DELEGATION

Lynda Gagne, PhD, CPA, CGA – Assistant Professor, University of Victoria – Fiscal Sustainability and Local Governments

Chair Miller welcomed Lynda Gagne, Assistant Professor, University of Victoria.

Ms. Gagne provided a PowerPoint Presentation. She advised that her presentation would cover the following topics:

- Fiscal sustainability reporting in Canada;
- Canadian fiscal sustainability issues;
- BC fiscal sustainability issues;
- Local and total government finance trends;
- sustainable fiscal policies.

Fiscal Sustainability Defined

- International Public Sector Accounting Standards Board (IPSASB):
 - The ability of government to meet its service delivery and financial commitments both now and in the future. (Reporting on the Long-Term Sustainability of Public Finances, November 2009; emphasis added);
 - o CPA Canada's Public Sector Accounting Board (Financial Condition)
 - The ability to meet existing financial obligations both in respect of its service commitments to the public and financial commitments to creditors, employees, and others.

Fiscal Sustainability Challenges and Risks

- Population aging;
- Climate change;

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- Population growth and other environmental pressures;
- Infrastructure deficits;
- Unrealistic growth expectations;
- Unwillingness to pay for desired public services;
- Housing market prices bubbles.

Ms. Gagne showed a slide with the Canadian governments' fiscal gaps, 2014.

Ms. Gagne commented that the Office of the Parliamentary Budget Officer has been preparing fiscal sustainability reports since 2010. The PBO uses a 75 year time horizon in its projections. It defines the fiscal gap as the permanent change in the path of the government's primary balance (revenues less non-interest expenditure) that would need to be made immediately so that government debt as a share of GDP returns to the same ratio at the end of the projection as at the beginning. The 2014 report concludes that the sub-national fiscal gap can be closed with a mix of modest spending restraint and tax increases. However, the report neither mentions the words "climate change" or "infrastructure". Continuous stable growth is assumed and the only driver of the fiscal gap is the aging population.

Canadian Fiscal Sustainability Issues (Infrastructure)

- According to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) Canadian Infrastructure Report Card 2015:
 - Municipal drinking-water and wastewater systems ranked "Good: Adequate for now,";
 - o Stormwater systems ranged "Very good: Fit for the future";
 - o Roads received an overall grade of "Fair: Requires attention";
 - 30% of municipal infrastructure ranks between "fair" and "very poor" with an estimated replacement cost of \$171.8 billion (111% of aggregate Canadian local government expense in 2013).
- New Building Canada Plan:
 - o \$53 billion across Canada between 2014-2024;
 - o In BC:
 - \$1.1 billion under the New Building Canada Fund;
 - \$2.76 billion under the Gas Tax Fund.

BC Fiscal Sustainability Issues

- BC local government per capita spending is low by Canadian standards;
- At \$893, BC local government total per capita property taxes are among the lowest in Canada;
- Non-residential taxes are comparable to other provinces;
- Business taxes are not generally a competitive problem in BC, except for specific situations;
- Recent municipal costs have been growing faster than the population and are often the result of decisions by other governments;

Lynda Gagne, PhD, CPA, CGA – Assistant Professor, University of Victoria – Fiscal Sustainability and Local Governments

- The Province had the highest announced marginal effective tax rates for 2014 at 27.1%;
- Real per capita GDP growth in BC between 1990 and 2010 was estimated at 19.8% compared to the Canadian average of 30.3%;
- The Province does not appear to have the capacity to substantially increase local government funding.

Local and Total Government Finance Trends

Ms. Gagne explained a slide that demonstrates that local government revenues-to-total government revenues have been declining while local government expenses-to-total government expenses have been increasing. This change is a reflection of all levels of government converging on equalizing expenses and revenues. She added that governments have shrunk in relation to the economy, from over 50% to around 40%. Debt servicing costs have been declining while infrastructure costs have been increasing.

Sustainable Fiscal Policies

Provincial and local government revenues need to increase and/or expenses decrease; fiscal policies also need to address the larger issues of climate change, conservation, and sustainability.

- Provincial and federal gas/carbon taxes can be implemented/enhanced and used to enrich infrastructure funding, including significantly enhanced funding for public transit and cycling infrastructure, and climate change-related infrastructure needs;
- Tolls on all major arteries in high population density areas with considerable single occupancy vehicle community should be considered;
- Pricing for water and sewer services can be enhanced to reflect full costs of infrastructure and shadows prices for water;
- Municipalities and regional authorities can continue to support solid waste reduction, recycling, and composting using pricing mechanisms and bylaws;
- Tax shifts such as these need to be accompanied by measures that compensate or insure low-cost minimum levels of services for low income households and that address competitiveness issues.

1. Federal Endangered Species

a. Possible impact upon forestry in B.C.

Director Miller explained that the Federal Government through the Federal Ministry of Environment is proposing Federal Endangered Species regulations to address migratory bird populations that will make it impossible for the forest industry to log between spring (break up) to mid-summer (August). Industry is aware of the possible changes and is very concerned with the shortened timeframe to log. Industry is meeting to develop recommendations to forward to the Federal Government. Director Miller is in contact with representatives from Babine Forest Products and will continue to update the Forestry Committee regarding the issue.

2. Replanting of Burned Areas/ Enforcement

Director Thiessen spoke to the trend of increasingly larger wildfires. Discussion took place regarding having representative(s) from Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations to speak to the replanting of burned areas and the enforcement of that replanting.

Director Miller mentioned that he spoke to the northern representative at the Federation of Canadian Municipalities Convention on June 4-8, 2015 in Edmonton, AB. regarding federal pine beetle funding that was promised in 2007 for pine beetle impacted regions. Chair MacDougall explained that the bioenergy plants can utilize some of the burned fibre, so utilization of that fibre as soon as possible would enable the ability to replant the trees.

Chair Miller stated as local government leaders it is important to lobby the Federal Government regarding the funding that was promised and to bring the issue forward with Members of Parliament in the region. Chair Miller will bring forward the information to the Omineca Beetle Action Coalition meeting on June 12, 2015.

Discussion took place in regard to having the representatives nominated for Member of Parliament to be invited to attend a future Regional District meeting to discuss issues brought forward. Staff will invite Federal Government Members of Parliament to discuss Mountain Pine Beetle funding, CN Rail Safety issues. Further questions can be forwarded to staff.

3. Slash Burning Of Logged Areas

Director Thiessen spoke to the burning of the slash in logged areas. He spoke to the hazards associated with the piles being fuel sources during wildfire events. Chair Miller noted the importance for the Forestry Committee to have open discussions with stakeholders as to the importance of fire mitigation. Chair MacDougall spoke to the rules in place for forest licenses and licensees agreements to address hazard abatement.

Discussion took place regarding the debris being part of the fertilization cycle for the trees. Director Miller explained that there is a coarse woody debris management regime that prescribed burns leaves logs/trees that add fertilizer to the ground. Currently the light fibre debris that causes flash fires, the fibre that doesn't get burned when a prescribed burn is conducted, provides a light quick fuel that is a ladder fuel and will burn into new growth and destroy a plantation.

Glenwood Hall located outside of Smithers in Electoral Area "A" has agreed to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako. This Memorandum of Understanding provides guidelines for a temporary Reception Centre during an emergency that requires Emergency Support Services when residents are displaced from their homes.

A copy of this Memorandum of Understanding is available upon request from Deborah Jones-Middleton.

INTRODUCTION:

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako recognizes that emergencies do occur which may cause large numbers of people to evacuate their homes. The evacuation process requires the use of Reception Centres which are typically situated in building such as churches, community halls, arenas and other public or private facilities.

MANDATE:

The Province of British Columbia introduced the amended the Emergency Program Act in 2004 requiring Regional Districts to coordinate the provision of food, clothing, shelter, services to victims of emergencies and disasters.

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has Emergency Support Services teams who actively plan and train their team of volunteers to provide these services. An important part of the Emergency Support Services preparedness process is to sign a Memorandum of Understanding with owners, managers, or trustees of buildings that fit the criterion for use as a Reception Centre should an emergency or disaster strike.

A Reception Centre is a safe location where people, forced to leave their homes due to natural or man-made disasters, are brought to register and receive documentation to obtain essential services such as food, clothing and lodging.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING:

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding is to confirm the willingness of Glenwood Hall to permit the use of its facility as a temporary Reception Centre location when required by the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako during an emergency or disaster that causes residents to be displaced from their homes. It is therefore understood between the parties as follows:

1. Upon direction from the Emergency Operations Centre, a representative from the Emergency Support Services program will contact the first available Facility Contact as listed on Appendix "A" who will make arrangements to open the facility as quickly as possible. Glenwood Hall also agrees to provide a maintenance representative or someone fully knowledgeable of the facility to assist in opening and preparing the facility for the displaced residents and general public (lighting, heating, cooling, etc.).

- 2. The Term will commence when the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako takes possession of the facility. Glenwood Hall will allow the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako to operate the facility 24 hours a day, 7 days a week throughout the Term.
- 3. Rent will be calculated on a per diem basis and is based on the rate as set out in Appendix "B". The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, if possible, will advise the Facility Contact when a conclusion of the term is known or anticipated.
- 4. Upon conclusion of the term, Glenwood Hall will send the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako a written invoice detailing separately the facility rental cost and the janitorial/maintenance costs with a combined total.
- 5. Janitorial/maintenance work will be completed by Glenwood Hall preferred Supplier, contact information for which is included on Appendix "B". Janitorial/maintenance costs will be included in the rental rate, as outlined in Appendix "A", and will be paid directly to Glenwood Hall.
- 6. Glenwood Hall is required to carry public liability and property insurance on the property at all times. The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, through the Emergency Management BC, provides WorkSafe BC and insurance coverage and liability for emergency program volunteers.
- 7. The rental of this facility includes the use of all items located within the premises including, but not limited to: kitchen appliances and supplies, tables, chairs, audio equipment, telephone and data lines, office equipment, parking lot, loading dock, washrooms and supplies.
- 8. Glenwood Hall will permit the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako to display signage on the exterior and interior of the facility as normally displayed by a designated Reception Centre.

Legal Authority

The *Emergency Program Act Local Authority Emergency Management Regulation Section 2 (3)* require local governments to provide the following:

"(f) coordinate the provision of food, clothing, shelter, transportation and medical services to victims of emergencies and disasters, whether that provision is made from within or outside of the local authority."

Background

The provision of the above services are typically provided by volunteers through local government Emergency Support Services Programs. The Province provides training through the Justice Institute of British Columbia, providing there are a minimum number of attendees available to attend the course. Expenses incurred during a response are covered by the Province, although the Province does not provide any other funding to local governments to support this program. Local governments are not eligible for Gaming Grants. In the past, the Federal Government provided funding through the Joint Emergency Preparedness Program, however, that funding was cancelled in 2012.

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has invested a significant amount of staff time, and funding on volunteer recruitment, training and appreciation. Given the vast area of the region and low population, recruitment is difficult. New recruits typically come from previous events where they dropped in to see if they can help. Maintaining new recruits is challenging. Staff have worked with the Province, neighbouring Regional Districts, municipalities, and corporate sponsors to provide training and volunteer appreciation. Regardless of the investment, when an emergency evacuation has taken place, staff have struggled to provide the required Emergency Support Services volunteers to staff the Reception Centres.

During the Little Bobtail Lake Fire staff were informed that the Regional District was required to offer Group Lodging versus hotel/motel accommodation to evacuees. Staff became aware that the Regional District of Fraser Fort George was providing hotel/motel accommodations to evacuees from their region and when staff questioned the PREOC about this we were told everyone should have offered Group Lodging. During this response a Group Lodging plan was developed to be provided in Prince George if the evacuation area was expanded. Staff was informed that the plan called for thirty-three (33) volunteers to man the facility every twenty-four hour period in order to provide the required services, this is way beyond the capacity of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Emergency Support Services Program.

After the event staff questioned the request for the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako to provide Group Lodging during the Little Bobtail Lake Fire evacuation through the BC Association of Emergency Managers and the Province responded as follows:

"Over the past few months we have been talking about moving more in the direction of providing group lodging as the preferred option for caring for large numbers of people evacuated under an evacuation order. **We must emphasize that we are not making the use of group lodging mandatory at this time**. The decision to use congregate care instead of commercial accommodations must be made depending on variables such as availability of commercial lodging, numbers of evacuees etc.

We are, however, encouraging greater use of group lodging at this time...

A multi-year work plan detailing time scales of the steps we plan to take towards these changes is being drafted."

On July 14, 2015 staff hosted a regional meeting with Chief Administrative Officers, Emergency Program Coordinators, and Emergency Support Services Directors to discuss these emerging issues and all in attendance agreed that Group Lodging is beyond the capacity of our Emergency Support Services Teams.

On July 20, 2015 staff attended the ESS Advisory Forum hosted by the Province. At that meeting Emergency Management BC staff advised that they would be meeting with the Canadian Red Cross to develop an agreement to assist local authorities in providing Group Lodging if they are unable to do so. The Canadian Red Cross was engaged in this plan to provide Group Lodging for the Little Bobtail Lake Fire, and they were unable to man enough volunteers to provide the services at that time. During the meeting other Emergency Support Services Directors shared they had had this experience with the Canadian Red Cross as well, and cautioned the Province to address this issue when negotiating with the Canadian Red Cross. Staff also recommended that instead the Province consider hiring professionally trained Emergency Support Services workers to provide services on behalf of local governments during these types of events. This was met with significant push back from other Emergency Support Services Directors who are concerned that volunteers will not want to work with paid service providers. On July 22, 2015 staff received an email from Emergency Management BC requesting local government to provide a listing of "identified potential group lodging sites and facilities", the purpose stated was "to learn about, and inventory, what they (local government) have in their areas as possible group lodging sites/facilities. The purpose of this inventory is not to take over authority or resources, but to expand EMBC's ability to assist with timely coordination in the event that a local authority is overwhelmed during a disaster response."

Conclusion

It is a concern that the Province may require local governments to provide Group Lodging for an emergency evacuation of Level 3 or higher in scope. To set up a Group Lodging facility is not only expensive to the Province it is onerous to the Regional District and the Emergency Support Services Team. In the Regional Districts experience no one has used the Group Lodging facility when it has been provided. To establish a Group Lodging Facility requires:

- > 24 hour operations;
- > a facility that the required amenities;
- > a large number of volunteers to keep the facility open and functioning;
- > 24 hour security; and
- provision of food services.

Emergency Support Services is the most difficult service for staff to manage during an emergency response requiring the evacuation of residents. Many volunteers are unavailable at the time of the event, or can only give a limited amount of time, it is recommended that volunteers should be ready to provide up to three days at a time if dispatched.

Volunteers are asked to provide services, with minimal training, to people who have been evacuated from their home, who many times are emotionally distraught, and unsure of the potential loss they may experience. We have had volunteers exasperated with the multiple tasks they are asked to provide. Emergency Support Services would be better served by comprehensively trained personnel.

Recommendation

INTRODUCTION:

The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako recognizes that emergencies do occur which may cause large numbers of people to evacuate their homes. The evacuation process requires the use of Reception Centres which are typically situated in building such as churches, community halls, arenas and other public or private facilities.

MANDATE:

The Province of British Columbia introduced the amended the Emergency Program Act in 2004 requiring Regional Districts to coordinate the provision of food, clothing, shelter, services to victims of emergencies and disasters. The Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako has Emergency Support Services teams who actively plan and train their team of volunteers to provide these services. An important part of the Emergency Support Services preparedness process is to sign a Memorandum of Understanding with owners, managers, or trustees of buildings that fit the criterion for use as a Reception Centre should an emergency or disaster strike.

A Reception Centre is a safe location where people, forced to leave their homes due to natural or man-made disasters, are brought to register and receive documentation to obtain essential services such as food, clothing and lodging.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING:

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding is to confirm the willingness of $\overline{\mathcal{I} \subset \mathcal{R} \subset}$ to permit the use of its facility as a temporary Reception Centre location when required by the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako during an emergency or disaster that causes residents to be displaced from their homes. It is therefore understood between the parties as follows:

1. Upon direction from the Emergency Operations Centre, a representative from the Emergency Support Services program will contact the first available Facility Contact as listed on Appendix "A" who will make arrangements to open the facility as quickly as possible.

<u>TERC</u> also agrees to provide a maintenance representative or someone fully knowledgeable of the facility to assist in opening and preparing the facility for the displaced residents and general public (lighting, heating, cooling, etc.).



Attached are the consolidated financial statements for the six months ending June 30, 2015, which show a year to date deficit of \$72,462 compared with budget. This is due to the fact that most of our revenues are received in the third quarter while expenditures are incurred throughout the year. While we attempt to capture the timing in our budget, there are always variations in timing that cannot be anticipated. In addition, we incurred \$154,321 of EOC expenditures that have not yet been reimbursed by Emergency Management BC. These items are expected to result in a surplus in the third quarter.

Also attached is a colour coded summary report showing the expenses for region wide and regional rural services. In addition, each electoral area and municipal Director has been provided with a custom report that also includes the sub-regional and local services in which that jurisdiction participates.

The colour coding has been set up to format automatically as follows:

- · Green indicates that expenditures for that service are within budget;
- Yellow indicates that expenditures are over budget by less than \$2,000; and,
- Red indicates that expenditures are over budget by more than \$2,000.

In the current report, EOC expenditures are shown as Red due to costs for the Little Bobtail Lake fire and flooding on the Bulkley and Nechako rivers.

The full detailed departmental financial statements are available on request.

Also attached as Schedule 1 is a listing of our capital reserves at June 30, 2015 totalling about \$6.71 million; and Schedule 2 is a listing of our debenture debt at June 30, 2015 totalling \$914,000.

Subject:	Metal Recycling – Recommendation for Contract Award

On July 21, 2015, a Request for Quotations was issued for metal recycling services to five companies (Allen's Scrap and Salvage Ltd., Richmond Steel Recycling Ltd., Schnitzer Steel Canada Ltd., Allied Salvage and Metals Ltd. and ABC Recycling). Metal recycling service is for 2015 only with a contract expiry date of December 31, 2015. The deadline for receipt of quotations was noon, August 5, 2015.

The RDBN requested cost quotations for the sorting, pickup and removal of scrap metals, from the following solid waste management facilities:

- Fort St. James Transfer Station
- Vanderhoof Transfer Station
- Area "D" (Fraser Lake Rural) Transfer Station
- Granisle Transfer Station
- Burns Lake Transfer Station
- Knockholt Landfill
- Smithers/Telkwa Transfer Station

A separate quotation was requested for the sorting, pickup and removal of scrap metals from the Manson Creek Landfill due to the remote location of the site.

Estimated quantities of available scrap metal were outlined as follows:

Clearly outlined in the Request for Quotation document was the following expectations of the RDBN:

- 1. That the successful contractor provides reliable, consistent service to the Regional District.
- 2. That the successful contractor will be able to provide proof, satisfactory to the Regional District, that all materials collected are recycled and not landfilled.
- 3. That the successful contractor will pay the Regional District revenue for all scrap metals collected by the contractor for recycling.

Quotations submitted to the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako were to contain the following information:

- 1. Price (\$ per metric tonne of recycled metal) to be paid to the RDBN for processing materials from the sites to be serviced. This price shall be net of any costs to perform the work of the contract; including but not limited to:
 - i. Mobilization and demobilization to, from, and between the serviced sites.
 - ii. All labour, materials, and machinery involved in the collection, baling, loading, contaminant separation, and clean-up of on-site scrap metal stockpiles.
 - iii. The transport to market of collected materials.
 - iv. Detailed reporting of materials removed from each individual site.
- 2. Proposed schedule of service for both Primary and Secondary Facilities;
- 3. Description of final destination of recycled metal;
- 4. List of previous experience and references (including contact information);
- 5. Confirmation that insurance requirements will be met if awarded contract;
- 6. Confirmation that the Contractor is in good standing with Worksafe BC.

Prior to the deadline for receipt of submissions, the RDBN received 3 quotations. The financial results for the three quotations received are summarized below:

Company	Payment to RDBN
Richmond Steel Recycling Ltd.	Floating rate dependent on market value at time of metal collection and processing.
Schnitzer Steel Canada Ltd.	 \$20.28/metric tonne fixed rate for servicing all sites other than Manson Creek Landfill. \$0.00/metric tonne fixed rate for servicing the Manson Creek Landfill.
Allied Salvage and Metals Ltd.	 \$15.00/metric tonne minimum rate for servicing all sites other than Manson Creek Landfill. If market value increases minimum rate would be adjusted \$0.50/metric tonne for every \$1.00/metric tonne a published index moves. Quote to provide service to the Manson Creek Landfill was not provided due to insufficient material.



Based on the pricing provided, it is recommended to award the contract to Schnitzer Steel Canada Ltd. for removal and recycling of scrap metal from RDBN Landfill and Transfer Stations for the 2015 year. Payment to the RDBN would be \$20.28/metric tonne for materials collected at solid waste management sites other than the Manson Creek Landfill. The Manson Creek Landfill would be serviced at no cost/no revenue to the RDBN.

RECOMMENDATION

(All/Directors/Majority)

1. That the Board of Directors receive the memorandum titled, "Metal Recycling – Recommendation for Contract Award" and dated August 7, 2015.

2. Further that the Board of Directors award a contract for metal recycling services for 2015, expiring December 31, 2015, to Schnitzer Steel Canada Ltd. with revenue paid to the RDBN of \$20.28/metric tonne of scrap metal recycled from RDBN sites other than the Manson Creek Landfill. Scrap metal will be removed and recycled from the Manson Creek Landfill.

Subject:	RDBN Composting Program 2015

Overview

The 2015 Composting Program is following on the success of the 2014 Backyard Composting Program that was implemented by the RDBN in May and June 2014. The 2015 program will consist of two parts:

1. Subsidized backyard composting bins and mixing tools will be advertised and sold by the RDBN in August 2015. In September, these composting kits will be delivered to 7 - 8 locations in the Regional District where the people who have pre-paid can receive their kit. The locations where the kits will be distributed will correspond with the incorporated municipalities where workshops were delivered last year. Lynda Fyfe, Sustainability Assistant, will deliver the kits to these locations, set up a booth with the kits, and an information display. A two hour period has been allocated for each location for residents to pick up their kit. The compost bins will include a booklet on how to compost (provided by the distributor) and there will be information brochures and visuals on display. Any questions that people might have about how to properly use the kits will also be answered at that time. When residents pre-purchase a compost package through the RDBN, they will be asked to "register," by providing their name and contact information. There will be a checklist where registrants will be asked to indicate how they heard about the program (to assist with future marketing) and whether they would like a follow-up call to find out how the kit is working for them (to assess the functionality of the Earth Machine compost bin in particular and to determine challenges or barriers that people might be facing).



Composting packages will be distributed within the Regional District using calculations as follows:

2. Development of a composting display/demonstration that will be set up at the RDBN office. The display/demo is intended to be improved over time and to show a growing selection of composting options. Options on display in 2015 will include: the Earth Machine backyard composter and the compost mixing tools, the Green Cone backyard compost digester, a do-it-yourself version of a digester for handling non-compostables; the active vermi-composting bin in our office, a do-it-yourself home vermi-composting bin, and a bokashi food waste fermenter as well as information resources for all of these options. The intent is that interested residents will be able to view the display/demo during regular office hours.

2015 Program Design Considerations

The design of this year's program addresses the suggestion made in 2014 for future changes to the program:

- 1. Offer a pre-order process for residents interested in compost bins only, separate from the workshop portion as many people were attracted to the subsidized bin opportunity only.
- 2. Provide worm composters and green cone food digesters as an option for pre-order in addition to the compost bins as many people showed interest in other composting options.

Although the 2015 budget didn't allow for Green Cones and worm composters to be



offered to the public, the permanent display at the RDBN office will be a way for residents to view these options and to get further information about how to use and access them.

3. Offer workshops in the spring and fall.

The feedback collected from participants in the 2014 program indicates the importance of follow-up support for residents who are learning about composting. Of the 109 workshop attendees, 23 were contacted by RDBN staff between September 2014 and June 2015. Issues mentioned by phone call respondents included: bears getting into or destroying the compost, compost that doesn't fully mature, how to get the right moisture level, and what to do with kitchen scraps in the winter when the compost freezes. Six people had experienced some difficulty using the compost mixing tool.

Advertising Plan

The 2015 advertising campaign will use the same media outlets as were used in 2014: posters, posts on the Sustainable RDBN Facebook page, ads in local free classified publications, ads on the Peak and Valley Country, radio stations, front page of the RDBN Sustainability Newsletter, joint efforts with local municipalities and partnerships with community groups including Farmers' Market organizations, the Nechako Waste Reduction Initiative (Vanderhoof), H.O.P.E. Society (Houston) and GrendelGrow (Smithers). This year ads will also be sent to CFRN and CBC Radio 1. The advertising campaign will begin in August with an ad posted on the front page of the August/September Sustainability Newsletter. Pre-payment for the composting kits will be available in August.

Program Financing

One hundred composting kits (compost bin and mixing tool) will be offered to the public at a subsidized cost of \$40. This means that the RDBN would have to cover the remaining cost (estimated at \$38) for each composting package sold. The total initial cost to the RDBN for the compost kit distribution and display/demo set up will be \$10,021. If all 100 kits are sold, the RDBN will recover \$4,000 and the total 2015 program cost will be \$6,021. There is \$10,000 allocated in the 2015 Environmental Services Budget to cover the costs of the proposed program.



From a general agriculture perspective, I believe that there is not a clear benefit demonstrated by subdividing the subject parcel into two ¼ sections. The applicants state that they feel that a ¼ section lot size better serves agriculture in the area and cite that according to the ALR, a ¼ section is still a viable farm parcel size. The subject parcel appears to be largely arable with the bulk of the parcel rated as Class 3 and 4 CLI agriculture capability with common subclasses of stoniness and topography limitations. There is a significant portion of the subject parcel in productive hayfields (~106 acres), and the applicants have clearly demonstrated their dedication to maintain this vital resource, among other important bio-physical characteristics found within the subject parcel.

Generally speaking, larger acreages sell for less \$/acre than smaller acreages and common field-based forage and grain crops that are mechanically harvested are more profitable on a large, contiguous land-base. Large agriculture parcels will provide a wide range of future agriculture management options whether that be leasing a certain area of the parcel to another producer, and/or conducting a mixed-farm operation and not just forage fields for example.

Agriculture parcels such as the subject (current ~320acres) and larger are somewhat rare in the Bulkley Valley, and I do not find a compelling reason to support the proposed subdivision and thus forgo future agriculturally-based endeavours by reducing the current parcel size. Large parcel sizes greater than a ¼ section in size are sought out by some agriculture producers as evidenced by recent sales. In the Bulkley Valley in particular I believe there is a demand for all sizes of agriculture land parcels, and buyers will seek them out accordingly, or enter into alternative land-access arrangements with owners."

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The surrounding area is dominated by large agricultural parcels. The proposed subdivision would fit with the existing rural character as the parcels are a mix of ¼ sections, ½ sections and smaller. Maintaining appropriately large parcel sizes and keeping smaller residential development away from farming areas is important in preserving the integrity of agricultural lands and minimizing conflict between agriculture and non-agriculture uses.

Both proposed parcels are suitable for farming. The Proposed Lot 1 and Lot 2 soil capability are mainly Class 4; capable of a restricted range of crops. Proposed Lot 2 experiences more limitations to crop type due to the Class 6 percentage. This class is more suited for grazing land.

There is an easement through the two southern adjacent properties that allows access

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to the subject property from Old Babine Lake Road. The easement could facilitate both parcels if subdivided.

Official Community Plan

The current OCP designation for the property is Agricultural. This designation is intended to preserve these lands for the purposes of farming and other related activities. Section 3.1.2.(6) of the OCP states that:

Non-farm use of agricultural land shall be avoided. Applications for exclusions, subdivisions, and non-farm uses within the Agricultural Land Reserve may only be considered under the following circumstances.

- a) There is limited agricultural potential within the proposed area.
- b) Soil conditions are not suitable for agriculture.
- c) Neighbouring uses will not be compromised.
- d) Adequate provisions for fencing are provided, where a proposed development is adjacent to an existing agricultural use.
- e) The application is in the best interest of the community.
- f) The proposed development considers and addresses potential impacts and potential improvements to recreational features and the environment, including wildlife habitat.
- g) And, traffic management issues will be considered and addressed appropriately.

Zoning

The Proposed Lot 1 and Proposed Lot 2 meet the minimum parcel area requirement of 16 ha in the Ag1 Zone.

Agricultural Plan

During the development of the "RDBN Agricultural Plan" which was completed in 2012 the issue of subdivision to allow hobby farms was the topic of much discussion. The conclusion was that the region's agricultural interest was best served by not allowing this type of development as these parcels will likely end up being used primarily for rural residential purposes and not for agriculture. The Agricultural Plan states the following.

"Maintaining appropriately large parcel sizes and keeping smaller parcel residential development and other uses away from farming areas is an important factor in preserving the integrity of agricultural lands, and minimizing conflict between agriculture and non-agricultural uses. Where there is conflict the agricultural producers can expect to incur increased operational costs to manage or reduce the conflict."

The Agricultural Plan recommends that:

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"The RDBN should continue with its efforts to protect and preserve farm land and soil having capability for agricultural purposes through the restriction of subdivision, and limited encroachment of non-farm uses."

In Staff's opinion the proposed subdivision is not supported by the OCP as the soil conditions are suitable for agriculture, and the subdivision is not in the best interest in the community. Further, the application is contrary to the direction provided in the Agricultural Plan. Therefore, staff do not support this subdivision application.

Recommendation

That Agricultural Land Reserve Subdivision Application No. 1184 (Simpson-Hochachka) be recommended to the Agricultural Land Commission for denial.








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Surrounding Applications, ALR Status & Surrounding Development

Proposed Subdivision size: Two parcels ¼ SEC LESS A STRIP OF LAND BEING THE MOST ELY 20 M IN PARL WIDTH

Proposal Synopsis: The owners have occupied and farmed the subject property since 2005. They propose to subdivide the current ½ section of land (130 Hectare) parcel into two equal ¼ section operational farms (65 Hectare) for its continued use as agricultural land. The current use of the land, while being partially farmed for hay on the Southern side, is under-utilized on the North side given its size and location and the proponents believe the proposed subdivision will support agriculture in the Regional District of Bulkley Valley Nechako through developing two operational farming activities and better utilization of land that is currently under forest cover. The proponents have been farming 43 hectares of the subject property for ten years at times themselves and at times under lease to produce hay. They have also operated a small wood mill and managed the forested lands for beetle kill. The land is currently seasonally occupied with a small cabin and solar outbuildings and is surrounded by both private agricultural and crown land. By subdividing the land into two operational farms the proponents believe the proposed parcel sizes will better serve agriculture in the area.





Figure 4. Ministry of Forests forest cover mapping. Green lines represent forest cover polygons.

The photograph (figure 4.) clearly shows the property has a natural division between previously logged and now forested land adjacent to crown land in the Northern half while the Southern half is surrounded by farmland and is currently in active hay production. Some of the currently forested land cover is ideally suited to further agricultural development, for example, it is viable to have cattle and other livestock on the semi-forested lands to the Northern half.





Agricultural Management

A key consideration of the landowners is maintaining the current agricultural status and use of the existing agricultural zones, improving agricultural soils, avoiding any further regression of agriculturally modified sections back to forest land, maintaining a mix of agricultural and ecologically attractive lands including wildlife viewing for which the land is particularly well suited, promoting the properties use for local agriculture/eco-tourism use and maintaining viewscapes and existing trails as well as protecting valuable hydrology and soil cover types for the long term health of the local ecosystem.

To date they have maintained hay production and prevented forest incursion on existing agricultural sections, actively managed for beetle kill on forested lands, prevented hydrological damage in accordance with recommendations provided by a professional forester and commenced tilling and reseeding of the current hay field. Ideally, if this proposed subdivision is allowed they would like to promote further agricultural use of now partially forested sections of the land and open up agricultural use in particularly productive zoning including some of the 06 landcover typology outlined in (figure 5) in such a way as to promote viewscapes, existing trails and protecting identified hydrological and wildlife features.

Forty-three of 130 ha on the property are in maintained hay field. There are an additional ~3 ha that were cultivated but were not maintained prior to the current owners obtaining the land. Forest encroachment is occurring on the non-hayed fields although it has been actively managed on the North Eastern side. These areas could be fill-planted to augment timber production or, with substantial additional effort and expense, rehabilitated to produce hay, or could become prime agricultural lands for free-range cattle.

How this proposed subdivision will benefit agriculture:

The proponents commissioned a land study of the ecological zoning and uses of the current land by a registered professional forester (Larry McCulloch B.Sc.R, R.P.F.) to better understand how they could preserve the ecological integrity of the land, understand its unique characteristics while maintaining or even improving its agricultural potential.

The proposed land falls into two potentially distinct parcels when seen from an aerial photo. The Southwestern ¼ section, up to an existing land divide culminates in a crest on the property where an existing driveway enters from Old Babine Lake Road. This half of the property is predominantly in hay production with the exception of a steep ravine dropping down to Driftwood Creek on the Northern side and drains in a Southwesterly direction. A small solar powered seasonal cabin is located near a grove of trees in this lower half and is accessed by a nominal driveway. The steep ravine is hydrologically sensitive and currently forested with predominantly large Spruce trees. The slope is not conducive to agricultural use and the lower swale is surrounded by rural residential use along Driftwood Road. This section is actively farmed for hay and is currently being rotationally tilled and seeded.

The second Northeastern ¼ section drains to the Northwest and is largely forested with the exception of a small pasture on the Northeastern side. This section is largely surrounded by crown land and was formerly logged with existing skid trails that have been maintained. A fenceline was developed but not maintained on this half prior to purchase and it surrounds the entire property. This ¼ section holds the most promise for further agricultural development particularly in some of the lower flatter topography of 06 forest typology found in figure 5 but also presents some of the most challenging development issues due to its sensitive hydrology and use as a water source by neighbouring properties. There are excellent opportunities to develop this ¼ section with mixed agricultural, hydrological and wildlife as well as viewscape values in mind. The owners of the property are not in a position to own both ¼ sections of property and would like to either develop the Northeastern section properly or farm the Southwestern ¼ section only.



The context of Agricultural Land Use in the area of the proposed subdivision is marked by a decline in the number of farms, a long term trend toward increasing farm size, an increase in the average age of farmers and considerable obstacles for young farmers or agricultural entrepreneurs to gain access to farmland. Each of these trends does not bode well for the health of the agricultural sector in the region. According to Statistics Canada there were 205,730 farms in Canada in 2011, which represents a decline of more than 74,000 farms since 1991. The average farm has increased from 80 hectares to 315 hectares in size. More than half of these farms are operated by farmers over the age of 55. The average age of the Canadian farmer has shifted from 47.5 to 54 years during the same period that farms have been *declining* in number and getting *bigger*. In short there are fewer farms, they are a lot bigger and there are significant barriers for young people wanting to enter the sector all happening at the same time that our current population of farmers is aging. These are well-known, documented trends in the agricultural sector and present a real and challenging threat to the viability of agriculture in the region.

Young people may be reticent to occupy lands too far away from regional communities or simply unable to purchase parcel sizes that are too large to financially manage. Even children from farming families may choose to live in communities r urban areas because of amenities and forfeit careers in the farming sector.

Numerous agricultural analysts have identified a demographic issue in Canada that continues to evolve and promises to peak in the coming ten years, presenting a rising challenges for young people to enter the sector. In a 2014 article in Career Bear by John Tattrie he quotes Christie Young the Director of Farm Start that:

"In the next ten years, about 80 per cent of the agricultural assets in the country are going to be transferred, we're going to have a massive crisis in the agricultural sector because we don't have the infrastructure set up to get people into farming."

Land that is near small towns and cities is increasingly important to attract a vibrant and healthy population of young farmers who may need to have second career jobs to sustain nominally productive land. While in the past this kind of hobby farming or mixed use was seen as a threat to traditional agriculture it is now being seen as a vital opportunity to maintain agricultural land through mixed uses. Innovative ways to maintain rural agricultural use of the land need to be encouraged particularly in the North where fuel costs may be higher and transportation issues more challenging.

This is exactly the position that the proponents find themselves in. We have been working with second career jobs while sustaining a nominally productive farm operation and battling the high costs associated with large farm operations. We were young aspiring farmers when we first purchased the land but soon found the cost of farm machinery and starting up a new operation were prohibitively high. Nevertheless we bought three older tractors, haying equipment and tilled and worked the land over a period of five or six years. Recently we have been working with a local farmer to lease the land in order to rotate and seed it in a financially viable manner. We maintained the existing fields, fought back forest encroachment and carefully planned an ecologically sensitive agricultural approach to stewarding the subject property including studying the land for alternative agricultural uses. We have been financially unable to develop the back half of the property and even explored selling the property over the past year because we are in the position of neither being able to develop the land nor properly farm what we have due to its size and our own personal financial capacity. Owning our land would be far more attractive if it was half the size and we had enough capital as young farmers to manage the existing farmland as a viable farm or develop the Northwestern ¼ section into a viable farm.

Increasingly agricultural jobs near towns and cities are offset by other employment as the cost of entering the sector to operate large farms is too high for young people and this is the trend we find ourselves caught in. While the trend has been toward amalgamating farms into large corporate operations and moving toward larger and larger operational sizes this is exactly what needs to be avoided especially in the valuable areas near small communities where a rural lifestyle needs to be encouraged with small operable farms.

We need more small, accessible farms, of the right size, that encourage young people to enter the sector especially near small towns and cities where they can access second career opportunities. Many of these younger farmers are accessing alternative markets such as vegetable gardens, organic produce, farmers markets, unusual crops or experimental crops or producing alternative agricultural products or even combining agricultural tourism in creative ways to live and work rurally. In fact, there is a growing movement of young families who are moving back to farming in the Bulkley Valley. Some of these families produce small scale agricultural products to sell locally at the farmers market or at local businesses, while other families are breaking into the larger agricultural markets of the region. However, in all the cases we are aware of, these families manage smaller areas of farm land. This runs counter to the national trend of farms becoming larger and more mechanized, and suggests to us that here in the Bulkley Valley, the possibility of subdividing this half-section into two smaller farms, still of 'viable size' according to the ALR, would be the best decision for maximum farming use.

The proponents believe that two operational farms sufficiently large enough to sustain operational farming activities while small enough to be affordable and accessible to small town living is key to the sectors sustainability and health. Combined with the potential of agricultural or eco-tourism for which our land is particularly well-suited two smaller farms would benefit agriculture in the region.

Traditionally, the ¼ section has been seen as the basic building block of an operational farm in Canada and this is reflected in the adjacent average parcel sizes which are 160 acres or less and we are proposing that two ¼ sections and two operational farms will better serve this particular piece of land given its location and given the abundance of ¼ section farms in the surrounding area. Traditionally the


residential occupation of farm land can be viewed as a threat to agriculture because of the encroachment of hobby farms or residential occupation in rural areas and the proponents recognize this. Increasing farm size was a way to avoid this kind of occupation but it has resulted in farms that are too expensive except for large corporate operations. While amalgamating farms may have been a reasonable strategy for preserving farmland in the past, and large farms were a desirable way of avoiding urban encroachment, the greatest threat to farming in the foreseeable future is exactly the opposite. It is now rural to urban migration, the loss of farming knowledge and the abandonment of farming lands combined with a demographic decline in farmers, the increasing financial inaccessibility of large farming operations, an ageing population and a dearth of innovative alternatives for young farmers wanting to enter the market. Ideally, in the farm lands surrounding Smithers and other Northern communities there would be accessible rural farmland just large enough to make a living from and yet small enough for start -p operations to afford both land, equipment and the costs of developing farmland.

Is the proposed use supportive of agriculture or in conflict with it:

The proposed subdivision will result in two operational farms instead of one large farm in which half of the arable land is currently in marginal forest cover. As figure 10 clearly shows subdividing the land and developing the Northwestern ¼ section will result in more arable agricultural land in support of the purpose of the ALR.


Will the proposal permanently damage the physical capability of the land for agricultural use?

The land is currently serviced by a nominal driveway with an existing easement over neighbouring lands such that no further roadways would be needed that might damage existing land. Furthermore the current driveway enters the property and follows the natural glacial crest of the hill where the soils are the most marginal and then connects to an old skid trail in order as much as possible to avoid damaging existing farmland. Subdividing would not require any further road building as the driveway enters the property in such as way that it would service both ¹/₄ sections. There is a chance that further indiscriminate development of the Northeastern section would result in hydrological damage or damage to existing water sources but the proponents are proposing that the subject property could be developed for agricultural use through a mixed forest and agricultural land development strategy and avoid riparian zone development in such as way that it would complement the properties viewscapes and maintain eco-tourism values while increasing agricultural productivity. The proponents have already installed culverts to manage these riparian areas. There is an existing potable water source on site as well as a sewage lagoon on the property such that the subdivision would not result in a demand for urban-type services such as sewer and water nor would this even be possible.



How do the existing and proposed parcel sizes relate to the type of agriculture in the area?

If the property was subdivided into two ¼ section parcels it would be in accordance with neighbouring properties which are similar in size or smaller and which have been deemed as suitable sizes for agricultural subdivision. There is a large area of crown land to the while all of the neighbouring properties are 160 acres or less. Subdividing the property would not raise any expectations for similar actions in surrounding properties as this is the largest property size for neighbouring parcels. Surrounding parcels are largely used for grassland foraging or hay production and the proposed subdivision would result in an increase in the local type and use of agricultural land. The proposal would not require a change to the regional and community planning objectives for the area nor a change to the zoning or Official Community Plan. Indeed the proposed subdivision, if it results in ecologically sensitive wildlife and forest management, viewscape management and an increase in local agricultural tourism or eco-tourism potential would complement the local OCP while promoting rural living.



PROPOSAL

The applicant has requested the issuance of a Temporary Use Permit (TUP) to allow the operation of a gravel crusher in an existing gravel pit. Gravel crushing is not a permitted use under the H1 and H2 zoning.

The owners are currently screening the extracted sand and gravel from the property, which has been permitted by the Ministry of Energy and Mines (MOEM) until April 7, 2020.



Aerial map of subject property




The applicants intend to use the crusher for a two week period every second year until 2020. The crusher will run from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., commencing April 2016. The crushed material will be stockpiled on-site in the Use Area until sold.

The location of the crusher is not defined as it is mobile and can be moved within the Use Area.

Hauling will take place from April to October. The total estimated volume of extracted gravel to be crushed is 10,000 m³. Hauling of the crushed material will take place on a private access through the adjacent property located to the south (9880 Hyw 16). Hauling is not intended to occur during the two week crushing period due to stockpiling efforts. The applicants state that the crushing activity will not increase hauling frequency from the estimated two to three loads per day.

It is noted that the gravel pit is not the use being considered by this application. The Regional District does not have any regulations regarding gravel extraction operations or other types of mining.

TEMPORARY USE PERMITS EXPLAINED

Pursuant to Section 921 of the *Local Government Act*, a Regional District Board may allow temporary uses for a period of three years or less, after which a subsequent request can then be made to have the Board consider renewing the permit for an additional three years. After the six years a new application can be made to allow the use to continue.

The permit should only be issued in accordance with the policy identified in the applicable OCP. The Burns Lake Rural and Francois Lake (North Shore) Official Community Plan allows for the issuance of a Temporary Use Permit on the following basis.

- (1) Temporary commercial or industrial permits may be issued, pursuant to Section 921 of the Local Government Act, throughout the plan area, where:
 - (a) The use is clearly temporary in nature;
 - (b) The proposed temporary use will not create an amount of traffic that will adversely affect the natural environment, or rural character of the area;
 - (c) The environment would not be negatively affected by the proposed temporary use;
 - (d) The proposed temporary use will not have adverse effects on neighbouring land uses or property owners;
 - (e) The proposed temporary use does not require a significant amount of capital investment in a particular location; and,

(f) The proposed temporary use has the support of the Agricultural Land Commission if the land is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

THE APPROVAL PROCESS

Notice of this application will be published in a local newspaper informing the public of the time and location of the Board's consideration of the application, and their ability to provide input. Property owners and tenants within 50 metres of the subject property will also be sent a similar notice.

REFERRAL COMMENTS

Mining Referral

At the February 2015 Regional District Committee Meeting, the Rural Directors Committee considered the Notice of Work application for sand and gravel extraction on the subject property. The following referral comments were submitted to the MOEM:

- That the Ministry of Energy and Mines be encouraged to consult with the local community to identify their potential concerns and appropriate measures to mitigate any negative impacts associated with the proposed activity, such as implementing restricted hours of operation.
- It is noted that a crushing plant is not a permitted use on the property pursuant to "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993.
- The applicant is encouraged to discuss any future plans for the sales of gravel on the property and construction of the equipment repair shop with the RDBN Planning Department to ensure that these activities occur in a manner that is consistent with RDBN zoning.


Ministry of Transportation

"Approval recommended subject to conditions below:

- When the Mines referral was sent to MOTI, MOTI met with the client regarding the highway access. This access was not approved for industrial access but was originally approved for residential purposes.
- Meeting on site with the client and Area Manager with MOTI, it was decided that with minor improvements (drainage and slope) the access would be used for gravel extraction temporarily only.
- If larger volumes are to be extracted (>5000m³/year), MOTI will ask for a designed industrial access at the location.
- If highway disturbances are noted during this time, MOTI will also ask for a designed industrial access."

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The subject property is a ¼ section lot located in the rural area east of Burns Lake and borders crown land to the north. The surrounding area consists mainly of large parcels. However, there is a residential subdivision located southeast of the property along Tintagel Road. According to RDBN mapping the closest residence is located 150-200 meters east of the Extraction Area, on the adjacent private property.



The surrounding OCP designations are mixed, and include Agriculture, Resource and Rural Residential.


According to RDBN mapping the 'Use Area' has a treed buffer area of +/- 30 meters from the property line. The topography of the area as well as the large buffers limits the visibility from the street and the neighbouring residential property.

Private access used for hauling will remove truck traffic from Tintagel Road, except at the crossing from the subject property to the south adjacent lot at 9880 Highway 16.

It is noted that there are no permanent structures required for the industrial use and that the crusher is easily removable; therefore, the proposed temporary use does not require a significant amount of capital investment.

In the Planning Department's opinion the limited operation times, private access and the natural features of the property adequately mitigate potential concerns associated with the crushing operation.

CONDITIONS

The following conditions are included as terms of the TUP to minimize the impact of the gravel crusher on area residents

- Operating hours from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. for a two week period a year;
- The gravel crushing plant shall only be used within the area labelled as Use Area;
- A 30 metered treed buffer zone must be maintained adjacent to the property boundary, and;
- Hauling of crushed material must use the private road located through 9880 Highway 16.

The Planning Department expects that the temporary industrial use will not have a significant negative impact on the area.

Recommendations

That the Regional District Board:

Approve the issuance of Temporary Use Permit No. B-01-15.








PROPOSAL

The applicant has a Crown land Licence of Occupation for quarrying on the application area. The materials are used for local construction projects and asphalt production. The land has been an existing aggregate pit for decades. The applicant wishes to have the ability to bring a temporary portable asphalt plant and a crushing plant on-site.

The application area is zoned Ag1 and is located in the ALR. Gravel crushing and the operation of an asphalt plant are not permitted uses under the Ag1 Zoning. The applicant has therefore applied for a temporary use permit to allow the use for up to three years.

The applicant has proposed to limit the hours of operation of the plants from 7 A.M. to 7 P.M., from Monday to Saturday for 2-4 weeks per year sometime between April and November.



Applicant's site plan

The Licence of Occupation area is ± 7.65 ha in size. Annual estimated crushing production is approximately 5,000 to 10,000 tonnes per year. At the completion of mining the applicant proposes to reclaim the area as per Ministry of Energy and Mines and Agricultural Land Commission guidelines.

It is noted that the gravel pit is not the use being considered by this application. The Regional District is not permitted to regulate gravel extraction operations or other types of mining. The use being considered is the operation of a temporary portable asphalt plant and a crushing plant.

Temporary Use Permits Explained

Pursuant to Section 921 of the *Local Government Act*, a Regional District Board may allow temporary uses for a period of three years or less, after which a subsequent request can then be made to have the Board consider renewing the permit for an

additional three years. After the six years a new application can be made to allow the use to continue.

The permit should only be issued in accordance with the policy identified in the applicable OCP. The Houston, Topley, Granisle Rural Official Community Plan states the following:

- (1) Temporary use permits may be issued, pursuant to Section 921 of the Local Government Act, throughout the plan area, where:
 - (a) The proposed temporary use will not create an amount of traffic that will adversely affect the natural environment, or rural character of the area;
 - (b) The environment would not be negatively affected by the proposed temporary use;
 - (c) The proposed temporary use will not have adverse effects on neighbouring land uses or property owners;
 - (d) The proposed temporary use does not require a significant amount of capital investment in a particular location; and,
 - (e) The proposed temporary use has the support of the Agricultural Land Commission if the land is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

The Approval Process

Notice of this application has been published in the Houston Today newspaper informing the public of the time and location of the Board's consideration of the application, and their ability to provide input. Property owners and tenants within 50 metres of the subject property have also been sent a similar notice. Any written submissions received from the public prior to the Regional District Board meeting will be put on the supplementary agenda.

Prior to the Board's consideration of the application the gallery should be asked if anyone wishes to provide comment on the application.



PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The subject property is located in rural area with large parcels and mainly Crown land. There are several gravel pits in the area, and the District of Houston industrial area is located on the other side of the Morice River. There are also active agricultural operations in the area. The site is accessed by forest service roads. There are no permanent structures required for the industrial use and the proposed development does not require a significant amount of capital investment. The use can be relatively easily removed from the site at the end of the permit period.

The Morice River is located approximately 130 metres away from the application area. The area between the between the gravel pit and the river acts as a treed buffer and is located on Crown land. There is no reason to anticipate that this buffer area will be disturbed. The Ministry of Environment indicated no concerns with the proposal.

There appears to be no notable visual impact associated with the proposed use, as it is screened from the road by a tree buffer, which will be maintained.

According to our mapping the closest residence is located northwest of the application area on Morice Telkwa FSR, approximately 1.3 kilometres from the site. The proposed uses may create some additional traffic during operation, there will be some increase in noise, and fumes from the operating machinery. However, given the lack of development in the area, and the restricted operating period (4 weeks each year from 7 A.M. to 7 P.M.) staff do not anticipate any negative impacts on area residents.

As noted the application area is located in the ALR. The ALC has a Notice of Intent for the gravel extraction on the property. The proposed gravel crusher and asphalt plant would require an application for Non-Farm Use to the Commission. The applicant is in contact with the ALC regarding the required permits.

Recommendations

That the Regional District Board:

- 1. Approve the issuance of Temporary Use Permit No. G-01-15;
- 2. Direct staff to issue the Temporary Use Permit once, and if, the applicant has received non-farm use approval for the temporary portable asphalt plant and a crushing plant on the subject property.



1.0 **Project Overview**

1.1 **Project Purpose**

The area of interest herein called "Houston Gravel pit" is a parcel of land in the Houston area that has been identified as an aggregate (sand and gravel) deposit. Road sub-base gravels and asphalt aggregate is required by LB Paving Ltd. for local construction projects and asphalt production. LB Paving hereby submits the following management report as part of an application for a Temporary Industrial Use Permit from the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako.

1.2 Site Location and Description

Houston Pit is 7.8 Kms west of Houston, BC on Morice – Gold FSR.

1.3 Legal Description

Part of District Lot 4107, Range 5 Coast Range 5 Land District, covering that part of DL 4107 for the purpose of Quarry; LBF # 6400488 and 6405188.

1.4 Access Plans

Access to this site is on good gravel roads.

- Starting from the intersection of Highway 16 and Morice River Road;
- Go 4.1 Km south on Morice River Road and turn right onto Bymac FSR;
- Go 1.2 km on Bymac FSR till the Morice Walcott road;
- Turn left and go 0.65 km on the Morice Walcott Road, crossing the Morice River and turn left on to Morice Gold FSR;
- The pit entrance is on the right, 0.8 kms along the Morice Gold FSR.

Site access has been controlled through the installation of a locked gate at the pit boundary.

2.0 **Project Description**

2.1 **Description of Work**

- Annuual estimate crushing production is approximately 5,000 to 10,000 tonnes per year;
- The aggregate will be excavated, screened, crushed and stockpiled on site to the preferred grain size and quality for road gravel and asphalt production;
- The machines to be used will include a front end loader, bulldozer, excavator, screening plant, crushing plant and asphalt plant;
- The crusher will operate on site from 2 to 4 weeks per year, depending on the market conditions;
- The operating schedule for the crusher will be from Monday to Saturday between the hours of 7 am and 7 pm, sometime during the construction period of April 1 until November 15 of each year. There will be no operations on statutory holidays;
- The height of the working face will be less than 5 meters;
- The operating schedule for the asphalt plant will be from Monday to Saturday between the hours of 7 am and 7 pm sometime during the construction period of April 1 until November 15 of each year. There will be no operations on statutory holidays;
- The asphalt plant is only expected to operate on site for 2 to 4 weeks per year, depending on the market conditions;
- At completion of mining, all slopes shall be trimmed to a consistent, minimum slope of 2:1 or the natural slope with native granular material

2.2 Asphalt Plant Operations

A counterflow portable asphalt plant, rated at 250 T/Hr, whose burner is powered by recycled fuel with electrical power supplied to the asphalt plant by a diesel fired generator. The asphalt Plant will be moved onto this site on a demand basis.

Asphalt oil is stored in insulated and heated tanks. The oil is delivered and pumped out of trailers into the stationary tanks following written procedures. The asphalt oil begins to solidify below 31 degrees Celsius so the product must be kept warm enough to flow through the lines. Once the oil is in the storage tanks then a riello burner is used to keep the product up to temperature. The heating units are diesel fired. These tanks are filled by LB fuel truck on an "as needed" basis. Diesel is stored in a double walled fuel vault. Diesel heaters on tanks are fed from a small tanks (180 iitre) and the RFO tank is fired with RFO, plumbed directly from the RFO tank.

LB Paving air emissions permit requires that the plant give off less than 120 milligrams of fine particulate per cubic metre of exhaust. The portable plant has a Portable Bag House with cyclone and contains approximately 250 bags that trap the particulates as the exhaust travels through. The unit collects the fines, trapped inside, and then a screw recycles the fines back into the mixing chamber.

Asphalt Release Agent:

Maxi-Kreme is a biodegradable (all ingredients are food grade) asphalt release agent used for cleaning tools, equipment and truck boxes. This agent is effective in cleaning paving equipment and is a very environmentally friendly product for cleaning.

2.3 **Present State of Land**

The Houston pit is on Crown land. The entire site has been grubbed and has been an existing aggregate pit for decades. The site is leased and operated by L. B. Paving Ltd. of Smithers.



There is no known overlapping or adjacent uses of this portion of land, public or others. There are many active gravel pits to the east of the site. South of the site is the Morice-Gold FSR and a 120 meter buffer towards the Morice River.

The entire site has been grubbed. The overburden thickness is approximately 0.15 to 0.2 m of organics. The soil texture consists of coarse sand and some gravel, deposited as part of an ancient, abandoned fluvial terrace.

There are no watercourses running through the site. The Morice River is approximately 130 meters south of the site.

This site is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

Current land use:	An operating sand and gravel pit.
Topography:	The site is mainly gravel, sloping from north to south.
Watercourses:	None in the application area.
Vegetation:	The after growth of an area previously logged.
Soil Texture:	There is very little organics on top of the gravel.

2.4 Reclamation

The site will be reclaimed as per Ministry of Energy and Mines and Agricultural Land Commission regulations. At the completion of mining, all slopes shall be rimmed to a consistent, minimum slope of 2:1 or the natural slope angle with native granular material. Exhausted area of the pit will be reclaimed and re-vegetated with native grasses and trees.

2.5 Environmental

2.5.1 Land Impacts

The site will have minimal impacts to the land as the entire site has been previously disturbed; the area has been logged, and there is an existing aggregate operation on site. There are no known archeological sites. A 130 meter buffer between the gravel pit and the Morice River.

Gravel and asphalt products will be trucked off-site along Morice River Road as they are consumed on projects.

In order to minimize adverse impacts, at the end of each phase, pit faces will be re-sloped and exhausted areas of the aggregate pit will be re-vegetated as per mining regulations.

2.5.2 Atmospheric Impacts

There will be some diesel exhaust from the operating machinery and trucks hauling away material away from the site, but this will be kept to a minimum. Minimal dust will be produced during excavation. The nearest residence is over 1.2 km to the northwest. Hours of operations will be limited to 7:00 am to 7:00 pm, six days a week (Monday to Saturday)

The following dust control plan will be followed:

- 30 km speed limit will be maintained within the pit area;
- All the trucks will be covered with a tarp;

- 145
- Placement of the crusher will be in the bottom of the pit;
- Crushers will be equipped with nozzled water spray bars;
- Well maintained access roads;
- Placement of dust control measures on haul roads and active travelled area if required;
- A maximum drop height of 2 meters;
- All personal will be informed on this dust control plan;
- In cases of a wind event or extreme heat and the above mentioned measures are not adequate, operations will stop until LB Paving has managed the dust effectively;

The following noise control plan will be followed:

- 30 km speed limit will be maintained with the pit area:
- Placement of the crusher in the bottom of the pit;
- Well maintained access roads;
- A maximum drop height of 2 meters;
- All personal will be informed on this noise control plan;
- Crushing and asphalt plant hours of operations will be between 7:00 am and 7:00 pm, Monday to Saturday, not including holidays;
- All equipment use on site will have functional mufflers that are in good working order and muffle noise to their full capacity;
- Stockpiles will be placed to minimize normal operating noise.

2.5.3 Aquatic Impacts

The site has no direct impacts on the aquatic environment. To minimize any potential impacts to the flat land below the working site in the spring, measures have been taken to control erosion. The site is 130 meters away from the Morice River.

2.5.4 Fish and Wildlife Impacts

The site is expected to have no direct impact on fish and wildlife habitats. The nearest water body is the Morice River which is fish bearing. However, the site is located 130 meters north of the river and on the other side of the Morice – Gold FSR, so the operation will not impact this fish-bearing water resource. The site has been logged and disturbed. There are numerous other existing gravel pits in the immediate vicinity. There will be minimal to no disturbance to existing wildlife habitats. There are no known threatened or endangered species in the area that will be impacted by this operation.

The following Wildlife Management plan will be followed:

- The existing 130 meters buffer between the gravel pit and the Morice River will be undisturbed. This will act as a corridor/shelter for any wildlife or birds passing through the area;
- There is no water course on the site.

2.5.5 Socio-community

The site will not affect or influence existing community services or infrastructure, and not disturb any existing water supplies, emergency services or transportation. There are no changes to the access road and the traffic (from the machinery to the site and removal of the material from the site) will be infrequent and minimal on the Morice River FSR.



2.5.6 Land Use

The land is zoned as a AG-1 pursuant to Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993. The bylaw allows the site to be used for aggregate extraction and limited processing. This application is to provide LB with the permit to crush and operate a asphalt plant on the site.

2.5.7 Public Health

The site has no effect on public health, as there is minimal to zero waste on site, and waste disposal will be managed responsibly and according to sites codes. Site contamination will be minimal to zero.

There were 8 building permit applications submitted this reporting period with a total construction value of \$2,204,759.00. There have been 34 permits issued to date in 2015.



Dear Members of the Regional District;

Residents of our area have been increasingly concerned about episodes of poor air quality and it's impacts on health. These concerns are supported by the BC Lung Association 2015 State of the Air Report showing that we are among the most polluted of BC municipalities in 2014 (References attached). We understand that having clean air not only influences peoples' decisions to live here, but tourism as well.

It is well documented in the health and science literature that poor air quality contributes to increased rates of cancer, heart disease, auto-immune diseases and respiratory illness, as well as many other health problems (2). With this knowledge, it is now time for the Village of Burns Lake to take a constructive role in creating an environment of clean air residents.

Considering the above, we are respectfully asking the following:

1. That the Regional District ask the Ministry of Environment to not issue any new or amended air emission permits affecting our airshed until an updated inventory of emission sources is complete, and public discussions pertaining to impacts on clean air have occurred. We see this as an opportunity for the Village of Burns Lake and its residents to 'take stock' of our air quality and plan wisely for the healthy future of our community.

2. That the Regional District consider actively supporting municipalities of our area to create a strong knowledge base framework that will guide sound health and economic decisions in the pursuit of clean air. Appendix A contains a suggested framework to help the Burns Lake Mayor and Council work towards clean air.

Appendix A

Framework for assessing current air quality in Telkwa and surroundings. Much of this information can be requested from the BVLD Airshed Management Society, Ministry of Environment and/or Northern Health.

- The highest priority is an updated inventory of particulate matter (PM) sources affecting the Bulkley Valley airshed. (PM2.5, particles equal or smaller than 2.5 micrometres, are of the greatest health concern.) Ten years have passed and there have been many changes since the last Ministry of Environment microemissions inventory for 2001-2002 (3).
- We need a review of the most up-to-date, 2014, air quality data, including how it compares with the past and to provincial annual air quality targets.
- Telkwa and Smithers also exceeded the provincial 24-hour air quality target in 2014 (1). Inclusion of 'worst-case' hourly and 24-hour readings would encourage residents to take precautions during air quality advisories. It is well known that there is an increase in respiratory and cardiovascular emergency room visits during episodes of poor air quality, even those of short duration.
- The opinions of health officials such as Northern Health workers should be sought. Conditions have improved since the 2007 BC Centre for Disease Control estimates suggested that the mortality attributable to air pollution in Northern BC was on the same order of magnitude as the mortality attributable to diabetes (2). Have conditions improved enough to safeguard our children's health?
- Mayor and Council should help communicate this information to the public and receive public feedback.
- With up-to-date baseline information, Council and residents will be equipped to judge what level of additional air emissions, if any, are publicly acceptable in our airshed.

Thank you for your correspondence of February 12, 2015, regarding emergency response planning. I appreciate being made aware of your concerns and want to assure you that the safety of Canadians remains Transport Canada's top priority. Please accept my apology for the delay in replying.

With respect to Parkland County's debrief and public summary on the train derailment in Gainford, Alberta, I have noted your comment that Canadian National (CN) did not use the Unified Incident Command during the response. Better use of the Unified Incident Command would strengthen response capability and communications between local, provincial and federal governments and the entity holding the duty to respond (CN in this case).

With respect to your second point that CN decided to burn off spilled hazardous material and did not inform the county or the public, I would note that plans to vent and burn were provided to Parkland County through meetings that included officials from Parkland County, CN and Transport Canada.

The third comment states that communications with the public were not consistent between CN and Parkland County. Communication would have been better had there been coordination through the Unified Incident Command; however, it is important to note that the response to the incident itself was deemed appropriate by the Regional Remedial Measures Specialist.

I would now like to turn to the further concerns identified by the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley–Nechako and listed on page two of your letter.

Point #1 - There is a dangerous time lapse between the derailment report and the contents of what the train is carrying when relayed to first responders, who may be put in a deathly situation.

Transport Canada officials would not expect first responders to go into a derailment scene without an understanding of what is involved. In cooperation with international colleagues, the Department has developed the Emergency Response Guidebook, which provides recommendations on initial measures to protect the public and first responders. The system of placarding provides immediate information on the contents of railcars.

Transport Canada's experience has been that the rail consist is available almost immediately from the railroad company and can be obtained from the Canadian Transport Emergency Centre (CANUTEC). This information, along with other observations from the scene, such as car numbers and placards, forms a picture of the derailment and the risks involved.

Point #2 – Small municipal and rural fire departments are not equipped or trained to respond to an incident involving a hazardous material spill and/or explosion.

The Government of Canada has acknowledged this and implemented the Emergency Response Assistance Plan (ERAP) program, whereby the industry becomes responsible for providing emergency response assistance. The contents of the ERAP include a description of the personnel, resources and equipment that can be brought to an emergency scene involving the product shipped. Transport Canada approves an ERAP if it is deemed adequate for the commodities involved and geographical area of coverage.

A first responder can have immediate access to a technical expert named in the ERAP through CANUTEC who will provide initial advice and guidance until an ERAP team arrives. The intent of an ERAP, as per the *Transportation of Dangerous Goods Act, 1992*, is to ensure that an emergency response assistance capability exists describing specific actions to be taken in the event of an actual or anticipated release and listing specialized personnel and equipment that are available in a timely manner to supplement normal emergency response resources.

Point #3 - There are many kilometres of railway that do not have fire department coverage in our region that may be populated.

The lack of fire department coverage is an issue, not only as it relates to a response to train derailments, but also for a response to house fires, automobile collisions and medical emergencies—all of which are more frequent. While I cannot speak to the lack of fire department coverage in a certain region, as mentioned, Transport Canada has a robust ERAP program in place to respond to derailments involving dangerous goods, and derailments occurring in remote locations have been dealt with effectively in the past and will continue to be dealt with effectively in the future.

Point #4 – Residents in the region, many who live along the rail lines, may be at immediate and extreme risk if a hazardous material spill occurred.

Release of dangerous goods in a populated area can pose an extreme risk. Transport Canada makes every effort to reduce this risk through initiatives in rail safety, means of containment standards and emergency response.

Point #5 - A response to a hazardous material spill could take upwards of twelve hours to get to; this delayed response would certainly have a negative impact on residents along the rail line and the environment.

Transport Canada expects a response from industry as quickly as can be achieved, with 12 hours set as a maximum to have a response team on scene. Depending on the location, this may occur much more quickly. It is also expected that a technical advisor from the ERAP holder should be available on the phone immediately. A technical advisor must be able to physically go to the scene within six hours.

A response to a train derailment of any complexity can take a number of days to resolve. It is expected that the first response community would secure the area and ensure that the public is not at risk, through an order to evacuate if necessary. All efforts will be made to protect the public, property and the environment.

Other than new requirements for ERAP holders to assist first responders for a release of flammable liquids, ERAP holders, through their response organization, are not "first" responders and would only deal with stopping or preventing a release and transferring a product.

In addition to my aforementioned responses to your specific comments, I would add that the issues raised in your letter have been the subject of review and recommendations by the Emergency Response Task Force over the past several months. Some of the issues are addressed in the Task Force's Quarterly Reports, the first of which was published on November 17, 2014, and is available online at **www.tc.gc.ca/eng/tdg/first-quarterly-report-1212.html**. The second Quarterly Report is being finalized. This information is relevant to Class 3 Flammable Liquids transported by rail only.

The Emergency Response Task Force's main focus is the transportation of flammable liquids by rail. Its primary objective is to improve public safety at dangerous goods incidents involving flammable liquids transported by rail. The Task Force also has the mandate to conduct further research, and to assess, evaluate and make recommendations to improve the ERAP program. The Task Force has generated much interest and stakeholder engagement from Transport Canada, the provinces, territories, First Nations and municipalities, rail and petroleum industries, first responder communities and the public.

On April 23, 2014, I announced the creation of the Task Force under the Transportation of Dangerous Goods Directorate, to work on strengthening emergency response capacity across the country. Task Force members are recommending that Transport Canada further promote and improve knowledge and understanding of various aspects of transportation of dangerous goods activities and programs with an outreach and awareness program as an ongoing activity that will address, among other topics, the following:

- ERAP Program;
- Role of Transportation of Dangerous Goods Remedial Measures Specialists;
- CANUTEC;
- Protective Direction 32;
- Protective Direction 33;
- Emergency Response Task Force; and
- Transportation of Dangerous Goods General Policy Advisory Council.

The aforementioned recommendations can be found online via the Task Force's first Quarterly Report. Additional recommendations related to Incident Command Structure, first responder roles and responsibilities, authority having jurisdiction, and communications will be addressed in the second Quarterly Report.

Your letter of June 9, 2015, to Honourable Christy Clark, Premier of British Columbia, regarding support of a water use plan for the Nechako Reservoir has been referred to the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations. I am pleased to have the opportunity to provide you with a response.

I acknowledge the Regional District Board of Directors considers a water use plan would address issues such as flooding and erosion on the Nechako River and assist in lessening negative impacts to communities downstream of the reservoir.

Water use plans (WUPs) have been developed and implemented by BC Hydro for most of their water control facilities. As well, Metro Vancouver has developed a joint WUP encompassing their facilities on both the Capilano and Seymour Rivers. The latter WUP is in the final stages of review prior to authorizing its implementation. These WUPs represent significant achievements in terms of rebalancing how water is used to address multiple values, and provide guidance when facing high and low inflow events.

My understanding is that the Nechako Reservoir, while being managed to produce power, is also managed to provide required cooling flows for migrating salmon at certain times of the year and minimum environmental flows at other times. As well, the reservoir has to some degree lessened downstream high and low inflow impacts but is restricted in doing so by Tahtsa Narrows.

In all cases, the development of WUPs was led by the water licence holder owning the water control facilities. Should the key licensee on the Nechako, Rio Tinto Alcan, wish to develop a WUP, this office would work with them to determine the planning process; including seeking input from the full range of water use interests relevant to their water control facilities.

Thank you for your letter dated June 25, 2015 regarding recommendations the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako have for the Province in response to the BC Earthquake Preparedness: Consultation Report by Mr. Henry Renteria. These recommendations from the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako included new provincial funding to Emergency Management BC (EMBC), to build a team of experts and gather resources to manage and deal with emergency management as it was managed in the past. They also included the Province developing a program for enhanced preparedness and response to emergencies and not rely on local government for emergency preparedness service delivery.

A key finding and conclusion of Mr. Renteria's report is that emergency management is a responsibility shared by all levels of government, the private sector, non-government organizations and the public. He added that not one agency or any one level of government can prepare BC for an overwhelming event. What is required is a holistic approach with all parties recognizing that they have a role to play in creating a culture of preparedness in BC, and ensuring that the emergency management system empowers all parties both inside and outside of governments.

Full implementation of Mr. Renteria's report will take time and resources and in the short term, likely is cost prohibitive for all parties (federal, provincial, local, and private sector entities). Responding to all of the report's recommendations will require a long-term approach and one that is undertaken by all levels of government. At this time, the Province is committed to implementing the following recommendations:

 An upgrade to the Provincial Emergency Notification System (PENS), that provides new efficiencies to help get emergency notifications, such as tsunami warning, more quickly to the hands of emergency managers and media to BC's coastal communities.

- Six Provincial Duty Managers, to ensure 24/7 operational decision making in the Provincial Emergency Coordination Centre.
- A newly created logistics team within EMBC.
- New Integrated Response Plan.
- Development and implementation of an integrated and comprehensive training and exercise program to test and validate operational plans and support continuous improvement.
- Development of public education resources for enhanced community resilience with input from local authorities, first nations and the private sector entities. Local authorities will be able to use the materials for their own public education programs.
- Participation in development and implementation of the Alert Ready national public alerting system that will allow authorized users, such as EMBC, to formulate and post alerts sent to communities in BC.
- The development and implementation of the Provincial Coordination Team (PCT), designed to provide support during significant emergency events. The PCT is a team of cross-government, multifunctional provincial asset of experienced emergency managers and technical specialists with varied skills designed to be available on short notice to provide enhanced provincial coordination support.


While the province remains committed to working with local authorities and providing support, including the eligible reimbursements to regional districts for emergency event costs, it cannot be solely responsible for emergency preparedness service delivery. The Province will continue working with all partners as we move forward in emergency management.

British Columbia Earthquake Preparedness Consultation Report

At the July 9th regular meeting of the board of directors of the Central Coast Regional District the following resolution was passed: 'That administration write a letter similar to the June 25, 2015 letter from the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako with regards to disaster preparedness to state that any increase in funding needs to be directed to Emergency Management BC and not to regional districts as regional districts do not have the resources or expertise to fully deliver emergency services.'

The release of the British Columbia Earthquake Preparedness Consultation Report in December, 2014 contained recommendations specific to funding and accountability within local government. Recommendation #2 states that the provincial and federal governments must implement a funding program to support local authority preparedness efforts and leverage emergency management funding to increase emphasis on planning and mitigation and increase local authority accountability.

Expectations of emergency management at the local government level have been on the increase since the provincial transfer of duties ten years ago. For smaller communities and regional districts, local authorities have limited resources and capacities to draw upon to undertake emergency management activities, including planning and mitigation. This is not specific to seismic hazard but to all forms of natural disasters.

In an office such as ours, with a staffing roster of fewer than six individuals, all regular operations must cease during an emergency event as personnel transform into their respective disaster response roles. Similarly, planning and exercising those plans creates interruption to important day to day business. This loss of valuable productivity is not recoverable.

The Central Coast Regional District (CCRD) echoes the concerns cited by the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako in a letter sent to you dated June 25, 2015. Additional funding provided to local government for emergency preparedness may not be the best use of monies considering the reality of limited capacity and resources.



The consensus of the CCRD board is that the provincial and federal governments are downloading responsibilities to local government in order to cut budgets to emergency management at the provincial level. Regional Districts are not in a financial position or a human resource position to take on further responsibility for emergency management and the Central Coast Regional District would like to register an objection that the government is not living up to its mandate.

Should the key actions in support of Recommendation #2 be endorsed and implemented, the CCRD would like to see additional funding redirected to EMBC as the appropriate agency to take the essential and vital lead on emergency preparedness, response and recovery. As an example, such funding could go towards boosting the capacity of the integrated response model (Temporary Emergency Assignment Management System-TEAMS) which is an existing resource pool of trained and experienced staff ready to deploy anywhere in the province. Our regional district could benefit from the support of the TEAMS during a large-scale emergency event.

The Central Coast Regional District submits this correspondence in the spirit of cooperation within its limitations with regards to emergency management. We look forward to your response, specific to an update on Recommendation #2 of the BC Earthquake Preparedness Consultation Report.

Dear Chair Miller and Directors:

As you may be aware, BC Hydro has been studying the installation of capacitor stations in three locations close to the existing 500 kV transmission line between Prince George and Terrace. (Capacitor stations are fenced, outdoor electrical facilities containing equipment that boosts the voltage of a lengthy transmission line, allowing the line to carry more electricity.) Through the planned Prince George to Terrace Capacitors (PGTC) project, we can boost the capacity of this major transmission line by up to 60%, cost-effectively providing more electricity to meet industrial development needs in northwest B.C.

In summer 2013, we solicited feedback from local governments and from property owners living near sites which we had shortlisted as potentially suitable capacitor station locations. The feedback we received from that process and from First Nations consultation, as well as the results of environmental and other studies led to BC Hydro recently purchasing property for two of the three capacitor station sites. As shown on the enclosed maps, one site (Cap 1) is about 8 km south of Vanderhoof, near Saranovich Rd. The second (Cap 2) is about 15 km northwest of Burns Lake, near Palling Road.

In each case, the capacitor station will occupy only a portion of the property we have purchased. The fenced area for Cap 1 will be about 100 x 200 m, plus an access road from Saranovich Road to the facility; for CAP 2, the fenced area will be about 150 x 200 m plus an access road from Palling Road to the facility. Purchasing excess land allows for further expansion of the capacitor stations, should this ever be required.

The third site will be on Crown land about 30 km west of Telkwa; this site has not yet been acquired.


The construction of these capacitor stations is dependent on potential industrial load interconnections proceeding in northwest B.C. Based on current forecasts, BC Hydro plans to start constructing the capacitor stations in late 2016/early 2017.




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

This year, over 7,800 inquiries and complaints were responded to and nearly 1,900 early resolutions and investigative files were completed. Complainants who come to us help us fix problems in the public sector before they become any more complicated. They allow us to fulfil our mandate to oversee administrative fairness in public administration and promote the values of fairness, transparency and accountability. Not only do our resolutions help those who come to us - they help public authorities too. Ministries, Crown corporations, boards and commissions, local governments, health and educational authorities were, because of our involvement, able to find reasonable and equitable solutions that are fair for everyone.

In addition to the individual case summaries found in the Annual Report, our office published a systemic investigation report. In the Public Interest: Protecting Students through Effective Oversight of Private Career Training Institutions contains 31 findings and 36 recommendations directed to the Ministry of Advanced Education. 

Recently the Premier announced a change in cabinet responsibilities that has moved Emergency Management BC (EMBC) to the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) under Minister Todd Stone, with Naomi Yamamoto being named Minister of State for Emergency Preparedness supported by Deputy Minister Becky Denlinger. All EMBC functions including the Office of the Fire Commissioner and Public Safety Lifeline Volunteers have now moved to MoTI, with the exception of BC Coroners Service which will remain with the Ministry of Justice.

This change signifies that Emergency Management BC is getting a higher profile in government and reflects the significant importance being placed on the role of emergency management and public safety.

Although not all the details of our transition have been clearly defined, I am committed to providing you with communication updates as we move through this change. It is important to note that the important mission of EMBC's work has not and will not change. EMBC remains committed to providing support to local authorities and stakeholders in the delivery of emergency management programs and public safety initiatives, aimed at providing for the safety of BC's citizens.

After a year of collaboration, planning, consultation and engagement, and through the efforts of an integrated team, I am pleased to announce the release of the BC Earthquake Immediate Response Plan (IRP) <u>http://www.embc.gov.bc.ca/em/hazard_plans/hazard_plans.html</u>. The IRP is the first component of a comprehensive provincial earthquake plan and sets the conditions for the subsequent planning efforts: sustained response and recovery. The IRP details how the Province will lead and coordinate during the immediate response phase and articulates the roles, responsibilities and integration of the provincial government, its agencies, and partners. It is intended to be utilized by EMBC, provincial ministries and crown corporations, and integrates Federal Government, local authorities and First Nations, critical infrastructure owners, bordering jurisdictions, and

intergovernmental organizations and non-governmental organizations involved in the provincial-level response.

 As part of EMBC's strategic planning and accountability, I am also pleased to present EMBC's annual report for the fiscal year 2014-2015. This report is a synopsis of EMBC's efforts and productivity over the last year, with a particular focus on accomplishments related to our Strategic Plan. I am extremely proud of what EMBC has achieved and am looking forward to another productive year ahead leading and partnering with our stakeholders to enhance emergency management across BC. PHYSIOTHERAPY FACT SHEET

- **Physiotherapy** is a healthcare profession dedicated to working with people to identify and maximize their ability to move and function throughout their lifespan. Specifically, physiotherapists improve clients' quality of life by promoting optimal mobility, physical activity and overall health and wellness. Physiotherapists help to prevent injuries and provide therapy to alleviate pain, strengthen muscles and improve co-ordination. The profession is committed to health and quality of life.
- Shortage of Physiotherapists: There is a shortage of physiotherapists across BC but most significantly in the North. 2014 Indicated 267 vacancies in BC. There are no physiotherapy services in most First Nations communities but this is not included in the number of vacancies. Families living in northern, rural and First Nations communities are disadvantaged by lack of access to these services. The proposed increase in resource development in the north will also exacerbate the need for health professionals.
- **Current Vacancies:** There are currently 14 vacant positions in Central and Northern BC. There are many communities with no positions and no service due to unsuccessful physiotherapy recruitment efforts, resulting in loss of positions. Access to physiotherapists can reduce reliance on hospital emergency departments for management of chronic disease and improve patient outcomes for a lower cost.
- **Pediatrics:** The College of New Caledonia recently cancelled their contracts with Ministry of Children and Families to provide Early Intervention Services for vulnerable children in Nechako Lakes and Burns Lake. This leaves a significant gap in physiotherapy services for children with delayed development, where early intervention makes a critical difference in the future of childrens' ability to function and develop life skills.
- Seniors: A recent report by the Seniors Advocate showed that BC falls far behind other provinces in therapy services available to seniors. This leads to seniors in BC being placed in residential care prematurely due to mobility issues and no chance of good rehabilitation following a fall, injury or age-related mobility losses. The age of the physiotherapy work-force is also greater in the north meaning that imminently there will be more vacant physiotherapy positions and the expertise of these therapists will no longer be available to provide clinical teaching to new students unless this initiative is acted on in a timely manner.
- Training: UBC is the only Physiotherapy School in BC. UBC has the lowest number of seats to population ratio amongst all the provinces and experiences the worst shortages of physiotherapists across Canada. They graduate 80 physiotherapists annually. 20 of these 80 are in the northern and rural cohort, which means that their clinical experience is taught in rural and northern communities through UNBC. UNBC has a physiotherapy lab and clinical co-ordinator on site. They are also hooked up audio-visually across the Region and with UBC. UNBC has current space for a 20 seat physiotherapy program. Research shows that students trained in the north are far more likely to stay in the north.
- Local Government Support: The Mayors and Councils and MLAs that we spoke to at the NCLGA conference in May agreed that there was a need for more physiotherapists and that recruitment and retention is more successful when students come from and are trained in a rural or northern community.
- Request: We ask that you and members of the NCLGA advocate for 20 more physiotherapy academic seats in BC, to be located in the north to address the community need for physiotherapy services. A Northern Physiotherapy Program at UNBC, similar to the Northern Medical Program, would help to serve northern and rural communities. This will bring students in to experience work in rural communities and increase supply for the existing vacancies thereby improving the overall access to physiotherapy for many more rural and northern British Columbians.

Re: Major Air Discharge Permit 06099 Amendment Application

On July 10, 2015, Smithers Council held a Committee of the Whole meeting at which SLR Consulting presented its Technical Assessment Report for NEWPRO's major air discharge permit amendment application.

The Town of Smithers hereby provides the following comment on NEWPRO's application:

Smithers Town Council unanimously supports NEWPRO's proposal to convert its panel board plant to a wood pellet manufacturing facility. The plant will provide local employment and economic benefits. It will also fill an important niche in our local wood products sector, diversifying fibre sources and utilizing waste.

The new pellet plant is being proposed in a severely compromised airshed where particulate air pollution consistently exceeds provincial guidelines. This air quality concern presents a credible health risk for local residents and undermines the quality of life that makes Smithers and the Bulkley Valley such a desirable place to live.

The NEWPRO proposal involves amending an existing permit, which will result in an overall reduction of permitted industrial emissions. We believe that in the future, permits for additional sources of particulate emissions should only be considered if our community consistently meets provincial air quality guidelines.

The Town of Smithers is committed to renewing our efforts to improve air quality by better managing emissions from residential wood stoves in our community, which we understand are significant contributors to poor air quality. We invite the Ministry of Environment to join us as a partner in these efforts.



Additionally, Council requests that the Ministry of Environment complete an updated inventory of particulate matter emission sources in the Bulkley Valley and ensure its monitoring network is sufficient to measure air pollution impacts in the neighbourhoods immediately adjacent to the proposed plant.



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

Members of the Province's new Rural Advisory Council were announced on March 11, 2015 by Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Minister Steve Thomson and Parliamentary Secretary Donna Barnett.

The 14 individuals come from different areas of the province. The mandate of the council is to provide input to government policy decisions to best support thriving rural communities, while keeping in mind government's need to control spending and ensure an overall balanced budget for the Province.





The initial focus for the council will be to provide advice on rural economic development, including rural access to capital and business development support for rural entrepreneurs and businesses. The council will also advise on rural community capacity building, including the Rural Dividend.

Vice-Chair Gerry Thiessen, from the OBAC Board, was selected to be a member. His vision for rural B.C. is to make sure the residents are healthy and educated and stay in their community to make it economically sustainable.

Memorandum of Understanding

Regional Transportation

On June 12, 2015, OBAC's Board of Directors met with ADM Deborah Bowman, Planning and Greg Gilks, Transportation Policy from the Ministry of Transportation. The Board received an update on the activities of the Ministry since May 2014 and discussed next steps in collaborating on transportation opportunities within the OBAC region.

Northern Agriculture Research Initiative

Building Agricultural Resilience in the Bulkley Valley: Soil Health and Management was selected in the 2014 Request for Proposals. Over the last three years of research, Enhancing Northern Agricultural Production through Applied Research

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and Community Engagement, focused on agrifood producer engagement has documented a narrative of increasing social, economic and production risk, combined with decreasing resources and support for the agriculture sector in the Omineca Region. A void in research and extension was created with the closure of the Experimental Farms; there is now a critical need to re-initiate long term, community directed research that is rooted in the context of the region and will provide results that are relevant and applicable to local producers.

During Phase III of the project, a strategic framework outlining the need to incrementally address increasing risk to agrifood producers was developed, largely through a collaborative steering committee, comprised of a diverse group of producers in the Bulkley Valley, the AGRI Regional Agrologist and UNBC researchers.

This year's project will help validate and refine the strategic framework, providing a meaningful example of how this research can be successful and better inform future projects.

The steering committee has identified soil health and management as a general theme; specific methods and project focus will be developed by the steering committee in the first months of the project. Numerous soil associations, complex topography, diverse agricultural land use practices and irrigation challenges are some of the issues unique to the Bulkley Valley that have made soil health and management difficult and expensive for producers. Soil health impacts all agrifood producers within the region. Improving soil management is a critical need in regards to climate change adaptation, making this an ideal entry point into a long-term partnership with the Smithers' Farmers' Institute that will build regional capacity to address the range of identified challenges and establish best practices for the region.

Outcomes of this year's and future projects will help agrifood producers understand how to maintain soil health and positively contribute to viability of their individual operations.


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The project will also focus on extension and outreach, including workshops, field days, active engagement of youth within the community, and year-end project review.



GTI is a collaborative initiative spearheaded by leading community energy experts in Canada. It recognizes that all communities need help to get from plans and ideas to implementation.

GTI focuses on the following objectives:

- Identifying challenges and success factors for CEP implementation in Canada.
- Defining business models for government staff, utilities, the real estate sector and other community stakeholders involved in implementing CEPs.
- Building the capacity to implement CEPs collaboratively and effectively.
- Building a collaborative community of practice and mining the collective intelligence of CEP early adopters in Canada.

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
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UBCM Renews Partnership with First Nations Summit

Jul 29, 2015

On Friday, July 17, 2015, First Nations Summit (FNS) and UBCM came together to renew their Protocol on Cooperation and Communication, a partnership that has produced long-standing, mutually beneficial outcomes for both organizations. Grand Chief Edward John and Howard Grant, Executive Director of First Nations Summit joined Councillor Sav Dhaliwal, UBCM President, and Councillor Murry Krause, Second Vice-President and Chair, UBCM First Nations Relations Committee, in a formal signing of the renewed Protocol.



The Protocol formalizes the "commitment by the First Nations Summit and the UBCM to work together to promote cooperative local government–First Nations relationships." The two organizations carry out this work by information sharing, regular communication, and relationship building through joint initiatives such as the Regional Community to Community Forum program. Additionally, the First Nations Summit Task Group and the UBCM First Nations Relations Committee will meet annually to discuss issues of mutual concern.

In accordance with UBCM policy, renewal of the Protocol was first approved by the First Nations Relations Committee before receiving approval from the full UBCM Executive.

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BC Climate Leadership Plan

Jul 29, 2015

The Province is currently developing a new Climate Leadership Plan to move forward with provincial climate action commitments. The first public consultation, in the form of a discussion paper and accompanying survey, will take place between July 17 and August 17, 2015.

In May 2015, the Province appointed a Climate Leadership Team to review options for economic development and greenhouse gas emissions reductions, as well as to make recommendations for the new Climate Leadership Plan. Representatives from the business, academic, and environmental communities, as well as First Nations and local governments, sit on the Climate Leadership Team.

The public will have two opportunities over the next six months to participate in shaping the new plan. The first phase of public consultation – the discussion paper and survey – is underway and will conclude August 17, 2015. After reviewing discussion paper submissions and the Climate Leadership Team's recommendations, the Province will release a draft Climate Leadership Plan in December 2015 for the second phase of public consultation. The Province will release the final Climate Leadership Plan in March 2016.

WET'SUWET'EN FIRST NATION

First Nations seek balance between environment and economy

By: Karen Ogen is Chief of the Wet'suwet'en First Nation

I am a strong believer that in today's British Columbia — in an economy that has long rested on a foundation of resource development — environmentalism must mean more than just saying no.

I believe environmentalism must mean working hard to establish a higher standard. It needs to be about determining what is important, and never relinquishing those values or principles. It must also mean having hard conversations about the projects we are willing to accept, those we are not and the real reasons why.

Our people signed in December a \$2.8-million agreement with the province to support the Coastal Gas Link LNG pipeline. As part of this, we have also negotiated access to \$30 million in training and education funds.

We signed that agreement for two reasons.

First, and most important, we are confident the project will meet our standards for environmental protection. Wet'suwet'en people have been engaged in the resource economy for a long time through forestry activities. In my people's territory, forestry has had more negative impact than a natural gas pipeline ever will. That is not something I say lightly. It is a conclusion based on a careful analysis of the facts.

To help ensure our land is protected, the agreement includes key provisions such as \$30 million for an Environmental Stewardship Initiative under which Wet'suwet'en people will conduct important environmental work in partnership with the provincial and federal governments.

The second reason we signed that agreement is because it will mean important revenues and opportunities for our people. It will help to ensure we can stand on our own two feet. For the first time in my memory, our community will have more good-paying jobs than it has people.

Despite our careful approach, we have been attacked by critics within our community and beyond. Public supporters have been hard to find, even though there are many First Nations signing economic agreements with government and industry throughout the province.

I have long believed it is short sighted to turn down projects such as this before understanding the true risks and benefits, that is just an easy way to avoid dealing with complex issues. I also know it is a certain path toward a life of continued poverty.

There is no doubt sustainability means protecting our environment. But sustainability also means ensuring our people have access to real opportunities and a decent standard of life.

That's not just my approach. It's one that other First Nations are following as they seek to balance the sustainability of their people and that of the environment.

Take for example the Squamish Nation, which is now considering whether to offer its support for an LNG export facility being proposed for their territory by Woodfibre LNG.

Squamish is breaking important new ground, as it has subjected Woodfibre's proposal to its independent environmental assessment. As part of that process, Squamish recently assembled a list of conditions it will need the project to fulfil before it will allow the project to happen.

By subjecting Woodfibre LNG to its review, the Squamish Nation is now holding the project to a higher standard on environmental protection than we might otherwise have seen from the provincial or federal governments.

I know this is a complex issue, and one that stirs many emotions. I also know the conversation looks much different when people have all the facts.

For that reason, I am working to form a First Nations LNG Alliance that will not only advocate for First Nation interests, but also help people understand how like-minded First Nations can collaborate to raise the bar on environmental protection.

My nation has also produced a video that looks at all aspects of LNG production, from extraction all the way to export. That video can be seen at (<u>http://wetsuwetenfirstnation.ca/2015/07/05/nis-tsedilh-moving-forward-film/</u>). The most important message it delivers is that we must put our trust and our faith into First Nations to manage the effects of these projects in their respective territories.

Because the bottom line is this: Whether it be fracking, pipeline or terminal issues, First Nations are overcoming a systemic exclusion from these opportunities and are rising to the challenge of what it takes to conduct a proper assessment.

We are balancing environmental protection with economic opportunity.

We are finding a way.

We are moving forward.






