He noted the District has now filled its job postings. He recognized Northern Development Initiative Trust for their Internship Program due to a number of employees that the District of Vanderhoof has hired that participated in the program.
COVID-19 Pandemic	Director Riis-Christianson thanked Chair Thiessen for his opening comments regarding the challenges being felt and observed due to the COVID-19 pandemic and current strain on communities. He spoke of the importance of being calm and providing reassurance to residents and providing accurate information for individuals to make informed decisions.

She spoke of the impacts of past COVID-19 restrictions and the ability to provide programing under the present COVID-19 regulations.
	Director Atrill attended a protest that took place in Smithers concerning businesses addressing the Provincial Vaccine Passport requirements. She noted the number of different issues and the angst with members of the protest. Director Atrill mentioned the importance of focusing on the good and positive to continue to move forward.
	Director Newell spoke of the fear that is overwhelming some people and noted that with differing opinions in regard to COVID- 19 Vaccine Passports it has become challenging to be inclusive of one another, but it is so important.

<u>BC Emergency Health Services (BCEHS)</u> Director McGurie indicated that after meeting with BC Emergency Health Services during the UBCM Convention she looks forward to having further follow up with BCEHS when a meeting can be scheduled between BCEHS and Stuart-Nechako Regional Hospital District.

Director Storey thanked Director McGuire for her work in regard to concerns with BCEHS staffing levels in small rural communities.

The Honourable David Eby, Attorney General and Minister responsible for Housing

Director Atrill mentioned that the Town of Smithers UBCM meetings focused on the topics of land acquisition and housing issues. Director Atrill was also the lead speaker for the RDBN regarding communities in the region experiencing an increase in homelessness due to mental health and addiction struggles. She mentioned that while the meeting took place she witnessed an overdose taking place in the homeless camp located near the Town of Smithers municipal office. Nathan Cullen, Minister of State for Lands and Natural Resource Operations and MLA Stikine also participated in the call.

Director Storey commented that the Village of Fraser Lake also met with Minister Eby to discuss housing, respite and senior housing in the community.

The Honourable Katrine Conroy, Minister of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development Director Brienen mentioned that in speaking with Minister Conroy the Modernizing Forest Policy in British Columbia intentions paper was brought forward. He mentioned that as Chair of the RDBN Natural Resources Committee he will bring the Paper forward at the next Committee meeting.

Director Funk mentioned that in discussions with Minister Conroy concerns were raised regarding the potential change from tabular rates to stumpage rates and the impacts to Community Forests. Director Storey also mentioned that the Village of Fraser Lake raised the same concern and spoke of the importance of ensuring that Community Forests continue to benefit communities.

Northwest BC Resource Benefits Alliance (RBA)

Director Brienen noted that the RBA has a meeting scheduled with the Honourable Josie Osborne, Minister of Municipal Affairs on September 28, 2021. He spoke of RBA conversations at UBCM and that the Province referenced strong fiscal futures in the long-term but the impact in the north is now.

Chair Thiessen noted that the District of Vanderhoof UBCM meetings with Premier Horgan provided an opportunity to briefly discuss RBA.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Over the past two years the Planning Department has undertaken a review of the Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan (OCP), as directed by the Regional District Board in June 2019. The new OCP is intended to replace the current Vanderhoof Rural OCP which was adopted in 2009.

The review process has included consultation with First Nations, community groups, government agencies and the public. This consultation also included the establishment of a working group consisting of community members and agency representatives, as well as open

houses in Vanderhoof and Cluculz Lake to solicit public input. OCP review information has been available to the public on the Regional District website for the duration of the review process.

Staff are now presenting the Bylaw to the Board for consideration of first and second reading.

OVERVIEW OF THE OCP REVIEW PROCESS

In June 2019, the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Board of Directors directed staff to proceed with the review process for the Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan and approved a consultation strategy.

Letters with information about the review process and requests for preliminary comments were sent to the agencies listed in the consultation strategy - local First Nations, community groups, the District of Vanderhoof, School District 91, adjacent Regional Districts and various Provincial Ministries.

Preliminary consultation with the Advisory Planning Commission (APC) for Electoral Area F took place in October 2019. An open house was also held that month to introduce the review process to the public and to solicit participation on a working group to assist in the review process and the drafting of a new Plan. At the open house the Regional District introduced a survey to obtain public input regarding the issues that require attention in the plan.

Northern Health, the District of Vanderhoof, the Nechako Valley Regional Cattlemen's Association, the Chamber of Commerce, Community Futures, the Cluculz Lake Community Association, and Saik'uz First Nation were asked to provide a representative to participate on the working group.



Staff created a preliminary draft of the OCP to provide the working group with a format for discussion of issues. Working group meetings were held on November 26, 2019, January 7, 2020, and January 21, 2020. The focus was on reviewing the process and the mandate of the Plan, identifying, and discussing key issues, helping define the community visions and goals for the Plan area, and developing the policies contained in the Plan. The working group meeting notes from the three meetings are attached to this report.

An open house was held in Cluculz Lake on February 26, 2020, in consultation with the Cluculz Lake Community Association. The open house was held to allow the community to comment on issues specific to the community, with a focus on understanding the community's

opinions on commercial development in the area. A Cluculz Lake Commercial Land Use questionnaire was handed out to attendees. Fourteen questionnaires were returned, and the results are attached to this report.

Further in-person public engagement was suspended in the spring of 2020 given the ongoing health protocols associated with the Covid-19 pandemic. Public input was instead solicited by promoting the survey and posting the OCP draft, maps and related information on the Regional District website. A total of 173 surveys were completed and returned. A leaflet showcasing the OCP survey results is attached to this report.



The draft was fine-tuned based on the input received and the revised draft OCP was referred to the working group in May 2021. Staff received written and verbal comments back from several members. The APC reviewed and provided comments on the draft plan in May 2021. Consultation letters with an invitation to provide comments were sent to agencies listed in the consultation strategy. The draft was further revised based on the comments received from the referral agencies, the working group members, and the APC.

Legislated Consultation

Section 475 of the Local Government Act states the following.

- (1) During the development of an official community plan, or the repeal or amendment of an official community plan, the proposing local government must provide one or more opportunities it considers appropriate for consultations with persons, organizations, and authorities it considers will be affected.
- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1), the local government must:
 - (a) consider whether the opportunities for consultation with one or more of the persons, organizations and authorities should be early and ongoing; and
 - (b) specifically consider whether consultation is required with
 - (i) the board of a regional district in which the area covered by the plan is located, in the case of a municipal official community plan;
 - (ii) the board of any regional district that is adjacent to the area covered by the plan;
 - (iii) the council of any municipality that is adjacent to the area covered by the plan;

- (iv) first nations;
- (v) school district boards, greater boards and improvement district boards; and
- (iv) the Provincial and Federal governments and their agencies.
- (3) Consultation under this section is in addition to the public hearing required under section 477 (3)(c).
- (4) If the development of an official community plan, or the repeal or amendment of an official community plan, might affect agricultural land, the proposing local government must consult with the Agricultural Land Commission.

As previously noted, the Board considered and approved the consultation options identified on the attached consultation checklist at the beginning of the OCP review process in June 2019. It is recommended that the Board re-consider the consultation options identified on the checklist and determine if further consultation is necessary. If the Board considers additional consultation necessary, this should occur prior to first and second reading.

The entire Plan area is located within School District 91 (SD91). Section 476 of the *Local Government Act*, requires the Regional District to consult with boards of education with regards to the following:

- (a) the actual and anticipated needs for school facilities and support services in the school districts;
- (b) the size, number and location of the sites anticipated to be required for the school facilities referred to in paragraph (a);
- (c) the type of school anticipated to be required on the sites referred to in paragraph (b);
- (d) when the school facilities and support services referred to in paragraph (a) are anticipated to be required;
- (e) how the existing and proposed school facilities relate to existing or proposed community facilities in the area.

All referral responses as well as the changes made to the OCP, if any, based on the input received have been summarized in a table attached to this report. Responses were received from the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries, Ministry of Energy, Mines and Low Carbon innovation and the Agricultural Land Commission.

OVERVIEW OF THE OCP ADOPTION PROCESS

Should the Board support the recommendations in this report the OCP adoption process would proceed as follows:

- First and second reading of OCP Adoption Bylaw No. 1963, 2021
- Public Hearing for the OCP Bylaw
- Board consideration of third reading
- Adoption of the OCP Bylaw

Following first and second reading of the OCP Bylaw, a Public Hearing on the Bylaw will be scheduled in consultation with the Electoral Area F Director. Following the Public Hearing, the OCP will again be presented to the Board along with the summary of the proceedings of the Public Hearing.

Should the Board wish to amend the Bylaw based upon Public Hearing input, the amended Bylaw could be re-approved at second reading. Depending upon the nature of the amendments a second Public Hearing may be required prior to third reading of the amended Bylaw.

DISCUSSION

The draft Vanderhoof Rural OCP has undergone a notable public consultation process, and in staff's opinion the Plan reflects an appropriately balanced expression of the community's interest and vision for the future of the area. The focus of the process was to update the existing plan and not undertake an extensive review process.

Staff note that the "Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1963, 2021" has been considered by staff in conjunction with the Regional District's financial plan and solid waste management plan, and there are no apparent conflicts or issues between the plans.

The Board may approve the "Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1963, 2021" as attached, amend the Bylaw and then approve the amended Bylaw, or refer the Bylaw back to staff with direction to make further amendments.

Should the Bylaw be acceptable to the Board, staff recommend that "Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1963, 2021" be given first and second readings and that the Bylaw proceed to a Public Hearing. It is also recommended that the Public Hearing for "Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1963, 2021" be delegated to Director Petersen or his alternate.

A Bylaw to Adopt an Official Community Plan for Electoral Area F within the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako

AND WHEREAS the Board of the Regional District has deemed it advisable to replace "Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1517, 2009" and adopt a new Official Community Plan for Electoral Area F as provided for in the *Local Government Act;*

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako in open meeting assembled HEREBY ENACTS AS FOLLOWS.

1. <u>Title</u>

This Bylaw may be cited as "Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1963, 2021".

2. Application

This Bylaw is applicable to Electoral Area "F" as outlined in Map No. 1 of Schedule "A" of this Bylaw.

3. Official Community Plan

Schedules "A," "B" and "C", which are attached to and form an integral part of the Bylaw are the Official Community Plan for the area to which this Bylaw applies.

4. <u>Severability</u>

If any schedule, section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or map of this Bylaw is for any reason held to be invalid by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Bylaw.

5. <u>Repeal</u>

"Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1517, 2009" and all amendments thereto are repealed.

• Jason Llewellyn thanked everyone for attending and asked Karen Tabe from the Ministry of Agriculture, to introduce herself, as she is new to the group.

OCP Survey

• Over 100 survey responses have been received so far. Staff made a graphic poster of the survey results for the working group members to review.

The Draft OCP

- Staff explained that the statistics previously contained in section 1.2 Plan Area Profile, will be removed and instead the section will refer to the document titled "Vanderhoof and Surrounding Area Community Profile", prepared by the Economic Development Department of the RDBN, which is typically updated more frequently than the OCPs.
- Randy and Ginny stated their concerns with accidents that shut down the highway or other roads, where sometimes that are no alternative routes, and staff suggested that this issue be reviewed in the emergency section.
- Ron expressed concern that the second paragraph in section 1.5 is unclear. Staff will have a look at that.
- Graham feels that the words limited and exclusively in section 2.3.1(5) should be removed.
- A goal regarding ALC advocacy and agriculture should be added to the Vanderhoof General Goals in section 2.2.

Living Near Farms

Local agriculture is enjoyed in Area F. 64% of respondents felt it positively impacted their lives, while 25% had no strong feelings. Only 11% felt local agriculture had negative effects on their quality of life.

Should Land with Good Agricultural Capacity Be Reserved for Agricultural Use?

While most support the ALC, some respondents expressed frustration with the control it has over changes to private property. Many believe farmers should be allowed to place a second dwelling on an ALR property, or allow non-farm uses that do not diminish the property's agricultural capability.

Cluculz Lake

What About it?

Cluculz Lake is a rural, unincorporated community around the shores of Cluculz Lake. Residents here have their own set of concerns and key issues. 68 Cluculz Lake residents took the survey, making them the most responsive community with 39% of all responses.

Demographic Differences


The demographics of Cluculz Lake respondents are unique in Area F. In Cluculz Lake, 88% of respondents were over 50, compared to 65% elsewhere in the area. Additionally, many Cluculz Lake respondents noted that they don't actually live in Area F, and instead own a vacation property on the lake.



Local Concerns

As a distinct community, the opinions of Cluculz Lake residents differ from the rest of the area. Residents are uniquely focused on the lake itself. Water quality being affected by agricultural runoff and failing lakefront sewage systems are their main concerns. Also of concern is a feeling that too many nonresidents are using the lake.

Residents here are more likely to be against growth. There is a feeling that the area has been overdeveloped already, demonstrated by local resistance to growth. 56% of all Cluculz Lake residents want zero residential development, as opposed to 20% elsewhere in Area F. This opposition applies to commercial development too, as 53% of residents call for zero commercial development in the area, versus 37% elsewhere in Area F.








Proposed Rezoning

A building was placed on the property without a building permit, and a Stop Work Order was issued by a Building Inspector.

The applicant is proposing to rezone the subject property from Small Holdings (H1) to Small Holdings – Additional Dwelling (H1A) to allow the use of the building as a 2nd dwelling. The Small Holdings -Additional Dwelling (H1A) Zone permits two single family dwelling per parcel if one dwelling is 120 m² or less.



DISCUSSION

Official Community Plan


The subject property is designated Rural Residential (RR) in the Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1704, 2014 which is intended to provide opportunities for people to live in a rural setting while protecting and preserving the rural character of the area. Section 3.4.2 (7) of the OCP states that rezoning applications to allow a second single family dwelling on a parcel may be considered under the following circumstances:

- (a) The subject property is a minimum of 2 hectares (5 acres) in size or larger, or a 2nd single family dwelling exists and is legal but non-conforming to zoning.
- (b) It has been demonstrated that the parcel can accommodate an on-site sewage disposal system for two dwellings.
- (c) The development is compatible with adjacent land uses and maintains the rural character of the area.
- (d) The parcel is not located within a floodplain or on other hazard lands.
- (e) The development addresses wildlife and ecological values.
- (f) And, the future subdivision of the land into a parcel smaller than 2 hectares (5 acres) is prohibited.

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Building inspection

A RDBN Building Inspector placed a Stop Work Order on the building on July 6, 2021. The property owners have applied for and received a building permit for the building to be used as an accessory building. This allows the roof and foundation work to be completed before the winter to prevent weather damage. The applicant understands that the building cannot be used as a 2nd dwelling if the rezoning is not approved. They are also aware that a new building permit would be required to convert the building to a residential use.



On-Site-Sewage Disposal

The applicant has submitted a letter from an on-site wastewater practitioner confirming the property can support a sewer system for the second dwelling.

Referral Comments

The Electoral Area A Advisory Planning Commission provided the following comments.

"APC was concerned that if granted permission as an accessory building it would continue to be an eyesore in the community. Consideration for the lot parameters and the fact that it is divided by the road, APC felt that it would be more beneficial to permit the owner the opportunity to comply with all regulations including the most concerning, Northern Health. APC believes that the negative visual impact will be reduced and the property will become more esthetically pleasing if a residence is permitted. The APC discussed but did not prejudice the application with the fact that the applicant by-passed the process and did not obtain a building permit prior to placing the mobile home on site. APC recommends approval."







DISCUSSION

The subject property is designated Agriculture (AG) in the Smithers Telkwa Rural Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1704, 2014. The AG Designation is intended to protect and preserve farmland and soil having agricultural capacity and facilitate the appropriate utilization of that land for agricultural purposes.

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The Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) is in the process of amending their regulations regarding 2^{nd} dwellings in the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). The current regulation allowing a manufactured home on ALR land for a relative will be removed as part of this process. The new rules are expected to allow 2^{nd} dwellings to a maximum size of 90 m² for properties under 40 ha. These changes are scheduled to come into effect December 31, 2021. The manufactured home the applicants want exceeds the maximum size of 90 m². Therefore, they wish to be rezoned to Small Holdings – Additional Dwelling (H1A) so that they can have the larger manufactured home under the existing ALC rules. The H1A zone allows a second dwelling to be up to 120 m² (1290 ft²).

The applicant indicates that a Type 3 onsite sewage disposal system is required for the proposed second dwelling.

This application proposes to reduce the setback requirement from a parcel line abutting a highway to allow the construction of a shop. It was discovered at building permit review that the side parcel line abutted an undeveloped highway, which has different setback requirements.

Staff have no objections to the reduced setback on this parcel and recommend the permit be approved.

Proposal:

The applicant is requesting a Development Variance Permit to vary the provisions of the Waterfront Residential II Zone (R4) Zone by reducing the minimum parcel line which abuts a highway setback from 4.5 m (14.8 ft) to 2.4 m (8 ft) in order to construct a new 140 m² (1,500 ft²) shop between the existing house and the side parcel line.

The property owner completed a geotechnical assessment for the proposed shop location, which was required by their engineer, and ordered the shop, believing the side parcel line of the property abutted the neighbour's property. It was discovered at the building permit review stage that the side parcel line abutted an undeveloped highway (highlighted in yellow on subject property map), which has different setback requirements.



Subject Property Map

The applicant states the following reasons for supporting the application:

- Replacing an existing shop: shop lacks curb appeal and is aging, needing replacement.
- Appropriateness of siting:
 - \circ $\;$ The existing septic field and driveway limit suitable locations for siting.
 - \circ $\;$ The large shop would be less visually intrusive at the east side of the dwelling.

DISCUSSION

Land Use

Both a single family dwelling and an older shop used for tools are located on the subject property. The property owner wants to construct a new shop for personal use. The proposed location is easily accessible from the existing dwelling and driveway. Other than the requested variance, the proposal complies with zoning regulations.

Building Inspection

A building permit was submitted for the proposed shop, accompanied by a geotechnical assessment. All building permit documents, including the geotechnical assessment, assumed that the shop needed a 2 m (6.56 ft) parcel line setback. Building inspection has no concerns with the proposal.

Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) Requirements

As the proposed variance is for a parcel line setback abutting an undeveloped highway, a MoTI setback permit is also required. MoTI typically requires a 4.5 m structure setback from all highway rights-of-way (3 m in some instances). The applicant is aware of this requirement.








T ROBERTS ROAD FRONT VIEW OF 2590 GENOW ISLAND RD.




2590 GEROW ISLAND RD. PROPOSED SHOP SITE

In 2020, We (Kelli Payne and Jeremy Perry) were told by a on site building inspector that we needed to be 7 feet away from the east property line and 6 feet away from the east side of the home to put the proposed 30'x50' personal shop. He mentioned that because there are no windows on that side of the home you could build closer to the home. We decided to hire a land surveyor to come to the property and put stakes on the property lot lines just to be 100% accurate. Once this was done, we measured from the property line stakes and all was within the measurement we were told we needed from the building inspector.

We looked at several different shop building ideas over the next few months. We decided that a steel with wood construction shop with colored metal siding would be a good look for the neighbourhood and offer great curb appeal. Also putting a asphalt shingle roof on to stop any snow sliding onto my one neighbors property. My home is the first home you see when you drive onto Gerow Island Road so we feel the look here is important.

In 2021, we ordered a Perka/Hybrid 30x50 shop and waited for the engineered plans we needed to apply for a building permit. We received the engineered plans in late July 2021. We met with the building inspector in early August 2021 and he was very helpful and told us what we needed to do next. He gave us a building permit application and took a copy of the engineered building plans. He said he would also need engineered plans for the foundation. We spoke with the engineer and he stated that he would need a geotechnical study done before he could draw any foundation plans. From here we found and hired a geotech to come to Burns Lake to have this done. We had this study done in August 2021. Once this study was done we ordered the foundation plans. The building inspector said we can bring in the filled out application anytime and as we receive these document, just bring them in. He explained that this way the file will be opened and the process will be started. The completed building permit application was brought in at the end of August.

Unfortunately, it was not until September that we first heard that we now need to be 15 feet from the west property line due to a road/highway. When looking at a map and the standing on the actual property, the road appears to be a "undeveloped lane". We are told that now we need to apply for a variance permit to move forward with this project.

We have done everything we have been asked to do thus far. At this point we have spent \$47,865.00.

In closing, we are hoping that you will please consider this variance permit to be approved so we can continue with these plans we started in 2020.







Proposal

The applicant is requesting Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) approval to operate a sand and gravel pit on the subject property.

The application indicates that 50,000 m³ of aggregate will be removed to a depth of 18 m from the non-farm use area of 0.89 ha. The applicant indicates that the removal of this material will widen the bench at the bottom of an existing gully, creating a usable area for equipment and hay storage. The bank of the gully will be leveled to a 2:1 slope and reclaimed as pasture for goats. The estimated duration of the project is 4 years.



DISCUSSION

Official Community Plan

The subject property is designated Agriculture (AG) under the Vanderhoof Rural Official Community Plan. The intent of the designation is to preserve the land for the purposes of farming and other related activities. The OCP states:

Severances for small lot residential (other than home site severances approved by the Agricultural Land Commission), institutional, commercial or industrial development shall be avoided. However, applications for exclusions, subdivisions, and non-farm uses within the Agricultural Land Reserve may be supported if:

- (a) There is limited agricultural potential within the proposed area;
- (b) Soil conditions are not suitable for agriculture;
- (c) Neighbouring uses will not be compromised;
- (d) Adequate provisions for fencing are provided, where necessary;
- (e) There is a demonstrated need for the proposed development; and,
- (f) The application is in the best interest of the community

Zoning

The property is zoned Agricultural (Ag1) pursuant to Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Zoning Bylaw No. 1800, 2020 (the Zoning Bylaw). The Zoning Bylaw cannot regulate the removal or deposit of soil, including gravel; however, it does regulate the processing of soil. Soil processing is not permitted in the Ag1 Zone.

Planning Department Comments

On the eastern edge of the property is a naturally occurring, steeply sloped gully that has a seasonal creek. The gully contains a mix of sand and gravel, to a considerable depth. The applicant has removed approximately 400 m³ of aggregate for use on the property to level the land and build up the driveway.

The subject property's Soil Classification is Class 5. In this class it is identified that:

Class 5 lands can be cultivated and some may be used for cultivated field crops provided unusually intensive management is employed and/or the crop is particularly adapted to the conditions peculiar to these lands. The applicants are keen to establish a productive farm that would include goats, pigs and chickens, and a small herd of cattle. Building the soil to an acceptable quality for pasture land will require adequate fertilizing at a considerable cost. The application indicates that 100% of the gravel sales will be going into supporting the development of the farm.

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The Planning Department has no concern with the impact on agriculture resulting from the gravel pit operations provided that the ALC ensures that the gully slope is adequately reclaimed for future agriculture use.

Referral Comments

The Electoral Area F Advisory Planning Commission supports the application.

The RDBN Agriculture Coordinator (East) comments are as follows:

Based on the application details, I agree that the area outlined in this proposal currently has poor to no suitability for agriculture, and that at the end of the gravel pit tenure the area will be of better agricultural suitability. I have some familiarity with this farm, and the road access to the proposed site is already established and adequate to accommodate the proposal. The footprint for removal of materials should not impact other productive areas of the property.

With respect to the proposed reclamation of the gravel pit area, it should be noted that the application states that Clear Creek is a 'seasonal' creek, however fish species have been found upstream of the property (see attached documents) so this creek is classified as fish bearing. From an agricultural perspective, there are clear set-back requirements in the Agricultural Environmental Management Code of Practice (AEM

CoP) for farm buildings and other infrastructure that should be considered in the reclamation plan. Adjusting the boundaries of the gravel pit to these setbacks would make it easier for the property owners to remain in compliance when they convert the gravel pit back to agricultural use at the end of the four years. This would also help to maintain the riparian area along the creek, which would ultimately act as a vegetative buffer for manure run-off if the gravel pit area is ultimately converted to pasture.

Completing a fisheries and/or stream habitat assessment at this stage would assist the landowners by providing them with baseline data for future agricultural activities.

Finally, the reclamation plan could look at keyline concepts and/or other regenerative agriculture practices that reduce the risk of erosion of the slope. Stabilizing the slope by controlling the flow of water both above and below ground would reduce the risk of sediment and manure pollution into Clear Creek. Keyline concepts incorporate grading and sloping practices that retain and/or gently distribute runoff on the slope, support better establishment of pasture grasses, and reduce possible erosion on the agricultural lands.




Agricultural Capability Map







Dear Deneve Vanderwolf,

Thank you for providing the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries (Ministry) with the opportunity to comment on the proposed Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) application to operate a sand and gravel operation located at 12538 Highway 27 and in the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). Ministry staff offer the following comments:

- From the information provided, it appears the applicant is currently raising chickens, turkeys, goats, pigs, and ducks, and intends to use any gravel pit operation earnings "100%" towards "supporting the development of the farm".
- Ministry staff note however that the application does not propose any measures that might help mitigate potential noise and dust arising from the operation, which may also impact existing and future agricultural activities, both on and adjacent to the property.
- While the proposal might be considered relatively small-scale (both in size and duration), the Regional District may wish to review the site and potential land use edge-planning options (such as vegetative buffers or berms) with the applicant to help mitigate the operation's potential impact on or conflict with surrounding land uses.
- Ministry staff also note that the provided Planning Department Referral Report references a gully that has a seasonal creek. Although the referenced watercourse may only flow seasonally, it may provide habitat for fish and be defined as a stream under the provincial <u>Riparian Areas Protection Regulation</u>. The Regional District may wish to review the regulation to determine if the proposal is consistent with it.

- Ministry staff also note that photos in the provided Planning Department Referral Report show an existing and well-established infestation of Canada thistle. Weeds can greatly reduce the productivity of agricultural areas and under the provincial *Weed Control Act* the land occupier has a legal obligation to control noxious weeds on the site. Control of both plants and seeds is required as the seeds from invasive plants can lay dormant and viable in the soil for many years and can be a serious long-term problem.
- Quarries and gravel pits are continually disturbed sites, perfect for the establishment of invasive plants. Seeds from the invasive plants can contaminate the soil removed from the pit and be transferred to another site. - Regional District staff may also wish to confirm with the applicant that any associated plan for the operation includes activities ensuring equipment is clean prior to being brought on site.





SUBJECT: Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action

RECOMMENDATION:

(all/directors/majority)

To receive/discuss.

BACKGROUND

The 2021 UBCM Convention's "Pathways to Truth and Reconciliation" plenary session with the Honorable Murray Sinclair, Minister Rankin (Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation), Andrea Reimer (Vancouver City Councillor, 2008-18), and John Jack (Regional District Alberni-Clayoquot Chair and Huu-ay-aht First Nations Councillor) discussed the topic of reconciliation and relationship-building. The session specifically focused on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's 94 Calls to Action and how individuals, local governments, and agencies could work towards reconciliation.

Following this session, staff discussed measures to internally implement the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's report and decided to bring forward five Calls to Action for the Board to reflect and/or discuss at each Board meeting. Thus, creating space for the Board to discuss each of the 94 Calls to Action and how the Regional District can support local First Nations in their advocacy for reconciliation efforts in the region.

CALLS TO ACTION FOR DISCUSSION

The legacy of residential schools and the current child welfare system.

1. We call upon the federal, provincial, territorial, and Aboriginal governments to commit to reducing the number of Aboriginal children in care by:

i. Monitoring and assessing neglect investigations.

ii. Providing adequate resources to enable Aboriginal communities and child-welfare organizations

to keep Aboriginal families together where it is safe to do so, and to keep children in culturally appropriate environments, regardless of where they reside.

iii. Ensuring that social workers and others who conduct child-welfare investigations are properly educated and trained about the history and impacts of residential schools.

iv. Ensuring that social workers and others who conduct child-welfare investigations are properly educated and trained about the potential for Aboriginal communities and families to provide more appropriate solutions to family healing.

v. Requiring that all child-welfare decision makers consider the impact of the residential school experience on children and their caregivers.

2. We call upon the federal government, in collaboration with the provinces and territories, to prepare and publish annual reports on the number of Aboriginal children (First Nations, Inuit, and Métis) who are in care, compared with non-Aboriginal children, as well as the reasons for apprehension, the total spending on preventive and care services by child-welfare agencies, and the effectiveness of various interventions.

3. We call upon all levels of government to fully implement Jordan's Principle¹.

4. We call upon the federal government to enact Aboriginal child-welfare legislation that establishes national standards for Aboriginal child apprehension and custody cases and includes principles that:

i. Affirm the right of Aboriginal governments to establish and maintain their own child-welfare agencies.

ii. Require all child-welfare agencies and courts to take the residential school legacy into account in their decision making.

¹ "Jordan's Principle is a legal requirement resulting from the Orders of the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT) and is not a policy or program.

[[]It] is a child-first principle that aims to eliminate service inequities and delays for First Nations children. Jordan's Principle states that any public service ordinarily available to all other children must be made available to First Nations children without delay or denial.

Jordan's Principle is named in honour of Jordan River Anderson, a young First Nations boy from Norway House Cree Nation in northern Manitoba, who spent his entire life in hospital while caught in a jurisdictional dispute between the governments of Canada and Manitoba, which both refused to pay for the in-home medical care necessary for Jordan to live in his home and community." iii. Establish, as an important priority, a requirement that placements of Aboriginal children into temporary and permanent care be culturally appropriate.

5. We call upon the federal, provincial, territorial, and Aboriginal governments to develop culturally appropriate parenting programs for Aboriginal families.

RECOMMENDATION:

That Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Procedure Bylaw No. 1964, 2021 be given first, second, and third reading this 21st day of October, 2021.

BACKGROUND

In June 2020, Ministerial Order M192 came into effect which allowed all meetings and public hearings to be conducted electronically during the COVID-19 pandemic.

On June 1, 2021, <u>Bill 10</u> *Municipal Affairs Statues Amendment Act* was passed to provide permanent authority for local governments to choose, by bylaw, whether to conduct regular and committee meetings electronically. These new rules came into effect on September 29, 2021. The new rules do not require local governments to adopt electronic meeting provisions, however, local governments are encouraged to consider whether there are circumstances where electronic meetings may be beneficial. As a best practice identified by the Province, electronic meetings should not be a substitute for all in-person meetings.

The current RDBN procedure bylaw allows up to two directors to attend electronically per meeting under the following circumstances:

- Physical incapacity due to injury or illness;
- Inclement weather;
- Physical absence from the Regional District boundaries while acting in the capacity as a Director on RDBN matters;
- Extraordinary circumstances which, in the view of the Chair, renders attendance in person by the Director impractical.

Directors attending under these circumstances are only permitted to do so on two different meeting dates per year unless otherwise authorized by the Chair.

In addition to a few minor housekeeping changes, the new draft bylaw proposes the following changes:

Section 5.3

This section has been revised to reflect that an electronic agenda will be provided at least four days in advance rather than five days in advance. The current practice of five days was to accommodate agendas that were mailed out.

Section 8.3

The current bylaw allows only two directors to participate electronically at any given meeting. Staff are recommending that this be changed to four directors, which still ensures that a quorum is present in the boardroom should electronic communication be lost.

Section 8.4

This section outlines the determination of electronic attendees should there be more than four Directors that wish to participate electronically.

Section 8.8

This is a new section that requires directors to provide 24 hours' notice to the Chair and CAO/Corporate Officer when possible. This provides ample time for the meeting credentials to be provided and to ensure that section 8.3 is not being contravened.

Section 9.0 – Electronic Participation in case of Emergency or Special Circumstance

This section is new and reflects the new legislation that allows local governments to hold electronic meetings. This section allows electronic participation in an emergency, special circumstance, or public health event that prevents or restricts members from being able to physically meet in one location. Meetings called under this section will be at the call of the Board Chair and there shall be no limit to the number of Directors who may attend electronically.

Section 15.9

This section is added to reference the RDBN Code of Conduct.

REGIONAL DISTRICT OF BULKLEY-NECHAKO

BYLAW NO. 1964, 2021

A bylaw to regulate the meetings and conduct of the Regional Board and Committees

WHEREAS the Regional District pursuant to Section 225 of the *Local Government Act* must, by bylaw, provide for the procedure to be followed for the conduct of its business and the business of its select and standing committees, and, in particular, must, by bylaw:

- (a) establish the general procedures to be followed by the Board and by Board committees in conducting their business, including the manner by which resolutions may be passed and bylaws adopted;
- (b) provide for advance public notice respecting the time, place and date of Board and Board committee meetings and establish the procedures for giving that notice;
- (c) identify places that are to be public notice posting places for the purposes of the application of section 94 (requirements for public notice) of the *Community Charter* to the Regional District.

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

PART 1 - GENERAL

1.0 <u>Title</u>

- 1. This bylaw may be cited for all purposes as "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Procedure Bylaw No. 1964, 2021."
- 2. The "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Procedure Bylaw No. 1832, 2012" is hereby repealed.

2.0 Interpretation

"Board" means the Board of Directors of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako;

> "**Chairperson**" means the Chairperson of the Board elected by the Board to fulfil the duties and responsibility of Chair pursuant to the *Local Government Act* and includes the person presiding at a meeting of the Board, or the person appointed as Chair of a Standing or Select Committee of the Board, as the context requires;

> "Vice-Chairperson" means the person elected by the Board to fulfil the duties and responsibility of Vice-Chairperson pursuant to the *Local Government Act* and includes the person presiding at a meeting of the Board, or a Standing or Select Committee of the Board in the absence of the Chairperson as the context requires;

"Committee" means a Standing or Select Committee of the Board;

"Committee of the Whole" means a committee of all Board members.

"Chief Administrative Officer" means the officer assigned responsibility for chief administration pursuant to the *Local Government Act.*

"**Corporate Administrator**" means the officer assigned responsibility for corporate administration pursuant to the *Local Government Act*;

"Delegation" means an individual or an organization addressing the Board, a committee or commission about a specific item on the agenda of a meeting;

"**Director**" means a member of the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, whether as a Municipal Director or an Electoral Area Director pursuant to the *Local Government Act*;

"Inaugural Meeting" means the first meeting of the Board that is held after November 1 in any year.

"Public Notice Posting Place" means the notice board, whether electronic or not, located in the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako main office, Burns Lake, British Columbia;

"Regional District" means the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako;

"Regional District Office" means the main office of the Regional District located in Burns Lake, British Columbia;

"RDBN" means the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako;

"RDBN Website" means the information resource found at an internet address

provided by the RDBN.

3.0 <u>Election of Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson</u>

- 3.1 At the Inaugural Meeting the Board shall elect a Chairperson from among its Directors.
- 3.2 Following election of a Chairperson, and at the same meeting, the Board shall elect a Vice-Chairperson from among its Directors.
- 3.3 The Chief Administrative Officer is to preside from the Chair over the election of the Chair and Vice Chair. The Chief Administrative Officer has all the powers and duties of the Chair under this bylaw and the *Local Government Act* to the extent necessary to conduct the election.
- 3.4 Each candidate for election as Chair or Vice Chair may make a statement of not more than two minutes duration before the election.
- 3.5 The election of the Chair and the Vice Chair must be by a secret ballot of the Directors whose votes are to be recorded on ballot papers prepared and distributed for the purpose by the Chief Administrative Officer.
- 3.6 The winner of an election is to be determined by the Chief Administrative Officer in accordance with the following rules:
 - (a) Where there are two candidates for a position, the candidate who receives the most votes is the winner of the election.
 - (b) Where there are more than two candidates for a position, the candidate who receives more votes than all of the other candidates together is the winner.
 - (c) Subject to rule (d) below, where there are more than two candidates for a position and no candidate receives more votes than all of the other candidates together, the candidate who received the least votes is eliminated and another vote is to be held. Voting is to continue as provided in these rules until one candidate receives more votes than all of the other candidates together.
 - (d) If two candidates are tied for the least number of votes, the Chief Administrative Officer must announce the results of that vote and a second vote must be held. If the second vote results in another tie

> for the least number of votes, the Chief Administrative Officer must toss a coin and the loser of that toss is eliminated as if he or she alone had received the least number of votes. Voting is then to continue as provided in these rules.

- 3.7 The Chief Administrative Officer must declare the winner of an election by announcing it to the Board of Directors. The Chief Administrative Officer must record the winner of the election in the minutes for the meeting at which the election is held.
- 3.8 The Chief Administrative Officer must destroy the ballots cast in an election if the Directors unanimously so resolve.
- 3.9 During the absence, illness or other disability of the Chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson has all the authority of the Chairperson and is subject to the same rules as the Chairperson.
- 3.10 If the office of the Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson becomes vacant, the Board shall elect another Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson from among its Directors at the first possible regular meeting of the Board.

PART TWO - MEETINGS

4.0 Meetings of the Regional Board and Standing Committees

- 4.1 Regular Meetings of the Board shall be held at such time and place as the Board shall decide from time to time by resolution.
- 4.2 At the Inaugural Meeting each year, the Board shall set the time, place, and dates of the regular meetings of the Board and its Standing Committees for the coming year.
- 4.3 The Schedule of Regular Meetings of the Board and its Standing Committees must be posted at the Public Notice Posting Place.

5.0 Notice of Regular Board Meetings

- 5.1 At least seventy-two (72) hours before a Regular Board Meeting, the Corporate Administrator must give public notice of the time, place, and date of the meeting by way of a notice posted at the Public Notice Posting Place.
- 5.2 At least twenty-four (24) hours before a Regular Board Meeting,

the Corporate Administrator must give further public notice of the meeting by:

- (a) posting a copy of the agenda at the Public Notice Posting Place and on the RDBN Website; and
- (b) leaving copies of the agenda at the reception counter at the Regional District office for the purpose of making them available to members of the public.
- 5.3 The Corporate Administrator will issue an electronic copy of the agenda at least four (4) days before the date of the Regular Board Meeting to each director at the electronic address given by the director.

6.0 <u>Reports</u>

- 6.1 A Standing or Select Committee of the Board may report to the Board at any regular meeting or as required by the Board.
- 6.2 Written reports should be prepared and submitted to the Corporate Administrator who shall make copies of each report and attach a copy to the agenda of the forthcoming regular meeting of the Board before the agenda is circulated to the members of the Board.

7.0 Notice of Special Board and Committee Meetings

- 7.1 Except where notice of a Special Meeting is waived by a unanimous vote of all Board members under Section 220(3) of the *Local Government Act*, before a special meeting of the Board, the Corporate Administrator must;
 - (a) At least 24 hours before a Special Meeting, give advance public notice of the time, place, and date of the meeting by posting a notice on the Public Notice Posting Place;
 - (b) give notice of the Special Meeting in accordance with section 220(2) of the *Local Government Act*.
- 7.2 In an emergency, notice of a Special Meeting may be given, in accordance with section 220(4) of the *Local Government Act.*
- 7.3 Section 7.1 does not apply where the Directors have been given notice under Section 7.2.

8.0 <u>Electronic Meetings</u>

- 8.1 Provided the conditions set out in the *Regional Districts Electronic Meetings Regulation, B.C. Reg.271/2005* and section 220 of the *Local Government Act* are met, a special Board or Committee Meeting may be conducted by means of visual and/or audio electronic or other communication facilities if the Board requires it.
- 8.2 Provided the conditions set out in the *Regional Districts Electronic Meetings Regulation, B.C. Reg.271/2005* are met, a Director who is unable to attend a Board, Committee, Special, or In-Camera meeting other than a meeting convened under Section 8.1, may participate in a meeting, by means of visual and/or audio electronic or other communication facilities, if the Director is unable to attend in person because of:
 - (a) Physical incapacity due to injury or illness;
 - (b) Inclement weather;
 - (c) Physical absence from the Regional District boundaries while acting in the capacity as a Director on Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako matters;
 - (d) Extraordinary circumstances which, in the view of the Chair, renders attendance in person by the Director impractical;

provided that a Director who participates in accordance with section 8.2 does so at no more than two different meeting dates per year unless otherwise authorized by the Chair.

- 8.3 No more than four Directors at one time may participate at a meeting under section 8.2 unless otherwise authorized by the Chair. This ensures that a quorum remains present in the event that communication is lost with those attending electronically.
- 8.4 If more than four Directors wish to participate electronically at a Board, Committee, Special, or In-Camera meeting, the Corporate Officer will by lot choose who is entitled to participate electronically.

- 8.4 Any Director participating at a meeting in accordance with section 8.2 must be in receipt of the agenda and any applicable staff reports as have been provided to Directors not participating electronically before the Board meeting.
- 8.5 Notice of a special Board meeting required under section 7 and conducted under section 8.1 must contain information of the way in which the meeting is to be conducted and the place where the public may attend to hear, or watch and hear, the proceedings of the meeting that are open to the public.
- 8.6 A Director participating electronically by audio means only must indicate his or her vote verbally.
- 8.7 A Director participating in a meeting electronically is deemed to be present in the meeting as though they are physically present.
- 8.8 A Director must provide 24 hours' notice to the Chair and the Chief Administrative Officer or Corporate Officer of their intent to participate electronically unless it is not practicable to do so.

9.0 <u>Electronic Participation in case of Emergency or Special Circumstance</u>

- 9.1 In an emergency, special circumstance, or public health event that prevents or restricts members from being able to physically meet in one location, Directors may participate in a meeting by means of electronic or other communication facilities that:
 - (a) Enable the meeting's participants to hear, or watch and hear, each other; and,
 - (b) except for a meeting that is closed to the public, enable the public to hear, or watch and hear, the person(s) participating by electronic or other communication facilities.
- 9.2 Meetings called under subsection (1) will be at the call of the Board Chair.
- 9.3 Special meetings called under subsection (1) will be in accordance with section 7 of this bylaw and will comply with the requirements set out in subsection 2(2)(d) of the *Regional District Electronic Meetings Regulations*, B.C. Reg. 118/2018.

9.4 There shall be no limit to the number of Directors who may participate electronically.

10.0 Notice of Committee Meetings

10.1 In this section:

"Standing Committee" means a Committee of the Board which is not a Standing Committee of the Whole.

- 10.2 At least seventy-two (72) hours before a regular meeting of a Standing Committee of the Whole, the Corporate Administrator must give public notice of the time, place, and date of the meeting by way of a notice posted at the Public Notice Posting Place.
- 10.3 At least twenty-four (24) hours before a regular meeting of a Standing Committee of the Whole, the Corporate Administrator must give further public notice of the meeting by:
 - (a) posting a copy of the agenda at the Public Notice Posting Place; and
 - (b) leaving copies of the agenda at the reception counter at the Regional District Office for the purpose of making them available to members of the public.
- 10.4 At least twenty-four (24) hours before a regular meeting of a Standing Committee of the Whole, the Corporate Administrator must deliver a copy of the agenda to each member of the Committee at the place to which the Committee member has directed notices be sent.
- 10.5 At least twenty-four (24) hours before:
 - (a) a special meeting of a Standing Committee of the Whole; or
 - (b) a meeting of a Standing Committee;

the Corporate Administrator must give advance public notice of the time, place, and date of the meeting by way of a notice posted at the Public Notice Posting Place.

11.0 Attendance of Public at Meetings

- 11.1 Except where the provisions of Section 90 of the *Community Charter* apply all the Regional Board meetings must be open to the public.
- 11.2 Where the Board wishes to close a meeting or part of a meeting to the public, it may do so by first adopting a resolution in a public meeting in accordance with Section 92 of the *Community Charter*.
- 11.3 This section applies to meetings of bodies referred to in Section 93 of the *Community Charter*, including, without limitation:
 - (a) Select or Standing Committees of the Board;
 - (b) the Board of Variance;
 - (c) the Parcel Tax Review Panel;
 - (d) the Advisory Planning Commissions;
 - (e) other Committees and Commissions established by the Board;
 - (f) Committee of the Whole.
- 11.4 Despite Section 10.1, the Chairperson may expel or exclude from a Board meeting or meeting of a body referred to in Section 11.3, a person in accordance with Section 133 of the *Community Charter*.

12.0 <u>Minutes of Meetings</u>

- 12.1 Minutes of Board meetings must be kept in accordance with Section 223 (1) of the Local Government Act. For the purposes of Section 223(1)(b) of the Local Government Act, the designated officer is the Corporate Administrator.
- 12.2 Minutes of Committee meetings referred to in Section 11.3 must be kept in accordance with Section 223(2) of the *Local Government Act*.
- 12.3 Section 12.2 applies to meetings of:
 - (a) Select or Standing Committees of the Board; and
 - (b) Any other Committee composed solely of Board members acting as Board members.

13.0 Closed Meetings

- 13.1 A meeting of the Board may be closed to the public in accordance with Section 90 of the *Community Charter*.
- 13.2 It shall be the responsibility of the Chairperson, Chief Administrative Officer, and the Corporate Administrator, individually or collectively, to recommend to the Board that it consider certain matters at a closed meeting (with the public and/or certain members of the staff excluded), and to prepare an agenda designating the topics to be so discussed.

PART 3 - PROCEDURES

14.0 **Opening Procedures**

- 14.1 As soon as a quorum is present, following the stated time of the meeting, the Chairperson shall take the Chair and call the Directors to order.
- 14.2 If the Chairperson does not attend the meeting within fifteen (15) minutes after the time appointed, the Vice-Chairperson shall take the Chair and call the Directors to order. If the Vice-Chairperson is also absent, the Chief Administrative Officer or the Corporate Administrator shall take the Chair and call the Directors to order. If a quorum is present, the Directors shall elect an Acting Chairperson who shall preside during the meeting until the arrival of the Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson. The person appointed as Acting Chairperson has all the authority and is subject to the same rules as the Chairperson.
- 14.3 If no quorum is present within thirty (30) minutes after the appointed time of the meeting, the Chief Administrative Officer or Corporate Administrator shall record in the minute book the names of the Directors present and the meeting shall be adjourned.
- 14.4 A quorum of a regular Board Meeting shall consist of ten (10) Directors.
- 14.5 Immediately after the Chairperson has taken his/her seat and has called the meeting to order, the minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read by the Chief Administrative Officer or Corporate Administrator in order to correct mistakes. The reading of the minutes shall be dispensed with if each member has been sent a copy of the minutes at least seventy-two (72) hours before the meeting at which they are to be considered.

15.0 Rules of Conduct and Debate

- 15.1 Every Director shall address the Chairperson before speaking to any question or motion.
- 15.2 Directors shall address the Chairperson as "Mr. Chair" or "Madam Chair" or "Mr. Chairperson" or "Madam Chairperson" and shall refer to each other as "Director _____".
- 15.3 No Director shall:
 - speak disrespectfully of Her Majesty the Queen or any of the Royal Family, or of the Governor General or a Lieutenant Governor, or persons administering the Government of Canada or of the Government of British Columbia;
 - (b) use offensive words in or against the Board, a Director or a Regional District staff member;
 - (c) speak to or raise matters that are not germane to the question being debated;
 - (d) disobey the rules of the Board on questions of order or practice, or upon the interpretation of the rules of the Board.
- 15.4 If a Director takes an action prohibited in section 15.3, that Director may be ordered by a majority vote of the Directors present to leave his or her seat for that meeting. If a Director refuses to leave his or her seat, that Director may on the order of the Chairperson be removed from the meeting by a Peace Officer.
- 15.5 The Board may permit a Director who has been ordered to leave his or her seat to take his/her seat again, if that Director apologizes.
- 15.6 After a question is finally put to the Chairperson, no member shall speak to the question, nor shall any other motion be made until after the result of the vote has been declared. The decision of the Chairperson as to whether the question has been finally put shall be conclusive.
- 15.7 If the Chairperson desires to leave the chair for the purpose of taking part in the debate or otherwise, the Chairperson shall call on the Vice-

Chairperson or if the Vice-Chairperson is absent, one of the Directors shall be called to take the chair until resumed by the Chairperson.

- 15.8 When any order, resolution, or question is lost by reason of the Board or any Committee thereof breaking up for want of a quorum, the order, resolution, or question so lost shall be the first item of business to be proceeded with and disposed of at the next meeting of the Board or Committee.
- 15.9 The RDBN Code of Conduct shall apply to all meetings referred to in Section 11.3.

16.0 Points of Order

- 16.1 The Chairperson, or the Director presiding at the meeting of the Board, shall preserve order and decide all points of order which may arise, subject to an appeal by the other Directors of the Board then present.
- 16.2 If an appeal is made by a Director of the Board from the decision of the Chairperson, the question "Shall the Chairperson be sustained?" shall immediately be put by the Chairperson and decided without debate. The Chairperson shall be governed by the majority of the Directors of the Board then present, other than the Chairperson. In the event of the votes being equal, the question shall pass in the affirmative.
- 16.3 If the Chairperson refuses to put the question "Shall the Chairperson be sustained?", the Board shall forthwith appoint the Vice-Chairperson, or if absent, one of the Directors to preside temporarily in lieu of such Chairperson, as the case may be, and the Vice-Chairperson or Director of the Regional Board so temporarily appointed shall proceed in accordance with Subsection 16.2. In the event of the votes being equal, the question shall pass in the affirmative.
- 16.4 Any resolution or motion carried under the circumstances mentioned in Subsection 16.3 is as effectual and binding as if carried under the presidency of the Chairperson.

17.0 Motions

- 17.1 Motions other than routine motions shall be put in writing and seconded before being debated or put from the Chairperson.
- 17.2 A motion that has been seconded must be read by the Chairperson, Chief

Administrative Officer, or Corporate Administrator before debate at the request of any Director.

- 17.3 Amendments to a motion shall be decided upon before the main question is put to a vote. Only one amendment shall be allowed to an amendment.
- 17.4 A motion to commit the subject matter to a Committee, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment of the main question.
- 17.5 A motion to adjourn the Board or to adjourn the debate shall always be in order, but if such motion is defeated, no similar motion to the same effect shall be made until some intermediate business or matter has been disposed of.

18.0 Voting of Questions

- 18.1 Voting on questions, resolutions, and bylaws must be in accordance with Sections 206 to 214 of the *Local Government Act*.
- 18.2 Section 18.1 applies to the meetings of a Committee.
- 18.3 Any Director who is present at the meeting but who declines to vote on a question for any reason shall be deemed to have voted in the affirmative and that Director's vote or votes shall be counted accordingly.
- 18.4 In all cases where the votes of the Directors then present, including the vote of the Chairperson or other person presiding, are tied, the question shall be defeated and it shall be the duty of the presiding Director to so declare.
- 18.5 As soon as the Chairperson has announced the results of the vote on a question, any Director who voted in opposition may request the Chairperson to have that Director's name so recorded in the minutes.
- 18.6 When a question under consideration contains distinct propositions, the vote upon each proposition shall be taken separately only upon the request of any Director to do so.
- 18.7 After a bylaw, resolution, or proceeding of the Board is adopted, the Chairperson may return it for reconsideration in accordance with Section 217 of the *Local Government Act*.
- 18.8 The Board shall not reconsider any question more than once.

- 18.9 The motion to reconsider requires two-thirds of the votes cast of the Directors present to pass.
- 18.10 The Board shall not reconsider any question that
 - (a) has been acted upon by any officer or employee of the Regional District.
 - (b) received the assent or approval of the electors and was subsequently adopted by the Board; or
 - (c) has been reconsidered under Section 217 of the *Local Government Act* or Section 18.7 of this Bylaw.
- 18.11 After a question has been reconsidered, it shall not be reintroduced for a period of six months except by unanimous consent of all Directors.
- 18.12 For the purpose of this section, a question has been acted upon if
 - a) in the case of a contract, a bylaw or resolution authorizing the Board to enter into the contract has been communicated to another party to the agreement;
 - an approval or consent of the Board has been communicated to a public authority and the public authority has relied upon the approval or consent to issue a permit, approval, or license or to enter into an agreement with a third party; or
 - c) in any other case, a decision of the Board on this question has been communicated to a third party in circumstances in which it is reasonable to believe that the third party or another person has, in reliance upon the communication, incurred a liability or altered his or her legal position;
- 18.13 This section shall not be interpreted as fettering or impairing any legislative power, duty or function of the Board.

PART 4 - BYLAWS

19.0 Bylaws

- 19.1 A bylaw may be given up to 3 readings at one meeting of the Board.
- 19.2 The Board may reconsider any clause or section of a bylaw following first,

second and/or third reading, but before adoption.

- 19.3 Despite Section 135 (3) (at least one day between third reading and adoption) of the Community Charter, a bylaw that does not require approval, consent or assent under this or any other Act before it is adopted may be adopted at the same meeting at which it passes third reading if the motion for adoption receives at least 2/3 of the votes cast.
- 19.4 If a bylaw requires statutory approval, the approval must be obtained after the bylaw has been given third reading and before the bylaw is adopted.
- 19.5 Once adopted, a bylaw must be signed by the Chairperson at the Board meeting at which it was adopted and be signed by the officer assigned responsibility under Section 236 of the *Local Government Act.*

20.0 Standing and Select Committees

- 20.1 The Chairperson may establish standing committees in accordance with Section 218(2) of the *Local Government Act*. The proceedings of all such Committees shall be subject to the approval of the Board.
- 20.2 The Board may from time to time appoint a select committee in accordance with Section 218(1) of the *Local Government Act*.
- 20.3 Any Director of the Board may be appointed to a standing or select committee whether or not that director is present at the meeting where the appointment is made.
- 20.4 Any Director may attend a meeting of any Committee. A Director who has not been appointed to a Committee and attends a meeting of that Committee may not vote, but, with the exception of the Executive Committee, may be allowed to take part in any discussion or debate by permission of a majority of the votes of the members of that Committee then present.
- 20.5 The Chairperson is an ex-officio member of all Board Committees. The Chairperson shall have the right to vote, but shall not be included in the quorum.
- 20.6 The general duties of all the standing committees of the Board shall be as follows:
 - a) To consider and report to the Board from time to time, or whenever

> desired by the Board and as often as the interest of the Regional District may require, on all matters referred to them by the Chairperson or the Board or coming within their purview, and to recommend such action by the Board in relation thereto as they, the Committee, deem necessary or expedient.

- b) To carry out the instructions of the Board expressed by resolution in regard to any matter referred by the Board to any committee for immediate action thereupon, but in such cases the instructions of the Board shall be specific and the Committee shall report its action in detail at the next regular or other meeting of the Board, or as specified in the instructions of the Board.
- 20.7 In the transaction of business, all Standing and Select Committees shall adhere as far as possible to the rules governing proceedings in meetings of the Board.
- 20.8 Of the number of Directors appointed to compose any standing or select committee, a majority of the Directors having among them a majority of the votes shall be a quorum competent to transact business.
- 20.9 On completion of its assignment and submission of its report to the Board, a Select Committee shall be automatically dissolved.

PART 6 - AGENDAS

21.0 Delegations

- 21.1 Individuals or groups wishing to appear before the Board may do so only if they have first notified the Chairperson, Chief Administrative Officer, or Corporate Administrator in writing before the agenda has been prepared and circulated to the Board, except on extraordinary occasions declared as such by the Chairperson.
- 21.2 Every delegation shall be allowed a reasonable time at the discretion of the Chairperson to present its petition or submission, at the meeting. The Board may dispose of the petition or submission at the meeting, refer the subject matter to a Committee or take such other action as is deemed expedient.

22.0 Rules of Order

22.1 In all unprovided cases in the proceedings of the Board or of its

Committee(s), the most current edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed to the extent those Rules are applicable in the circumstances and not inconsistent with this Bylaw, the *Community Charter* or the *Local Government Act*.

REGIONAL DISTRICT OF BULKLEY-NECHAKO BYLAW 1960

A Bylaw for Amending Directors' Remuneration

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of the *Local Government Act*, a Board may adopt procedures, conditions and amounts for Directors' remuneration and expenses;

NOW THEREFORE the Board of the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

1. <u>TITLE:</u>

This bylaw shall be cited as the "Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Directors' Remuneration and Expenses Bylaw Amendment No. 1960, 2021

2. Bylaw 1837, 2018 "A Bylaw for Directors' Remuneration" is hereby amended by:

Section 4. (C) is repealed and replaced with the following:

(C) Disputes regarding Directors' Remuneration and Expense Reports shall be forwarded to the Chair, Vice-Chair, and CAO for resolution.

Section 8. (C) is repealed and replaced with the following:

(C) Meal Expenses:

In lieu of reimbursement of actual expenses for meals and incidentals while on Regional District business, a Director may claim the following allowances:

For Meals and Incidentals within the Regional District

Full Day	Breakfast	Lunch	Dinner
\$69	\$23	\$23	\$23

For Meals and Incidentals Outside the Regional District

Full	Breakfast	Lunch	Dinner
Day			
\$86	\$23	\$23	\$40

A claim for meals can only be made if it has not been provided by the Regional District or as part of a convention or other event. Where meals are provided, there is no reimbursement if the Director chooses to eat elsewhere. Exceptions would include where there are special dietary needs or the inability to take advantage of paid meals because of a timing conflict with other Regional District business. To claim meals, the following conditions must apply:

- Begin before 7 am on the date of departure to claim breakfast
- Begin before 12 pm on the date of departure (and end after 1 pm on the date of return) to claim lunch
- End after 6 pm on the date of return to claim dinner

The actual cost of any meal may be reimbursed if a receipt is provided and the CAO, Chair, or Vice-Chair determines that reimbursement is warranted.

Section 10. (B) and (C) are repealed and replaced with the following:

- (B) Electoral Area Directors will be reimbursed up to \$125 per month for home internet service upon the provision of receipts. A one-time fee of up to \$200 may be reimbursed for the installation costs associated with the provision of new or higher speed internet service.
- (C) Electoral Area Directors will be reimbursed up to \$2,000 per term for a tablet or portable laptop computer upon receipt. Municipalities will be provided 50% of the costs associated with providing their municipal Director with a tablet or portable lap top computer to a maximum of \$1,000. Electoral Area Directors will be provided technical support and business software that is determined by the Regional District's Information Officer (or similar position) as required to support their role as Director.

Section 11. (A) is repealed and replaced with the following:

(A) Electoral Area Directors will be allocated no less than \$10,000 (to be increased by CPI annually beginning in 2023) to attend conventions and meetings related to their work as an Electoral Area Director including meetings with Elected Officials or officials of other governments including Indigenous Governments.

This amount includes costs associated with attendance at UBCM and NCLGA. This amount may be used for convention costs, travel and remuneration.

Costs will be reimbursed at the regular expense rate described in this bylaw. Remuneration rates will be either at the $\frac{1}{2}$ day or full day meeting rates listed in Schedule B.

W.O.W. Bus Repairs and Maintenance Costs: We recently were required to pay two large amounts billed by the School District to cover maintenance and repairs costs, including a large repair completed in June 2021. These repairs and maintenance were necessary to keep the bus on the road and the program running, but they are much larger than expected and budgeted for, totalling \$4497.75. This is equivalent to nearly 50% of the W.O.W. Bus program's total operating expenses budgeted for the year.

The W.O.W. Bus Service to Southside extends library, literacy and food share services specifically to residents in Electoral Areas B & E. This unexpectedly large expense has overdrawn our W.O.W. Background:

The project will improve riverside accessibility and cycling improvements for the Village of Telkwa downtown / riverside area to attract both residents and visitors, following the Parks Master Plan adopted in 2020. The project works include:

- Installing three 6-bicycle rack holders and ten accessible picnic tables along the Riverside trail (including Eddy Park, Library Park and Riverside Park).
- Pave the remaining portion of the Riverside trail. There is a section of the trail alongside the river that has never been paved (and isn't in the budget to be paved after the Flood Mitigation Project currently in progress). Paving this section from Hope Avenue to the Dockrill Rink will mean both pedestrians and cyclists will have a paved pathway through the downtown area to the boat launch/bridge, providing an accessible pathway.

Total uncommitted Gas Tax Funds remaining in Electoral Area 'A' allocation is \$1,084,898.26.

Director Mark Fisher is supportive of this project and of accessing Federal Gas Tax Funds in the amount of up to \$37,500.00 from Area 'A' for this Recreation Infrastructure project.

A Board resolution is required to contribute Federal Gas Tax Funds to this project.

Director Lambert spoke regarding the RDBN concerns with how the Province of BC deals with residents that 'Stay & Defend' their property. During that discussion Minister Farnworth indicated that he would be willing to listen to any solutions.

Director Lambert has met with staff to discuss potential solutions and is now looking for Board support to request a meeting as was offered.

DISCUSSION

During the September 8, 2021 meeting with Minister Farnworth, Director Lambert presented the following concerns:

- > During the 2018 wildfires the RDBN issued evacuation orders to residents.
- Many residents in the evacuation order areas chose to stay and defend their own and neighbour's properties and tend to their livestock or hobby farm animals they chose to shelter in place.
- The RDBN was put in a conflicting position having evacuated residents and then being asked to send resources into the evacuation order area.
- > Residents are hesitant to leave their property due to the increased risk of looking.
- There are limited resources available to man check points and patrol areas to protect property
- The RDBN is looking to the province to provide clear direction in the Emergency Program Act on how local government is to support residents who choose to Stay and Defend.

Since the meeting with Minister Farnworth, Director Lambert has identified the following discussion items and potential solutions for 'Stay & Defend':

The Issues


- The Emergency Program Act does not require adults to evacuate when an Evacuation Order is in place. During the 2018 wildfires the RDBN issued evacuation orders to residents, many residents in the evacuation order areas chose to stay and defend their own and neighbour's properties and tend to their livestock or crops.
- There are limited resources available to man check points and patrol areas to protect property:
 - in northern BC RCMP turnover is frequent and many of the resources sent here are straight from depo, with no on the ground experience, and do not fully understand the evacuation process; and
 - the RCMP resources sent in from other areas of the Province of BC to support local resources do not know the area or the people who live here;
 - there are no local private security companies in the region;
 - typically, when the RDBN is impacted by wildfire, many areas in the southern section of the Province are impacted also, and resources from private security companies are not available.
- When there are wildfires burning in higher populated areas BCWS resources may be scarce.
- In an evacuation affecting ranching and farming communities there is a reluctance to leave their property which causes great concern to the producers such as:
 - the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako is a vast area with many sparsely
 populated areas, many Forest Service Roads, some decommissioned, however,
 still accessible with All Terrain Vehicles (ATV), and hundreds of ATV and walking
 trails that are impossible to man during an evacuation, which puts many
 properties at risk to looting and trespassers moving through properties, without
 anyone there to protect even when the main highways and roadways are
 manned by RCMP;
 - producers and homeowners want to protect their property, and care for their animals and/or crops, which are the biggest assets the average person have;
 - in remote areas such as the Southside of François Lake, many people cannot afford property insurance, so staying and defending may be the only chance they have to save themselves from potential bankruptcy.

- The RDBN was put in a conflicting position having evacuated residents and then being asked to send resources into the evacuation order area.
- > Allowing ranchers and farmers to stay in an Evacuation Order Area to address:
 - animal care, which will reduce the potential loss due to stress;
 - clearing crops, especially long grass crops, that will slow the spread of fire;
 - build fire guards around their own property and if required support BCWS efforts in the local area:
- Currently if a resident, including ranchers and farmers, leave the Evacuation Area to get the required resources to support themselves, they are unable to return without an Entry Permit.
 - Entry Permits are intended for short periods of time to go in and feed and water animals, they require the person to leave the area by a specified time;
 - the Entry Permit process is time consuming for both the resident and the EOC, and fruitless especially when there is no intention of leaving the area again unless further resources are required;
 - providing residents with ongoing Entry Permits would put the EOC in conflict with the Evacuation Order and potentially in a libelous situation.
- First Nations seem to be able to do things their own way, including bringing in fuel, and other resources as they see fit.
 - Local government residents can be stopped at check points and refused reentry or refused to allow them to bring fuel and other resources into the Evacuation Order area.

Potential Solutions

- Respect residents' ability to assess the risks and make healthy safe decisions on their own behalf.
- Residents in the RDBN are typically good neighbours and help each other in stressful and emergent situations:
 - these relationships are critical to providing peace of mind because they know the person supporting them.
- Increase response information directly to residents evacuated on what the response plan is and how they plan to protect residents' property, by hosting 'Resident Information Sessions' led by BCWS and the Local Government.
- The BCWS utilized 1,400 Contractors during the 2021 Wildfire Season, which represents under 3% of the contractors available.
 - We understand that there is a Local Contractor signup process with BCWS, however, there needs to be better messaging and education provided to the local contractors so that more local contractors can be mobilized.
 - The advertising should also target ranchers and farmers who are also trained and have equipment that can be mobilized quickly.
 - The process needs to be streamlined so that BCWS can quickly mobilize local contractors during an event as well.
 - Local residents in large rural areas know the back roads, and areas risk better than imported wildfire response people and are able to provide good local knowledge to support their response, it is critical that this be encouraged.
 - Mobilizing local contractors should be a top priority, especially when resources are low.
- > Allow residents with Premise ID's to:
 - sign a waiver that states they will take responsibility for themselves when they choose to reenter an Evacuation Order Area;

- to bring in other adult support to assist in the response on their own land or in support of BCWS response utilizing their own equipment; (utilizing my own disking equipment to build fireguard and to reclaim the land versus a cat guard reduced the cost of reclamation significantly;) and
- allow ranchers and farmers to bring in fuel and other resources to maintain their operations.
- BCWS set up a hotline that ranchers and farmers can call into and get real time fire information.
- Providing public education on how residents can Shelter in Place if they are overrun by a fire.

The Agriculture Coordinators produce this newsletter once a month for distribution by email to a subscriber list. Moving forward, the most recent edition of the Growing Opportunities Newsletter will be provided on Board agendas for receipt.

At the time of the September publication, there were 73 subscribers to the newsletter. By comparison, our first issue in June 2021 had 43 subscribers. Our goal is to have the subscribership continue to grow each month. We promote the newsletter primarily through social media.

The subscribers come from across the RDBN, and include ranchers, small-scale producers, government representatives and agricultural organizations.

The topic choices per issue are selected based on what is happening within the RDBN region as well as within the Agriculture Department at the time. The GO Team welcomes article suggestions.

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


BC GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCEMENTS

New Meat Licensing System

On July 20, 2021, the BC Government announced the new changes to the meat inspection and licensing system in BC for agricultural producers. These changes come into effect on October 1, 2021.

There will be no changes to the current abattoir facility licensing except in name. However; these changes could provide opportunities for small-scale producers wanting to sell meat locally within the RDBN.



Increasing Housing Flexibility in the ALR

On July 12, 2021, the BC Government announced the new rules around housing on Agricultural Reserve Lands in BC. Examples of the changes include ALR properties having guest houses, accommodations above an existing building, manufactured home, and construction of new residences.



Invasive Plants on your Property - What to do?

The RDBN is one of the partner organizations of the Northwest Invasive Plant Council (NWIPC). The NWIPC is a non-profit organization that manages non-native, invasive plants across northwestern BC. The partnership between the RDBN and NWIPC includes:

- The NWIPC monitors for invasive plants at RDBN managed sites (eg. landfills) and will remove invasive plants from these sites through biological, chemical, mechanical or a combination of methods. These sites are monitored annually. Additionally, the NWIPC will respond to private lands within the RDBN that have invasive species of highest priority.
- Managed through the NWIPC, the RDBN sponsors the Landowner Invasive Plant Removal Rebate Program for landowners within the RDBN. This program will cover some of the cost incurred by landowners who hire an approved contractor in to remove invasive plants from their property. There are invasive plant removal contractors located in Vanderhoof, Burns Lake, and Smithers.
- RDBN funding support to NWIPC also goes towards public education, and the promotion of the Play Clean Go program. This program is an education initiative to stop the spread of invasive species in parks and natural areas.

If you think you have an invasive plant species on your property, here are a few things you can do:

- 1. Download the <u>'Report Invasive Species' App</u> (Apple and Android) to help ID and report the plant and its location (submit your report even if out of cell range, it'll load when you get back into service).
- 2. Contact the NWIPC directly at **1-866-449-3337** if you have a priority invasive plant on your property (see link below).
- 3. Consider hiring an **approved contractor** to remove invasive plants from your property and apply for the **Landowner Rebate** to help with the costs.
- 4. Check out the RDBN's <u>Invasive Species page on the RDBN Agriculture website</u> for more information and other helpful links. And continue reading below for more information.



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Got Grasshoppers?

Many ranchers in the RDBN are reporting high numbers of grasshoppers in their pastures and crops resulting in damage and loss. In July, Michelle Roberge, RDBN Regional Agriculture Coordinator - East visited Nechako Valley Cattlemen's Association member Alex Kulchar's property with Keith Uloth, Pest Monitoring Research Manager with the Peace BC Grain Producers Association and Karen Tabe, Regional Agrologist. Keith did some sampling and the group talked about emerging information on the different species in the RDBN that pose issues for producers.

The RDBN is working on a grasshopper field day to help inform ranchers and producers about grasshopper ID, lifecycle and best management practices. More on that to come.

To get you started on understanding grasshoppers - download the *Grasshopper ID & Control Methods* guide created by Dr. Dan Johnson out of the University of Lethbridge in Alberta. Dan is a foremost expert in Canada on grasshopper. Dan's guide is a free resource available online.

We were grateful to have the opportunity to connect with so many members of the agricultural community.

We also had the wonderful opportunity to attend each of the seven Farmers' Markets in the RDBN as part of an initiative to promote the RDBN Connecting Consumers to Producers Food Directory and support local producers by taking-over each market. This included a same day draw where the prize was a compilation of fresh, local product from the market. As our communities move through the fall seasonal changes, the Federal Election and the 4th wave of the COVID-19 pandemic, agriculture is one of the anchors throughout our region. We feel that local agriculture provides our region with an essential framework of local food security, community connection and economic stability. A big thank you to producers in the RDBN that are so essential, and to the consumers that support them.



The RDBN Agriculture Coordinators will be attending the RegenBC Conference later this month to be part of discussions around regenerative agriculture concepts and innovations that consider climate change and environmental sustainability in the context of farming. 
Climate Action Initiative Webinars!

The impacts of climate change to agriculture are becoming more and more evident throughout the RDBN. The RDBN works closely with the Climate & Agriculture Initiative BC (CAI). This organization assists the province's agriculture sector with adapting to climate change by:

- Creating networks and fostering partnerships and collaboration
- · Implementing projects to demonstrate, test and evaluate approaches and practices
- Developing resources and tools
- Sharing information and transferring knowledge

The CAI website has excellent information for producers to understand and learn more about the impacts of climate change to agriculture. 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Aucaons

Sending livestock to auction or market is a big component of the agricultural economy and operations in the RDBN. Many of the auction markets offer livestock sales for specific species, including cattle, horses, sheep, pigs, and goats. These auctions are great opportunities to either sell off livestock to larger markets or purchase new stock for your operations. In the spring, bull sales dominate the auction landscape, and by fall the auction calendar fills up with regular markets mainly for cattle. Additionally, many of the auction companies offer equipment sales, another great opportunity for producers to find used farm equipment, tractors, and tack. Nearly all auction houses now offer online bidding options, so you can bid from the comfort of your home, and you have the chance to bid on animals and items from other regions in the province and western Canada.

Things to consider when you are selling or buying from an auction...

- Additional fees. Depending on if you are selling or buying, there are additional auctioneer fees that are charged on your sale. Check the fine print of the auction house for their rates.
- **Bidding Online.** Most online auctions allow you to bid your 'maximum price' on an item. The auction will automatically raise your bid, depending on other bids that come in, until you reach your maximum. This allows you to bid once and leave the auction, as many of the online auctions last multiple days. You can increase your maximum bid at any time.
- **Pick-up.** Each auction house has their own rules around when you need to pick-up your animals or items after the auction is over. Be sure to come prepared with big enough trailers and trucks to fit all your items, and enough help on pick-up day.

Dear Chair Gerry Thiessen and Directors:

I would like to personally thank you and your delegation for meeting virtually with me and my Ministry staff during the 2021 Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) Annual Convention. While COVID-19 has continued to challenge our ability to meet face-to-face, our call was a positive opportunity to discuss where we can work together.

It was a pleasure to hear from you in my first convention experience as Minister of Citizens' Services, and I appreciated hearing about the issues and opportunities for connectivity in your region. Topics raised during the virtual meeting included:

- Updates on approved and conditionally-approved connectivity projects in your area.
- Streamlining access to passive infrastructure, such as hydro poles.
- The Northwest BC Resource Benefits Alliance.

We recognize that connectivity is critical to enabling and supporting the delivery of accessible and responsive services that people in B.C. count on. Fast, affordable connectivity provides people with equitable access to opportunities for education, work and business, as well as to access online services and stay connected with those who matter to them most.

Since 2017, our government has invested \$190 million into expanding connectivity, with almost \$90 million committed to new connectivity projects throughout B.C. since October 2020 as part of the Connecting British Columbia program's Economic Recovery Intake. We have made great progress connecting more people than ever before. However, we know there is more to do and we will need to work together to solve the remaining infrastructure challenges in the province.

Thank you for sharing that you are moving towards a partner agreement with CityWest. We were pleased to give you an update on the applications you have made to the Connecting British Columbia program, administered by Northern Development Initiative Trust. While we do not have control over decisions that the federal government makes on their programs, please be assured I will be calling my federal counterpart to enquire about timelines for projects yet to be reviewed in the Universal Broadband Fund. The Provincial funding portion for a project is held until a final decision on Federal applications is reached.

We recognize that issues with access to hydro poles in connectivity projects can cause project delays. My Ministry is committed to working with BC Hydro and the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Low Carbon Innovation to address timely and equitable access to hydro poles, and I am pleased to hear that BC Hydro has also committed to follow up with your district to discuss any concerns you have. Any project that receives Provincial funding is required to provide open access to the built infrastructure. I am committed to continuing this principle in any future funding models.

I appreciate you bringing up your comments and concerns around the Northwest BC Regional Benefits Alliance. Please know that we heard this theme from other communities, and I will pass these comments on to my colleagues in government.

Thank you also to your district for participating in the Internet Speed Study, being led in partnership between the Ministry of Citizens' Services, UBCM and Northern Development Initiative Trust. The study is assessing the magnitude of discrepancy between internet speeds experienced by people in rural communities in B.C. and those listed in the National Broadband Availability Map, and was started because of concerns expressed from communities like yours. Your participation helps us understand the issue better so that it can be addressed. We sincerely appreciate your involvement in the study. Results of the study will be available later this year.

As mentioned on the call, staff in the Connectivity Division would be happy to follow up with you, and I understand a meeting has already been booked. My door is also always open.

I found it very valuable to hear from you and other communities throughout the week. Meetings such as this help me better understand the issues your community is facing around connectivity.
