service areas for interested Electoral Area Directors at the Board's discretion.

Option 2

Option 2 involves the RDBN taking a more proactive and long term approach to establishing recreational facilities, and involves hiring a full time recreation coordinator to do the following work:

- Develop a needs assessment for each Electoral Area in consultation with the community.
- Develop a strategy, and associated budget to facilitate the desired recreation and trails related development.
- Do the work necessary to enter into agreements with community groups, the MoTI, or Crown Lands as necessary to implement the strategies.
- Manage contracts and agreements with community groups and /or contractors responsible for maintaining facilities.

This is more similar to the model which is most typically adopted by regional districts, and would offer the RDBN greater control over what type of new facilities are provided. If the Board's preference is for option 2 it is recommended that staff prepare a subsequent report on option 2 with recommendations on how to best proceed.

Staff recommend that the Board consider the information provided in this report and indicate the preferred option.

Option 3

Option 3 is the status quo where the RDBN does not formally become involved in contribution to, or operating parks, or recreation facilities, as a service. If the Board's preference is for option 3 it is recommended that the Board direct staff to not prepare any Service Establishment Bylaws related to parks and recreation in the rural areas.

Recommendations:

Cycle 16 Trail

- 1. That the Regional District Board determine whether staff should continue working on the Cycle 16 Trail project on the understanding that the project is contingent on the RDBN taking full responsibility for the Cycle 16 Trail.
- That the Regional District direct staff to develop a Cycle 16 Trail implementation strategy, for the Board's consideration, should the Board wish to consider developing the Cycle 16 trail.

Options 1, 2 or 3

3. That the Regional District Board identify its preferred option, and provide direction to staff regarding recreation and trail development in the rural areas.

PURPOSE

At the July 9th, 2009 Committee of the Whole Meeting the Committee asked staff to provide the Regional District Board with the following information.

- The location and maintenance status of recreation sites previously maintained by the Ministry of Forests.
- The identification of other recreation amenities in the region.
- How other Regional District deal with the maintenance and operation of recreation sites.

DISCUSSION

Recreation Sites, Recreation Areas, and Provincial Parks

The Regional District has compiled a database, and mapping, for each Electoral Area showing Recreation Sites, Recreation Areas, Provincial Parks, and Community Recreation Areas. The inventory did not specifically include trails; however, many of the Recreation Areas contain trails.

The inventory data is included in Schedules A, B, C, and D. More complete data is available from staff as excel spreadsheets. The Recreation Sites, Recreation Areas, Provincial Parks, and Community Recreation Areas are shown on maps for each Electoral Area that are provided under separate cover.

Data sources for the inventory include the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and the Arts (MoTCA), the Land and Data Resource Warehouse (LRDW), Regional District staff, and local community groups. The MoTCA warned that recreation data from their website and from the LRDW may not be accurate. The information they provided directly was only valid for 2009 as the management of sites is dependent on available funding.

The inventory database and maps are organized as follows.

• Recreation Sites are specific sites under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and the Arts, the majority of which are used for camping, (former Ministry of Forests campsites). These sites are categorized as Managed, Unmanaged, or Retired.

Managed Recreation sites are those managed by the MoTCA. Some are maintained by contractors or community groups. Some are user maintained.

Recreation sites that are Unmanaged are typically low priority sites that are available for use but are not managed in any way because of a lack of funding. Unmanaged sites are those that remain listed as recreation sites but are not intended to be managed or maintained in any way.

Recreation sites that are Retired are those that have been closed.

Managed Recreation Sites and Recreation Areas are described in Schedule A to this report. Unmanaged and retired Recreation Sites and Recreation Areas are described in Schedule B.

Recreation Areas are areas of high recreation value where the land use priority is identified as recreation by the province. Recreation Areas are categorized as Managed or Unmanaged. Managed Recreation Areas are managed by the MoTCA. Most are user maintained however, some are operated by community groups.

Recreation Areas that are unmanaged are listed as being Active, Retired or Pending in Schedule B. Some Recreation Areas that are Retired are areas that have been given Provincial Park status.

• **Provincial Parks** are established by the province under the *Park Act*. The list of Provincial Parks only includes those that are advertised for recreational use on the BC Parks website.

Provincial Parks are described in Schedule C to this report.

 Community Recreation Areas are beach areas, boat launches, campsites, swimming holes, day use sites, docks, or popular fishing areas or sites that are operated by a community group, informally used for recreation by the public, or are areas that have the potential for development as recreation sites.

These areas have been identified by RDBN Staff or Board members. Also, community input was obtained by sending letters to community groups across the Regional District asking for information on Community Recreation Areas. Board members are encouraged to inform staff of any Community Recreation Areas which should be added to the maps.

It is noted that this list is incomplete and that the data base is to be updated as information is available. Also, some provincial Recreation Sites are also listed as community recreation areas where specifically identified as important by a community group.

Community Recreation Areas are identified in schedule D to this report.

Other Regional District Recreation Services

Schedule E provides a very brief description of the services provided by a number of Regional Districts. It also provides information on the manner in which the services are provided and the facilities operated.

Please note that the information provided is based on a search of each Regional District's web site and involved limited discussion with staff to confirm, clarify, or otherwise correct the information obtained. It is provided to give a general idea of the involvement of Regional Districts in providing recreation services and the range of options in providing the service.

Staff are working on an application to the BC Rural Dividend Program for 2018/19 Tourism Initiatives. The Regional Tourism Working Group met on November 16 and each member provided input into potential initiatives. The application will include the following initiatives and the request will be for 80% of the budget. Other funding opportunities are also being pursued. A Board Resolution is required to submit the application, and enter into a contract with the Province of BC, should the funding be approved.

The application includes:

1) Development of the Discovery App

This project will build on the current web-based itinerary generator to create a program to make a mobile-friendly app that will be able to be downloaded from the Google Play Store and iTunes. Discovery App Online: <u>http://visitbulkleynechako.com/discovery-app</u> Budget: \$10,000 Timeline: April, 2018 – December 2019

2) 360/Virtual Reality Video Production

This project will see the production of VR videos/games featuring the region to allow visitors to have a VR experience. It will also include the purchase of VR headsets for Visitor Information Centers around the region to be able to offer the experience.

Budget: \$70,000 Timeline: April, 2018 - December 2019

3) Tourism Investment Package

This project will include data collected through the Value of Tourism Study and Tourism Profiles created for the region in the creation of an Investment Package targeted at attracting tourism operators to the region. Budget: \$25,000 Timeline: April, 2018-September, 2018

4) Participation in the User Generated Content Partnership

This exciting program, headed by Destination Canada, will allow efficient and streamlined access to the authentic content captured on social media for use in marketing the region. Budget: \$15,000 Timeline: April, 2018 – March 31, 2019

The Regional District's 2011 Ford Escape was involved in a collision with a moose. Staff were not injured and there was no loss of time worked as a result of this accident. This accident resulted in significant damage to the vehicle and the vehicle is described by our insurer as a "total loss". The pay-out for this vehicle is currently unknown.

We are seeking direction to replace this vehicle. Our current plans are to purchase a "heavy half tonne" four wheel drive truck with four doors. Estimates of the cost range from \$40,000 to \$50,000 depending on make and trim level. The Regional District will follow its purchasing policy to get the best value for money.

In addition, the Regional District has a 2008 Ford Escape that it planned to replace in 2018. The replacement for this vehicle will be in the 2018 budget; however, staff have indicated a need to keep the older vehicle to allow staff to maximize their field time. This will be an inexpensive way to increase the fleet size by one vehicle in 2018.

The Society plans to restructure the uninsulated contoured doors to the Food Bank storage area (loading area doors) by framing the space in and installing insulated steel doors along with an energy efficient window to allow for natural lighting, as well as replacing the uninsulated exterior doors to the Soup Kitchen with insulated doors.

The total cost of this renovation project is estimated at \$21,887.25, and the Nak'azdli Band has contributed \$1700 towards the upgrades.

Total uncommitted Gas Tax Funds remaining in Electoral Area 'C' allocation is \$280,155.42. Director Greenaway is supportive of this project and of accessing Federal Gas Tax Funds in the amount of up to \$20,187.25 from Area 'C' Gas Tax Funds for this Community Energy Systems project. The Cluculz Lake Community Association (CLCA) is just completing their highly successful renovation project at the Cluculz Lake Hall, located in Electoral Area "F" (Vanderhoof Rural). In fact, the Association was able to return GST rebate funds to the Area "F" Gas Tax Allocation.

The Hall still requires renovations to be done to the washrooms. The CLCA has used the services of a Registered Professional (Engineer) as required by the RDBN to provide drawings for this project. The estimated cost for this project is as follows:

The Association has pending funding applications with Northern Development Initiative Trust (NDIT), Four Rivers Coop, and Integris Credit Union. NDIT requires a commitment of other funding prior to their January Board Meeting but the Coop and Credit Union funding announcements have not yet been made. Director Petersen is willing to commit the funds required from the Area "F" Gas Tax Allocation to ensure that the NDIT application goes forward as strongly as possible.

The RDBN has participated in the Travel Narthern BC partnership to share a four-booth space at the Vancouver Outdoor Adventure Show, for the last six years. For two years before that, the RDBN rented one booth individually.

Travel Northern BC is an informal group including, Tourism Smithers, Tourism Kitimat, Kermodei Tourism (Terrace), Tourism Prince George, Tourism Prince Rupert and Regional District of Kitimat –Stikine. The group promotes tourism opportunities from Prince George to Prince Rupert as a region, not as individual communities.

Highlights from the 2017 Outdoor Adventure Show included:

- 16,300 visitors to the show
- The space occupied comprises four typical booth spaces and is strategically located for maximum attendance.
- Cedar walls surrounded the booth and displayed photos of outdoor activities that can be experienced in the north.
- Information requests (in order of most least requested) included mountain biking, wildlife, salmon, fishing, camping, historic sites, and backcountry skiing.
- 350 bags of information and 100 Regional Tourism Guides were distributed.
- Collaboration between the northern partners ensured northern BC and tourism activities are marketed well, all communities are highlighted, and there is an adequate number of people staffing the booth.

Some of the benefits of participating in the Travel Northern BC Partnership include:

- Reduced costs as booth and supply costs are shared equally.
- Enhanced presence within the tradeshow area, four 10'x10' booths instead of one -10'x10' booth. The larger area attracts a higher number of show attendees than the single RDBN booth. The booth display includes a log cabin with windows looking out to activity scenes with the intent of attracting people to the booth with a unique feature.
- Four booth attendants are available at all times to answer questions and promote the region.

The budget for 2018 is \$3,450. This amount is included in the 2018 Regional Economic Development Department draft budget.

The Regional Tourism Working Group felt this partnership and attendance at the Calgary show was a high priority project of the group. This show would not require attendance by the RDBN and the budget would be \$1,800.







These two applications are regarding a Conditional Withdraw (Section 17) application for a 30 year term to gain tenure over two areas for the purpose of establishing a traditional use area and an area dedicated as cultural significance for the Saik'uz First Nation.

The Saik'uz First Nation is currently in Treaty negotiations with the Province of British Columbia. The areas near Sinkut Mountain and at the confluence of the Nechako and Stuart Rivers are deemed important to the Saik'uz First Nation they wish to ensure protection of these areas until Treaty negotiations are finalized. Therefore, it is proposed that a Section 17 - Conditional Withdraw application would be the appropriate tool to manage the land use in these areas.

Section 17 - Conditional Withdraw

Conditional Withdraw applications under the *Land Act* designate a portion of Crown land for a particular use or for the conservation of natural or heritage resources. Only compatible uses with the designated use regulated under the *Land Act* will be considered by the Province. An example of a compatible use that would be considered, would be a low impact adventure tourism operation or interpretive trail system that reflects Saik'uz terms and values.

Allocating a Section 17 – Conditional Withdraw would prevent the Province to issue Crown Grants, Licence of Occupations or Land Leases in this area unless the use is compatible and has the consent of the Saik'uz First Nation. According to Provincial Government staff any application made to the Province in the proposed application areas would need to go through consultation with the Saik'uz First Nation. This consultation would require face to face meetings, 90 day referral times, and written permission from the Saik'uz for the proposed use of land in the areas. In effect it appears that the proposal would establish joint management of the areas, and restrict the private sale of lands in these areas.

Section 17 – Conditional Withdraw does not grant Saik'uz First Nation the exclusive right to use the proposed application areas. According to Provincial Government staff uses subject to other Acts such as the *Forest Act, Mines Act* etc. will not be restricted within the proposed application areas. For example, existing and future forestry licences and range tenures under the *Forest Act* are not impacted. In addition, existing licence and tenure holdings issued under the *Land Act* will be maintained.


Staff have confirmed with the Province that the Saik'uz would not be allowed to restrict

access to, or place any signage in, these areas. The public will be free to use the area for recreation or hunting. The existing hunting, trapping, guiding licences are being maintained. There are no known recreation sites, or tenured trail systems within the areas.

Sinkut Mountain has seen some interest for wind farm development. Innergex Wind Energy has done some investigative work in the area in 2014. However, the Province has confirmed that the application will not impact the company's area of interest.



Discussion

There is very limited written information regarding the referrals. Most of the information provided has been verbally provided by Provincial Government staff. RDBN staff are not aware of any potential tenure applications that may be impacted by the proposed Section 17 Conditional Withdrawal. It is noted that a portion of the land in the Sinkut Mountain area is within the ALR. This land does not appear to be developed for agricultural use.

Staff would prefer to have more information on the referral; however, the Province has indicated that there are no associated studies or support documents available. The province has also indicated that the RDBN's comments are required by December 22, 2017.

The application for Amendment of Water Licence C125689 (Meadows Creek Water Supply Station) is expected within the next week.

A portion of the Mines Act permit application document is attached for the Board's information. The full application packages are available from staff on request.

APPLICATION REVIEW

The Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) and the Major Mine Permitting Office (MMPO) have requested review of the applications and the provision of comments by December 15th, 2017. They are seeking finalization of the draft application processing schedule as soon as possible in consultation with the company and Nak'azdli Whu'ten First Nation, McLeod Lake Indian Band and the Takla Lake First Nation.

The draft application processing schedule includes the following key dates:

- Working group/Mine Review Committee Round 1 Comments Due = December 15th
- Two day technical meeting workshop to discuss Round 1 Comments = December 18 and 19th
- TCMC Round 1 Comment Responses = January 2nd
- Working group/Mine Review Committee Round 2 Comments Due = January 10th
- TCMC Round 2 Comment Responses = January 15th
- Draft Joint Decision Package Completion = January 30th
- Joint Decision Makers Meeting = January 31st
- Referral to Decision Makers = February 1st

STAFF COMMENT

The application review focuses on the potential impacts on terrain, soils, and geology; water resources, fish and aquatic resources; vegetation and plant communities; wildlife and wildlife habitat; and archaeology and heritage resources. TCMC has submitted their applications, along with supporting documentation, and a conclusion that their proposals do not represent any notable negative impacts.

Staff are not in a position to make any notable technical contributions to the application review process, or the conclusions reached by TCMC in their application. Therefore, staff have no recommended comments for submission to the EAO or the MMPO relating to the TCMC applications.

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Introduction & Project Description

Centerra Gold Inc. is a publicly traded company on the Toronto Stock Exchange under the symbol CG. Centerra Gold maintains the wholly owned subsidiary of Thompson Creek Metals Company Inc. (TCMC) which owns Mount Milligan mine, located in north central British Columbia approximately 155 km northwest of Prince George. Mount Milligan is an open pit, gold-copper mine with a designed 60,000 tonnes per day processing plant and various ancillary support facilities. Initial mine production started in September 2013 and the facility has a projected mine life of approximately 22 years.

The Mount Milligan mine is an operating mine with fully developed Environment and Health and Safety Polices.

The Mount Milligan property includes 80 mineral claims under Mineral Lease 631503 with a combined area of 49,744.163 ha. The claims are on Crown land in the Omineca Mining Division of British Columbia. All of the mineral claims are wholly owned by Thompson Creek Metals Company Inc. The property is covered by a no staking reserve for placer minerals.

The mine site lies within the Rainbow Creek watershed, which is a tributary of the Nation River. The Rainbow Creek watershed has an area of 238 km2 and ranges in elevation from approximately 1,100 metres above sea level, south of the mine site, to an elevation of about 850 m at its confluence with the Nation River. Rainbow Creek has several major tributaries including Meadows and Limestone Creeks. The confluence of Meadows Creek and Rainbow Creek is approximately 20 km downstream of the headwaters. Meadows Creek drains an area of approximately 26 km². Limestone Creek flows into Rainbow Creek about 40 km downstream of the headwaters and drains an area of S3 km². The Rainbow Creek-Nation River confluence is approximately 7 km downstream from Limestone Creek.

The open pit, processing plant and related support facilities, such as shops and camp facility, are located in the King Richard Creek drainage system. King Richard Creek originates immediately to the east of Heidi Lake and the entire catchment has been impounded behind the south embankment of the Tailings Storage Facility (T5F) dam.

At this time, there is only one open pit at the mine site, the MBX Pit. There are no underground workings at Mount Milligan. The on-site mill operates a Primary Crusher, Secondary Crusher, SAG mill, two (2) Ball Mills and 2 pebble crushers. The grinding circuit feeds a conventional rougher/cleaner floatation circuit with additional gravity recovery processes for gold. This produces a gold-copper concentrate which is shipped by truck and trailer to Mackenzie, BC where it is transferred to rail cars. The concentrate is then moved by rail to a port managed by Kinder Morgan in Vancouver, BC.

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


Figure 1: Mount Milligan Mine (Inset: Concentrate Port Terminal)

Indigenous Groups


The two closest Indigenous groups to the Mount Milligan mine site are McLeod Lake Indian Band (MLIB), located on Highway 97, 30 km south of Mackenzie, BC and Nak'azdli Whut'en, located near Fort St. James, BC. In accordance with the agreements signed between TCMC and MLIB and Nak'azdli respectively, the Company has undertaken frequent consultation with both Nations throughout the application process.


Past discussions have occurred with West Moberly First Nation and Halfway River First Nation regarding the Mount Milligan mine, but neither Nation has expressed interest in engaging with TCMC on the project since operations began.


The traditional territory boundaries of a third Nation, Takla Lake First Nation (TLFN), were revised between 2009 and 2017, and now include the Mount Milligan mine site. TLFN's main community of Takla Landing is located approximately 190 km northwest of Fort St. James. TCMC is working to ensure adequate consultation with TLFN takes place throughout the amendment process.




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Mines Act Permit Application (MAPA)

TCMC is applying for what the company has termed a Phase 1 amendment associated with alternate water resources

The personnel most directly involved in this application include the following:

- Phil Welten BSc.ME MAUSIMM General Manager
 - Phil Welten has been in the industry for 40 years, working in both open pit and underground projects around the world. Phil will be providing guidance and resources to ensure a successful application.
- Tim Caldwell (RPF) Environmental Superintendent
 - Tim Caldwell has been in the environmental field for 25 years, starting in the forest industry and over the last decade in mining. Tim will be assisting in writing the application and providing environmental expertise.
- Stantec Consulting Project Management Consultants
 - This consultant will provide leadership expertise to ensure a comprehensive, high quality application is developed for submission, enabling a speedy, smooth approval.

The Mount Milligan mine requires approximately 10,000,000 cubic meters (m3) of water to produce gold-copper concentrate from mined ore. TCMC's water management plan includes storing precipitation and run-off that flows into the King Richard Watershed and then into the Tailings Storage Facility (TSF), using and recycling TSF water for use in the mill. The TSF is currently the primary source of make-up water and as such, TSF levels are critical to mill operations.

In late 2016, a bathymetric survey of TSF water levels showed that water levels were critically low. The current and anticipated water shortage is estimated to be 1,800,000 m3 in 2018 and in 2019. This shortage is currently being investigated via strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats (SWOT) analysis (Appendix A), and may be due to several factors, including:

- · Consecutive years of dry conditions limiting the replenishment of make-up water storage -
- Inaccurate water balance model predictions (overestimating runoff to TSF)
- Less than half the expected water availability from the TSF (as suggested from an updated survey of TSF water storage)
- · Basing calibrations of the model in recent years on annual average flows rather than actual flows
- Not constructing the Meadows Creek Water Supply Pond due to operational, Indigenous and environmental considerations; and
- Water infiltration into silt lenses within the TSF overburden resulting in the inability to access this water

For more details of the water deficit, please refer to the Water Deficit Investigation found in Appendix 3.

The construction of a supply pond in Meadows Creek was proposed in the original Environmental Assessment (EA) for Mount Milligan, but was not built because of potential adverse environmental effects, the cost to construct and operate the pond, and Indigenous concerns. Concerns included potential adverse effects to the headwaters of Meadows Creek which are utilized by fish, and the need to construct a 16.5 m dam and pond with an approximate footprint of 4,000 m².

To achieve an annual makeup water supply of 1,800,000 m3 in 2018 and 2019, TCMC is proposing to withdraw water from Philip Lake 1, Esker Lakes, and Meadows Creek, and to recover additional water from the TSF through tower drains and water recovery wells (Figure 2.0-1). Water withdrawal from Philip Lake 1, Esker

Lakes and Meadows Creek will be short-term; proposed to be functional for approximately 22 months starting in early 2018. Water will be pumped via a pipeline to the TSF.

Water withdrawal from Meadows Creek was assessed in the EA Application for Mount Milligan (Amec 2008) and approved and is therefore not assessed in this Application. As the two TSF water sources (tower drains and water recovery wells) will recover water contained in and under mine tailings currently stored in the TSF, they do not require amendments to the current EA Certificate or additional regulatory authorizations. The TSF water sources are discussed further in the water investigation report Appendix A.

This Application is seeking approval for the use of the Philip Lake 1 and Esker Lakes as short term water sources for mill processing. To achieve this, TCMC is seeking an amendment to the current mine boundary to facilitate burying pipes and installing the pumps required for water transport. The following information and appendices describe in detail the aspects proposed in this MAPA amendment.

On September 7, 2017, TCMC was informed by the BC Environmental Assessment Office that an amendment to the mine's current Environmental Assessment Certificate would also be required since the Meadows Creek Water Supply Pond was never constructed. This amendment application was submitted on December 5, 2017.

Mine Boundary

The current mine boundary (Figure 8) consists of an area of approximately 2,002 ha and includes the TSF, processing plant, camp facilities and other buildings critical or ancillary to the operation of the mine. In addition to what is shown in the map below, there is a 240KV powerline that extends approximately 96km from the mine to the Kennedy substation. The right-of-way for the powerline corridor is approximately 90 m wide, thus accounting for an additional 864 ha for a grand total of 2,866 ha.






Figure 7: Philip Lake 1 - Pump Area

The proposed pipeline requires the addition of 32 hectares to the mine boundary on the Philip Lake 1 route and 2 hectares for Esker Lakes, creating a total footprint for this amendment of 2,900 ha as shown in Figure 9. With the exception of the near-shore location of Philip Lake 1, a proposed corridor of approximately 5.7 km will be constructed on previously disturbed corridors adjacent to the Rainbow FSR, Mackenzie Connector and a harvested block and in-block road that stops within 75m to 100m of Philip Lake 1 (shown in Figure 7).

Esker Lakes will have approximately 100m of pipeline with floating pump in the lake. There are no anticipated ground disturbances associated with the pumping activities on Esker Lakes, as the pipe will be placed on ground surface.





Terrain, Soils & Geology

Philip Lake 1





Figure 10: Philip Lake #1 Pipeline Footprint

As seen in Figure 10 below, the water pipeline between Philip Lake 1 and the mine site will be buried within right-of-ways and cut-blocks resulting in ground disturbance from trenching and cover of the pipeline. Placement of pump infrastructure will require the clearing of an area near Philip Lake 1. As the pipeline corridor follows existing linear disturbances for the majority of the alignment, there will be little additional ground disturbance anticipated for the burying of the pipe. An area of approximately 0.6 ha is expected for additional ground disturbance at Philip Lake 1 to set up for a pump pad and to allow access for a crane to place the pump barge into the lake. Sediment and erosion control measures will be implemented in areas where soils are disturbed for construction. The updated Water, Seepage and Erosion Control Plan has been included in Appendix 2.

Construction of the water infrastructure between Philip Lake 1 and TSF Pond 2 will require clearing of riparian vegetation within a 30-m wide, 200-m long section located on the northern bank of the western basin of Philip Lake 1. Clearing riparian vegetation may increase bank erosion, which could result in increased Total Suspended Solids (TSS) entering Philip Lake 1, potentially affecting surface water quality.

The following mitigations measures will be implemented to minimize potential adverse effects of increased TSS on surface water quality:

- Vegetation clearing will be limited to a 30-m wide strip within the riparian area of the lake, achieved by flagging the boundaries of the area and communicating these boundaries to heavy equipment operators prior to construction.
- An environmental monitor will be on-site throughout construction to ensure that riparian vegetation is not cleared beyond the flagged area
- Tree stumps in the ground that do not interfere with construction or operation of the pipe or pump house will be left
- Where possible, riparian vegetation will be cleared during the winter when the ground is frozen
- Heavy machinery will be prohibited from working within 5 m of the top of bank of the lake

The erosion and sedimentation mitigation measures implemented at Philip Lake 1 will be effective for limiting the amount of bank erosion and increased TSS that may occur at the water pipeline location. As a result, no residual adverse effects to surface water quality are anticipated to occur due to construction of the water pipeline and pump house.

The pipeline from Philips Lake 1 will cross Rainbow Creek at approximately 33km on the Rainbow FSR. An 18inch HDPE will be placed upon a manufactured truss adjacent to but separate from the existing bridge crossing. To prevent sediment and erosion that could impact water quality, there will be no vegetation clearing within 15 metres of the wetted width of Rainbow Creek and construction will occur during snowcovered frozen periods.

During construction, third-party environmental monitors will be employed to observe construction activities and environmental conditions. They will provide feedback to the construction Project Manager when opportunities for further mitigation occur.

Esker Lakes

Construction of the pipeline at Eskers Lake (Figure 11) will not involve ground disturbance or clearing of vegetation. The pipeline and associated pump will be installed during snow-covered, frozen periods, and the concrete pad for the generator will be placed outside of the riparian zone as to not cause erosion and/or the release of total suspended solids into surface waters.

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Water Resources

Philip Lake 1

Philip Lake 1 is both ground and surface water fed. The main outlet for the lake is Philip Creek which outflows from the northeastern corner to the most western corner of Philip Lake 2. Philip Lake 2 drains to Philip Lake 3 and Philip Creek eventually drains into the Nation River. TCMC proposes to pump 15% of the outflow of Philip Creek between Philip Lake 1 and 2, drawing down the lake an estimated 1.8cm.

Esker Lakes

Esker Lakes is a groundwater fed waterbody that also discharges via groundwater. During the original EA Application, Esker Lakes was assessed to have a groundwater inflow of approximately 50L/sec. TCMC is proposing to pump at approximately half of this inflow rating, to be assessed further via a pump test. Monitoring of surrounding groundwater wells and a weir installed at the Lower Rainbow Pond (constructed as part of the Fish Habitat Compensation Program for the mine) will be performed during the pump test to determine potentials from impacts related to pumping.

Fish & Aquatic Resources

Philip Lake 1

Screens will be installed on the end of the intake pipe placed in Philip Lake 1. These screens will be designed to meet DFO's "Freshwater Intake End-of-Pipe Fish Screen Guidelines" (DFO 1995) to minimize the number of fish mortalities caused by impingement on the screen or entrainment into the pumps. Screen and mesh size

will be selected based on the total open screen area needed to maintain approach velocities < 0.038 m/s at the screen/water interface, the maximum approach velocity required to preclude impingement of juvenile (> 25 mm fork length), anguilliform swimming fish (e.g., burbot) on the screen (DFO 1995).

In addition to screens, impingement and entrainment of fish in Philip Lake 1 will be minimized by:

- Placing the intake pipe at least 30 cm above the bottom of the lake to avoid entrainment of sediment and benthic species
- Placing the intake pipe at least 15 m off-shore and in water at least 4 m in depth to avoid nearshore areas where concentrations of juvenile fish (i.e., smaller, poorer swimming fish than adults) may be higher than in off-shore areas. The northern end of the western basin of Philip Lake 1 has a maximum depth of 4 m (Figure 5.3-7)
- Including a manifold with screens to provide a more even distribution of water velocities across the screen surface
- Cleaning screens regularly by removing them from the water and pressure washing, manual scrubbing, or by back-washing with air or water from the pumps

Design and installation of fish screens on the end of the intake pipe is expected to be highly effective for minimizing impingement and entrainment of fish in Philip Lake 1. Fish mortalities resulting from impingement and entrainment are predicted to be low and the residual effect to fish populations in Philip Lake 1 is expected to be negligible.

Esker Lakes

Esker Lakes are non-fish bearing bodies of water. No direct impacts to fish and aquatic resources are anticipated arising from the construction/implementation of the pump and piping to Esker Lakes.

Rainbow Creek is down gradient of Esker Lakes and may be influenced by groundwater flows related to the aquifer that supplies both waterbodies. To ensure there are no significant impacts to Rainbow Creek, TCMC will design and implement an Operational Monitoring Plan that provides continuous data on lake levels in Esker Lakes, groundwater levels down gradient from Esker Lakes, and inflows to the Lower Rainbow Pond pond. Data from this monitoring plan will be used to determine if water withdrawals are having a larger effect on the aquifer then anticipated and are reducing inflows to the offset pond. Should inflow volumes to the offset pond decrease below 90% of base flows currently entering the pond in winter, TCMC will decrease pumping rates and lengthening the duration of pumping, temporarily stopping pumping to allow the aquifer to recharge, and/or permanently stop pumping from Esker Lakes during the winter of 2018.

Vegetation and Plant Communities

The pipeline corridor to Philip Lake 1 will follow existing linear disturbances for the majority of the alignment resulting in limited vegetation clearing to facilitate construction access (approximately 0.6 ha). There will be no vegetation clearing for access to Esker Lakes. Sediment and erosion control measures will be implemented in areas where soils are disturbed for construction.

Ecosystem mapping identified no plant communities at risk in the area adjacent to Philip Lake 1 to be cleared during construction. No rare plant species were identified during rare plant surveys conducted in the vegetation regional study area (Amec 2008) or through review of data from the BC Conservation Data Centre (2017). TCMC has committed to a salvage and relocation program for any incidental rare plants identified during construction activities, per the Landscape, Soils, and Vegetation Management Plan.

The effects determination from the Environmental Assessment Report was based on the loss or alteration of 1,820 ha of terrestrial and aquatic habitat and concluded no significant effect. In consideration of existing commitments, the changes to the Project are of a sufficiently small magnitude that they have no potential to alter the previous residual effects characterizations or significance determinations.

Wildlife and Wildlife Habitat

The majority of the pipeline required to support additional water extraction will follow existing linear disturbances.

A 5.7 km length of 18" HDPE pipeline will extend from TSF Pond 2 to Philip Lake 1 and will be buried within an existing Forest Service Roads and a forest access road right-of-way and riparian or upland vegetation adjacent to Philip Lake 1. A 30 m x 200 m (or 0.6 ha) parcel of forested areas and riparian vegetation adjacent to Philip Lake 1 will be required to allow for construction of the pump station, and will occupy <0.1% of the total perimeter of Philip Lake 1.

A 100-m length of 6" HDPE pipeline will be an above-ground installation along existing linear features from TSF Pond 1 to Esker Lakes, crossing a riparian area and upland low shrub. No ground disturbance or clearing will be required.

Pipelines will either be above-ground 6" HDPE (Esker Lake) or buried (Philip Lake 1) and are not expected to disrupt wildlife movement. As pipeline construction is scheduled between December 2017 and January 2018, clearing is not expected to affect breeding birds or amphibians.

Project mitigations and management plans previously developed for wildlife and wildlife habitat will be implemented to avoid or reduce residual effects from changes in this amendment. The changes in this amendment are of a sufficiently small magnitude and will have negligible potential to alter the previous residual effects characterizations or the determination of no significant effect for wildlife and their habitats.

TCMC's existing Wildlife Management Plan (TCMC, 2016) outlines restricted work periods and recommended nest setbacks for birds potentially occurring within the local study area, referencing the Region 7 Omineca – Reduced Risk Timing Windows for Fish and Wildlife (BC MOE 2004). Vegetation clearing for work outlined in this amendment will adhere to the restricted work periods outlined in the Wildlife Management Plan. If vegetation clearing is scheduled to occur within the restricted work period, a pre-clearing nest survey will be completed to confirm there are no active nests within or immediately adjacent to the proposed clearing footprint.

Water extraction is scheduled to occur at Philip Lake 1 between January and March 2018 and April to Dctober 2019. In the unlikely event that decreased water depths are recorded at the lake and coincide with the breeding and development period for western toad (Anaxyrus boreas; approximately early May through early September), water extraction may result in residual effects beyond those described in the EA Certificate Amendment Application. If decreased water depths are observed during this period, then additional monitoring and salvage considerations may be required consistent with best industry practice (i.e., BC MFLNRO 2014).

Archeology and Heritage Resources

Archaeological sites or other HCA-protected heritage resources may be identified within the Project footprint during assessment. Any sites and corresponding interactions that may be uncovered will be assessed as part of the provincially regulated heritage review process overseen by the Archaeology Branch. Potential effects on identified sites resulting from proposed activities will be mitigated in accordance with the Archaeology and Cultural Heritage Resources Management Plan, input from First Nations, and applicable heritage legislation. Effects on individual archaeological or heritage sites resulting from proposed works will be reduced through engineering options, avoidance, or the application of mitigation procedures following the Cultural Heritage Resources Management Plan and as required under provincial legislation. With the implementation of these measures, adverse residual effects for archaeology and heritage resources are anticipated to be not significant.

Overview of Proposed Pipeline and Pumphouse

To withdraw water from Philip Lake 1 and Esker Lakes, two new water pipelines are proposed.

The first pipeline will be a 100 m long water pipeline (6" high-density polyethylene (HDPE) pipe) proposed for installation from TSF Pond 1 to Esker Lakes, crossing a riparian area and upland low shrub/forb vegetation. There will be no ground disturbance, and no clearing or grubbing will be required. Approximately 200,000 m3 of water will be withdrawn at 25 liters per second (L/s) from January 1 to April 1, 2018. Water withdrawal will then cease and the water pipeline will be dismantled and natural revegetation will occur.

The second pipeline is an approximately 5.4 km long water pipeline (18" HDPE pipe) proposed for installation from TSF Pond 2 to Phillip Lake 1. The pipeline will be buried within the right-of-way of existing forestry access roads (2 m depth along roads, 3-3.5 m at road crossings), and through a vegetated area comprised of riparian and upland vegetation immediately adjacent to Philip Lake 1. A 30 m x 200 m (0.6 hectare [ha]) vegetation clearing would be required from the edge of the cutover to Philip Lake 1 to allow construction of the pump station and intake placement into the water. The pipeline will cross Rainbow Creek adjacent to the existing bridge (km 33 on Rainbow Road), where the exposed section will be insulated to prevent freezing. The pipeline will have a purge valve installed near its low point at Rainbow Creek to drain into the adjacent upland forest in the event of an emergency shut down to prevent freezing. Approximately 260,000 m3 of water would be withdrawn at up to 35 L/s from January 1 to April 1, 2018, and approximately 1,010,000 m3 of water would be withdrawn at up to 60 L/s from April 2 to September 1, 2018. In the event the Phase 2 Environmental Assessment amendment is not approved by end of 2018, similar open-water withdrawal rates are proposed for 2019.

At Philip Lake 1, the proposed pump will be a close-coupled centrifugal pump coupled to an electric motor, capable of pumping 1650 USGPM (104 L/sec). Pumping at Esker Lakes will utilize a close-coupled centrifugal pump coupled to an electric motor, similar to that used at Philip Lake 1. The pump will be capable however, of 3,240 USGPM (205 L/sec). Pump specifications for the proposed (or similar) pumps have been included in Appendix 1.

A 10 m x 10 m floating barge pump station will be required at the terminus end of each water pipeline. The barges will located in areas of the lakes where the water depth is greater than 2 m. The maximum pump capacity is anticipated to be 20D L/s, with sustained flow rates at 30 L/s to 60 L/s. A diesel generator, rated at 57 kW and 63 kVA under 80% load, will power each pump. Generators will be housed to produce a constant noise level of 68 dBA. Fuel consumption under 80% load will be approximately 13.08 L/hr, producing 3.45 x 10-2 metric tonnes/hr in carbon dioxide emissions.

Both generators will be capable of producing 150KW and will be supplied by a 500 US gallon diesel fuel tank.

Engineered drawings of the project further explain the pipes and pumps in more detail and can be found in Appendix 4.

Construction Schedule

Pipe construction and pump installation will commence immediately upon permit approvals. The anticipated timelines are included in the Table below. Table 3 shows the timeline of events associated with the amendment project from construction to decommissioning.

Reclamation

All disturbances associated with this expansion will become part of the Long Term Closure Plan for the Mount Milligan project and will comply with the programs and guidelines outlined in that document. The 5.7km of pipeline to Philip Lake 1 and pump area will be decommissioned at end of mine life. Piping will be removed and the pump pad will be reclaimed and revegetated allowing for both natural ingress as well as planting of native species appropriate for the ecology of the area. Road accesses will be reclaimed as per the Long Term Closure Plan for other roads in the area where applicable (i.e. road will not be used after mine life). Esker Lakes having no disturbance will be reclaimed in 2019 by removing the pump and pipe. Proposal:

The applicant received approval from the Agricultural Land Commission to subdivide the proposed 2 ha. parcel from the \pm 42.3 ha. subject property. Due to the minimum parcel area requirement prescribed by the Agricultural (Ag1) Zone, the applicant has applied for a development variance permit to vary the minimum parcel area from 16 ha to 2 ha to allow the creation of Proposed Lot 1.



REFERRAL COMMENTS

Advisory Planning Commission

Resolution: The APC recommends that the application be approved. Comments: The APC has no questions or concerns.

Ministry of Agriculture

From an agriculture perspective, maintaining the current zoning of AG1 on the subject parcel is not ideal; AG1 zoning and permitted agriculture uses are specific to large (16Ha+) parcel size.

I have some concern with possible precedent with this DVP approach on smaller than 16Ha parcels created by subdivision and maintaining AG1 zoning by means of DVP and not pursuing re-zoning to perhaps H1 or even H2 on parcels between 2 – 16Ha. That said, many of the surrounding Hislop / Bluff private land parcels are 5 acre (2 Ha) small-lots with primary use being residential with AG1 zoning, so this proposed parcel is certainly not out-of-character.

Although not entirely specific to this subject parcel and DVP referral, if there is an opportunity to engage with the Agriculture Land Commission planning staff regarding ALR boundary amendments and/or a multi-property re-zoning (H1) for the Bluff/Hislop 5 acre parcels it might be a worthy endeavour to better reflect the land use limitations (including agriculture activities) on small lot parcels such as these. Constraints to agriculture endeavours on these smaller 2 Ha parcels include: challenging topography, shallow soils, intense summer aspect/exposure and limited water availability.

Ministry of Transportation

Approval Not Recommended Due to Reasons Outlined Below:

The proposed subdivision will take the steep terrain with access from Bluff Road out of the farmable land. The original Lot 7 Plan PRP10646 was 7.6 ha in size. As I recall, there was not sufficient land to accommodate septic disposal and building envelope and water line with their respective setbacks on the property located off of Bluff Road.

As well, under current regulations, the proposal will need to be evaluated for, safe for intended use from a geotechnical perspective. I would anticipate that at minimum, there would be setbacks prescribed for any construction from the scarp which would further inhibit the useable area,

I strongly suggest that this area be investigated prior to a DVP being issued.

If a DVP is issued, these items will be part of the subdivision requirements. The issuance of a DVP does not automatically indicate that a subdivision will be approved. All requirements of the subdivision process must be met prior to any approval.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The owners of property within 50m of the subject property have been provided notice of the application and will have an opportunity to comment on this application at the Board meeting on December 14, 2017. No comments have been received to date.

Zoning

The application area is zoned Agricultural (Ag1). The minimum parcel size requirement for the Ag1 zone is 16 ha. Proposed Lot 1 does not meet this requirement. Because the parcel is not larger than 2 ha in size, the Provincial Approving Officer did not allow the subdivision to be created under Section 514 of the *Local Government Act* which allows the subdivision of land into parcels smaller than the minimum parcel size set by zoning, in certain circumstances, if the subdivision is to provide a family member with a residence.

Land Use

The property is located near Tyhee Lake near Telkwa. The application is a mix of smaller rural residential acreages and larger agricultural parcels. The actively farmed areas surrounding the application area are mixed, comprising of managed forage and pasture lands, mixed grass and legume field crops.

Discussion

All of Proposed Lot 1 is limited by topography and is not suitable for farming. Maintaining the Ag1 zone by issuing the development variance permit will keep the property's zoning consistent with the neighbouring properties on Bluff Road.

At the site visit, staff noted the challenges of the lot providing a safe building site and room for sewage due to the topography. The Provincial Subdivision Approving Officer will evaluate the hazards associated with geotechnical issues and the proposed parcel providing a suitable building site as part of the subdivision approval process. The Development Variance Permit will expire within three years of its issuance if these issues cannot be adequately addressed to the satisfaction of the Province

Recommendation:

That the Board approve Development Variance Permit A-03-17 for the property legally described as "Lot 1, Sections 36 and 31, Township 5 & 6, Range 5, Coast District, Plan EPP61667" to vary Section 14.02 of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993 from 16 ha. to 2 ha. developed in general compliance with Schedule A of the permit.



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

The applicants wish to sell their property to the Acting Agent. The interested buyers wish to rezone the property from Heavy Industrial (M2) to Small Holdings (H1) to facilitate a three residential lot subdivision and a shared common lot for access. This rezoning application is also being considered for adoption at the same Board meeting at which this application is being considered.



Preliminary Subdivision Plan

Please note, this plan is preliminary and is subject to changes.

DVP

The subject property is 7.73 ha. in size. The Small Holdings (H1) zone's minimum parcel area requirement is 2 ha, therefore the zone would facilitate a three lot subdivision. However, the interested buyers wish to have one lot be large enough for the option to build two single family dwellings. Under the H1 zone two single family dwellings are permitted if the property is as large as 4 ha. in size, but one lot can only be increased in size to 4 ha if one other lot is reduced in size.

The variance would allow one of the proposed lots to be smaller than the prescribed 2 ha. minimum parcel size provided that the number of residential lots created is not more than three. The DVP application would not vary density as long as the subdivision is limited to three residential parcels in total. As such, one parcel may need to be smaller

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than the permitted H1 minimum parcel area requirement of 2 ha. to accommodate the 4 ha. parcel that is large enough to support two single family dwellings.

Common Lot for Access

The subject property's access crosses the CN railway. Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTi) and CN have specified that they would like the proposed lots to use the same access point to decrease the number of crossings of the railway. As such, the applicants wish to create a 40m x 40m (0.16 ha.) Proposed Common Lot used for access purposes to satisfy CN and MoTI's access concerns.

Therefore, the applicant has applied for a Development Variance Permit to vary Section 12.02 of Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993, by reducing the minimum parcel area from 2 ha. to 1.2 ha. for one of the proposed lots and 0.16 ha. for a common lot used for access.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The adjacent property owners within 50m of the subject property have been provided notice of the application and will have an opportunity to comment on this application at the Board meeting on December 14, 2017 when the Board considers this application.

Official Community Plan

The property is currently designated as Lakeshore (L) in the Burns Lake Rural and Francois Lake (North Shore) Official Community Plan Bylaw 1785, 2017 (the OCP). The OCP direction is that the property be developed for residential use rather than industrial use; therefore, the application is consistent with the Official Community Plan.

The intention of the Lakeshore Designation is to develop residential lots that fit the existing character of the Plan area, and ensures future development does not have a notably negative impact on the natural environment.

Section 3.5.2 (8) of the OCP states that rezoning applications to permit parcels as small as 2 hectares (4.94 acres) may be considered where:

- (a) It has been demonstrated that the proposed lots can accommodate an onsite water supply and sewage disposal system;
- (b) The development is compatible with adjacent land uses and maintains the rural character of the area;
- (c) Parcels are not located on a floodplain or on other hazard lands; and,
- (d) The development addresses wildlife and ecological values.

Zoning

The uses permitted in the Small Holdings (H1) zone include:

- (a) single family dwelling;
- (b) two family dwelling;
- (c) agriculture;
- (d) horticulture, nursery, greenhouse;

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- (e) silviculture;
- (f) kennel and veterinary clinic;
- (g) home occupation;
- (h) buildings and structures accessory to the permitted principal uses.

The permitted uses fit the character of the area. The H1 Zone and the terms of the DVP would ensure that no more than 3 parcels and one common lot for access are created.

Sewage

The applicants have hired an engineer to ensure that the parcels can accommodate an on-site water supply and sewage disposal system. It is noted that the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure will evaluate the availability of a safe building site as part of the subdivision approval process. The subject property is within building inspection area.



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
Proposal:

To amend Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993 from **Heavy Industrial (M2)** to **Small Holdings (H1)** to allow the subdivision of the property into three parcels and a common lot for access.

The preliminary lot layout plan shows the proposed lots as follows,

- Preliminary Parcel A is 1.2 ha (3.0 acres) in size and will be vacant.
- Preliminary Parcel B is 1.9 ha (4.8 acres) in size and contains the existing residence and septic field.
- Preliminary Parcel C is 3.7 ha (9.1 acres) in size and contains the existing shop.
- Preliminary Parcel D is 80.9 m² (0.02 acres) in size and will be a common lot for access purposes.

Preliminary Lot Layout Plan (Revised October 30, 2017)



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It is noted that the parcel layout shown above is preliminary and may change during the formal subdivision approval process through the Provincial Approving Officer with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure.

Development Variance Permit

The property owner has also applied for a Development Variance Permit (DVP) to vary the minimum parcel size of one of the three proposed residential parcels and the common lot for access purposes. This application is also being considered in a separate report along with this adoption report.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The public hearing for Bylaw 1812 was held on November 20, 2017. No concerns or comments were raised.

At the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako November 23, 2017 Board meeting third reading was given to "Regional District of Bulkley-Nehcako Rezoning Bylaw No. 1812, 2017".

The rezoning bylaw has been signed by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, as required. This rezoning bylaw is therefore brought forward for consideration of adoption.



PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to obtain Board approval to re-enter into a 9-1-1 Call Answer and Fire/Rescue Dispatch Services Agreement with the Regional District of Fraser-Fort George (RDFFG). This agreement allows the RDBN to provide fire/rescue dispatch services to residents in the RDBN 9-1-1 service area.

DISCUSSION:

The current contract between the RDBN and RDFFG is due to expire on December 31, 2017. This contract allows residents within the RDBN 9-1-1 service areas, who have access to a telephone connected to a telephone system, to dial 9-1-1 and communicate with a Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) for the purpose of reporting information relating to police, fire or ambulance emergencies.

The Cariboo Regional District, Regional District of Kitimat-Stikine, Regional District of Central Kootney and other unconfirmed Regional Districts have all received the same draft 9-1-1 Services agreement from RDFFG. Costs for Annual Maintenance are shared between all RDFFG 'Clients'.

This agreement is essential for providing 9-1-1 service to RDBN residents. The draft agreement between the Regional District of Fraser-Fort George is attached for your consideration. Section 2 of the draft agreement outlines the following services that RDFFG will provide to the RDBN:

- 1. 9-1-1 Call Answer Service within the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area;
- 2. Fire/Rescue Emergency Dispatch and Communications Service; and
- 3. CAD, RMS, and supporting GIS services.

Section 3.2 of the draft agreement outlines the RDBN's responsibility.



9-1-1 CALL ANSWER and FIRE/RESCUE DISPATCH SERVICE AGREEMENT

BETWEEN:

THE REGIONAL DISTRICT OF FRASER-FORT GEORGE, a local government incorporated pursuant to the Local Government Act and having its business office located at: 155 George Street Prince George, British Columbia V2L 1P8

(hereinafter referred to as the "RDFFG")

AND:

REGIONAL DISTRICT OF BULKLEY-NECHAKO.

a local government incorporated pursuant to the Local Sovernment Act and having its business office located at: 37 3rd Avenue, PO Box 820 Burns Lake, British Columbia V0J 1E0

(hereinafter referred to as the "RDBN")

OF THE SECOND PART

OF THE FIRST PART

WHEREAS:

- A. the RDFFG provides 9-1-1 call answer and free rescue dispatch emergency services;
- B. the RDBN wishes the RDFFG to provide 9117 call answer and the rescue dispatch services through the RDFFG System; and
- C. the parties have agreed to enter into this 9-1-1 Gall Answer and Fire/Rescue Dispatch Services Agreement (the Agreement) on the terms and conditions set out herein.

NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSES THAT, in consideration of the premises, covenants, and promises of each party terein contained the parties agree as follows:

1. DEFINITIONS

In this Agreement:

"93141. Call Answer Service" means to permit persons within the RDBN 9-1-1 Service Area who have access to a telephone connected to a telephone system, to dial 9-1-1 for the purpose of reporting information relating to police, fire, or ambulance emergencies

"9-1-1 Service Area" means the geographic area as described in Appendix B

"CAD" means the Computer Aided Dispatch System used for dispatching fire/rescue agencies

"RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area" means the geographic area as described in Appendix B

"RDBN's Agencies" means the fire/rescue emergency response agencies within the RDBN 9-1-1 Service Area listed in Appendix 'C'

"RDBN's System" means the RDBN's field radio dispatch and communications system, and all other equipment and facilities within the Service Area that are required for the purpose of receiving dispatches from and otherwise communicating with the FOCC



"DATA" means address points, street centerlines, zone boundaries and community boundaries, and all associated attributes

"E-Comm" means Emergency Communications for British Columbia Incorporated, responsible for providing the PSAP Service

"Effective Date" means the date that service commences as specified in Section 5.1

"ERA" or "Emergency Response Agency" means any emergency response agency to which emergency calls are transferred through the Services and which is responsible for dispatching police, fire, medical emergency or other emergency personnel

"Fire/Rescue Emergency Dispatch and Communications Service" means the service responsible for receiving 9-1-1 fire/rescue calls from the PSAP and other emergency telephone calls from another source and dispatching the agencies listed in Appendix C

"FOCC" means the Fire Operations Communications Centre designated by the RDFFG that is responsible for providing the Fire/Rescue Emergency Dispatch and Communications Service

"GIS" means the computerized Geographic Information system used to manage the Data

"PSAP" means the Primary Safety Answering Point operated by the operator designated in section 2.2 (a.) on behalf of the RDFFG

"RCMP" means the Royal Canadian Mounted Police

"RDFFG System" means the 9-1-1 Emergency Velephone Service provided by the RDFFG consisting of 9-1-1 call answer, fire/rescue dispatch, and supporting GIS services

"RMS" means the Records Management System provided by the RDFFG for use by the fire/rescue agencies

"Service Fee" means the amounts payable by the RDBN in respect of the Services as described in Appendix 'A'

"Services, means, collectively, the PSAP service and the Fire/Rescue Emergency Dispatch and Communications Service, and the additional services described in this Agreement, to be provided by the RDFFG, and the

"Term" meanstructerm of this Agreement as described in Section 5.1.

2. SERVICES

- 2.1
- THERDFFG agrees to provide the Services to the RDBN as described below:
- a. Call AnswerService within the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area;
- b. File/Reserverence Dispatch and Communications Service; and
- c. CAD, RMS, and supporting GIS services.



- 2.2 Unless otherwise specified by the RDFFG:
 - a. the PSAP shall be operated by E-Comm from the Emergency Communications Centre for Southwest British Columbia; and
 - b. the Fire/Rescue Emergency Dispatch and Communications Service shall be operated by the City of Prince George and referred to as the FOCC for the purpose of this Agreement.

2.3 PSAP

In accordance with the terms of its contract with the PSAP provider, the RDFFG will require that all 9-1-1 calls routed by telecommunications service providers from the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area to the PSAP, or that are otherwise received by the PSAP from the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area, be:

- a. transferred by the PSAP to the RCMP if the call relates to a police emergency;
- b. transferred by the PSAP to the FOCC if the calling ates to a fire outsetue emergency; and
- c. transferred by the PSAP to the BC Ambulance Solvice if the call relates to amedical emergency.

2.4 Fire/Rescue Emergency Dispatch and Communications Service

In accordance with the terms of its contract with the operator of the FOCC (but subject to section 3.1(d) of this Agreement), the RDF5G will require that upon receiving a 9-1-1 call from the PSAP, or an emergency call from another source within the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area, that relates to a fire or rescue emergency, the FOCC will dispatch and communicate with the appropriate RDBN's Agency(ies) when fire/rescue services are required.

3. ADDITIONAL SERVICES

3.1 The RDFFG agrees to:

- a. Supply the RDBN with a report of all fire/rescue dispatched incidents within the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area on amonthly basis, which will include statistics on the number of police, fire, and amount calls the served.
- b. Receive process, maintain, and update CAD and GIS data provided by the RDBN.
- c. Povide CAD and RMS software and software support services, maintain and operate the CAD and RMS software and undertake periodic software updates and equipment upgrades as required to maintain efficiency of the Services.
- d. Wake reasonable efforts to require the FOCC to operate to standards established by the National Emergency Number Association and the National Fire Protection Association.
- e. Schedule meetings in Prince George or at the RDBN's office as necessary, to discuss system operation, maintenance, development, and costs. The cost of each party's attendance will be the responsibility of that party.



3.2 The RDBN agrees to:

- a. Maintain and operate the RDBN's System in the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area.
- b. Where the RDBN has or requires Crown tenures or private property agreements for communications sites, it is the responsibility of the RDBN to secure and maintain such agreements.
- Provide twenty-four (24) hours/seven (7) days per week technical repair and maintenance services for the RDBN's System.
- d. Maintain and update CAD and GIS Data derived from the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area, including all of the RDBN's member municipalities and First Nations, and to forward the Data and regular updates to the RDFFG. The RDBN acknowledges and agrees that if regular Data updates are not submitted by the RDBN to the RDFFG, the RDFFG shall not be responsible for missing or incorrect Data.
- e. Data submitted shall be spatial and in the format specified by the RDFFG, unless alternative arrangements have been mutually agreed upon by the RDFEG and the RDBN.
- f. All addressing inquiries received by the RDFFG shallce redirected to the RDEN
- g. Notify Telus of all address changes for the RDBN's service area.
- Act as a liaison between the RDFFG/FOCG all Emergency Response Agencies listed in Appendix C, member municipalities, and Enst Nations in its Setvice Area.
- i. Confirm and sign off on the agencies in Appendix G
- j. Provide requests for all additions and deletions to the list or agencies in the RDBN's Service Area by way of an updated and signed off Appendix C provided to the RDFFG. The amended Appendix C shall be attached to and form an integral part of this Agreement. Additions to the list of agencies serviced may result in costs to the RDBN to implement, see Appendix A 40.

4. SERVICE FEES

4.1 Fees and Disbursements

The RDFFG will charge for the performance of the Services only the fees and disbursements authorized under this Agreement.

- 4.2
- Invoices

Invoicing shall occur semi-annually. The RDFFG shall provide the RDBN with an invoice for the Service Reenavable for the previous six month's calls as determined in accordance with Appendix A

The RDBN will pay to the RDFFG the Service Fee payable in respect of that invoicing period as determined in accordance with Appendix A.





4.3 Taxes

The RDBN will pay all applicable taxes levied by any governmental authority in connection with the payment of the Service Fee or the Services provided under this Agreement.

5. TERM, AMENDMENT AND TERMINATION

5.1 Term

This Services provided in this Agreement will be delivered January 1, 2018 to December 31, 2022.

5.2 Amendment

This Agreement may only be amended by agreement in writing by both parties. Any amendment(s) will be attached to and form an integral part of this Agreement.

5.3 Termination of the Services

The parties acknowledge that the Services are essential for the protection of the public in the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area.

In the event of a breach of this Agreement by the RDBN, the RDFFG agrees it will not terminate this Agreement unless the RDFFG provides notice of the breach of the Agreement by the RDBN, and the RDBN fails to rectify the breach with SIX (6) months of the date of notice.

In the event of a breach by the RDFFC that results in loss of or substantial degradation to, the Services, the RDBN may terminate this Agreement by providing six (6) months' notice to the RDFFC. In the event of early termination of this Agreement, the Service Fee will be adjusted on a pro-rate basis for Services that were completed up to and including the date of termination.

6. **DISPUTE RESOLUTION**

6.1 Procedure

If there is any dispute arising out of or relating to, this Agreement, the parties will attempt to resolve such dispute first by direct negotiation and then, if that is not successful and if the parties so agree, by mediation with a neutral third party mediator acceptable to both parties. Each party will bear its own costs and expenses in connection with any mediation and all costs and expenses of the mediator will be shared equally by the parties. If any dispute is not settled by negotiation or mediation within sixty (60) days either party may give written notice to the other requiring the dispute be settled exclusively by binding arbitration by a single arbitrator. If the parties cannot egree on an arbitrator, the arbitrator will be selected in accordance with the *Arbitration Acc*



6.2 No Suspension of Services

The parties agree that the Services are essential for the protection of the public within the RDBN's 9-1-1 Service Area and that the Services may not be suspended during the resolution of any dispute referred to in section 6.1 unless this Agreement has first been terminated in accordance with section 5.3.

7. INSURANCE

Each party will obtain and maintain a comprehensive general liability insurance policy against claims for bodily injury, including death, property damage or other loss anising out of the operation of the Services. The RDFFG and the RDBN will each include the other as an additional insured on the policy obtained and maintained by that party. Each policy will be written on a comprehensive basis with inclusive limits of not less than \$10,000,000 (ten million dollars) per occurrence or such higher limit as the parties may agree from time to time. If this Agreement is terminated prior to the expiration of the Term, the parties agree to maintain their respective policies for two (2) years after the date of such termination.

8. INDEMNIFICATION

8.1 RDFFG Indemnification

The RDFFG hereby indemnifies, saves harmless, releases and forever discharges the RDBN from and against any and all manner of actions clauses of actions, claims, debts, suits, losses, liabilities, costs, demands and expenses whatscever, whether known or unknown, of any person in any way arising from, in connection with constitute to the operation of the RDFFG System which is in any way contributed to, or by reason of the negligence or other fault of the RDFFG, its servants, agents or employees in connection with or in consequence of this Agreement.

8.2 RDBN indemnification

The RDBN hereby incernifies, saves hamiles incleases and forever discharges the RDFFG from and against any and altmanner of actions, causes of actions, claims, debts, suits, losses, liabilities, costs, demands and expenses whatsoever, whether known or unknown, of any person in any way arising from in connection with, or attributable to, the negligence or other fault of RDBN its servants, agents or employees in connection with, or in consequence of, this Agreement

9. GENERAL PROVISIONS

9.1 Further Agreements

One (ii) year prior to the expiry of the Term of this Agreement, the parties will meet to discuss the terms of an evagreement for the provision of the Services, but neither party will be bound to extend or renew this Agreement, or to enter into a new agreement, unless the terms of the extension, renewal or new agreement are approved by that party's Board and the agreement is executed by that party's authorized signatories.

In the event that six months prior to the end of the Term of this Agreement the RDBN provides the RDFFG with written notice that it does not intend to renew this Agreement or to enter into a new Agreement, the RDFFG will calculate the RDBN's invoice for the final year of the Term of this Agreement in accordance with Appendix A and with section 4.2.



9.2 Assignment

Neither party will have the right to assign, transfer, or otherwise dispose of any of its interest in all or any part of this Agreement, without the prior written consent of the other party.

9.3 Notices

Any notice required pursuant to this Agreement will be in writing and delivered personally, by courier, registered mail, or email to the address of the appropriate party as set forth herein, or to such other address as either party may substitute by written notice to the other:

Any notice or other writing sent in compliance with this section is deemed to have been given and received on the day it is so delivered unless that day is not a business day, in which case the notice shall be deemed to have been given and received on the next day that is a business day. For clarity, "business day" means a day other than a Saturday, Sunday or statutory holiday in the Province of British columbia.

9.4 Entire Agreement

This Agreement constitutes the return agreement between the RDBN and the RDFFG and supersedes all previous expectations, understandings, communications, representations and agreements, whether verbal or written, between the RDBN and RDFFG with respect to its subject matter and may not be modified except by subsequent agreement in writing executed by the RDBN and the RDBN and the RDBN except by subsequent agreement in writing executed by the RDBN and the RDBN and the RDBN.

This Agreement will enure to the benefit of, and be binding upon the parties hereto, and their successors, administrators, executors, heirs and permitted assigns.

Each of the parties hereto covenants and agrees to execute such further documents and instruments and do such other things as may be necessary to implement and carry out the intent of this Agreement.

9.5 Waiver

Except as may be specifically agreed in writing, no action or failure to act by the RDBN or the RDFFG shall constitute a waiver of any right or duty afforded either of them under this Agreement, nor shall any such action or failure to act, constitute an approval of, or acquiescence in any breach of this Agreement.



Waiver of any default by either party will not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent default by that party.

9.6 Relationship of Parties

The legal relationship between the RDFFG and the RDBN arising pursuant to this Agreement is that of service provider and purchaser of services and in particular, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed so as to render the relationship between the RDFFG and the RDBN to be that of partners in a partnership or joint venture, or employee and employer.

Nothing in this Agreement will be construed as creating any employment or other contractual relationship between the RDBN, E-Comm, or the City of Prince George, its employees, servants, or agents.

9.7 Access to Records

- a. The RDFFG will promptly provide the RDBN with operations information and records respecting the operation of the FOCC, as the RDBN acting reasonably may from time to time require.
- b. The RDFFG will provide to the RDBN a copy of any contract agreement, or memorandum of understanding between E-Comm, the City of Prince George and the RDFFG concerning the operation of the PSAP or the FOCC.

9.8 Access to Information Requests and Protection of Privacy

The RDFFG and RDBN both acknowledge and agree that all requests for access to records referred to in sections 2.3 and 2.4 of this Agreement that are received from third parties under the *Freedom* of *Information and Projection of Privacy* Apt (B.C.) ("FIPPA") by the RDFFG or the RDBN shall be processed in accordance with *FIPPA*. The RDFFG and the RDBN will comply with all federal and provincial legislation applicable with respect to the protection of privacy as in effect from time to time, including without limitation the provisions of the *FIPPA*. Without limiting the foregoing, the RDFFG and the RDBN both acknowledge and agree that the records referred to that is section include personal information (as defined in the *FIPPA*) and that such personal information shall be collected, maintained, used and disclosed only as permitted by and in accordance with the provisions of the *FIPPA*.

9.9 Validity

Should any part of this Agreement be declared or held invalid for any reason, such invalidity will not affect the validity of the remainder which will continue in full force and effect and be construed as if this Agreement had been executed without the invalid portion.



9.10 Miscellaneous

- a. Every reference to each party is deemed to include the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, permitted assigns, employees, servants, agents, officers, and invitees of that party whenever the context so requires or allows.
- b. Time is of the essence concerning this Agreement.
- c. This Agreement will be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the laws of the Province of British Columbia.

2.0 FIRE/RESCUE EMERGENCY DISPATCH AND COMMUNICATIONS ANNUAL OPERATING COST CONTRIBUTION



Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Service Area







Attached to this email are the estimates and proposed contract for your review regarding the continuation of 9-1-1 Call Answer and Fire Dispatch Services.

This email will also confirm that services we provide will not be impacted, by the delay's that will be required to have RD Boards consider and approve our draft 2018-2022 contract.

Some additional background and highlights on the Service:

- The 9-1-1 Call Answer and Fire Dispatch Service was first introduced in 1992 and was a FFG Extra-Territorial Service that captured the North Cariboo. I believe the BC Tel system dictated geography of the service area at the time which caused the North Cariboo to be included
 - In 2005 the South Cariboo was brought in through a separate service agreement and the North Cariboo was still part of the Extra-Territorial Service Area
 - o In 2007 the Kitimat Stikine came on line through a service agreement
 - In 2009 the Extra-Territorial Service with the North Cariboo was terminated (service withdrawal process) and service was continued through a single service agreement for the whole of the Cariboo
 - o In 2011 the Bulkley-Nechako came on line through a separate service agreement
 - o At this time 76 agencies are supported through our fire dispatch (FOCC) service
- The PSAP portion of the 9-1-1 service is provided by EComm and FFG has the contract with EComm on behalf of the four partners
- Our Fire Dispatch Service Level is based on a constant and open communication system with responding VFDs for the event duration to ensure constant support of the responding agency
- Fire Dispatch (FOCC) is an RD service and we contract with the City of Prince George for dispatcher personnel and the physical location of the dispatch center. Dispatch equipment and the CAD/RM5 is RD supplied and maintained
 - o In the last set of IAFF negotiations the City was successful in reducing dispatcher wages
 - The City is building a new fire hall and the dispatch centre will be relocated into this new facility. There is no capital expectations in respect of the bricks and mortar component of the project
- Costs are apportioned evenly among the partners based on call volume. This is a shared risk funding formula and RDFFG does not have a profit margin in the formula.

- We are changing the billing cycle in this agreement to a <u>twice-yearly</u> cycle so we can be fluid in bringing in new partners and sharing any savings
- In the New Year:
 - o we are hoping to expand service in the KSRD to a previously un-serviced area
 - we will be providing Fire Dispatch to a sub-set of halls in the Central Kootenay
 - o we have been directed to continue to look to find others (and we have interest)
 - o Any expansion will use the same cost apportionment formula with savings shared by all.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to obtain Board approval of the RDBN's application to UBCM's Community Emergency Preparedness Fund under the Emergency Operations Centre funding stream.

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS FUND APPLICATION:

The application deadline for UBCM's Community Emergency Preparedness Fund's Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) intake is February 2, 2017. Up to \$25,000 is available per local government to build and enhance capacity and response to emergencies through training, purchase of equipment and other EOC needs. The grant application requires a Board resolution indicating support for the activities proposed and a willingness to provide overall grant management.

The Protective Services Department recommends that the RDBN apply for the grant for projects that will increase efficiency and capacity to respond to emergencies or disasters within the Region. These projects relate to our current responsibilities as designated by the *Emergency Program Act* in the provision of staff EOC training, EOC equipment, and a functional Emergency Operations Centre exercise. The recommended projects include the following:

- Staff EOC training expenses including training for emergency radio communications.
- The provision of EOC specific computers and necessary programming.
- Consultant, facility rental and other expenses associated with hosting a functional exercise.
- Backup power and communication equipment should the office be unusable or communications are down.

Recommendation

"That the RDBN Board supports application to UBCM's Community Emergency Preparedness Fund's Emergency Operations Centre program for the following activities.

- 1. Staff EOC training expenses including training for emergency radio communications.

PURPOSE:

To renew the Luck Bay Fire Protection Agreement for another five (5) year term.

BACKGROUND:

The Regional District of Bulkley Nechako currently owns and maintains the Luck Bay Fire Hall, and holds an agreement with the District of Fort St. James to provide fire protection to the Luck Bay Rural Fire Protection Area. This agreement expires on December 31, 2017. In 2016 the Luck Bay Fire Hall was downgraded from a 3B rating to a 5 by the Fire Underwriters Survey (FUS), mainly due to a lack of membership, availability of a water tender, and an established water supply. This means that even though the area is provided with fire protection services, residents do not receive a discount on their home insurance. The former Fire Chief of Fort St. James, in discussion with Regional District Staff, made it clear that he did not wish to go forward and renew the contract with Luck Bay when it expired. Since that time, a new Fire Chief has been hired. He, along with Regional District staff, are working to ensure the continued delivery of Fire Protection services to the Luck Bay area, and the hope to one day regain the 3B rating.

DISCUSSION:

The Luck Bay Rural Fire Protection Agreement has been reviewed by both Regional District staff, and the District of Fort St. James. The only proposed change is to Section 2 (b)(ii) of the attached draft agreement which reads as follows:

- "The Regional District will consider identitying and establishing a secondary water source" was changed to:
- The Regional District will actively assist the District in identifying and establishing sufficient dry hydrants within the Luck Bay Rural Fire Protection Area to provide primary all weather access water source(s) as deemed necessary by the District Fire Chief.

The identification and installation of a water source is one of the top priorities if the Luck Bay Fire Protection Service is to succeed. The Regional Fire Chief along with the District Fire Chief will work together to identify the best option/location for this water source in the spring/summer of 2018. It is anticipated that the cost of the all-weather water source will be at the expense of the rural service area. These costs and budgeting implications will be discussed in detail as part of the Rural Fire Department Review being completed in 2018.

Recommendation

That the Board Chair and staff be authorized to enter into the attached agreement with the District of Fort St. James for a five (5) year contract ending on December 31, 2022

LUCK BAY RURAL FIRE PROTECTION AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT DATED THIS _____ DAY OF _____, 2017

BETWEEN:

THE REGIONAL DISTRICT OF BULKLEY-NECHAKO, P.O. BOX 820, Burns Lake, British Columbia, VOJ 1EO

(hereinafter referred to as "the Regional District")

OF THE FIRST PART

AND:

THE DISTRICT OF FORT ST. JAMES, 477 Stuart Drive West, P.O. Box 640, Fort St. James, British Columbia, V0J 1P0

(hereinafter referred to as "the District")

OF THE SECOND PART

WHEREAS: a Regional District may, by bylaw establish and operate a local service under the provisions of Part 24 of the Local Government Act;

AND WHEREAS: The Regional District has established by Bylaw No. 1335, a service of fire protection for a portion of Electoral Area "C" known as the "Luck Bay Rural Fire Protection Service Area";

AND WHEREAS: to facilitate the provision of fire protection services in the Luck Bay Fire Protection Service Area (the Service Area), a satellite fire hall will be required in the Service Area:

AND WHEREAS: the parties wish to develop an integrated fire protection service, to include the Service Area, under the direction and management of the District of Fort St. James;

AND WHEREAS: the parties wish to enter into a contractual agreement to provide for a fire protection service in the Service Area;

NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises and of mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto covenant and agree each with the other as follows:

1. Service Provision

- a) The District undertakes to provide fire protection service to structures and dwellings for and to the residents of the "Luck Bay Rural Fire Protection Service Area" shown on Schedule "A" to "Luck Rural Fire Protection Service Establishment By-law No. 1335 (the Service Area) at the "Exterior Operations Level" as defined in the Structure Firefighters Competency and Training Playbook published by the Office of the Fire Commissioner of BC, In addition, the District will:
 - i) make every effort to recruit and train sufficient fire fighters to meet and maintain the District of Fort St. James Fire Department's operational requirements and guidelines, utilizing all available resources;
 - ii) make every effort to provide sufficient water for incidents using all available

resources; and

- iii) employ risk management options when providing fire protection services to the Luck Bay Rural Fire Protection Area.
- b) For the purpose of this Agreement, the service provision standards and requirements agreed to by the parties under section 1(a) are referred to hereafter as the "Service Provision Requirements".

2. <u>Regional District Provisions</u>

- a) The Regional District, on behalf of the Service Area, provides a satellite fire hall on a property within the Service Area suitable for housing a pumper fire truck. As the Regional District owns the satellite fire hall, it is responsible for the related debt repayments, the cost of maintenance, improvements, additions, and utilities. Improvements and additions must be mutually agreed upon by both parties.
- b) The Regional District will :
 - Actively assist the District with recruitment of firefighters that live within the protection area of the Luck Bay Fire hall by mailing letters and/or flyers provided by the District advising area residents of the requirement for new firefighters; and
 - ii) Actively assist the District in identifying, and establishing sufficient Dry Hydrants within the Luck Bay Rural Fire Protection Area to provide primary all weather access water sources as deemed necessary by the District Fire Chief.

3. Annual Fee for Service

The Regional District, on behalf of the Service Area, undertakes to pay the District an annual sum (to be paid on August 1st. in each year) in compensation for the provision of the said service during the lifetime of this Agreement as hereinafter determined.

- a) The formula for the calculation of the annual amount due under this section, shall be as follows:
 - Determine the converted hospital assessment on land and improvements within the District of Fort St. James, the existing rural service area, the Service Area and all three areas together;
 - ii) Calculate the percentage of the converted hospital assessment within the District of Fort St. James, the existing rural service area and the Service Area respectively; and
 - iii) Apply these percentages to the net annual operating costs of the fire protection service to determine the proportionate contribution of the District, the existing rural service area and the Luck Bay Service Area.
- b) The maximum amount the Service Area shall contribute to the fire protection

service shall not exceed THREE DOLLARS (\$3.00) per ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000) of the net taxable value of land and improvements in the Service Area. Renegotiation of the bylaw is required should the maximum amount be reached during the life of this Agreement.

c) The Regional District and District will use the latest and/or adjusted assessment information provided by the British Columbia Assessment Authority in determining the converted hospital assessment on land and improvements.

4. Annual Budget

The Electoral Area "C" Director of the Regional District shall be involved in the preparation of the District's Fire Department Annual Budget, the net operating costs of which shall be furnished to the Regional District in time to be included in the Regional District's Annual Budget for that year, no later than March 1st.

5. <u>Record of Fires</u>

The District shall keep a record of fires within the District of Fort St. James and each rural service area for the benefit and information of both the District and Regional District.

6. Other Agreements

The District shall ensure that any agreement between the District of Fort St. James and the Ministry of Forests with respect to the control and extinguishment of fires shall apply to the Service Area.

7. Indemnities

- a) Except for the District Liabilities for which the District is responsible under * section 7(b), the Regional District agrees to defend, indemnify and save harmless the District and its officers, employees, agents, successors and assigns, from any and all liability arising from personal injury, death or other damages or loss, whether to persons or property, which may be suffered, sustained or which are attributable to provision of the Fire Protection Services. This includes, but is not limited to, claims of third parties, and demands, actions, causes of action, losses, damages, costs, liabilities and expenses (including legal fees and costs on a solicitor and own client basis) of whatever kind or character on account of any actual or alleged loss, injury or damage to any person or to any property arising out of or in connection with the provision of or inability to provide Fire Protection Services, including liability arising from an insufficient number of firefighters capable of manning equipment attending an incident, response time to an incident, and an adequate water supply not being available to effectively fight a fire, provided the District has made every reasonable effort to comply with the Service Provision requirements agreed to by the Parties under section 1 of this Agreement.
- b) The District agrees to defend, indemnify and save harmless the Regional District and its officers, employees, agents, successors and assigns, from any and all liability arising from personal injury, death or other damages or

loss, whether to persons or property, which may be suffered, sustained or which are attributable to the negligence of the District in providing Fire Protection Services, or to the failure of the District to provide Fire Protection Services in accordance with the requirements of this Agreement (the "District Liabilities"). For certainty, the District's responsibility under this section 7(b) shall not apply to any liabilities arising out of the provision by the District of the Fire Protection Services that arise from an insufficient number of firefighters capable of manning equipment attending an incident, the response time to an incident, or an adequate water supply not being available to effectively fight a fire, provided the District has made every reasonable effort to comply with the Service Level requirements agreed to by the Parties under section 1 of this Agreement.

c) The provisions of this section 7 shall survive the expiry or termination of this Agreement.

8. Force Majeure

- a) "Force Majeure" means any event or circumstance not within the reasonable control of the party claiming Force Majeure and includes:
 - i) acts of God, including wind, ice and other storms, lightning, floods, earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and landslides;
 - ii) strikes, lockouts and other industrial disturbances;
 - iii) epidemics, war (whether or not declared), blockades, acts or public enemies, acts of sabotage, civil insurrection, riots and civil disobedience; and
 - iv) explosions, fires or mechanical breakdowns.
- b) If at any time any party hereto is unable to fulfill an obligation under this Agreement due to an event of Force Majeure, that party shall be relieved from its obligation for the duration of such event of Force Majeure, provided that the party claiming the benefit of this section shall within twenty-four (24) hours of the occurrence of the event that party claims is an event of Force Majeure provide to the other parties a notice in writing specifying:
 - i) the event that party claims is an event of Force Majeure;
 - ii) the circumstances which that party claims prevents it from performance of its obligations under this Agreement.
- c) The provisions of this section shall not relieve a party of its obligation to continue to take all reasonable steps within that party's control to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement, or to resume the carrying out of its obligations hereunder at the earliest opportunity, or to mitigate the extent of the loss or damage it may suffer or incur as a result of the event of Force Majeure.
- 9. <u>Term of Agreement</u>

The procedures outlined in this Agreement shall apply to each succeeding year during the term of this Agreement. The term of this Agreement shall be Five (5) years commencing on January 1, 2018 and terminating on December 31, 2022.

10. Early Termination

- a) In the event that, at the discretion of the District of Fort St. James in consultation with the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, it is determined that the District of Fort St. James can no longer provide adequate fire protection to the Service Area due to a lack of appropriate volunteer firefighters or equipment, the District may terminate this agreement with six (6) months written notice.
- b) During the notice period, the Regional District will work with the Fort St. James Fire Department to attempt to resolve the lack of firefighters by mailing letters and/or flyers advising area residents of the requirement for new firefighters or equipment by looking for alternate funding options. If this effort is successful in resolving the lack of firefighters or equipment to the satisfaction of the District of Fort St. James, the termination notice may be rescinded by the District in consultation with the Regional District.
- c) In the event that this Agreement is terminated early, all payments from the Regional District to the District will terminate. The Regional District will continue to own the satellite fire hall and any equipment which it has purchased and it will continue to be responsible for the repayment of any debt it has incurred to purchase these assets.
- d) The District will offer the right of first refusal to the Regional District regarding the sale of any fire trucks or equipment should the satellite fire hall be closed

Greetings.

Note: You ore receiving this update becouse at some point in the post, you have mode on inquiry or ottended a seminor regarding our model building bylow project. I have olso sent this update to our designoted member contocts, so I apologize of your are getting this message more than once.

As you have probably heard, the MIABC has embarked upon a project to update the Core Building Bylaw that the MIABC released in 2002 – originally drafted by Tom Barnes. The new version is being drafted by Don Lidstone of <u>Lidstone & Company</u>. There are may reasons for this project: the old version is 15 years old, the Building Act has introduced new changes, and the Building Code has undergone significant revisions. The new version of the bylaw is in the final stages of development and is currently being reviewed by the Province for its feedback. It is not possible to announce a fixed release date, but the target we are working toward is to release the revised building bylaw before the December 15, 2017 milestone (ie: the date that <u>Section 5</u> of the *Building Act* takes effect).

The 2017 version of the Model Building Bylaw will be more detailed than the last, but it will be built on the same core principles that Tom Barnes developed fifteen years ago. There will be up to three versions: one for large cities, one for small villages, and one for regional districts.

The December 15, 2017 date is a milestone only because of section 5 coming into force. In reality, that date is not a deadline for you to enact a revision to your building bylaw. If your existing bylaw remains in force after December 15th, there are some issues that deserve your attention, but those issues can be dealt with. Any provision in a local government bylaw that contains a "local building requirement" (as defined in the Building Act) will be *ultra vires*. This is not limited to your building bylaw and possibly could affect other bylaws that contain building requirements. However, even if some provisions in your building bylaw become *ultro vires* on December 15th, the rest of your bylaw will remain in effect. What is important is that you identify those unlawful building requirements and issue clear directions to building department staff and to building permit applicants confirming that those requirements no longer apply and will not be enforced.

Also, if your current building bylaw has sprinkler requirements above and beyond those imposed by the building code, please take note. The Building Act was going to ban all such provisions under section 5 of the Act, but in response to pressure from municipal fire departments (particularly in rural areas), the Province has issued an exception for sprinkler requirements if those requirements were contained in a bylaw enacted prior to December 15th. If you have such sprinkler requirements in your bylaw now, they will be grandfathered. If you change your building bylaw after December 15th, you will lose the grandfathered status of those sprinkler provisions. The Province is reviewing the sprinkler situation

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and will likely be issuing a Building Act supplemental regulation in the future. In the meantime, if you want to keep existing sprinkler provisions, they must be in force as of December 15 and you will lose them if you amend your bylaw after December 15th. What some local governments have decided to do about this is to pull their sprinkler requirements out of their building bylaw and enact a stand-alone sprinkler bylaw before December 15th. That way, they are free to amend their building bylaw after December 15th without losing their sprinkler provisions.

We have heard that many local governments plan to adopt new building bylaws in the new year (January to March). There is no real need to rush the process other than the sprinkler issue referred to above.

We have also learned that the province is working on a couple of potential changes that might further effect building regulation by local government. Therefore, there is a good chance that further amendments to your building bylaw might be necessary in the coming year or two. You might wish to keep an eye on the <u>Building & Safety Standards Branch</u> web site for ongoing changes to the Building Code and the Building Act.

Thank you for your November 24, 2017 letter of support for Thompson Creek Metals Company Inc.'s (TCMC) request to withdraw additional water on a short term basis for operation of the Mount Milligan Mine (Mine), to avoid shutdown of the Mine.

The Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) appreciates the employment and positive economic contributions the Mine provides to the local communities and the province of British Columbia more broadly.

Since July 2017, my staff and other regulators have been engaging TCMC on clarifying its proposed activities and the information necessary to support required regulatory approvals. I can assure you that the EAO staff have been prioritizing work on TCMC's proposed amendment to its Environmental Assessment Certificate and we are taking all measures to ensure that adequate staffing resources are allocated to support a timely review. I would note, however, that the EAO's ability to respond quickly to requested changes to an Environmental Assessment Certificate very much depends on the timeliness, quality and completeness of information that we receive to support the amendment process.



All signs on private property in Vancouver require sign permits except.



- Signs containing only the building number and street name
- Signs located within a building, if the sign cannot be seen from the street; however, these signs may require a building permit
 and an electrical permit if they are lit
- · Signs related to traffic, parking, directions, bus shelters, and so on if those signs are authorized by the City Engineer


You need a permit for any sign type described in the Definitions section of the Sign Bylaw. If a sign type is not described in the Sign Bylaw, it is not allowed. Depending on the type of sign, you may need a sign permit, awning permit, billboard permit, and building permit. For more information, read the Sign Bylaw or contact the Development and Building Services Centre.

<u>Sign Bylaw</u>

If the property is on the Vancouver Heritage Register, a heritage alteration permit is also needed. You can apply for that permit at the same time as the sign permit.

To apply for a sign permit, submit the following:

- 4. Two copies of each of the following drawings:
 - A dimensioned site and floor plan
 - A dimensioned elevation drawing
 - A text or copy drawing
 - A partial section of the building, showing the location where you want the sign to go

We may need additional information if you apply for a permit for these types of signs:

- All free-standing signs
- All facia signs located 15 ft (4.5 m) or more above ground
- All signs weighing more than 200 lbs (91 kg) including the combined weight of the channel letters

- Projecting signs weighing more than 50 lbs (22 kg)
- Canopy signs penetrating an I-beam or similar structural element of a canopy



Any other signs where City staff are concerned with the structural integrity of the sign

It was a great pleasure to meet with your delegation at the 2017 UBCM Convention. Our new government is committed to building partnerships with local government to make life more affordable for all British Columbians, to improve service delivery and to promote a strong economy that creates sustainable jobs.

The issues brought forward in our meeting were of great interest to me.

I appreciate your delegation's concerns regarding owner-builder authorization requirements, mandatory qualifications for local government building officials in 2021 and the voluntary Energy Step Code. I understand that the implementation of housing policies has a different impact for small rural municipalities such as Telkwa, than it does for larger ones such as Saanich, which is why you are interested in seeing more flexibility built into these requirements for rural areas.

As discussed, government introduced the new building official qualification and owner-builder authorization requirements to ensure a level of consistency across the province for enforcement and to strengthen consumer protection for the owner-builder and subsequent purchasers. On the other hand, the Energy Step Code is a voluntary standard that communities may choose to adopt, but are not required to do so.

Our new government is committed to addressing housing affordability and does not want to see the development of new housing stall in communities such as your own. If your housing concerns have not been addressed, please feel to contact me so that we can discuss these concerns further. I am pleased to advise that UBCM is in the process of distributing the second of two Community Works Fund (CWF) payments for fiscal 2017/2018. An electronic transfer of \$446,196.17 is expected to occur within the next 30 days. 

ENLs are intended to provide advanced notice to property owners that they will see a change in their upcoming assessment and to warn that their property taxes may change as a result. New for this year, and in consultation with Property Owners and Local Governments, BC Assessment has added content on our website to help explain the relationship between property assessments and taxes. The ENLs will reference this new content which can be found at <u>bcassessment.ca/propertytax</u>.

The Infrastructure Planning Grant Program (the Program) offers grants up to \$10,000 to help local governments plan, design and manage infrastructure. Funding is available for projects that support improved water, sewer, drainage and other environmental infrastructure.

In addition to selection criteria established by the Province of British Columbia, preference will be given to applications that will lead to future capital projects and those that promote innovation, build partnerships, and generate transferable knowledge.

Local governments that are involved in proactive infrastructure planning are better prepared to take advantage of capital grant programs. The Program can be used to help develop the long term plans and feasibility studies that are often key to the success of an application to a capital grant program.

The Program has a year round open intake with two application review deadlines. The next deadline for the 2018 Program is January 17, 2018. Program documents can be downloaded from the Ministry's website at:

Local governments are encouraged to submit applications on behalf of organizations such as improvement districts, registered water utilities or other small water systems if they have been approached by these groups to assist them to benefit from the Program. On behalf of the District of Sicamous we write to express our concern about the threat of Quagga and Zebra mussels. Sicamous submitted a resolution at UBCM that was endorsed requesting more funding from the Provincial Government to increase awareness and Education for the threat of Quagga and Zebra mussels into BC Lakes.

The effects to ALL BC Lakes would be devastating:

- Zebra and quagga mussels filter water to the point where food sources such as plankton are removed, altering food webs. This also causes clearer water, allowing sunlight to penetrate deeper, increasing growth of aquatic vegetation. One mussel can produce one million mussels per year.
- Impact fish and wildlife by increasing toxic algal blooms.
- Large colonies affect spawning areas, impacting the survival of fish eggs.
- Affects recreational activities by cutting swimmers feet as a result of their sharp shell
- Non-reversible once infested with mussels, all BC Lakes will be contaminated and there is currently no solution to destroy them.
- Cost to British Columbia will be Billions, to government, taxpayers and businesses if mussels manage to get into our eco-system
- Eco-system compromised, water intakes plugged, fish destroyed, beaches destroyed
- No long-term research provided on drinking water quality
- Negative tourism impact

Solutions:

Flu policy for visitors in effect at all NH facilities

As of today, all visitors to Northern Health (NH) facilities are being asked to wear a surgical mask if they haven't received their annual flu shot. The policy is part of the province's strategy to prevent the spread of flu and protect already vulnerable patients from a potentially fatal infection.

"Patients and clients in hospitals and long term care facilities often have weakened immune systems that put them at greater risk of serious complications from influenza," says Northern Health Chief Medical Health Officer Dr. Sandra Allison. "The best way to protect not only yourself but the people around you is to get a flu shot, even if you're normally a healthy individual."

The policy is applicable to all patient care areas in Northern Health hospitals, long-term care homes and other health facilities between December 1, 2017 and approximately March 31, 2018. Flu shots for visitors are free and can be obtained at your family doctor, walk-in clinics or pharmacies. The ImmunizeBC website lists all clinics across B.C. at immunizebc.ca.

People who have not had a flu shot can obtain a mask at a nursing station or outpatient reception desk. Doctors, staff, students and volunteers are also required to get immunized or wear a mask in patient care areas during the flu season.

Flu shots are free in B.C. for all children from six months to five years of age, people 65 years and older, Aboriginal people, those with chronic health conditions or compromised immune systems, and for anyone who lives or works with a person who is at higher risk of problems from the flu. Flu shots are also free for anyone visiting any Northern Health facility, including people who are accompanying patients to their appointments.

MRI services reach a milestone at Mills Memorial Hospital

Northern Health leaders and staff in Terrace joined with the Northwest Regional Hospital District today to mark a milestone in diagnostic imaging services at Mills Memorial Hospital. The new MRI unit at Mills Memorial has now performed its first 500 exams.

"This milestone means that hundreds of residents of Northwest B.C. have been able to receive important diagnostic imaging services closer to home," said Northern Health Board of Directors chairperson, Colleen Nyce. "This is a key aim of our overall strategy to help improve access to medical imaging technology in northern B.C."

The new MRI unit at Mills Memorial Hospital went into service in late August, following approximately 5 months of construction, and equipment testing. The unit is expected to do approximately 2,000 scans in its first year of operation.

Funding for the \$2.9 million Terrace MRI project came from:

- Ministry of Health (Province of B.C.) \$1,779,964
- Northwest Regional Hospital District \$1,135,612

"MRI is a service that was greatly needed in our region, and we welcomed the opportunity to contribute to this project," said Harry Nyce, North West Regional Hospital District Board Chair. "We appreciate Northern Health's leadership on this project, which will see our residents able to access MRI services with shorter wait times and less travel."

The Mills Memorial project was one of three MRI installation projects across the Northern Health region in 2017, including a new MRI at Fort St. John Hospital, and a replacement unit at the University of Northern BC in Prince George. Together, the new units triple the number of MRI's in the region, improving access and wait times and bringing services closer to home for residents across the north.

An MRI is a valuable test for medical professionals that use a magnetic field and pulses of radio wave energy to make pictures of organs and structures inside the body. Muscles, ligaments, cartilage, and other joint structures are often best seen with an MRI. In many cases MRI gives information about structures in the body that cannot be seen as well with an X-ray, ultrasound, or CT scan.



Northern Health's 10-year medical imaging plan to help improve access to medical imaging technology in northern B.C. also includes the implementation of the Provincial Breast Health Strategy, which has recently seen state-of-the-art digital mammography units installed at hospitals in Quesnel, Dawson Creek, Smithers, Terrace and Prince Rupert.

17 Communities in the Northern Health Region to Benefit from Funding to Increase Physical Activity

For immediate release: November 29, 2017

Northern Health, in partnership with the BC Alliance for Healthy Living (BCAHL), has awarded a total of \$353,800.00 in funds to 10 projects that will benefit 17 communities across the north. These initiatives will improve opportunities for physical activity in their communities.

The Active Communities grants are a one-time opportunity supported through the provincial Ministry of Health's <u>Active People</u>, <u>Active Places Physical Activity Strategy</u>. The aim of the strategy is to support and provide access to physical activity for individuals and families in communities across the province.

Regional Districts and local governments including, municipalities, Indigenous communities and Métis Chartered communities, were eligible to apply for the community grants. Excellence Awards Profile: Excellence in Action

The Community Excellence Awards are designed to profile excellence in local government and to inspire other communities to take risks to innovate, establish new partnerships, and pioneer new customer service practices. Over the coming months, profiles of the 2017 winning projects will be shared.

The Best Practices, Excellence in Action category acknowledges programs and services that exemplify excellence and that exhibit qualities of a true best practice by successfully addressing an issue or concern with positive results.

The 2017 winner of the Best Practices, Excellence in Action category is the City of Coquitam for their 'Productivity Enhancement Using Web Mapping' project. The project demonstrates how specialized web mapping applications and tools have increased operational efficiency, streamlined business processes, and improved data analysis and work programming.

Over 25 applications for web maps are currently being used. The City's GIS and Engineering staff have shared information on the development of their web mapping tools with other municipalities and stakeholders at a number of provincial and regional events and conferences.

The 2017 Honourable Mention for Excellence in Action was awarded to the Regional District of Central Okanagan (RDCO) for the 'My Dog Matters Rewards Program and Licensing App' project. In 2013, the RDCO embarked on a strategic 5-year campaign to promote positive public relations with dog owners and citizens and to increase dog licensing. Today, the RDCO has more than doubled its dog licenses, increased revenue and reduced taxation.

Dog owners can easily renew a license through the App and the RDCO is able to communicate directly to dog owners through email and notifications, saving thousands of dollars by moving away from doing business by mail. The RDCO reports that citizen feedback has been extremely positive and 5,000 users started using the app within the first five months.

The My Dog Matters Rewards Program connects licensed dog owners with more than 60 pet-friendly local businesses who offer discounts on products and services. Businesses choose the rewards they offer and benefit from free advertising.

MMIWG Inquiry Releases Interim Report

Nov. 8, 2017

The National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG) released their Interim Report on November 1. Recommendations include calls for the federal government to create a national police task force to reopen cases or review investigations, and to fully comply with a 2016 Canadian Human Rights Tribunal ruling that found that Canada was racially discriminating against First Nations children.

The Inquiry has been the subject of intense scrutiny since its inception, and continues to face considerable criticism by First Nations advocates and others concerned with slow progress and inquiry methods. Commissioners have stated that they are working hard to resolve their operational issues, and continue to push forward.

The Inquiry has now heard approximately 270 testimonies over several hearings taking place in Yukon, BC, Manitoba and Nova Scotia, and is now sitting for three days in Edmonton. Going forward, it will also be establishing an Institutional Hearings process that will focus on conduct and practices in police services and child welfare agencies, among other institutions. It also plans to establish expert panels to examine overarching themes and educate the Canadian public on subjects such as Indigenous law and decolonization.

The current deadline for completion of the Inquiry is December 31, 2018. In conjunction with the release of the Interim Report, Commissioners noted the need for more time to complete the work, but did not make a recommendation on a specific new end date.

UBCM members endorsed resolution B111 in 2015, calling for the federal government to convene a national inquiry into the widespread and severe violence faced by Indigenous women and girls in Canada. UBCM subsequently prepared a submission to Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada on Inquiry design.

Status of Asset Management in BC

Nov. 8, 2017

In May 2016, UBCM launched the *Phase 1 Asset Management Assessment Form - Baseline Survey*, and collected asset management data from all 189 local governments in BC. A report describing the cumulative data is now available: *The Status of Asset Management in British Columbia: Results from the 2016 Gas Tax Fund Asset Management Baseline Survey*.

Results from the survey are the first of their kind in BC and demonstrate there is a growing awareness of the importance of asset management to support the long-term delivery of local government services.

Some highlights from the report include:

- Over half of local governments have, or are in the process of having developed formal asset management processes.
- Approximately three-quarters of local governments reported that elected officials and local government staff understand the need for and benefits of asset management.
- On average, potable water, wastewater, sports & recreation facilities, and other types of buildings & facilities were
 reported as in good condition.
- On average, roads & bridges and storm water assets were reported as in fair condition.

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UBCM Submission On Cannabis Legalization

Dec. 5, 2017

UBCM has provided a submission regarding the development of a provincial framework for non-medical cannabis to the provincial Cannabis Legalization and Regulation Secretariat (CLRS). The submission is based upon the work undertaken by the Joint Provincial-Local Government Committee on Cannabis Regulation (JCCR) and has been endorsed by UBCM's Executive.

UBCM's recommendations call for a hybrid retail model (public and private retailers) that resembles the hybrid provincial liquor retail framework. Other notable recommendations call on the Province to retain the federal 4 plants per household limit for personal cultivation operations, and to extend existing public tobacco regulations/restrictions to smoking or vaping non-medical cannabis.

The recommendations contained in UBCM's submission relate to the seven broad issues outlined in the provincial discussion paper, *Cannabis Legalization and Regulation in British Columbia*, including:

- Minimum age to buy, grow and possess non-medical cannabis;
- Personal possession limits for adults and youth;
- Public consumption (e.g. smoking, vaping);
- Drug-impaired driving regulations;
- · Personal cultivation (number of plants, location, security, etc.);
- Distribution model; and,
- Retail model.

The local government JCCR members' responses to these questions have informed the recommendations made by UBCM in this submission. This document represents the first portion of UBCM's feedback, addressing specific time-sensitive issues tabled by the Cannabis Legalization and Regulation Secretariat. Other local government issues and concerns (e.g. distribution of taxation revenue, regulation of edibles) will be addressed through the JCCR over the coming months.

Background

On September 21, 2017, UBCM received an invitation from Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General, Mike Farnworth, to form a standing committee on cannabis legalization. In addition to the broader provincial engagement strategy to support the development of the provincial regulatory framework for legalized cannabis, the standing committee provides a forum for local governments to share their experiences and knowledge and discuss issues of interest or concern with the Cannabis Legalization and Regulation Secretariat. The Committee may also be used to assist in required statutory consultation if changes to local government legislation are considered.

The twelve JCCR members include a mix of local government elected officials, senior staff members and staff members with specialized skill sets and experience in planning, building inspection, bylaw enforcement and/or public safety. Understanding that the provincial Cabinet may consider policy decisions prior to 2018, the JCCR undertook an intensive two-month engagement process. Members met every two weeks to consider expert opinions, analyze high priority policy issues, and determine appropriate recommendations, with the objective of using this information to form a submission.

Provincial Action

Earlier today, the province announced its initial decisions with regard to minimum age, distribution and retail model, each of which reflect UBCM's submission.



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

BYLAW NO. 1816

A bylaw to amend the tax limit for the Glacier Gulch Water Diversion Service

WHEREAS the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has established by Bylaw No. 850 the Glacier Gulch Water Diversion Local Service within a portion of Electoral Area "A";

AND WHEREAS the Regional District wishes to increase the maximum annual tax requisition for this service from FIVE THOUSAND (\$5,000) DOLLARS TO SIX THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED FIFTY (\$6,250) DOLLARS;

AND WHEREAS under Section 347 of the *Local Government Act*, the sole participant has consented to the adoption of this Bylaw;

AND WHEREAS under Regulation 113/2007, the approval of the Inspector is not required because the increase in the tax limit is not greater than 25% of the baseline amount five years previous;

NOW THEREFORE the Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. Section 5 of Bylaw No. 850, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefore:

"5. The maximum amount that may be requisitioned annually for the cost of the service shall be SIX THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED FIFTY (\$6,250) DOLLARS."

2. This bylaw may be cited as the "Glacier Gulch Water Diversion Local Service Establishment Amendment Bylaw No. 1816, 2017".
