Subject:	Bylaw 1879 Schedule D: User Fees and Disposal Rules - Proposed Amendments

RECOMMENDATION

That the Committee review, discuss and provide input.

BACKGROUND

In April 2020, the Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako Solid Waste Management Facility Regulation and User Fee Amendment Bylaw No. 1879, 2019 was approved by the Ministry of Environment and adopted by the RDBN Board of Directors. Since implementation of the new fee schedule, staff have encountered challenges with the some of the wording as well as the need for additional categories to address new circumstances in the waste management operation. The proposed amendments offer clarity to what wastes are accepted, how the fees can be applied and an update to the disposal fees.

Staff would like to submit an amendment to the Ministry by June 2022.

The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy currently has a two-month approval process for simple Bylaw changes. Staff had inquired about separating disposal fees from the bylaw to bypass the Ministry approval process, but have been informed that this in not permitted.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO SCHEDULE D: USER FEES AND DISPOSAL RULES

Bylaw 1879, Schedule D is presented below with corresponding proposed changes for each category. The rates present are for 2023 but can be implemented in 2022 if the approval process is completed. The Bylaw amendment may also include wording or specific rates to allow for annual CPI increases for the next 5 years.

Subject: Wood Waste Operations Update

RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

In 2021, Environmental Services Staff evaluated the way wood waste was collected, transported, and disposed-of throughout the region. Historically, wood waste was collected at the transfer stations in a single bay and hauled by the RDBN to the Landfills for disposal. Knockholt, Granisle and Southside Transfer stations collected clean wood and brush separately for periodic, on-site burning.

Numerous initiatives were commenced in 2021 to improve operational efficiencies and reduce the impact on the landfill, which included the establishment of sorting bays, re-organizing hauling strategy, wood grinding and sourcing an air curtain burner.

CURRENT WOOD WASTE MANAGMENT

Collection

Sorting bays for separating brush, clean dimensional lumber and Contaminated wood (painted, treated, stained, furniture etc.) have been established at the Smithers, Burns Lake, Area 'D' and Vanderhoof Transfer Stations. The separations bays provide a way to monitor the volumes of each material, allowing the RDBN to collect data for future diversion programs. These bays are accessible to the public for drop-off and for salvage (if safe to do so). In general, the sorting bays have been successful in achieving their purpose, however, if the wood bays are not managed properly and emptied before they are full, the public utilizes whatever space is convenient to dispose of their wood waste. At all sites, brush was kept contaminant free, but clean and contaminated wood became mixed.

Identified Challenges are: educating the public and more effective management of the bays.

In 2022, staff is planning to establish wood sorting bays at the Ft. St. James Transfer Station and the Knockholt Landfill. Staff is also considering the inclusion of larger diameter wood (currently limited to 6" diameter) and stumps.

Transport:

Formerly, wood waste was loaded and hauled to landfills by dedicating 2 days per week and emptying each site once per year. This strategy functioned but was often time-constrained and put unnecessary



pressure on sites and staff.

In 2021, an alternative wood waste hauling strategy was piloted in the Eastern RDBN. This new strategy utilized Roll-off bins at Ft. St. James and Area 'D' Transfer Stations which could be loaded by Site Attendants and hauled once per week which has the advantage of keeping the wood piles small and utilizing the existing Roll-off driver. In 2022, this strategy will be built-upon by adding a Roll-off truck to the RDBN fleet which will be driven by the current East Haul Driver or Field Assistant and minimize idle time. In addition, the excavator will be stationed at the Vanderhoof Transfer Station and used to load wood waste into the 53ft trailer and hauled by the current East Haul Driver or field assistant. This will allow for at least 1 load to be hauled from each Eastern site, once per week, while utilizing existing labour. Additional loads may be possible if the Temporary Landfill Attendant has capacity.

The wood waste hauling strategy in the western RDBN will remain as before, which will include rotating an excavator between the Burns Lake and Smithers Transfer Stations. This program will dedicate 1-2 days per week, and utilize the existing part-time waste haul driver, to transport wood to the Landfill.

Disposal:

Formerly, all wood waste was mixed and therefore landfilled except for minor amounts of clean wood and brush at Granisle, Knockholt and Southside which conducted periodic burning of this material.

Separating the wood waste offers opportunity for diversion. Currently there are no local markets for any of the material collected at RDBN Transfer Stations, however having source separated wood waste reduces the amount of landfilled material and thus saves airspace and extends the life of the landfills.

Contaminated wood waste is a challenging material to recycle and only specialized facilities can safely burn it. As Northern BC has no such facility, contaminated wood is destined for the landfill. Staff discovered that coarsely ground wood waste is used as daily cover material at other Landfills, which classifies it as "re-purposed" material and thus is not considered "disposal" under current regulation. In late 2021, staff arranged a wood grinding demonstration, to compare two types of grinders and assess the costs of both self-operating (rental) and contract grinding. At the Clearview Landfill and contractor was hired to grind 45 trailer loads of contaminated wood waste, which was accomplished in two (2) days for approximately \$20,000. The RDBN rented a smaller grinder and self-operated at the Smithers Transfer Station to process about 45 loads of contaminated wood waste, which was accomplished in two (2) weeks for approximately \$20,000. The ground material is ideal daily cover and reduces the need for soil. Moving forward, Staff will likely utilize both contract and rental grinding to process our wood, depending on need, availability and timing.

Brush and Clean Wood may have future markets in the region but currently the only option to divert this material from the landfill is to burn it. Obtaining authorization to open burn requires appropriate venting conditions (wind and vertical mixing) which greatly limits the ability to plan, especially during winter months. In January 2022, the RDBN purchased an air curtain incinerator (ACI) which can operate regardless of venting conditions as it is designed to reduce emissions. This ACI was tested in March and staff learned that, for efficient burning, we must adjust the way we handle brush to minimize the soil content of the stockpile. It was also realized that the clean wood (lumber) can be used as a tool to promote cleaner burning of poorer fuels. Overall, the ACI is a success and the operation will improve with experience.

CLOSURE



In 2021, staff made numerous changes to the way wood waste is collected, hauled and disposed. In general the new strategies have been successful, however, there are certain operations that have yet to be fully implemented and there are, of course efficiencies to be gained in 2022 and beyond.
