Regarding: Allocation of Costs to Rural Fire Services

Background

Historically, the administrative costs for rural fire protection was has not been charged to the rural fire services. RDBN staff time was minimal and consisted mostly of managing the financial aspects of the relationships with fire departments as well as facilitating any boundary expansions or new service areas.

In 2007 a Rural Fire Service Review was done of the four rural fire department, outlining the need for changes to the rural fire services. In 2011, the Protective Services Department (then Emergency Preparedness Staff) took responsibility for working with the Rural and Municipal Fire Departments as follows:

- establishing and maintaining effective Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Standard Operating Guidelines, Occupation Health and Safety Program and Respiratory Protection Program for all four rural services;
- developing and negotiating agreements with contribution and RDBN departments;
- renegotiating contracts with Municipal departments;
- developing and implementing the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Training and Evaluation Program for RDBN Departments;
- assisting with fire service referenda; and
- > working with all department to address any issues as they arise.

From 2011 to 2014 the RDBN allocated staff and fire department administration related expenditures to Rural Government, and in 2015 the RDBN allocated these expenditures to the Emergency Preparedness Service. These services are paid for by all rural tax payers.

In May 2015, the Province issued the "British Columbia Fire Service Minimum Training Standards Structure Firefighters Competency and Training Playbook" which, states that "...the authority having jurisdiction must ensure that its fire service meets the appropriate competency requirements as identified in the Competency ladder, as well as for the functions and roles not expressly covered by this Playbook. Ensuring compliance with minimum standard established in this Playbook is the responsibility of the authority having jurisdiction."

When the RDBN hired the Regulation Compliance Officer 30% of the salary was charged to the Emergency Preparedness Service to provide for the training and evaluation requirements outlined in the "British Columbia Fire Service Minimum Training Standards Structure Firefighters Competency and Training Playbook" to ensure the Rural Fire Department's compliance with the new training standards.

The Issue

The costs of Rural Government are borne by all rural taxpayers in the Regional District, including those that are not able to receive fire protection services. Initially, when the costs were relatively small, the impact on rural taxpayers was not that material. However, as these costs have increased significantly, Finance Staff and Protective Services Staff are

recommending that the costs be apportioned to the rural fire protection services in proportion to estimated time spent on those services.

Fire Protection Service Taxation Capacity

Attached is the Rural Fire Protection Services Taxation Capacity outlining the estimated allocated costs for each rural and municipal department and the taxation capacity for each department which is summarized below:

- > seven rural fire protection services operated by municipal fire departments have sufficient room under the existing tax limits to absorb the additional costs;
- Vanderhoof rural fire protection services can absorb the additional costs, but this will bring them close to their tax limits. The tax limits could be increased by 25% without referendum or alternative approval process; and
- Southside, Cluculz Lake, Topley and Burns Lake fire protection services will require tax limit increases to accommodate the additional costs.

Even though not all of the rural fire protection services can accommodate the proposed changes without the approval of the electors, staff feel that the RDBN should do what it can to allocate the costs appropriately and phase the rest in over time.

Recommendations

- 1. Increase the tax limits by 25% for the following rural fire protection services:
 - Southside;
 - Burns Lake; and
 - > Vanderhoof.
- 2. Apportion the Protective Services costs as outlined in the 'Rural Fire Protection Services Taxation Capacity' document under the column 'Municipal' equally to the eight municipally operated rural fire protection service areas as outlined in the.
- 3. Apportion the Protective Services costs as outlined in the 'Rural Fire Protection Services Taxation Capacity' document under the column 'All Rural' to each of the four rural fire protection services to the extent made possible by the new tax limits.
- 4. Apportion the Protective Services costs as outlined in the 'Rural Fire Protection Services Taxation Capacity' document under the column '3 Rural' to each of the three rural fire protection services receiving training and evaluation from the Regional District.
- 5. The excess Protective Services costs will continue to be allocated to the Emergency Preparedness Service, and phased in to the rural fire services as tax limits permit.

If the Rural Directors Committee agrees, the appropriate bylaws to accommodate the proposed tax limit increases would be brought before the Board at its meeting on March 25, 2016 and the above recommendations would be reflected in the RDBN local service budgets for these services.

Not all RDs responded and RDs that did respond provided various levels of information. The information received is as follows:

Regional Districts:

Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District

• Support non-profit societies/groups that complete park maintenance through "yearly" grant-in-aid.

Fraser Valley Regional District

Do NOT have a service in place.

Comox Valley Regional District

- Have a number of non-profit societies completing park maintenance;
- Some groups share the parks space such as the hatchery on Oyster River;
- Some non-profits work with mental health agencies;
- ALL are paid for their service under a variety of contracts.

Regional District of Kootenay Boundary

 Support non-profit societies/groups that complete park maintenance through "yearly" grant in aid.

Regional District of Mount Waddington

- Have four (4) recreation services that are run by non-profits on behalf of the RD;

SUBJECT: Recreational Sites/Areas in the RDBN

In 2009, the RDBN completed a recreation inventory which includes the location and maintenance status of recreation sites which were previously maintained by the Ministry of Forests together with other recreation sites in the region. Also, mapping was created to identify the location of the sites. A copy of the 2009 memo will be attached as a Supplementary Agenda item for your reference. Mapping that identifies the location of sites has been developed and is also available should Rural Directors wish a copy.

Currently, of the 28 BC Regional Districts, 22 of them manage regional parks in some form or another. There is no single widely accepted definition of a "regional park" across the province or country. Each Regional Park and Rec Trails Master Plan document in BC contains a different definition unique to its region. Commonalities include management guidelines, permitted or intended uses, and levels of protection.

Staff contacted all Regional Districts in the Province in 2013 to inquire of Regional Districts if they have a Parks and Recreation service/function in place.

Not all RDs responded and RDs that did respond provided various levels of information. The information received is as follows:

Regional Districts:

Central Kootenay RD

- Operate Glacier Creek Regional Park (1986);
- Designated the Lardeau Valley Community Club as the Glacier Creek Regional Park Commission;
- No fees collected for use:
- The Commission arranges for site maintenance contracts which are approved by the RDCK Board of Directors;
- Estimate \$10,000-\$15,000 for yearly operations;
- · Contractor must supply all equipment;

Central Kootenay RD (cont'd)

- Fines in place regarding offences (\$500);
- Information regarding cost, not received.

Columbia Shuswap RD

- Community Parks Service in place (1976);

- Maximum requisition \$0.30/\$1,000 of land and improvements;
- RD develops, maintains and operates community parks;
- Enforcement is by authorized RD personnel, CSRD bylaw enforcement officers and the RCMP;
- Offence tickets are submitted to offenders by CSRD;
- Parks Plan has been adopted which includes community parks and recreation policies;
- Parks include waterfront parks, recreation parks, trails, conservation parks, special feature parks on CSRD owned or leased land;
- Community Parks and Recreation Advisory Commissions are established in all electoral areas where a Parks Plan has been adopted;
- The Commissions advise the Regional Board re recreation policies;
- Regional District Parks staff oversee upkeep, maintenance, programs and development.

East Kootenay RD

- Operation and enforcement are dealt with by RD employees;
- Elec. Area parks and trail service in place as well;
- Separate electoral area service bylaws are also in place for other parks and trails in each electoral area (2010).

Nanaimo RD

- Regional Parks service in place for the purpose of acquiring, developing and operation of regional parks and regional trails (1989);

- Bylaw maximum is \$400,000 annually.

Peace River RD

- Separate Local Services have been established for recreational programs;
- Participants are Electoral Areas A,B,D,E,F, Town of Gibsons, the Sechelt Indian Government District and the District of Sechelt;
- Maximum taxation is \$0.15/\$1000 of net taxable value of land and improvements as assessed for the Regional Hospital District.

Thompson-Nicola RD

- Parks Service established for acquisition, development, maintenance and operation of regional parks (1979);
- Participants are Elec. Area A,B,E,I,J,L,M,N,O,P, Ashcroft, Cache Creek, Chase, Clinton, Kamloops, Logan Lake, Lytton and Merritt.
- Taxation is net taxable value of land and improvements (amount not identified).

During 2014, staff contacted the Province to inquire about funding provided to local groups/societies for upkeep and maintenance of sites in the region and were advised that in 2014 Lakes Outdoor Recreation Society received \$20,000, \$10,000 from the BV Credit Union; \$12,000 from the Burns Lake Community Forest. This is the only Provincial information that was received.

The Province also has indicated that it has provided hours of service through fire crew availability in removing dangerous trees, occasional brushing and outhouse and kiosk installation in the region. Signage was also improved/replaced in 2013.

Of note, Thompson-Nicola Regional District has adopted a bylaw which consists of two of its Electoral Areas, M and N, wherein a grant-in-aid specified area for recreation costs to "any public authority" is in place.



This application is for a Licence of Occupation for community purposes. The application is made by the Fort St. James' Snowmobile Club, the All Terrain Vehicle Club, and the Caledonia Classic Dog Sled Club. The purpose of the application is to allow the development of staging and parking areas, training areas, new tenured trails, a club house, storage buildings, and workshops associated with the recreational use of the area. The application area is 32.4 ha in size and located approximately 11 kilometres southwest of Fort St. James.



The application area is located at the beginning of the existing tenured Dog Creek Loop and Pam Lake trails which connects to a vast network of regional trails. These trails are managed by the Fort St. James's Snowmobile and All-Terrain Vehicle Club through a

partnership agreement with Recreation Sites and Trails BC (RSTBC).

The application area is zoned Rural Resource (RR1). The proposed uses may not comply with "RDBN Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993". Of particular concern are uses related to motorized recreation. 



MANAGEMENT PLAN

Land usage plan is to build two large parking lots 121 metres x 60 metres. One for the snowmobile and all terrain vehicle club and one for the dog mushers club. These parking lots are this size because most people have trucks and trailers. These trailers can be up to 10 metres long and they need room to unload. Our plan would be to build a 12.2metre x 24.4meter club house with two washrooms, kitchen, meeting room and a common room. We also plan on a 24.4metre x 24.4metre shop and storage area for our equipment. A 400 metre oval, for safety training on how to drive a snowmobile and all terrain vehicles. A 61 metre x 300 metre starting funnel for the dog team mass start and connected to our tenured trails. A well for water system and a septic system. This location is at the beginning of all of our trail system that we are responsible for and maintain for winter and summer recreation. We would provide a safe central staging area for snowmobiles, atv's and dog mushers. The proposed training oval is to train regional people and students, in safe riding skills. We are forming a partnership with the Caledonia Classic Dog Sled (dog mushers) for training and events in the fall and winter. They used to use part of Stuart Lake for the start of the race, but due to weather changes, it has become unsafe. This would put the club in a better position to offer the public more facilities, to make their day more enjoyable during our events.







This application is regarding a Crown Grant to obtain additional land for extensive agriculture purposes. The subject property is located on unsurveyed Crown land, in the vicinity of Kec Creek, Range 5, Coast District, approximately 16 kilometres north of the District of Vanderhoof. The application area is approximately 81.89 ha in size. The application area is not zoned under "Regional District of Bulkley Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993."

The intent of this application is to provide additional arable land to the applicant's existing grazing lease. The applicant proposes to establish fencing, harvest merchantable timber, and clear the land for pasture.





The Crown Grant application area is currently forested and overlays the proposed Vanderhoof Community Forest. The Vanderhoof Community Forest Agreement (CFA) is in its application stage and L&M Lumber and the District of Vanderhoof are working on the area based tenure application with the Vanderhoof Natural Resource District Office.

The Crown Grant application is being processed by the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resources Operations (MFLNRO). They have referred the Crown Grant application to the Vanderhoof Resource District Office and they have indicated that they do not see an impact to the Community Forest application. MFLNRO staff indicates that they will be basing their final decision on the Crown Grant application based on their assessment of the highest and best land use for the land.

The Planning Department contacted L& M Lumber and the District of Vanderhoof regarding the Crown Grant application and they have expressed concern regarding the potential for conflict with their Community Forest application.

The Planning Department recommends that the Province ensure that there is meaningful consultation with L& M Lumber and the District of Vanderhoof regarding the Crown Grant prior to making any decision on the application.



Hi Jennifer,

Thanks for the update regarding these applications.

Regarding the District of Vanderhoof Community Forest, and L&M as managing partner, we are interested in collaborating with all stakeholders that may be impacted by this area based tenure. The District of Vanderhoof has worked very hard over the past two and a half years to now be into the final stage approval of their application for a Community Forest. Much involvement and negotiation has occurred between the Vanderhoof Natural Resource District, major licencees, and other stakeholders to find a suitable area.

Our concerns regarding application 7409817 include the following:

- The final Community Forest Agreement (CFA) area was established prior to application for 7409817;
- The District of Vanderhoof has located a suitable CFA area, free of private land and other tenure encumbrances;
- Extensive consultation has been completed regarding the proposed area for the DOV Community Forest, including First Nations participation, licensee discussions, involvement with other communities, and outreach such as advertizing and community meetings. Though there has been communication with Mr. Johnson, there were no applications submitted by him for consideration of the final CFA boundary. Any matters pertaining to land use and finalization of the CFA boundary are brought forward to the District of Vanderhoof, but final decisions are the discretion and responsibility of FLNRO, not the District of Vanderhoof; and,
- The CFA is area-based and a detailed timber supply analysis has been completed for this area. Economic
 considerations and assumptions, including timber and other resource valuations have been made using the
 existing area, and any change to the existing CFA boundary will need to be compensated for accordingly with a
 suitable replacement supply of timber and like resources.

As consequence of these concerns, the District of Vanderhoof supports the Province in disallowing application 7409818 from happening.


