DELEGATIONS

BC EMERGENCY HEALTH SERVICES – Michael Lee, District Manager – Patient Care Delivery Nechako District RE: BC Ambulance Staffing/Shortages

Chair Thiessen welcomed Michael Lee, District Manager, Patient Care Delivery, Nechako District, BC Emergency Health Services (BCEHS).

Mr. Lee commented that BCEHS, Health Employers Association of BC and Cupe Local 873 recently ratified a three-year agreement that gives the opportunity and provision to increase permanent staffing in many communities within the region. The three-year plan will assist to stabilize staffing levels, improve response times and directly impact patient care. Mr. Lee spoke of a number of issues impacting recruitment and retention of BCEHS Attendants. The opportunity to implement permanent positions will assist in retention. Discussion took place regarding Scheduled on Call (SOC) Stations and compensation and earning potential for attendants. Due to the recent signing of the agreement details are still being finalized to move forward with changes to permanent staffing and SOC stations.

Director Watt-Senner questioned addressing issues in communities that are being left without a kilo car when patients are transferred to larger centres and that kilo car is not returning immediately to its base. Chair Thiessen shared a story regarding an incident that occurred in Vanderhoof that left a patient requiring attention for an hour while they waited for the ambulance to return from Prince George leaving the residents in the community vulnerable. Mr. Lee indicated that the newly signed agreement provides opportunities to work on interfacility transfers.

Mr. Lee provided an outline of a patient transfer and what can potentially occur if additional calls come in to BCEHS. The closest ambulance (kilo car) is dispatched to an incident. He noted that the goal is to return cars back to base communities as quickly as possible. Mr. Lee also mentioned that there are times when patients are handed off to another ambulance prior to reaching their final destination.

Chair Thiessen requested information in regard to the length of time for an average turn around for a patient transfer. Mr. Lee will provide that information to RDBN staff.

Director Watt-Senner brought forward concerns and struggles of local paramedics within Fraser Lake. Mr. Lee spoke of the challenges of making decisions when all ambulances are required for incidents/transfers that take place and leaving a community without an ambulance (kilo car) for a period of time. Director McGuire spoke of the need to address the shortages and provide incentives to encourage recruitment and retention of attendants.

Discussion took place in regard to the dedicated transfer team located in Burns Lake. That team is the only one within the region that does dedicated scheduled transfers daily from the Lakes District Hospital and Health Centre. Mr. Lee noted that incidents can take place after that car has left Burns Lake which will require another kilo car to complete additional transfers. Chair Thiessen requested data in regard to the transfer team in Burns Lake. Mr. Lee will provide information to RDBN staff.

Staffing shortages and shared community coverage was discussed. Mr. Lee indicated that there are times when resources are utilized from low volume areas to high volume call centres but BCEHS attempts to avoid those situations. Mr. Lee commented that he is aware of examples where communities are left without ambulances due to regular business and there will be opportunities to make changes as they move forward with the new collective agreement.

Director Parker expressed his appreciation for the BCEHS Attendants and crews and spoke of the excellent service they provide. The Board encouraged Mr. Lee to provide updates to the Board as they move through their new collective agreement.

Chair Thiessen thanked Mr. Lee for attending the meeting.

DELEGATIONS (CONT'D)

CYCLE 16 TRAIL SOCIETY – Tony Harris – RE: Update

Chair Thiessen welcomed Tony Harris, Cycle 16 Trail Society. Mr. Harris introduced Dan Boissevan and Jeremy Schriber, Cycle 16 Trail Society.

Mr. Harris commented that the Cycle 16 Trail Society is working to build a 17 km bike path from Telkwa to Smithers. He recognized the RDBN for its current Parks and Recreation Study and spoke of following the guidelines of the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure's Highway 16 Transportation Action Plan. The plan is to construct the path in three phases and the Society is currently working on Phase 1 - Smithers to Laidlaw Road. The Society is addressing the 9 metre highway right of way required by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) for the path. Due to the required setbacks negotiations are underway with private property owners to acquire land needed for the path. Conceptual designs are complete and next steps are to satisfy the requirements for potential Bike BC funding.

Mr. Harris and Mr. Boissevan spoke of the following:

- the Society's past presentation to the RDBN
- Ownership and responsibility of the proposed bike path from Telkwa to Smithers
- The Society's recent completion of its own study to identify expected costs for the life of the project and trail maintenance costs
- Contacting other Regional Districts that have similar bike paths and the various partnerships/agreements that have enabled them to build bike paths
- A copy of the study has been provided to the RDBN Director of Planning and Director Fisher, Electoral Area "A" (Smithers Rural).

Discussion took place in regard to the proposed conceptual route design for Phase 1 and the challenges of purchasing land for bike path access.

Director Fisher brought forward the potential for creating a service area. He questioned the funds raised thus far. Mr. Harris noted that the Society currently has 800 members and has raised \$300,000 to date. He mentioned that there is interest from the local business community and that there is potential to apply for Bike BC grant funding. Director Fisher also identified that the RDBN is currently working through a Parks and Recreation Study and asked if the Society was in the position to wait for the completion of that study. Mr. Harris indicated that they are working through the process of land ownership and have some time.

Alternate Director Wray mentioned that the Town of Smithers met with MoTI at the 2019 UBCM Convention and the Ministry is supportive of the project and indicated a willingness to work with Cycle 16 Trail Society on the Bike Path Project. Discussion took place regarding the setbacks from Highway 16 required by the MoTI. Mr. Harris noted that MoTI has been helpful and provided funding, advise and planning staff to assist in moving the project forward.

Mr. Schriber mentioned that in other locations local government owns the bike paths and they operate under agreement with other partners/societies. He noted there are other models that have been tried and are successful.

Chair Thiessen thanked Messrs. Harris, Boissevan and Schriber for attending the meeting

Chair Thiessen welcomed Randall Sweet, Senior External Relations Advisor, Chevron Canada.

Mr. Sweet provided a PowerPoint Presentation **Kitimat LNG Project Update**

Discussion took place in regard to information specific to the Nechako Reservoir and Rio Tinto and the research being completed by the University of Northern B.C. (UNBC). Chair Thiessen welcomed Peter Dalton, Director, Security & Emergency Management, Garth Thoroughgood, Executive Director Major Projects and James O'Hanley, Vice President Applications, BC Oil and Gas Commission (OCG).

Mr. Dalton provided a brief overview of OGC's oversite of emergency management for oil and gas activities. He voiced appreciation for the opportunity to connect and establish good working relationships with local government where oil and gas activities are taking place. The OGC sees local governments as needing to be informed members of the emergency response team.

- Any provincially regulated or permitted oil and gas activities require companies to create, establish, maintain, update and communicate changes for an Emergency Plan
 - Must be a valid plan from construction to abandonment
 - Must be reviewed on an annual basis by the OGC Security and Emergency Management Team
 - Ensure permit holders have capacity and competency to enact their Emergency Plans
 - Evaluations are completed through exercises that are required to be held yearly with permit holders
 - Exercises are created and focused on the company's primary risks
 - Must show capability of responding to and the ability to successfully manage the primary risk
 - OGC provides follow-up and feedback
 - Mostly successful but have had to provide feedback for additional training on occasion



DELEGATIONS (CONT'D)

BC OIL AND GAS COMMISSION – Peter Dalton, Director, Security & Emergency Management, Garth Thoroughgood, Executive Director Major Projects and James O'Hanley, Vice President Applications – RE: Emergency Management Requirements and Permitting and Approval Process (Cont'd)

- Encourage engagement with local governments for the occurrence of natural disasters/events
 - > Providing the immediate ability to connect and support a larger coordinated effort on the landscape
- Majority of events during a project construction phase are mostly natural disasters/events
- What happens when you have a large contingent of additional people on the ground during construction phase of a project – each permit holder must have its own Emergency Plan in place to manage their infrastructure
- OGC expectation during a large-scale event companies will want to remove people from the area as soon as possible
- OGC participates and involves permit holders as soon as it becomes aware of a natural event
 - Regularly participate in and provide information in coordination calls with Emergency Management B.C. (EMBC)
- Ensure permit holders are aware and involved in events
- Permit holders in construction phase will have an area specific plan
 - operate under core/corporate plan
 - overarching plan
 - Includes process for organizing a general response
 - Outlines how an event is reported up through an organization and how the threats/risks are communicated down through an organization

The following was discussed:

- > Permit holder capacity regarding abandonment and financial guarantees required of the permit holder
- The Oil and Gas Activities Act outlines that permit holders have an obligation for any costs in regard to emergency events due to an oil or gas activity that they are responsible for
 - Similar to Emergency Support Services (ESS) provided to displaced residents in an event
- In B.C. a company that develops infrastructure for a project is responsible for that infrastructure and continues to be responsible through to decommission and applies in perpetuity.
- > The OGC has the ability to require security for the discharge of obligation under the Oil and Gas Activity Act.
- The OGC has a system in place and is fully able to charge the necessary amount if there is a believed risk.

Director Lambert brought forward issues in regard to the abandonment of Equity Mine near Houston. Mr. O'Hanley commented that there are a small number of incidents being addressed in the Province in regard to insolvent companies and abandoned sites. He spoke of the Orphaned Obligation Fund that is funded by the Oil and Gas industry and the ability to address abandoned sites through that funding. Due to a number of recent insolvencies the OGC has increased that fund and the ability to utilize it.

DELEGATIONS (CONT'D)

BC OIL AND GAS COMMISSION (Cont'd)

Discussion took place in regard to:

- Long-term costs for emergency events
- Permit holders being responsible for their activities on the land base and are subject to the Wildfire Act
- In the case of wildfires, oil and gas right of ways have been used as break points and safety routes by BC Wildfire Service
- Licence/Permit holder is responsible for the Emergency Plan
 - Contractors/sub-contractors and all employees must have the ability to work within that plan
 - The Permit holder is responsible
- Challenges regarding information provided to local government
- Plans and information need to be completed and provided at the start of the process
 - Waste disposal
 - Invasive weeds
 - Road usage
- Direct impact to residents and neighbors of the project
 - More information earlier is better.

Mr. O'Hanley mentioned that consultation and notification permits have been provided and a number of concerns are Provincial regulations. He indicated that the OGC is willing to follow-up with Provincial Regulators with concerns and/or questions.

Chair Thiessen noted that residents come forward to local government representatives and with the Coastal GasLink Project being the first major oil and gas project to come through the area, there is a need for local government and area residents to have the ability to contact the appropriate project representatives, whether it be the OGC or Provincial Regulators and receive a timely response to concerns and/or questions. Mr. O'Hanley commented that the OGC has the opportunity to speak internally with the Province and has oversite concerning a large part of the regulatory process. The OGC can take the lead and bring forward questions and concerns. He spoke of finding the best point of contact and method to provide information to local government representatives.

Discussion took place regarding the process in regard to Emergency Response. Mr. Dalton mentioned that the OGC is conducting its third Emergency Management Pilot exercise in Terrace October 22-23, 2019. The exercises are intended to bring all stakeholders together to build capacity and break down barriers. The hope is that further lines of communication will be developed through the pilot project and a solid robust line of communication that addresses the needs of everyone can be developed.

Mr. O'Hanley commented that the OGC is a part of a number of different Provincial Government committees to address the Coastal GasLink Project and LNG. The Committees comprises of a number of agencies that have input into the decision making process. The Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources has set up a coordinating group led by Michelle Carr, Assistant Deputy Minister, LNG Canada Implementation. Mr. O'Hanley mentioned that ADM Carr would be a good source of contact to build relationships and develop levels of contact. Mr. O'Hanley reiterated the need for communication and information processes. Director Parker spoke of the need for the Regional District to have a direct line of contact with the OGC. Developing a simplified process to speak with decision makers was discussed.

Discussion took place in regard to gravel extraction. Mr. O'Hanley outlined the process for the OGC to authorize gravel extraction. He noted that limits do exist and the OGC has a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources under the *Mines Act* to provide approvals within a limited size and scope. If the project exceeds these parameters it is the responsibility of the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources.

Chair Thiessen encouraged Messrs. O'Hanley and Dalton to return to the RDBN to have further discussions as the project moves forward to ensure that the Board has the opportunity to address any issues and or concerns. Mr. Dalton commented that Deborah Jones-Middleton, Director of Protective Services may contact him at any time if there are concerns or questions.

Chair Thiessen thanked Messrs. Dalton, O'Hanley and Thoroughgood for attending the meeting.

 - Concerns of residents living in the direct area of pipeline construction and the added activity in noted wildfire zones with sparse or non-existent cellular coverage intensifying the wildfire risk to local residents.

Chair Thiessen thanked Messrs. Giddens, Deol, Moulton, Jonasson and Frederiksen for attending the meeting.

Director Brienen suggested having Michelle Carr, Assistant Deputy Minister LNG Canada Implementation, Ministry of Mines, Energy and Petroleum Resources attend a future RDBN meeting. He also spoke of having a flow chart that provides contact information for the regulatory authorities and agencies responsible for the CGL Project for local government officials and staff to utilize.

Director Layton spoke of the need to have a conflict resolution process outlined and available to local governments and residents to address concerns brought forward. Chair Thiessen noted that with the oil and gas industry being a relatively new industry in the region regular communication is important. He noted that residents contact their local government officials for support and assistance. The OGC has indicated they will be in contact with the RDBN CAO on a weekly basis and/or as required. Director Fisher spoke of the importance of having written processes and plans in place for accountability. Director Riis-Christianson reiterated the need to have a quick point of contact with the OGC and CGL Project to bring forward concerns and issues from residents and local government officials.

Curtis Helgesen, CAO noted that ADM Carr has reached out to the RDBN to meet with the Board, staff will follow-up to schedule a meeting.

VERBAL UPDATES RE: UBCM

1. Minister Meetings Updates by Lead Speakers

Chair Thiessen thanked the the Lead Speakers for taking responsibility for their topic and showcasing a strong Board stance and for being very engaged in the process. Cheryl Anderson, Manager of Administrative Services mentioned that staff will be providing follow-up letters to the Ministers that the Board met with at UBCM.

Chair Thiessen suggested a follow-up information page that includes a brief from each Minister meeting at UBCM.

Director Lambert spoke of the RDBN resolutions that were passed at UBCM and the need to follow-up with UBCM and Ministers to continue to move the issues forward.

Director Parker noted that the Board was very cohesive and had a good response to its Minister meetings. He mentioned providing follow-up letters to the Opposition Leaders the Board met with at UBCM and suggested meetings with Opposition Leaders at future UBCM's. Director Parker thanked Chair Thiessen for his leadership while at UBCM. Staff will also draft letters to the Opposition Leaders.

Chair Layton welcomed John Pousette, Provincial Bark Beetle Coordinator, Office of the Chief Forester Division and Ken White, Entomologist, Skeena, Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development.

Messrs. White and Pousette provided a PowerPoint Presentation.

Mr. White provided an overview of the provincial funding for forest health allocated to the Omineca and Skeena region of \$2.01M. The funding is apportioned to aerial overviews, monitoring and a minimum amount for research.

Chair Layton brought forward community leader concerns in regard to stumpage and sawmill curtailments. Small-scale salvagers have a willingness to harvest spruce beetle trees but because of current stumpage rates, it is not economical to harvest the timber. In the past trap tree programs were implemented by the government to utilize the fiber and mitigate the impact of the spruce beetle. Mr. Pousette noted that in the Prince George Timber Supply Area licencees have been requested to move their harvesting into spruce beetle areas to mitigate the impacts.

DELEGATION (CONT'D)

Mr. White mentioned that a new person has been hired in the Smithers FLNRORD District office to facilitate small scale salvaging for the Skeena region. Discussion took place in regard to personel in Prince George for the Omineca/Prince George region to address small scale salvaging.

Chair Layton brought forward concerns in regard to the impending shortage of timber supply and the importance of addressing the spruce beetle. He noted the Province's duty to manage the forests for the public and on the need for on the ground action for spruce beetle to address the potential impacts. Mr. Pousette commented that the Chief Forester takes into consideration a number of factors and values in the overall health of the forests. There are a number of values to consider in regard to the challenges of the spruce beetle along with challenges in accessing the spruce beetle killed timber in the Omineca region.

Discussion took place in regard to market impacts to harvesting and addressing spruce beetle timber.

Director Atrill questioned the impact of the aspen leaf liner in regard to the overall forest health. Mr. White noted that monitoring is taking place in regard to the aspen leaf liner and other factors impacting the aspen. He mentioned that there are a number of factors that can impact the timber that are difficult to foresee. Mr. White referenced the timeline and impact of the Mountain Pine Beetle. He noted that climate change and a number of factors such as other beetles can't be predicted. Director Thiessen spoke of the impacts of weather to the overall forest health. He brought forward concerns in regard to the monies that are being removed from the region from forestry and the investment in forest health is not enough. The importance of adequate funding for forest health was discussed.

Discussion took place in regard to:

- significant small scale salvaging of fir beetle in the Prince George Timber Supply Area
- harvesting on the landbase in Sweden intensive forestry
- B.C. extensive forestry
- Cruise based and scale based salvaging
- Spruce beetle stands are more diverse stands vs. the pine stands of the Mountain Pine Beetle
- Trap tree program
 - Approvals for the program are very lengthy and not timely
 - Requires further resources
- Further funding resources is required for forest health
- Forest health funding is apportioned from the Landbased Investment Strategy funding.

Chair Layton thanked Messrs. Pousette and White for attending the meeting.

Curtis Helgesen, CAO spoke with the consultant of the Lakes Landscape – Level Planning Pilot Project in regard to scheduling a meeting for September 30, 2019 from 3:30-4:30 pm. The Consultants will be meeting with stakeholders throughout the week. Discussion took place in regard to requesting a meeting later in the week of September 30 to October 4, 2019 and extending an invitation to the Lakes Timber Supply Community Advisory Committee. An alternative meeting date was suggested for Thursday, October 3, 2019.

Discussion took place regarding:

- The only meeting Chair Layton received reporting afterward was the Smithers meeting
- The importance of engagement sessions that are consistent and provide reporting out.

Chair Layton spoke of bringing forward the issue to the Honourable Doug Donaldson, Minister of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development at the 2019 UBCM Convention. Director McGuire noted the importance of speaking with Eamon O'Donoghue, Assistant Deputy Minister, Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development.

Director Brienen spoke of regionally working to ensure that timber remains in a community for processing. He spoke of the impacts to the District of Houston and its community members when the mill closed in Houston in 2016. Director Brienen mentioned the forest downturns that have taken place in the past and impacts of mill closures. He spoke of the importance of working together during the challenges but to continue to work as forestry recovers to ensure that the challenges do not reoccur and long-term plans are in place to mitigate issues. Director Brienen noted the importance of continuing to work as communities and with government during favourable times to ensure the long-term economic viability of forest communities and the need to learn from the past.

Director Brienen spoke of the need for reforestation education. Chair Layton suggested having FLNRORD staff to speak at a future Forestry Committee meeting in regard to reforestation. He also included the need to understand volume and area based harvesting and returns on silviculture.



Proposed Rezoning:

To amend "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 700, 1993" by rezoning the subject property from the Agricultural industry (M3) Zone to a new zone that allows the sale of recreation vehicles and their parts and accessories. The applicant says that their intent is to not repair the recreational vehicles on the property.

REFERRAL COMMENTS

Town of Smithers

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on the Zoning Amendment Application (A-03-19) for the property legally described as 'Lot D Section 2 Township 1A Range 5 Coast District Plan 4593 Except Plan PRP13276'. Please see below for a response to the Applicant's zoning amendment proposal to a new zone that would allow the sale of recreation vehicles and their parts and accessories (excluding repair work).

In keeping with the Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan, the Town of Smithers is supportive of continuing to focus commercial activity within the Town of Smithers boundary and maintaining the rural character of the Regional District's fringe area around the Town of Smithers. This contributes to the creation of a compact commercial district and industrial areas that are both separate and distinct from the Regional District, while also reducing some potential land use conflicts between rural residential and agricultural uses and commercial developments.

The Town of Smithers Service Commercial Zone (C-3), Light Industrial Zone (M-1), and Medium Industrial Zone (M-2) all allow the sale of recreation vehicles and their parts and accessories. As there is currently capacity to accommodate future development on land within these zones, the Town of Smithers does not support this zoning amendment application.

Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure

Currently, as the application is submitted the Ministry would request the following information before signing the Bylaw:

• There is no new zoning being applied as part of this application, which leaves a gap for the Ministry, as we are unsure what other developments could occur outside of the



intended sale of recreational vehicles and if this would have any impact to the Highway infrastructure;

- Submission of site plan depicting how the intended use would fit within the bounds of the parcel boundaries;
- No new accesses would be approved, particularly onto Highway 16;
- The Ministry would not allow any vehicles or structures to be placed within the Highway right of way;
- Signage should be kept within the property boundaries;
- The client is encouraged to contact the Ministry directly to discuss the access considerations and if any upgrades would be required.

Advisory Planning Commission

Resolution: Unanimously supports the application.

Comments: APC sees this as a minor change to current land use and agrees that this location is ideal for the business proposed.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

Commercial Development in the Rural Area

The Planning Department does not support the spread of commercial or light industrial businesses along the highway in rural residential areas. This type of strip development is attractive for some business as the land has good exposure, can be inexpensive compared to other lands in commercial areas, and is less expensive to develop because of reduced development standards and regulations in the rural area. However, accommodating this type of strip commercial / industrial development along the highways has long term negative impacts. It erodes the viability and vitality of commercial and industrial areas in municipalities, and creates the potential for notable aesthetic, functional, and land use conflict related impacts.

The limited regulation in the rural area is possible because rural densities are kept low and commercial and service-related light industrial development is focused in municipalities where the necessary regulation and development standards are in place. Accommodating this type of commercial development in the rural area will result in the need for increased RDBN regulation to control site design and development standards and can have a negative impact on the function and viability of commercial areas within municipalities.


The "Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1704, 2014" directs that a commercial designation, and rezoning application to allow commercial land uses, may only be considered where the primary target market for these services to be provided or sold is the local rural area. The proposed use does not meet the intent of the Smithers Telkwa Rural OCP's intent in staff's opinion.



Site Specific Considerations

As noted, Official Community Plan policy does not support the proposed land use; however, the situation is complicated by the fact that the property is currently zoned M3, and the area is currently zoned for a mix of industrial and commercial uses. There is an argument to be made that the impact of allowing the change of use from the growth and sale of nursery products and garden supplies, to the sale of recreational vehicles and their parts and accessories is not notable. However, the M3 zone has limited opportunity for commercial development, and allowing the sale of recreational vehicles would clearly increase the commercial use of the lands.

The Planning Department supports the recommendation of the Town of Smithers that the proposed commercial activity be focused within the Town of Smithers, and that the character of the Regional District's rural fringe area not be further commercialized.



69 PROPOSAL

The applicants have been living in a wall tent on the property since May 2019. They indicate that they've purchased the travel trailer and hope to occupy it on the property by November 2019. In August 2019 the applicants applied to rezone the subject property to allow year-round occupation of a travel trailer since it is not permitted under the RDBN Zoning Bylaw.

At the October 24, 2019 Board of Directors Meeting, the Board denied the applicant's proposal to rezone the property to allow year-round occupation of a travel trailer. Therefore, the applicant is now requesting the issuance of a Temporary Use Permit (TUP) to allow year-round occupation in a travel trailer on the property for a 3-year period.

The requested Temporary Use Permit would allow the occupancy of the travel trailer for a year to allow the applicant's to either legalize the travel trailer under the BC Building Code or find other accommodations.



The travel trailer has a Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) used by the automotive industry to identify individual motor vehicles and is built to the Canadian Standards Association (QAI) Z240 RV certification.

TEMPORARY USE PERMITS EXPLAINED

A TUP can allow a use not permitted by zoning to occur for up to three years. During those 3 years a request can be made to have the Board consider renewing the permit for an additional three years. After the renewed permit expires, a new application can be made to allow the use to continue.

The permit should only be issued in accordance with the policy identified in the Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan, which allows for the issuance of a Temporary Use Permit on the following basis:

70

- 6.2 (1) Temporary use permits may be issued for temporary uses, pursuant to Section 493 of the Local Government Act, under the following circumstances.
 - (a) The proposed temporary use will not create an amount of traffic that will adversely affect the natural environment, or rural character of the area;
 - (b) The environment would not be negatively affected by the proposed temporary use.
 - (c) The proposed temporary use will not have adverse effects on neighbouring land uses or property owners.
 - (d) The applicant has provided, for consideration as part of the application process, a decommissioning and reclamation plan, if the temporary use requires a significant amount of capital investment in a particular location, or otherwise results in the need for site reclamation.
 - (e) The need for security in the form of an irrevocable letter of credit with an automatic extension clause has been considered to ensure that required decommissioning and reclamation is completed.
 - (f) The proposed temporary use has the support of the Agricultural Land Commission if the land is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

The Approval Process

Notice of this application was published in the Interior News informing the public of the time and location of the Board's consideration of the application, and their ability to provide input. Property owners and tenants within 50 metres of the subject property were sent a similar notice.

Prior to the Board's consideration of the application the gallery should be asked if anyone wishes to provide comment on the application.

REFERRAL COMMENTS

The below referral comments were provided in relation to the applicant unsuccessful rezoning application.

Northern Health Authority (received October 31, 2019)

SEWAGE:

The Sewerage System Regulation [BC Reg 326/2004], under the Public Health Act [SBC 2008 c.28], does not distinguish between different types of living accommodations, unless they are part of a combined sewerage system. Specifically, the Sewerage System Regulation uses the term, "structure" as a means to apply the legislation to various types of living accommodations, including traditional buildings to recreational vehicles. So long as the owner complies with the Sewerage System Regulation, I would not have objection for use of this travel trailer for year-round occupation. Please note that I have not received any information in regards to this applicant's proposal for management/design of their domestic sewage.

DRINKING WATER:

According to our files and recent inspections, I understand that this parcel has a water line constructed to the property line (or close there to) in which water is supplied by the Sunset Water System for domestic use. Sunset Water System has been subject to a Boil Water Advisory since October 13, 2013. Upgrades to their water treatment regime is required. Currently, I do not have any reason to believe that this parcel will not receive adequate supply and pressure of water, but the owner should be aware that the water safety is not to standard. Further, the owner should ensure backflow of water back into the water supply is prevented, particularly if the travel trailer is equipped with a water storage tank. Also, the owner needs to consider insulating any exposed water lines to prevent freezing and water line breaks during the winter season.

The Sunset Water System is regulated by delegated Environmental Health Officers of Northern Health Authority under the Drinking Water Protection Act [SBC 2001 c.9] and Regulation [BC Reg 200/2003]. I have no objection with the year-round occupation of this travel trailer when connected to the Sunset Water System. If the owner were to choose to use another water supply and that water supply is only connected to this travel trailer, the Drinking Water Protection Act and Regulation would, for the most part, not apply; Northern Health Authority would not regulate the system as a Water Supply System under the aforementioned laws.

Overall, I have no objections with this proposal.

Advisory Planning Commission

Resolution: Unanimously support a TUP or variance to allow the applicants to build the shop and live in the tiny home.

Comments: APC discussion included wondering if TUP can be issued to deal with this now, variance to build the shop now and allow RDBN time to discuss and formulate a permanent solution. Suggest that decision include a covenant that the property cannot be sold with a tiny home as a residence unless/ until RBN determines how to handle tiny homes in the RDBN.

Ministry of Transportation

No Objections.

Comments: Please provide the applicant with the attached residential highways information sheet for driveway standards. Permits are not required for residential driveways on secondary roads.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENTS

The Zoning Bylaw and Travel Trailers

The Zoning Bylaw allows the use of recreational vehicles or camping vehicles, including travel trailers, in the H2, Ag1, RR1, C3, C5 and C5A zones. In all cases the use of recreational vehicles, including travel trailers, is limited to a maximum length of stay of 200 days per year. A primary reason for this restriction is to ensure that recreational vehicles are not improperly used as single-family dwellings contrary to the BC Building Code.

Travel Trailers in the ALR

The property is located within the Agricultural Land Reserve. Under the ALC Act and Regulations, camping vehicles are considered a residence. If it is the only residence on the property it would be allowed as the primary residence. If there is another residence, it would be considered an additional residence and not allowed. Since it isn't considered a manufactured home, it wouldn't fall under the allowance for a manufactured home for a family member. Long Term accommodation of a Camping Vehicle also does not fall under agri-tourism accommodations (even if the property meets the agri-tourism standard) because that is limited to short-term rentals for tourists.

The Building Bylaw and Travel Trailers

Travel trailers, and other RVs are constructed in compliance with Canadian Standard Association (CSA) requirements and are regulated under the *BC Motor Vehicle Act*. A travel trailer does not meet the required standard under the BC Building Code for a dwelling. In staff's opinion, allowing the use of travel trailers for year-round occupation, as proposed, would temporarily allow the avoidance of compliance to the BC Building Code. However, this would inevitably lead to notable enforcement issues.

When a travel trailer is permanently placed on the land or otherwise becomes inoperable as a travel trailer over time it functions as a building and would become subject to the BC Building Code and the RDBN's Building Bylaw. This can be expected to become a significant safety and enforcement issue for the Building Inspectors over time. Enforcement would be challenging given that the only practical enforcement option would be removal of the structure as compliance to the BC Building Code, and Home Protection Office Home Warranty regulations, may not be practical.

Other Considerations

Staff are concerned that allowing the use of travel trailers for year-round occupation would have a negative impact on the appearance of rural communities. It is expected that the use of older travel trailers for year-round occupation may become relatively commonplace. This could impact the character of rural neighbourhoods. In addition, recreation vehicles used for residential



purposes cannot be assessed as a built improvement by BC Assessment. Therefore, the structure cannot be taxed.

The RDBN Planning Department is sympathetic to the intent behind the "tiny home" movement and the associated sustainability and cost benefits. The Planning Department shall be reporting back to the Board with recommendations relating to the BC Building Code and the challenges associated with building a cost-effective tiny home that is BC Building Code compliant. Regulations are in place to protect resident's safety and ensure minimum construction standards.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Permit Term

In staff's opinion travel trailers cannot properly function long term as year-round accommodation in the RDBN. Therefore, staff recommend that the permit only be issued for one year. One year should give the applicants enough time to address their housing situation. If more time is needed, they may make an application to renew the permit in 2020. It is noted that the applicant has requested that the permit be issued for three years.

Sewage

In 2018 the applicants installed a Type 1 sewerage system on the property. BC Sewerage System Regulation requires applicants to complete the construction of a sewerage system within two years of the initial filing. Therefore, the applicants must receive a Letter of Certification by September 4, 2020 to legalize the sewerage system.

The applicants state that they are currently waiting for the travel trailer to arrive to finalize the construction. Therefore, it is recommended that a condition of the issuance of the permit will include that the applicants must file a Letter of Certification to Northern Health Authority prior to occupancy of the travel trailer.

Heating System & Electrical Safety

The standard the electrical, plumbing and gas is certified to is the CSA Z240 RV. The travel trailer will be heated by an electric mini split heat pump. Power connection is through a 50-amp service.

When a travel trailer is connected to Hydro, the Provincial Electrical Safety Officer will conduct a review of the electrical system of the travel trailer. The Officer will ensure that the travel trailer is certified to the CSA (or equivalent) standard for RVs. If the RV is not classed under a suitable standard the Officer will issue the owner a report, which states that it is not built to code, and that it should be modified to a standard which may not be possible after it is built.

RDBN Staff have notified the Area's Electrical Safety Officer of the possibility of the connection of a travel trailer to Hydro and will contact the RDBN upon their inspection.

Vehicle Not a Dwelling

In addition, staff recommend that conditions be added to the permit to ensure that the travel trailer remains mobile and does not become a building subject to the BC Building code. Therefore, conditions are added to the permit outlining that the applicant not attach any buildings or structures to the travel trailer, such as a porch deck or cover, and to not block access to the travel trailer to prevent it from being removed from the property.

Recommendation

That the Regional District Board approve the issuance of Temporary Use Permit A-03-19 for the property located at 4777 Tyhee Lake Road.





PROPOSAL







- 12. The permit holder must not assign, sublicense or transfer this permit or permit any person to use or occupy Crown land, other than its employees, contractors, or representatives, without the Commission's written consent.
- 13. The permit holder must ensure that any Crown land within the operating area is maintained in a condition so as to minimize hazards, including but not limited to hazards associated with storage of materials and equipment.
- 14. The permit holder must ensure that any Crown land within the operating area is free of garbage, debris and unused equipment.

Environmentai:

- 15. Following completion of the construction activities authorized under this authorization the permit holder must, as soon as practicable,
 - (1) decompact any soils compacted by the activity;
 - (2) if natural surface drainage pattern was altered by the carrying out of the activity, the permit holder must restore, to the extent practicable, to the drainage pattern and its condition before the alteration; and
 - (3) ensure re-vegetation of any exposed soil on the operating area including, where necessary, using seed or vegetative propagules of an ecologically suitable species that
 - (a) promote the restoration of the wildlife habitat that existed on the operating area before the oil and gas activity was begun, and

- c. refrain from resuming work in the vicinity of the artifacts, features, materials or things except in accordance with an appropriate mitigation plan that has been prepared in accordance with the Heritage Conservation Act and approved by the Archaeology Branch of the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

- Coastal GasLink will record locations of concerns identified during construction related to weeds, vegetation establishment, general ROW conditions, water crossing stability, and reclamation success. This issues list will be used to measure the success of mitigation used during construction of the proposed Project, and to ensure outstanding issues are investigated, resolved, and reported during Project operations.




Location Map




PROPOSAL

The applicant is requesting the issuance of a Temporary Use Permit (TUP) to allow the land to be used for the storage of equipment, fuel and other materials used in the construction of the Coastal Gaslink Pipeline in 2020 – 2021.

The application area is approximately 2.71 ha. in size. Peak traffic will be 8 to 10 vehicles per day for material handling and storage. Equipment and materials will be delivered from the site to the pipeline right of way as needed for construction. Employees working on site include a security guard and two operators. The applicants are not proposing any limitations on their hours of operation.





Temporary Use Permits Explained

A TUP allows the use to continue for up to three years. During those 3 years a request can be made to have the Board consider renewing the permit for an additional three years. After the renewed permit expires, a new application can be made to allow the use to continue.

The Approval Process

Notice of this application will be published in a local newspaper informing the public of the time and location of the Board's consideration of the application, and their ability to provide input. There are two private properties within 50 metres of the site that require delivery of notice. In addition, the Ministry of Forests Lands Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development, Skeena District office will be notified of the proposal and asked to provide all tenure holders within 50 metres of the subject property with a similar notice.

Prior to the Board's consideration of the application the gallery will be asked if anyone wishes to provide comment on the application.



The TUP must be in accordance with the policy identified in the Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan, which allows for the issuance of a Temporary Use Permit on the following basis:

- 6.2.A (1) Temporary commercial or industrial permits may be issued, pursuant to Section 921 of the Local Government Act, throughout the plan area, where:
 - (a) The proposed temporary use will not create an amount of traffic that will adversely affect the natural environment, or rural character of the area;



(b) The environment would not be negatively affected by the proposed temporary use;

- (c) The proposed temporary use will not have adverse effects on neighbouring land uses or property owners;
- (d) The proposed temporary use does not require a significant amount of capital investment in a particular location; and
- (e) The proposed temporary use has the support of the Agricultural Land Commission if the land is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

Zoning

The property is zoned Rural Resource (RR1) and the proposed use is not permitted in the RR1 Zone. Therefore, the applicant must apply to rezone the property or apply for a Temporary Use Permit (TUP).

Land Use Impacts

The proposed location appears well suited for the proposed storage use, given its relatively remote location, proximity to the Pipeline ROW and existing road infrastructure, and relatively flat topography. However, the closest residents are approximately 1 km to the south of the proposed use area. In addition, a range license overlaps the use area and may be affected due to the construction activity. These land owners and occupants will be notified of the proposal.

The site must be accessed, developed, and reclaimed in accordance with the permit issued by the BC Oil and Gas Commission, which is attached for the Board's information.

INTRODUCTION

The Regional District has received a referral from TELUS c/o Cypress Land Services regarding a proposed wireless communication tower to improve wireless communications services in the rural communities east of the District of Houston.

The proposed tower is 60.0 m tall, is proposed to be located on private land legally described as the Fractional North ½ of the Southeast ¼ of District Lot 3553, Range 5, Coast District, Except Plans 2069 and 4136, located approximately 25 kilometres northeast of the District of Houston.



The application area is zoned Agricultural (Ag1) under the RDBN Zoning Bylaw. Unattended public service or utility buildings and structures having no exterior storage of any kind are permitted in all zones of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw. It is noted that Zoning cannot regulate telecommunications towers, as this is under Federal jurisdiction.



AGRICULTURAL LAND RESERVE

The application area is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). The site area is smaller than 100m²; therefore, the proposal does not need a Non-Farm Use approval from the Agricultural Land Commission prior to construction of the tower. However, the applicant may be required to apply for a notice of intent for the placement of fill. The applicant states that they wish to use existing material on site, however, a geotechnical investigation has not been completed at this time to ensure there is enough material available on site without importing.

INDUSTRY CANADA CONSULTATION REQUIREMENTS

Industry Canada has a public consultation policy that proponents must follow prior to the placement of communication towers. This policy requires that proponents consult with the local land use authority prior to construction. The RDBN relies on Industry Canada's default public consultation process which is outlined below.

The proponent is required to do the following.

- 1. Provide written notification to the public, the land use authority and Industry Canada of the proposed antenna system installation or modification.
- 2. Engage the public and the land-use authority to address relevant questions, comments and concerns regarding the proposal.
- 3. And, provide an opportunity to the public and the land use authority to formally respond in writing to the proponent regarding measures taken to address reasonable and relevant concerns.

The aim of the consultation with the local authority is to do the following

- Discuss site options;
- Ensure that local processes related to antenna systems are respected;
- Address reasonable and relevant concerns from both the land use authority and the community they represent; and,
- Obtain land use authority concurrence in writing.

TELUS CONSULTATION WITH THE PUBLIC

Telus has informed the RDBN that they placed the attached public notice in the Houston Today on, September 25, 2019.

Industry Canada requires notices to be sent to all dwellings and properties that are found within three times the tower height, which is 180 metres for this proposal. There are three residents or other affected parties within the notification area. Telus states that they have received one comment during the consultation period, which is presented in the attached "Appendix 4: Comments and Responses Tracker."

STAFF COMMENTS

Visual Quality

From discussions with the Agent, the proposed 60 metre tower will be visible from Highway 16. However, visual quality does not seem to be a concern.

Public Concerns

The comment received spoke on behalf of other community members concerned with the placement of a gate restricting the use of Rock Pit Road. Residents are concerned that the gate will restrict access to Crown lands beyond that are currently being used for recreation purposes.

The applicant's response to the submission was that the road is privately owned, and therefore the private owner controls the use. RDBN Staff contacted the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) regarding the status of the road and confirmed that the road is actually public and a gate is not permitted.

The applicant corrected the error and contacted the respondent. TELUS has agreed to remove the gate from their plans and has revised the Request for Concurrence Package which is found attached to this report. It appears from the revised package that TELUS has followed Industry Canada's public notification standards.

Recommendation

That the Regional District Board direct staff to send a letter stating that the RDBN has no objection to the proposed communication tower location.

Concerns expressed wee in regard to a gate the was proposed to be located near the entrance of Perow Rock Road. Residents were concerned that the gate would block access to private properties and the road that is used for 4 wheeling, hiking and acquiring firewood. After receiving input from RDBN staff who confirmed with Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure that the road is not private and a gate is not permitted where it is shown on the map, TELUS has revised the preliminary plans to remove the gate. 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Overview

Cypress Land Services Inc., in our capacity as agents to TELUS, is submitting this information package to formalize the consultation process related to the installation and operation of a telecommunications facility. We have been in preliminary consultation with Nechako Regional District and in order to provide improved, dependable wireless services a new facility is required to the Perow area.

Proposed Site

The subject property is located 25km east of Houston near the community of Perow on Perow Rock Pit Road. This site is zoned AG1. The proposed installation consists of a 60.0 metre self-support tower structure with four (4) initial panel antennas, eight (8) future panel antennas, one (1) future 4' microwave dish and a lightning rod with an equipment shelter at the base, accompanying a space of approximately 8 feet by 10 feet, all enclosed by a chain link fence. Access is existing to the property and will be extended to the tower/compound area. Please see **Schedule A: Tower Site Location.**



Rationale for Site Selection

TELUS seeks to maintain and improve high quality, dependable network services. In order to improve network performance, TELUS is seeking to add the proposed communications installation to improve service in the Perow area.

The proposed site is a result of many considerations. Existing structures, including towers, were initially reviewed during the site selection process. After careful examination, it has been determined there are no viable existing structures in the area that would be suitable for the operations of TELUS' network equipment. Following ISED's requirements, TELUS would like to initiate Default Public Consultation Process (as described in the Industry Canada circular, CPC-2-0-03, issue 5, commonly referred to as the "CPC"). Information on the "CPC" consultation process may be found on-line at: http://www.ic.gc.ca/eic/site/smt-gst.nsf/eng/sf08777.html.

In order to obtain comments, concerns or questions in regard to the proposed tower site, the CPC requires TELUS to send out notification packages to all properties located within three times the height of the proposed tower (180 metres). A notice will also be placed in the local paper. This comment period is a minimum of 30 days. We expect the public consultation process to commence in September.

At the conclusion of the consultation process, TELUS will prepare a summary of comments received from the community as well as the replies provided by TELUS.

TELUS is requesting that, subsequent to the completed consultation process a letter or resolution of concurrence will be issued by the RDBN.





What is TELUS Proposing?

TELUS seeks to continue to provide high quality wireless telecommunications services to communities throughout British Columbia. Increasingly, communities depend on wireless voice, data and internet communications for business, personal enjoyment and personal security reasons. The Perow area, and Highway 16, are currently underserviced. The new tower would improve highway safety by introducing coverage along Highway 16, thereby improving highway travel safety by enabling e911 calls.


PRELIMINARY DESIGN PLANS - KEY PLAN







INTRODUCTION

The Regional District has received a referral from TELUS c/o Cypress Land Services regarding a proposed wireless communication tower to improve wireless communications services in the rural communities surrounding Quick.

The proposed tower is 30.0 m tall, is proposed to be located on private land at 17623 Quick East Road, approximately 13 kilometres southeast of the Village of Telkwa.



The application area is zoned Agricultural (Ag1) under the RDBN Zoning Bylaw. Unattended public service or utility buildings and structures having no exterior storage of any kind are permitted in all zones of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw. It is noted that Zoning cannot regulate telecommunications towers, as this is under Federal jurisdiction.

AGRICULTURAL LAND RESERVE

The application area is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). The site area is smaller than 100m²; therefore, the proposal does not need a Non-Farm Use approval from the Agricultural Land Commission prior to construction of the tower. However, the applicant may be required to apply for a notice of intent for the placement of fill. The applicant states that they wish to build a road from the landlord's driveway which will require bringing in gravel for the proposed road. The applicant is requesting concurrence for the proposal to build the telecommunication facility subject to ALC issuance of the Notice of Intent.

INDUSTRY CANADA CONSULTATION REQUIREMENTS

Industry Canada has a public consultation policy that proponents must follow prior to the placement of communication towers. This policy requires that proponents consult with the local land use authority prior to construction. The RDBN relies on Industry Canada's default public consultation process which is outlined below.

The proponent is required to do the following.

- 1. Provide written notification to the public, the land use authority and Industry Canada of the proposed antenna system installation or modification.

Overview

Cypress Land Services Inc., in our capacity as agents to TELUS, is submitting this information package to formalize the consultation process related to the installation and operation of a telecommunications facility. We have been in preliminary consultation with Bulkley-Nechanko Regional District and in order to provide improved, dependable wireless services a new facility is required to the "Quick" area.

Proposed Site

The subject property is located at **17623 Quick Road East/Yellowhead Hwy, Telkwa, BC**. This site is zoned AG1. The proposed installation consists of a 30.0 metres triangular light duty self-support tower structure with three (3) panel antennas and a lightning rod with tower mounted equipment cabinets at the base. Access is existing to the property and will be extended to the tower/compound area. Please see **Schedule A: Tower Site Location**.



Rationale for Site Selection

TELUS seeks to maintain and improve high quality, dependable network services. In order to improve network performance, TELUS is seeking to add the proposed communications installation to improve service in the Telkwa area.

The proposed site is a result of many considerations. Existing structures, including towers, were initially reviewed during the site selection process. After careful examination, it has been determined there are no viable existing structures in the area that would be suitable for the operations of TELUS' network equipment. The proposed location is considered to be appropriate given the tower will be located on a large property, well setback from the highway. The tower will not be able to host antennas from other users do to the limited structural capacity of the tower.

Tower Proposal Details

TELUS is proposing to install a 30 metre self-support tower, located on privately owned land in order to improve and extend wireless and telecommunication services including rural internet services. TELUS has completed preliminary design plans (Schedule B: Preliminary Plans). These preliminary design plans are subject to final engineered design, land survey and approval of Transport Canada. Transport Canada approval may require tower lighting and/or marking.

Consultation Process with the Cariboo Regional District

It is our understanding that RDBN does not have an adopted Telecommunications policy. Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED), formerly Industry Canada, requires all proponents to consult with the local land use authority and public, notwithstanding that ISED has exclusive jurisdiction in the licensing of telecommunication sites, such as the proposed tower. Following ISED's requirements, TELUS would like to initiate Default Public Consultation Process (as described in the Industry Canada circular, CPC-2-0-03, issue 5, commonly referred to as the "CPC"). Information on the "CPC" consultation process may be found on-line at: <u>http://www.ic.gc.ca/eic/site/smt-gst.nsf/eng/sf08777.html</u>.

In order to obtain comments, concerns or questions in regard to the proposed tower site, the CPC requires TELUS to send out notification packages to all properties located within three times the height of the proposed tower (90 metres). A notice will also be placed in the local paper. This comment period is a minimum of 30 days. We expect the public consultation process to commence in September.

At the conclusion of the consultation process, TELUS will prepare a summary of comments received from the community as well as the replies provided by TELUS.

TELUS is requesting that, subsequent to the completed consultation process a letter or resolution of concurrence will be issued by the RDBN.

Health and Safety

Health Canada's Safety Code 6 regulations are applicable to this, and all, telecommunications sites. Safety Code 6 seeks to limit the public's exposure to radiofrequency electromagnetic fields and ensures public safety. Additional information on health and safety may be found on-line at:





What is TELUS Proposing?

TELUS seeks to continue to provide high quality wireless telecommunications services to communities throughout British Columbia. Increasingly, communities depend on wireless voice, data and internet communications for business, personal enjoyment and personal security reasons. In order to ensure improved wireless services to the "Quick" area of Telkwa, TELUS is proposing to add a telecommunications facility.

The subject site is located on a large rural lot located along Quick Road East. It is proposed to install a 30.0 metre self-support tower, plus a 3.0 metre lightning rod, with three (3) antenna mounted at the top of the structure and tower mounted equipment cabinets near the base. Regulatory Authority

Any inquiries that are received as a result of this notification will be logged and submitted to the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (RDBN) and ISED as part of our application for concurrence.

Local Municipality

RDBN does not have a telecommunications consultation process to guide the consultation process. As such, ISED's Client Procedures Circular CPC-2-0-03 (CPC) consultation process will be followed. This process requires all **properties within three times the structure height be notified (in this instance those within 90.0 metres)** and an advertisement in the local newspaper. This notification is to provide the opportunity to obtain information regarding the proposal, ask questions and provide comments. The closing period for comments to be received by TELUS is **October 25, 2019**.

Location

The new facility is proposed to be located at the coordinates 54.619019° N, -126.865769° W, set back approximately 195.0 metres south from Quick Road E. To confirm, there are no existing structures in the vicinity of the proposed tower to collocate antennas on.



Safety Code 6

ISED requires all wireless carriers to operate in accordance with Health Canada's safety standards. TELUS attests that the installation described in this notification package will be installed and operated on an ongoing basis so as to comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6, as may be amended from time to time.

Site Access

Access will be obtained via an existing access road that will be extended to the tower compound. Construction is expected to take approximately one to two months.







Up to \$25,000 is available per local government to provide emergency management personnel with cultural safety and humility training in order to more effectively partner with and provide assistance to Indigenous communities during times of emergency. The grant application requires a Board resolution indicating support for the activities proposed and a willingness to provide overall grant management.

Every year, the RDBN assists with the organization of the Northern Emergency Support Services Training Conference. The Education and Youth Engagement Working Group has had substantial success working with SD91 providing experiential learning in Vanderhoof area streams in the Nechako watershed, in partnership with Steamkeepers and the University of Northern British Columbia. The Lakes Monitoring Working Group is working to establish specific monitoring protocols to establish baseline data on nine or more lakes in the watershed and to provide data to researchers.

REGIONAL DISTRICT OF BULKLEY-NECHAKO

BYLAW NO. 1881

A BYLAW TO ESTABLISH THE ELECTORAL AREAS' PARKS AND TRAILS SERVICE

WHEREAS:

- A. Under Section 332 of the *Local Government Act* a Regional District may operate any service the Board considers necessary or desirable for all or part of the Regional District;
- B. The Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako wishes to establish a service for the purpose of the creating, operating and marketing Regional Parks and Regional Trails;
- C. The approval of the Inspector of Municipalities has been obtained under section 342 of the *Local Government Act*; and
- D. Participating area approval in the participating areas has been obtained under Section 347 of the *Local Government Act.*

NOW THEREFORE the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

1) <u>Service</u>

The Electoral Areas' Parks and Trails Service (the "**Service**") is established by this Bylaw for the purpose of creating, operating and marketing Regional Parks and Regional Trails within the Electoral Areas of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako.

2) Boundaries

The boundaries of the Service Area are the boundaries of Electoral Areas "A" (Smithers Rural), "B" (Burns Lake Rural), "C" (Fort St. James Rural), "D" (Fraser Lake Rural), "E" (Francois Lake Rural), "F" (Vanderhoof Rural) and "G" (Houston Rural) in the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako (the "**Service Area**").

3) Participating Areas

The "Participating Areas" are Electoral Areas "A" (Smithers Rural), "B" (Burns Lake Rural), "C" (Fort St. James Rural), "D" (Fraser Lake Rural), "E" (Francois Lake Rural), "F" (Vanderhoof Rural) and "G" (Houston Rural).



4) <u>Cost Recovery</u>

As provided in Section 378 of the *Local Government Act,* the annual cost of providing this service shall be recovered by one or more of the following:

- a. Property value taxes imposed in accordance with Division 3 of Part 11 of the Local Government Act
- b. Fees and charges imposed under Section 397 of the Local Government Act;
- c. Revenues received by way of agreement, enterprise, gift, grant or otherwise;
- d. Revenues raised by other means authorized by the Local Government Act.

5) <u>Tax Base for Property Value Taxes</u>

The tax base for property value taxes shall be for the participating electoral areas in accordance with section 384 (5) (c) of the *Local Government Act* - the net taxable value of improvements in the participating area.

6) Apportionment of Costs

The Apportioning of the costs of providing the service, under section 380 (1) of the *Local Government Act* shall be:

Each Electoral Area will be apportioned the cost (including administration) attributed to the actual costs associated with the capital, operational and administration for each Regional Park or Regional Trail within that Electoral Area.

7) <u>Creation of a Regional Park or Regional Trail</u>

A Regional Park or Regional Trail must be formed by Board Resolution on land owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako or its member municipalities.

8) <u>Citation</u>

This Bylaw may be cited for all purposes as the "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Electoral Areas' Parks and Trails Establishment Bylaw No. 1881, 2019."

Overview:

The Regional District owns 894 shares of the 9980 shares of the Chinook Limited Partnership. The management company, Chinook Comfor Limited, has requested that the shareholder agreement be amended to lower the number of shareholders required to meet quorum. The revised shareholder agreement is attached to this memo.

Recommendation (All/Directors/Majority):

"That the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako agree to amend the Shareholders' Agreement for the Chinook Limited Partnership and request that the Chair and Manager of Corporate Services sign the amendment."

Discussion:

The current quorum requirements for the Chinook shareholder agreement has been difficult to attain since the inception of the partnership. Often meetings were started several hours late or cancelled for lack of quorum. Amending the Quorum for a meeting of shareholders from nine representatives to seven will provide for a more efficient business process.

B. The parties hereto wish to change the quorum required for the transaction of business at a meeting of Shareholders set out in section 3.4 (b) from "all Shareholders in person or by proxy" to "seven (7) Shareholders in person or by proxy".

NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSES that in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants set forth in this Agreement, each of the parties agrees with the others as follows:

ARTICLE 1 DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 In this Agreement, the following words and phrases, unless there is something in the context inconsistent with them, will have the following meanings:
 - (a) "Act" means the *Business Corporations Act* of British Columbia, as amended, or replacement legislation for such act;
 - (b) **"Articles"** means the articles of the Company as may be amended from time to time;
 - (c) **"Associate"** means, as to any party herein, any corporation that directly or indirectly through one or more intermediaries controls, is controlled by or is under common control with such other person and for these purposes the term

"control" means the possession, directly or indirectly, of the power to control the voting rights of fifty-one percent (51%) or more of the issued capital of a corporation or the power to direct or cause the direction of the management and policies of a person, whether through the ownership of voting securities, by contract or otherwise;

- (d) **"Auditors**" means the auditors of the Company from time to time or where the Company does not have auditors, its independent accountant;
- (e) "Bank" means the banker of the Company from time to time;
- (f) "Board" means the board of directors of the Company;
- (g) "Default" has the meaning set out in section 6.1;
- (h) **"Defaulting Shareholder**" has the meaning set out in section 6.1;
- (i) "Limited Partners" means Wet'suwet'en First Nation, Nee Tahi Buhn First Nation, Skin Tyee First Nation, Cheslatta Carrier First Nation, Lake Babine First Nation, Burns Lake Band, Village of Burns Lake, Bulkley Nechako, and means any one of them;
- (i) "Limited Partnership" means the Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership;
- (k) "Limited Partnership Agreement" means the limited partnership agreement dated for reference April 1, 2016, which creates and governs the Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership, and all amendments to such agreement;
- (I) **"Non-defaulting Shareholder**" individually and the **"Non-defaulting Shareholders**" collectively have the meaning set out in subsection 6.1(a);
- (m) **"Prime Rate**" means the floating rate of interest charged by the Bank in accordance with prevailing market conditions on short-term loans and designated as such by the Bank from time to time;
- (n) "Secretary" means the secretary of the Company;
- (o) **"Shareholders**" means Wet'suwet'en Co., Nee Tahi Buhn Co., Skin Tyee Co., Cheslatta Co., Lake Babine Co., Burns Lake Co., Village and Bulkley Nechako, and their permitted assigns and **"Shareholder**" means any one of them; and
- (p) **"Shares**" means at the relevant time the common shares in the capital of the Company issued and outstanding.

ARTICLE 2 INTERPRETATION

2.1 This Agreement will in all respects be governed by and be construed in accordance with the laws of the Province of British Columbia and the parties to this Agreement submit and attorn to the jurisdiction of the courts of the Province of British Columbia.

- 2.2 If a provision contained in this Agreement is invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect in any jurisdiction, the validity, legality and enforceability of such provision is not in any way affected or impaired in any other jurisdiction and the validity, legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions contained in this Agreement will not in any way be affected or impaired.
- 2.3 Wherever the singular is used in this Agreement, it is deemed to include the plural or the body politic or corporate where the context or the parties so require.
- 2.4 The headings of the sections of this Agreement are inserted for convenience only and do not affect the construction of this Agreement.
- 2.5 A reference to this Agreement to a numbered or lettered section, or clause refers to the section, section or clause bearing that number or letter in this Agreement, unless otherwise stated.
- 2.6 All accounting terms not defined in this Agreement have those meanings generally ascribed to them in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, applied consistently.
- 2.7 In the event of any conflict between this Agreement and the Articles, the terms of this Agreement will prevail and the Shareholders will vote their Shares to amend the Articles so that the Articles will conform with this Agreement. Upon execution of this Agreement, the Shareholders will cause the Articles to be amended to reflect the terms of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 3 CONDUCT OF THE AFFAIRS OF THE COMPANY

- 3.1 The Shareholders will vote their Shares so that the Board is comprised of nine directors and so that one nominee of each of the Wet'suwet'en Co., Nee Tahi Buhn Co., Skin Tyee Co., Cheslatta Co., Lake Babine Co., Burns Lake Co., Village Shareholders and two nominees from the Bulkley Nechako shareholders (one to be appointed from Area B and one to be appointed from Area E) are directors of the Company. If a position on the Board is open for any reason, the Shareholder whose nominee formerly occupied such position is entitled to nominate a new director to fill the vacancy.
- 3.2 If a nominee to the Board of one of the Shareholders fails to vote and act as a director to carry out the provisions of this Agreement, the Shareholders will exercise their right as shareholders of the Company and in accordance with the Articles to remove such nominee from the Board and to elect in his or her place an individual nominated by the Shareholder whose nominee was removed.
- 3.3 The conduct of the business of the Company shall be governed in accordance with the Articles, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement.
- 3.4 (a) The quorum required for the transaction of business at a meeting of the Board is six (6) out of nine (9) directors, comprising of at least four (4) of the nominees of each of Wet'suwet'en Co., Nee Tahi Buhn Co., Skin Tyee Co., Cheslatta Co., Lake Babine Co., Burns Lake Co., and two of the nominees of the Village of Burns Lake and Bulkley Nechako, subject to subsection 3.5;

- (b) The quorum required for the transaction of business at a meeting of Shareholders is seven (7) Shareholders in person or by proxy.
- 3.5 If a quorum is not present within one-half hour from the time set for a meeting of the Board, the meeting will be adjourned to the same day in the next week, at the same time and place, and, if at the first adjourned meeting a quorum is not present within one-half hour of the time appointed for the meeting, the meeting will be adjourned once more to the same day in the following week, at the same time and place, and if at the second adjourned meeting a quorum is still not present within one-half hour of the time appointed for the meeting, a majority of directors or their alternates will constitute a quorum;
- 3.6 Notwithstanding section 3.5, the following matters will only be undertaken upon the written consent of a least 4 of the shareholders of each of Wet'suwet'en Co, Nee Tahi Buhn Co., Skin Tyee Co., Cheslatta Co. Lake Babine Co., Burns Lake Co. and at least one of either Bulkley-Nechako or the Village (and the consent of each such shareholder must be signified by the written consent of all of the authorized signatories of the shareholder):
 - (a) the undertaking by the Limited Partnership of any new business or project;
 - (b) incurring by the Company on its own behalf or on behalf of the Limited Partnership of any capital commitment (including the purchase of any fixed asset) in excess of \$1,000,000.00 in respect of any one transaction;
 - (c) entering into any contracts which have as a term (including any renewal or extension terms permitted under the contract), exceeding two years or requires payment by the Company of an amount in excess of Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,500,000.00);
 - (d) acquiring or disposing of any interest in any other corporation or partnership or entering into any joint venture or partnership with any other corporation or person;
 - (e) lending or providing any guarantee in respect of any amount whatsoever including, without limitation, a loan by the Limited Partnership to any person;
 - (f) increasing, reducing or cancelling the authorized or issued share capital of the Company or issuing or granting any option over the unissued share capital of the Company;
 - (g) issuing any shares of any class in the capital of the Company (except for an issue of shares made pursuant to this Agreement); and
 - (h) adopting the annual budgets of the Company.
- 3.7 Notwithstanding section 3.5, the following matters will only be undertaken upon the written consent of all of the shareholders:
 - disposing of any land or improvements of the Company or any other significant asset of the Company or the Company (other than in the normal course of business); and



(b) selling or disposing of the whole or a substantial part of the undertaking and goodwill or the assets of the Company or the Limited Partnership.



- 4.2 Funds required from time to time by the Company will be obtained, to the greatest extent possible, by borrowing from a chartered bank or other institutional lender.
- 4.3 No Shareholder is obliged to enter into any agreement of guarantee with respect to the indebtedness of the Company or to pledge his or her credit on behalf of the Company, except with the unanimous agreement of the Shareholders, and unless it is agreed in writing by all the Shareholders to make further loans to the Company, the sole financial obligation of a Shareholder is as set out in section 4.1. Any guarantees or additional Shareholder's loans will be borne by the Shareholders pro rata in proportion to the shareholdings of Common shares in the Company, and if any of the Shareholders discharges any liabilities of the Company either directly or pursuant to a guarantee given under this section, the Shareholder discharging the liabilities has the right to be reimbursed by the Shareholders not so contributing so that in the end each of the Shareholders will have contributed in proportion to his or her pro rata shareholdings of Common shares.

ARTICLE 5 RESTRICTIONS ON TRANSFER

- 5.1 No Shareholder may sell, transfer or otherwise dispose of, or offer to sell, transfer or otherwise dispose of, any of his or her Shares unless agreed to in writing by all Shareholders, or expressly permitted pursuant to this Agreement.
- 5.2 If any Limited Partner transfers or assigns their interest in the Limited Partnership, (called a "**Transfer of Partnership Interest**"), in a manner permitted pursuant to the Limited Partnership Agreement, then the Limited Partner, shall concurrently transfer and assign its Shares (or if a portion only of its Limited Partnership interest is transferred and assigned, an equivalent portion of its Shares), without payment of any consideration for such Shares, to the assignee of the Limited Partnership interest and the parties hereto consent to such transfer and assignment of Shares.

Re:	Income Statements for the Third Quarter 2019

Overview:

Attached to this memo are the consolidated income statement for the first nine months for the Regional District. These statements are consolidated for all departments and are based on account. That is, the total of the type of revenue or expense for the entire Regional District is shown rather than the amount spent from each department. Department statements are available if the Directors require additional information.

The receipt of the income statement for the first half, third quarter and full year by the Board is a required part of the Regional District's control and audit process.

Recommendation (All/Directors/Majority)

"That the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako receive the Income Statement of the Regional District for the third quarter of 2019."

Discussion:

The third quarter of the year shows that the majority of the income has been received as the Regional District receives its taxation revenue in the latter part of July through to the early part of August. Funds received through grants, fees, debt repayment recovery was reviewed and is meeting expectations. The Northern Capital and Planning Grant has not yet been realized as income in our accounting system as this grant will be "realized" when allocated by the Board as a budget amendment in December – this accounts for the \$5.2 M variance is miscellaneous revenue.

None of the expenses show variances of concern. Financial staff are watching Directors' remuneration and related benefits as there have been a greater number of meetings than originally planned for in the budget, and the Employer Health Tax (EHT) was found to apply to a greater number of directors' different categories of remuneration than originally thought. In addition, staff are monitoring employee benefits as the original budget estimate may have been low in this transition year between Medical Service Premium and Employer Health Tax. Overall employee benefits and Directors' November 21, 2019



EHT contributions are expected to have up to a $\frac{1}{4}$ % pressure on the current overall budget estimates.

Directors' Travel costs are higher than originally budgeted resulting from the increased work associated with elected positions in the North requiring travel.

Equipment maintenance is higher than expected and will be monitored. This is due to a troublesome Bobcat that has now been replaced.

Southside waste hauling is over budget as a result of a large rate increase from the private hauling contractor. Environmental Services department is assessing other hauling options.

Fraser Lake recycling is over budget and this has been recognized by the Directors in a previous meeting. A budget amendment in December will capture this additional cost.

The NESST expense is higher than the estimated budget but this cost is balanced by an equally greater amount of NESST donations received.

Similarly Interest and Bank Charges is offset by higher than average Investment Revenue. Different services borrow money from the Regional District's general reserves until taxation revenues are received in August. During this time, they are allocated an interest expense.

Dear Gerry Thiessen and Board Members:

I would like to thank you and your colleagues for meeting with me at the 2019 Union of British Columbia Municipalities convention to discuss some of the agricultural issues and pressures the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako is experiencing.

During our meeting, we discussed the impacts of both Bills 15 and 52 on the Regional District. Specifically, you voiced your concerns that these regulations are not well suited to the north, well as concerns that restricting secondary dwellings in the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) is prohibitive to farmers. As you know, the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* (ALCA) allows additional residences to be constructed on the ALR if the Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) determines they are necessary for farm use. There is no one-size-fits-all size restriction on additional residence. The ALC uses its expertise in agriculture to decide the size of additional residence permitted, considering the unique circumstances of each application.

The changes were made to meet the B.C. government's commitment to revitalize the ALR and the ALC by reaffirming that the ALR is a provincial zone in which agriculture is recognized as the priority use, farming is encouraged, and non-agricultural uses are managed carefully. The recent amendments restored the ALR to one zone to ensure that all land within the reserve benefits from the same strong protections.

We also discussed the need to make farms sustainable, as well as the need to supplement ranching with forestry to ensure they do not disappear.

Additionally, you requested that the regional panels be continued as they allowed the ALC some flexibility in implementing regulations that took into consideration the Northern B.C. context. You also impressed upon me the importance of regional representation.

Thank you for your letter of June 18, 2019, to Minister Donaldson regarding several resolutions debated at the North Central Local Government Association (NCLGA) Annual General Meeting. I have been asked to respond and apologize for the delay.

R11 Community Resilience Investment (CRI) Program – FireSmart Community Funding

The CRI was initiated in 2018 to provide funding for local governments and communities to reduce the risk and impacts from wildfire through activities based on the FireSmart principles. This application-based program includes annual intakes and, with every intake, a review is undertaken with the intent to improve the program; for example, the upper limit for FireSmart grants was increased from \$100,000 to \$150,000 for higher risk communities after the first intake.

The BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) is aware that some larger communities, in particular regional districts, have expressed concern that the current funding model may not adequately address the unique challenges of rural and geographically dispersed communities. The CRI has been developed to allow for partnerships between communities to provide greater access to existing funding. We encourage all communities to continue to work together and with our ministry staff to coordinate efforts and plans to address wildfire concerns.

I would also like to take this opportunity to confirm that, as part of the next review process, BCWS will continue to evaluate funding mechanisms to allow greater access to the CRI. The current consultation and workshops that are taking place to improve the Community Wildfire Resiliency Planning Process will also inform decisions on the CRI.

Experiencing the impacts of a natural hazards can be extremely challenging. The province recognizes that evacuating an area due to an imminent threat is not an easy decision to make for local authorities and First Nations, but one that is made to protect life safety of the public and first responders. Remaining in place after an Evacuation Order can severely hamper response efforts, divert scarce resources, and could increase the risk to the first responders and the people that stay.

Due to the inherent risk, BCWS does not support the intent for the general public or residents to remain in place for wildfire response purposes after an Evacuation Order has been enacted. However, this should not be confused with a situation where a pre-organized group of adequately trained, resourced and practiced people can provide response services, which would be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

Since the devastating 2017 wildfire season, BCWS has been working with stakeholders to provide additional training to increase local capacity. Additionally, we will be focusing efforts on raising awareness of the risk and danger of wildfires, while increasing information on existing tools, such as FireSmart techniques that can be used to improve the potential of property withstanding the effects of wildfires.

Our staff and technical experts are dedicated to working closely with all local authorities and First Nations to provide the most accurate, timely and relevant information to you during all phases of a crisis. BCWS and Emergency Management BC (EMBC) can assist with appropriate messaging that communicates the risks and implications of choosing not to adhere to an evacuation order.

R14 Permitting Entry into an Evacuation Order Area

Drawing upon the lessons from 2017 and 2018, it was recognized that in certain circumstances, some individuals will need to enter evacuated areas on a temporary basis. EMBC worked with communities, provincial ministries, and stakeholders to revise the *Evacuation Operational Guidelines* and to develop the *Managing Access to Areas Under Evacuation Order Guideline*. First Nations and local authority communities have been provided with a recommended, standardized approach to allowing non-response-related temporary access to evacuated areas. It is not a requirement that local authorities and First Nations follow the recommendations provided; each community will need to implement a process that works best for them. These guidelines are posted on the EMBC website at <u>https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/safety/emergency-preparedness-response-recovery/local-emergency-programs/guidelines</u> under the broader heading "Evacuation Guidelines," and PDF copies were distributed to community Emergency Management contacts.



R18 ORV Management Framework Improvements to Facilitate Tourism

There have been several similar resolutions requesting amendments with respect to Off-Road Vehicles (ORV). As a result, the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) has re-initiated its ORV Local Government Working Group.

In response to this, UBCM initiated an ORV Local Government Working Group call on August 28, 2019, which was attended by a number of local governments. Municipalities that participated included: 100 Mile House, Campbell River, Chase, Chetwynd, Clearwater, Clinton, Elk Valley, Elkford, Fort St. James, Fort St. John, Greenwood, Mackenzie, Merritt, Port Hardy, Quesnel, Salmo, Salmon Arm, Sayward, Sicamous, Tahsis, Tumbler Ridge, Valemount, West Kelowna, and Zeballos. FLNRORD staff responsible for the ORV Management Framework and the *Off-Road Vehicle Act* also participated on the call.

The resolutions, including the "one permit" for multiple police detachments, require inter-ministry work and support from the ministries responsible for the *Motor Vehicle Act* and Regulations, which include the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (re: highway infrastructure and road safety), the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General (re: policing and driver safety), and the Ministry of Attorney General (re: ICBC).

UBCM will be scheduling a follow-up call in October 2019 with FLNRORD staff to confirm local government support and a common proposal.

R20 Fire Centre Funding

BCWS is adapting to the changing wildfire conditions by undertaking deliberate modifications to its organizational structure with the intent to increase opportunities and to gain efficiencies. Part of this organizational review was to adopt a more fluid and agile approach to allow for the early re-allocation and deployment of staff to areas with the highest need, based on the current and projected future conditions. This re-allocation process is in addition to hiring 16 new wildfire technicians to zone offices around the province.

Predicting where the next devastating wildfire season will be focused is not easy; thus, BCWS looks at its structure from a provincial perspective to ensure all areas of the province are addressed.

Again, thank you for writing and sharing the NCLGA's views on these important issues.

Dear Director Petersen and District of Vanderhoof Mayor and Council,

We are writing to you because of a concern we have about NVSS paper recycling. In 2010 we had a group of students from Nechako Valley Secondary School who were interested in making our school a more environmentally responsible place. They bought blue recycling boxes for each of our classrooms and encouraged everyone to recycle paper. Last year some of the recycling programs changed in BC and we are now no longer able to do this.

We think it is really important for young people to learn about ways to protect the environment and learn about ways to become responsible citizens. Recycling was one way we could help take care of our world's resources. Our Lifeskills students were also involved in helping collect paper and flattening cardboard for our school. This gave them a sense of purpose, taught important work skills and gave them an opportunity to be a valuable part of our school community. Many of our teachers also want to recycle in their classrooms but they are not supposed to bring their paper recycling to the Waste Transfer Station as we are now classified as an Institution under the new Recycling BC definition.

We don't understand why our teachers are limited with their efforts to help teach students about being environmentally responsible. We have students who are willing to collect paper recycling and had a system set up so that it was collected each week by community members with special needs in a work program. Our school also collects and recycles beverage cans, cardboard, batteries, cell phones, pens & markers, and ink cartridges. We would like to be able to continue recycling paper.

We are wondering what options we have for our paper and cardboard recycling program to be continued. Some communities have curbside recycling or can access other recycling options but our Waste Transfer station will not accept any ICI paper.

We would appreciate any feedback and would welcome any questions or suggestions. We really hope that we can start our school paper recycling again as it is one way for students to learn about being better global and environmentally responsible citizens, and one way that we can lessen our environmental impact on a daily basis. Thank you for informing us of the importance of high-speed internet to the ranching community.


