Request for Letter of Support - Nechako Valley Search and Rescue

The Nechako-Valley Search and Rescue (NVSAR) has requested a Letter of Support from the RDBN Board in support of their Public Safety Community Gaming Grant requesting \$100,000 to replace their deteriorating Mobile Command Centre.

NVSAR has provided Emergency Ground and Water Search services as requested by the RCMP for 25 years. Services include search and rescue operations for lost or missing persons, as well as assisting the RCMP with evidence searches. They also provide support for evacuation alerts and orders, aid the BC Ambulance Service with rescuing injured persons, and assist the BC Coroner Service in the recovery of human remains as needed.

The program operates under the guidelines set out by the Provincial Emergency Preparedness Program and provides emergency services to a 79,000 square kilometer area surrounding the District of Vanderhoof. In 2015, NVSAR attended 22 call-outs, the highest number recorded in the organization's history.

The Mobile Command Center is used as a base of operations for call-outs in the remote area that NVSAR provides service for during both Ground and Water Search and Rescue operations. The current Mobile Command Centre is more than 25 years old, and repairs are draining NVSAR resources. Recent assessment of the current vehicle determined that the vehicle will likely not remain functional until the next fiscal year.

Emergency conditions, changes in weather, and the possibility of incomplete information available at call-out mean that transporting all equipment is a necessity. As the majority of call-outs involve travelling hundreds of kilometers and unreliable cell service, a reliable, well-equipped Mobile Command Centre is essential to the continued operation of NVSAR.

Re: Security Issuing Bylaw – Topley Fire Protection

The following memo replaces the Security Issuing Bylaw – Topley Fire Protection memo in the regular board agenda.

Loan authorization bylaw 1744, which authorizes borrowing for up to \$383,639 was adopted by the Board on November 19, 2015 to facilitate the purchase of a new fire truck and new fire hall for the Topley Rural Fire Protection Service.

The cost of these capital expenditures was \$366,347.51 and was financed through temporary borrowing. The temporary borrowing will be repaid by the issuing of debentures in the fall MFA debenture issue. The fire hall and fire truck debt will be paid over 25 years.

Security Issuing Bylaw No. 1781 is included further in the agenda for your consideration.

Dear Chair Miller and Directors:

I recently wrote you about formation of the Forest Enhancement Society of BC (FESBC). The purpose of this letter is to update you on this initiative, and garner your support for projects being considered by the Nadina Natural Resource District.

The Nadina District is submitting six projects for approval during this intake period, all of which are designed to aid in the management of wildfire risk and/or enhance wildlife habitat. The specifics are as follows:

Block 1

This project involves the creation of a fire break approximately 100 metres in width (retaining deciduous species). The primary purpose of this break is to protect the Babine Forest Products and Pinnacle Pellet mills and mill sites; the secondary purpose is to provide access to this area for fire suppression activities, including the deployment of firefighting resources.

Blocks 2 & 3

These two projects focus on building a fire break to protect the Eagle Creek subdivision immediately south of the Village of Burns Lake. Coniferous trees will be removed and deciduous trees will be maintained while establishing a 50-metre fire break adjacent private property. The establishment of fire-resistant trees in the area will be a priority after logging and clearing activities are complete. All logging debris is slated to be mulched; alternatively, small-scale slash burning will be attempted.

Block 4

This project will involve partial cut removal of dead pine trees. It is estimated that 40 per cent of the trees will be removed in this fire-proofing activity. As the target area is near the mountain bike trails in Burns Lake, trail protection will be the first priority. The ministry is still working with the Burns Lake Mountain Biking Association

(BLMBA) on this project, and will not proceed with it unless the association lends its full support.

Block 5

This project is similar to Block 2 and 3 in the scope of activity. The purpose here is to protect the northern boundary of the Village of Burns Lake.

Block 6

This project is located in the Ootsa Reservoir, specifically Tahtsa Reach. (The target area is shaded in red and identified as priority area 1 on the attached map.) The activities proposed include the establishment of a timber-free zone in the reservoir. This includes the removal of all submerged or partially submerged trees up to the reservoir high water mark, which will allow the region's endangered woodland caribou to successfully move from islands in the reservoir to the mainland. All natal activity associated with these caribou occurs on these islands, and the young calves swim across the reservoir to the mainland. At present, many of these young animals fall prey to obstacles created by submerged timber.

While these projects are tentative at this point, we hope to obtain your support for them in the form of a letter. The deadline to submit these projects is August 19, 2016, and it is our hope that you can provide the required letter of support before that date.

These projects are just the first of many we hope to complete in this region. During the next intake period (November), we hope to work with the other municipalities in the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako on projects that will protect or enhance forest/wildlife resources in other areas of the Skeena region.

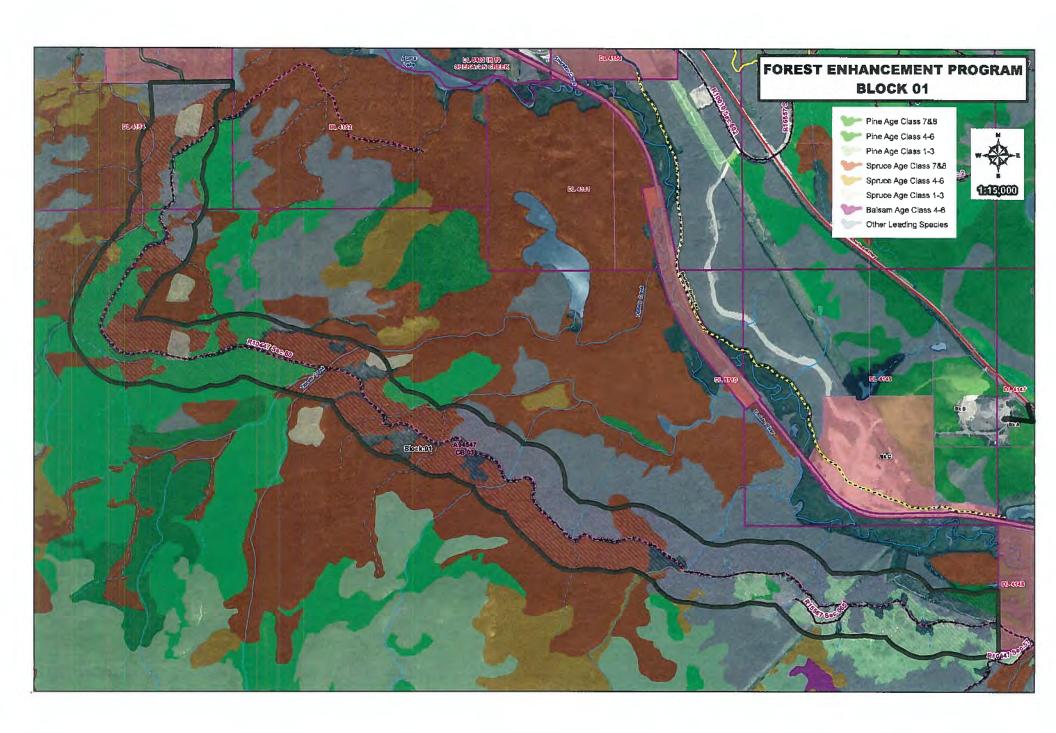

It was a pleasure to meet with you last week.

As per our conversation with regards to the Forest Enhancement Program the Ministry of Forests, Lands, and Natural Resource Operations is presently putting forward proposals that will further work preventing and mitigating the impact of wildfires; improve damaged and low value forests; improve wildlife habitat; support the use of fibre from damaged and low value forests; and treat forests to improve the management of greenhouse gases as well as advocate for the environmental and resource stewardship of British Columbia's Forests.

Ongoing work and communications have been occurring over the past several years locally with the Mayor and Councils of Vanderhoof, Fraser Lake and Fort St. James with regards to preventing and mitigating impact of wildfires. Further to this local work communication and facilitation with OBAC has also been held with the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako about the potential for additional prevention and mitigation.

Project proposals that are being forwarded within the Stuart Nechako District for the August 19 intake which we request a letter of support include:

Fuel mitigation west end of Cluculz Lake and Blackwater Road
Fuel mitigation Finmore Road Area
Fuel Mitigation Driftwood Road Right of Way in Fort St James area into Takla
Archaeological Impact Assessments in various rural areas which will allow further mitigation work for fire prevention to occur in the Stuart Nechako District.

My name is Lucienne McKone, I am the owner and operator of the new General Store ,(OMINECA GENERAL STORE), that recently open in Manson Creek, BC. We opened on June 3rd of 2016 and business is picking up everyday as people learn that we have opened. We have launched a web site where people can read about us, find us on google maps and to also contact us if needed,(ominecageneralstore.ca). Please feel free to check out our web site, as it will give you an insight as to where we want the Store to be in the coming months and even years.

The community of Manson Creek and the surrounding areas, including Germanson Landing, and their surrounding area, have become accustomed to having a Rural Agency Store that enabled them to purchase there favorite social drinks for almost 30 years, from the Wolfridge Store. Well the Wolfridge Store has since closed there doors as of October 31st 2015 and the communities and surrounding areas have been wondering why I do not sell their favourite social drinks, because it is so far for them to drive to the nearest Liquor Store which is 185 km away. In the years that the Wolfridge Store sold Liquor, they have had no problems what so ever from the customers. I believe that I will not have any problems either from my customers, as they see it as having a luxury here in Manson and did not want to lose that luxury. Well I feel like I have let my community down, with not being able to achieve my goal of acquiring a RAS for the them.

I under stand from the rejection letter that I received, (please find attached), that the population is not big enough here in Manson. Well I know that it is not big enough if you just include the year round locals. But this community is so wide spread that it is a 5km drive just to get water for some people. So to say that the 200 population is not with in a 5km drive of the store, is correct. But like I have stated before, this community and surrounding areas well exceeds the 200 population. The roads to this community are all year round, maintained roads. So that in its self brings people from as far away as Takla Landing, just to shop in my store. The Manson Creek community is growing each year, as my Husband and I are in full force as to bring this community back to life and have it grow. Just in the last month alone I have filled up all my mail boxes with the new comers to this area. As it sits now the



community is really disappointed that I was turned down for the RAS, because now they will have to drive 185 km to purchase there alcohol, when it could be sold here light here.

So I am asking for your help in achieving my goal to supply this community and surrounding areas with a RAS, which would be located in my General Store. I have allocated a location in my store for this purpose. I understand that there can be exceptions made regarding my situation and location. To be turned down because of our location is not right. If we could get someone here for a site visit, they could see that it is a special circumstances situation. So I am hoping for any help that I can acquire from you folks, and get an exception to the rule.

I have enclosed my letter of intent and 4 pages of signatures from the year round locals, the summer locals, and people who are here for work or pleasure in the summer, and others who work here year round but are not locals. And I am still acquiring more signatures. So what I am asking is that please take everything into consideration, before making a decision. I welcome you for a site visit of my store and to meet the community. So that you can see first hand what I see, and what is needed and wanted here by and for the community.

Thank you very much for your interest in establishing a Rural Agency Store (RAS) in Manson Creek, British Columbia.

The Liquor Distribution Branch (LDB) has reviewed your expression of interest for the operation of a RAS in Manson Creek. Throughout the RAS application process, we remain committed to fairness and consistency – seeking to ensure our decisions align with the intent of the RAS program, while balancing the interests of local businesses, stakeholders and community residents.

The RAS program criteria states the population being served by the trading area in which a rural agency store is located must have a minimum of 200 persons within a five kilometer driving distance. The LDB conducted a comprehensive investigation of the Manson Creek population, and after careful analysis from multiple government agencies, we have concluded that this location does not meet the population criterion. While we greatly appreciate your interest in the RAS program, the LDB will not be continuing with the application for the Omineca General Store at this time.

My Name is Lucienne McKone. I am sending you this letter of Intent in regards to establishing a liquor distribution center out of my General Store. I live in Manson Creek BC, Canada. The legal site location isBlock "k" Lot 3260 Cassiar District, Manson Creek BC. I am in the process of opening a General Store here in Manson Creek, "OMINECA GENERAL STORE", as the old store (Wolfridge), have closed their doors since October of 2015. I am aiming to have my doors open on June 1st,2016.

I have been awarded the Postmaster Position for the Post office here in Manson Creek, so the Post Office is now located in my store and is in operation at this time. I would like to provide the community with the same services as Wolfridge Store did in the past, which would include:

- *Dairy products.
- *fresh/frozen fruit and veggies.
- *Grain Product, bread, rice, pasta, baked good.
- *Canned goods, soups and stews.
- *Household Items, cleaning supplies, toiletries, pet food.
- *frozen products.
- *Convenient products, chips, pop, chocolate bars
- *tobacco products (in progress)
- *hardware items.
- *mining items.
- *automotive items.
- *fuels, gas and diesel.
- *propane, (cylinders only).
- *supply internet services so customers can get hunting and fishing licence on line.
- * and then if all goes well I would like supply them with a Liquor Store.

So basically my General Store will be a one stop shopping facility for my community and surrounding area including Germanson Landing.

The nearest LBS is 185 km away from my store, one in Fort Saint James and then in the other direction to Mackenzie. I worked in the Wolfridge store when it was open and I noticed that people where coming form everywhere in the area to shop in the store, not only for Liquor but for food, gas and propane. In the summer it is real busy around hear, with mining, campers, hunters, logging and the locals. The population here is about 200, but grows in the months from April to the end of October to approx. 300 every year. So needless to say that the store is busy all year but more so in the afore mentioned months.



We have all year, all weather roads to our community, so that make for large draw of population to this area. We get Mail and Groceries brought in once a week, 12 months of the year.

My store is set up so that all the different products that I will be supplying will have there own sections, the liquor would be on shelves behind the service counter, which is 8 feet long by 8 feet high by 2 feet deep, along with a locked 8ft x 8ft storage room.

I am hoping that I have provided the information that you require to consider myself and my general store as a liquor distribution facility for our community.

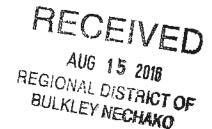

Hi Mark and Jason:

Yesterday, I saw the attached Interior News Notice for the TUP application for authorization to conduct gravel crushing operations at the location near Raymond Road off Highway 16 between Telkwa and Smithers . As you are aware, the whole issue of industrial activities of this sort taking place in areas zoned for agriculture and close to residences, tourism related businesses and the Bulkley River has previously raised a good deal of public concern.

Under these circumstances, it seems surprising that the newspaper notice for a hearing on an application of this nature gives essentially 1 week's notice to the public in Smithers for comments and a hearing taking place in Burns Lake. I doubt this meets the minimum requirements of the Local Government Act, and in any event, raises serious issues of procedural fairness.

Under the circumstances, we suggest that you postpone the Hearing and extend the deadline for public comment so that it does not end today. If the hearing cannot be postponed at this late date, at the very least no action should be taken until a second hearing date is provided in Smithers with adequate notice to the public.

We will be contacting our network about this, so you will probably receive a good deal of additional comment.

CONDITIONS RECOMMENDED FOR A TEMPORARY USE PERMIT TO COVER GRAVEL CRUSHING BY STETI CONSTRUCTION NEAR THE INTERSECTION OF HIGHWAY 16 AND RAYMOND ROAD

In general, we oppose the approval of a TUP (Temporary Use Permit) covering any gravel crushing operation in the Settlement Zone of the central Bulkley Valley, but especially when the operation would be (1) near the Bulkley River; (2) on the Bulkley floodplain or an adjacent glacial terrace; (3) within 4 km of any more than one or two rural residences; or (4) within 4 km of any other gravel crushing operation, legal or illegal. The research literature makes it plain that the noise from gravel crushing has harmful impacts on human health; residential property values; residents' enjoyment of their properties; fish habitat; and community development. Crushing at the Steti pit is about 1 km from the Bulkley River; on the Bulkley floodplain or an adjacent terrace; within 4 km of at least forty or fifty rural residences, some of them just 200 or 300 metres away; and within 2 km of two or three other actual or proposed or dormant or illegal gravel crushing operations.

This spring and early in the summer we ourselves were seriously disturbed by loud crushing and backup beeping noise apparently emanating from the Steti pit without benefit of coverage by a TUP. Our home is about 3.5 km distant from the pit.

If the RDBN Board of Directors decides to approve a TUP for gravel crushing at the Steti Construction pit, then we strongly urge the Board to include the following conditions:

First Condition

Gravel pits and crushing operations in the central Bulkley River have been used for all sorts of unrelated nuisance-generating activities, such as motocross driving and shooting. Any TUP granted to Steti for gravel crushing in the location under consideration should explicitly forbid use of the site for motocross or other recreational vehicle driving, shooting, exploding of fireworks, or other uses unrelated to gravel extraction and crushing.

Second Condition

Concerned residents, businesses, and recreational users of the Bulkley River and areas near it have urged in relation to previous gravel extraction and crushing permit applications that a Web



camera be installed at the proposed crushing site, in order to allow citizens to monitor illegal and environmentally offensive uses of the site. The site of the proposed Steti crushing operation should include such a Web camera.

Third Condition

In most settled parts of British Columbia, crushing at any given site is normally permitted for just two or three weeks a year. The Steti TUP should limit crushing to no more than two weeks a year, especially in view of the likelihood that other legal or illegal crushing will take place within two or three kilometres of the Steti operation. (The Province of British Columbia imposes no control whatsoever over the cumulative environmental effects of multiple gravel mining and crushing operations.) Without a very limited duration within which crushing may take place, some rural residents in the neighbourhood of the Steti operation may be subject to crushing noise and backup beeping for most of the non-winter months.

Fourth Condition

To prevent the compounding of crushing and backup noise in any particular area of the Settlement Zone, no crushing TUP should be approved or renewed by the RDBN if residents within a four-kilometre radius report that they are already suffering from noise emanating from other crushing operations, legal or illegal, in the area. Following this logic, the Steti TUP, if it is granted, should include a provision to the effect that the Steti crusher will not operate when residents within a four-kilometre radius report that they are being affected by noise from one or more other crushing operations in their neighbourhood.

Fifth Condition

The draft RDBN TUP permit No. A-01-16 specifies that the "hours of operation" will be limited to 7:00 A.M. to 6 P.M. daily. This item, **4.e.**, **should include the following phrase:** ("...hours of operation") "of either the crusher or vehicles loading or unloading the crusher" ("to..."). One of the most offensive sorts of noise produced by crushing operations is the backup beeping of loading vehicles.

Sixth Condition

The draft RDBN TUP permit specifies that the crushing plant should operate for a maximum of 50 days per calendar year. This figure is entirely out of keeping with gravel crushing TUP requirements elsewhere in British Columbia. The normal figure for settled areas is two or three weeks. Hence (a) item 4.f. should be rewritten to state "a maximum of 10 [or 15] days per calendar year." If the TUP permit includes any figure greater than 15 days per calendar year, then (b), item 4.f. should be rewritten to state "a maximum of [say] three consecutive weeks per calendar year." Otherwise local residents and businesses will find themselves needing to track, and somehow verify, days of crusher operation all across the calendar.

Security Issuing Bylaw

Bylaw No. 1781

A bylaw to authorize the entering into of an Agreement respecting financing between the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako and the Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia.

WHEREAS the Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia (the "Authority") may provide financing of capital requirements for regional districts or for their member municipalities by the issue of debentures or other evidence of indebtedness of the Authority and lending the proceeds therefrom to the regional district on whose request the financing is undertaken;

AND WHEREAS the Regional District will finance from time to time on behalf of and at the sole cost of the member municipalities, under the provisions of Section 410 of the Local Government Act, the works financed pursuant to the herein mentioned loan authorization bylaws;

AND WHEREAS under the provisions of Section 411 of the Local Government Act, the amount of borrowing authorized by each of the following loan authorization bylaws, the amount already borrowed under the authority thereof, the amount of authorization to borrow remaining thereunder, and the amount being issued under the authority thereof by this bylaw;

AND WHEREAS the tables contained in this bylaw are to provide clarity and information for the purposes of this bylaw;

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board, by this bylaw, hereby requests such financing shall be undertaken through the Authority.

NOW THEREFORE the Regional Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

- 1. The Authority is hereby requested and authorized to finance from time to time the above noted undertakings, and further described in the Regional District Loan Authorization Bylaws table, at the sole cost and on behalf of the Regional District and its member municipalities up to, but not exceeding Three Hundred Sixty-Six Thousand, Three Hundred Forty-Seven Dollars and Fifty-One Cents (\$366,347.51) in lawful money of Canada (provided that the Regional District may borrow all or part of such amount in such currency as the Trustees of the Authority shall determine but the aggregate amount in lawful money of Canada and in Canadian Dollar equivalents so borrowed shall not exceed \$366,347.51 in Canadian Dollars) at such interest and with such discounts or premiums and expenses as the Authority may deem appropriate in consideration of the market and economic conditions pertaining.
- 2. Upon completion by the Authority of financing undertaken pursuant hereto, the Chair and officer assigned the responsibility of financial administration of the Regional District, on behalf of the Regional District and under its seal shall, at such time or times as the Trustees of the Authority may request, enter into and deliver to the Authority one or more agreements, which said agreement or agreements shall be substantially in the form annexed hereto as Schedule "A" and made part of this bylaw (such Agreement or Agreements as may be entered into, delivered or substituted hereinafter referred to as the "Agreement") providing for payment by the Regional District to the Authority of the amounts required to meet the obligations of the Authority with respect to its borrowings undertaken pursuant hereto, which Agreement shall rank as debenture debt of the Regional District.
- 3. The Agreement in the form of Schedule "A" shall be dated and payable in the principal amount or amounts of monies and in Canadian dollars or as the Authority shall determine and subject to the Local Government Act, in such currency or currencies as shall be borrowed by the Authority under section 1 and shall set out the schedule of repayment of the principal amount together with interest on unpaid amounts as shall be determined by the Treasurer of the Authority.
- 4. The obligation incurred under the said Agreement shall bear interest from a date specified therein, which date shall be determined by the Treasurer of the Authority, and shall bear interest at a rate to be determined by the Treasurer of the Authority.
- The Agreement shall be sealed with the seal of the Regional District and shall bear the signature of the Chair and the officer assigned the responsibility of financial administration of the Regional District.
- The obligations incurred under the said Agreement as to both principal and interest shall be payable at the Head Office of the Authority in Victoria and at such time or times as shall be determined by the Treasurer of the Authority.
- 7. During the currency of the obligations incurred under the said Agreement to secure borrowings in respect of Bylaw No. 1744 the anticipated revenues accruing to the Regional District from the operation of the Topley Rural Fire Protection Service are at any time insufficient to meet the annual payment of interest and the repayment of principal in any year, there shall be requisitioned an amount sufficient to meet such insufficiency.

- 8. The Regional District shall provide and pay over to the Authority such sums as are required to discharge its obligations in accordance with the terms of the Agreement, provided, however, that if the sums provided for in the Agreement are not sufficient to meet the obligations of the Authority, any deficiency in meeting such obligations shall be a liability of the Regional District to the Authority and the Regional Board of the Regional District shall make due provision to discharge such liability.
- 9. The Regional District shall pay over to the Authority at such time or times as the Treasurer of the Authority so directs such sums as are required pursuant to Section 15 of the Municipal Finance Authority Act to be paid into the Debt Reserve Fund established by the Authority in connection with the financing undertaken by the Authority on behalf of the Regional District pursuant to the Agreement.
- 10. This bylaw may be cited as "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Security Issuing Topley Rural Fire Protection Service Bylaw No. 1781, 2016".
